Marie Tehan's address referred to the fact that public parks would be linked along the Creek as and when land became available.

With much new planting of indigenous trees throughout and provision of barbecues and shelter, the Manna Gum park is well worth visiting.

It was a cool and misty morning, which did not stop several greenies visiting to protest against the felling of old forest trees in East Gippsland and other allied issues.

ROCHE FARM REZONED

Speaking of impending development, the Roche farm has been rezoned to allow urban development. The developing company has been named Berwick Views Pty. Ltd. and is also planning on calling the estate "Berwick Views". The rezoning allows for 1066 lots, however the developer's plans call for a lot yield of 800 to 900 lots. The developer has applied for a planning permit to subdivide and

develop the first part along Beaconsfield-Emerald Road towards Holm Park Road. Documents detailing the entire estate can be inspected at the Cardinia Shire Offices. Council has not voted on the subdivision therefore you can address your comments or concerns to the Shire Offices concerning the development. This will be the only opportunity you will have to comment on the estate.



FRIENDS OF CARDINIA CREEK SANCTUARY

The Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary have held monthly working bees since the formation of the group in March 1998. Group activities included weed control, flora and fauna identification and assessment of areas for future work. The group is also beginning to write a Management Plan for the Sanctuary to ensure the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna is appropriately conserved.

The biggest problem facing the Sanctuary is the impact of the surrounding suburbs. The Cardinia Creek. streamside vegetation and native flora and fauna are being greatly affected by increased pollution, weed invasion, surrounding vegetation clearance, pest animals and misuse by some sanctuary visitors.

There are a number of things you can do to help look after the Sanctuary:

- 1. Dispose of garden waste properly by composting or putting out for waste collection. Many common garden plants have become major weeds within the Sanctuary due to people dumping garden clippings.
- 2. Become aware of which plants are environmental weeds in your area and do not plant these in your garden. Many garden plants such as Sweet Pittosporum, Ivy and introduced grasses have been brought into the Sanctuary by birds and dumped garden clippings and have invaded many areas. reducing the diversity of indigenous flora. Contact Council for information on local weeds.
- 3. Do not collect firewood in the Sanctuary. Fallen logs provide habitat for small native animals such as Bandicoots and Antechinus and dead trees

- provide hollows for possums and birds. They also break down to add nutrients to the soil for regeneration.
- 4. Reduce pollution entering our waterways- ensure rubbish does not enter storm water systems, - do not let soapy water enter storm water drains, eg. after washing cars, dogs etc. Surfactants in detergents are harmful to aquatic plants and animals. - do not dispose of paints, oils chemicals etc into drains.
- 5. When visiting the Sanctuary "LEAVE ONLY FOOTPRINTS" - Only use the tracks provided - do not trample the vegetation take your rubbish home with you.
- 6. Become a friend Members have found their involvement with the group extremely rewarding. It provides the

local community with an opportunity to learn about and help conserve our local environment. members of all ages are welcome. A variety of activities are planned for the new months including revegetation and fauna surveys. Working bees are held on the fourth Sunday of each Month 9am - 12 noon. Members meets

Above: - Ivan Jensen Ivan Jensen, who was the proprietor of the Trading Centre near the Baptist Church, died on 6th June, 1998. Ivan was a happygo-lucky man who most people will remember fondly. He had a smile and a joke for everyone and was always generous, thinking of others and how he could help.


Now what goes on inside that building? If you have ever come to Make and Mingle at the Beacie Baps, then you would know that the building is a friendly place, where people gather for various reasons.

If you have been a tradesperson for fifty years, how many times have you hit your thumb with the hammer? Thumbs are certainly hardy, I still have the same thumbs but, gee I've had a lot of hammers.

I shudder when I see lengths of timber loaded into sedan cars via the rear window with a metre or so sticking out. A friend did that some years ago. On his way home he swerved and the timber hit a post, swung around inside the car hitting him on the head. He lost his hearing and luckily kept his head. He was the first recipient of the bionic ear, which is a scientific

masterpiece. The accident happened in Dandenong it could happen here.

I have some good pieces of treated pine trellis, a year and a half old, 3 metres by 900mm for sale very cheap. They can be cut lengthwise to be used as fence extensions. Just \$10. a length which is half price.

CHICKENPOX

Chicken pox is known as a common childhood illness affecting children 5-9 years of age in 50% of cases according to an informative leaflet titled "Chickenpox", available from Keoghs Pharmacy, Beaconsfield.

Chickenpox cannot be cured but can be managed palliatively via nonprescription measures in the pharmacy. If there is any sign of bacterial superinfection, people should see their doctor.

There have been many cases of chicken pox, both in children and adults and several cases of shingles noted in Beaconsfield this year. There is medication available to treat shingles but it is only effective if commenced very early once symptoms (pain followed by rash) appear. A doctor must be consulted as soon as possible.



OUR NATURAL WORLD

The world of the occult is an area of life rarely entered into deliberately by most people, but this does not alter the fact that there are strange forces and events present in our over technicalized world, that do not fit into comfortable pigeon holes. Nature does not deny itself simply for man's comfort of mind.

The poet Robert Graves stated in 1969 that, "Occult powers are not so rare. One person in every 20 possesses them in some form."

This is an exact figure, 5 percent. This is also the figure for the "dominant minority" among human beings. In the early years of this century, Bernard Shaw asked the explorer Henry Stanley, "How many of his men could take over leadership of the party if he, Stanley, were ill"? "One in twenty," said Stanley. "Is that figure exact or approximate?" he was asked. "Exact".

