Successful Community Fair augurs well

IN THE past Beaconsfield was traditionally famous for its sports day held each year on the race track at 'old' Beaconsfield (in the approximate area between the Central Hotel and the new Central Park Estate). Held each Easter Monday, people came from far and wide.

On Saturday, April 1, 1989 people again came from far and wide to enjoy Beaconsfield's very first Community Fair, held by the Progress Association in conjunction with Yakkerboo at the Wood Street Squash Centre.

Although attendance was not huge it is hoped that a new tradition has been borne in Beaconsfield where local people of all ages can entertain and be entertained and community organisations can promote and raise funds for themselves and have fun.

The forecasters initially predicted a fine day then gradually they changed from warm, still and fine, to wet, windy and dull! By Friday our worst fears were confirmed — it looked even worse than the bad forecast! Come Saturday morning at 7am when the first stall holders arrived, it was realised that the Meteorological office were playing April Fool. The sun was out and it remained a fine sunny day throughout.

Much hard work, preparation and promotion went into the fair —

very much by Noel Tonks, owner of the Squash Court Centre where the fair was held. Few people realised how ideal the setting could be.

The whole site was well laid out with hot food stalls at the northern end of the car park. History followed with a Progress Association stall featuring local history. City of Berwick Councillor John Byron at the last moment brought along a trailer full of memorabilia. The interest created was enormous and maybe this stall may become a bigger feature of future fairs.

Craft and Art stalls, cakes and plants then occupied the whole long length of the verandahs around the perimeter of the building.

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Hints from Mother A tribute to **Nature's Corner**

ALL gardens grow weeds! They need no planting, become pests, yet provide the basis for the most important requirement for a future garden: the compost supply.

Special bins are available but an easy to build loose brick 'hold' can be made quite easily. Sizes vary according to material but a moderate, easy to handle heap can be made in an area of a metre square. approx. 80cm high on three sides allowing the front to give access for a monthly forking over. It is also advisable to build a similar bin next to it where refuse can be dumped as the full one matures - thus in only a few months the waste is turned to valuable food for plants.

Any refuse which has grown vegetable peelings, stalks, tea or coffee grounds, even shredded paper -can be thrown away on the compost. When weeds are used, it is best not to put in seeding heads, although with constant regular "turnings" with a garden fork, seedlings become compost. Pelargointo short lengths to rot and lawn cuttings are a must for pliable compost soils.

Flat dwellers - impatient gardeners - will find any nursery has bags of compost available, but even an old plastic bucket (covered with a wet sack) will soon provide a small supply which can be used to make a soil-less garden. We will have instructions for that in another