The matter of the dominant 5 percent was re-discovered during the Korean War by the Chinese. To economise on manpower, they decided to divide their American prisoners into two groups; the enterprising ones and the passive ones. They soon discovered that the enterprising soldiers were exactly one in twenty, 5 percent. When this dominant group was removed from the rest of the group, the others could be left with almost no guard at all.



BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE FEBRUARY 1944 TO AUGUST 1998.

From its small headquarters in Wood Street this volunteer organisation has been guardian over our community for over 50 years, 365 days a year, 24 hours a day, protecting us and our property in all sorts of emergencies.

31 people attended the inaugural meeting of the Brigade at the old Beaconsfield Hall on Monday 7th February 1944. The Beaconsfield Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade was formed with H. Cole- President, F. Heathcote - Vice President and R. Robson-Secretary. Over the years the following captains were appointed: W. Johnson, O.C. Williams, L. Kidd, R. Bailleu, F. Fitzgerald, J. Cornfield, M. Howard, R. Bailey, R. Reid, J. Whitehead, P. Aurisch, R. Burgess, T. Lukas and R. Woodfine.

The longest serving Captain was Bob Burgess. Initially the Brigade in July 1945 moved in an old Army hut from Yallourn. Subsequently two more buildings and additions were added to complete what is there today. The first official meeting at the Fire Station was held on 7th October, 1946.

Today the Brigade has 24 active members plus 3 juniors. They have 3 female members, one of whom holds the position of Officer. There is a Captain, 4 Lieutenants, a Communications Officer, Secretary, Treasurer & 2 Crew leaders. Training is held on each Sunday morning and the third Tuesday of each month at 7.30pm.

BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE FEBRUARY 1944 TO AUGUST 1998.



Currently the Brigade is equipped with 2 fire fighting tankers. Tanker 1 was acquired after the Ash Wednesday fires in 1983. It is an International truck 4x4 and carries 3,000 litres of water plus 6 crew. It is fitted out to tackle Bush Fires.

Tanker 2 also carries 3,000 litres of water but is a 2 wheel drive Isuzu. It is designed for construction fires and is fitted out with breathing apparatus and salvage equipment. Both trucks however are used on call outs for traffic accidents.



The business side of the volunteer Brigade is to respond to all emergencies. After the 000 emergency calls each member gets alerted on their personal pagers. When they attend emergencies they initially assess each event, contain the area concerned and co-ordinate with all other emergency and essential services. They are partly trained in 1st aid and through the C.F.A., S. East Training Ground they are thoroughly trained in all other aspects of emergency. These include hot fire attack, vehicle accidents, constructionfires, use of breathing apparatus etc.

On the social side of the volunteer Brigade they enjoy nights out at bowling, at group harbecues and at Christmas parties. On more official business they attend the Yakkerboo Parade, Beaconsfield Bonfire Nights and other School Fetes and Fairs. For public relations they regularly attend schools and kindergartens in the area.

In the past they have tackled major fires including Ash Wednesday in 1983, the cool store fire in Beaconsfield. Bushfires in East Gippsland, Bush Fires in N.S.W. and major fires on the Mornington peninsula.

Future trends indicate more jobs locally due to growth m population and businesses.

In recognition of Service, all members retain record of service cards. Plaques and certificates are awarded for fire fighter of the year, long service and outstanding service. All service to the Beaconsfield Volunteer Fire Brigade is meticulously monitored. Each member is well insured for the often dangerous events they are required to attend. However they are well qualified and trained and continue to be so, mostly on the charitable and tax deductable donations of the Beaconsfield Community.

CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU 20 YEARS OLD

Shire President Mr Ted Owens officially opened the Pakenham Citizens Advice Bureau on July 31st 1978. The idea of Citizen Advice Bureaux originated in England where they started during the Second World War to assist people through through trauma and turmoil. By 1978 there were 700 of these centres operating in England providing similar service for the general public.

Bureaux came to Victoria in 1968 and by 1978 there were 55 of them established in both Country and City parts of the State There became an obvious need for such a service in Pakenham and the District Care for the Aged Committee got things moving. Six volunteers undertook special training and the Agency opened their new Information and Referral Service at the Community House.

The original Secretary Mrs Dulcie Veenstra is still an active member of the staff as is Mrs Ann Ramsdale, another founding member. The first treasurer Mrs Billy Clarke gave many years service to the bureau.

Initially the bureau only opened for two hours a week but demand has increased and now it opens 10pm till 3pm Monday to Friday. There is a need to increase volunteer staff and they are always keen to take on interested people.

The team at CAB works hard to keep up with ever changing community needs. Bill now heads up the information team, Sue attends to the many information pamphlets available and Lyn is the training officer for new volunteers. There is a 12 week TAFE course that they have to attend. New members often bring fresh enthusiasm and ideas with

SPRING IS COMING

With the worst of winter behind us, gardeners can look forward to the favourite season, 'Spring'. Bulbs such as daffodils, hyacinths and freesias together with blossom and new growth on deciduous trees and shrubs are heralding the arrival of Spring already, and we look forward to a great season.

Now is the time to prepare beds for flowering annuals such as Petunia, Marigolds and Impatiens and also the vegetable garden. So dig over your beds to allow air into the soil and add organic fertiliser such as blood and bone or manure. Early fruiting tomatoes can be started now, but will need protection from the cold nights.




