


BIKE BUNGLE





Sunday 23rd August saw a horse float enter under the low railway bridge and exit the other side without its white fibreglass roof! The driver did not stop to pick up the mess left lying in the centre of the road, nor did he come back later. Saturday 29th August a horse float pulled by a grey Four Wheel Drive approached the bridge from Beaconsfield Ave. narrowly avoiding disaster.

Yet again on that same day another horse float towed by a white Commodore hit the low bridge from the south side ripping off the fibreglass roof. Sadly the horse on board was injured and had to be pacified and treated by a Vet. on site

the course provides you with skills and the confidence to teach English.



THE JOURNEY WITHIN

Below are extracts of an article written by Kathleen Garraway of Beaconsfield who acted as 'carer' for her husband David who suffered and died from cancer. It is an intimate account of her thoughts and feelings and has been published in the book TOGETHER ALONE'. With many similar articles from carers, the book raises much needed money for the Anti-Cancer Council for research, education, patient and family support.

I still haven't come up with an ideal scenario for my six year-old self. Maybe I have been dealing with reality for too long. That seems to be my role in life. Reality. Reality only hurts if you let it. It is when I start to fantasise that it starts to hurt. Fantasies have a habit of not living up to life's expectations. Reality hurts less. I don't expect so much from reality. Christ, that sounds depressing.

I have never put that into words before. That must be how I have been dealing with LIFE. All these years I have been hiding in reality because it hurts less. How

It is a nice clear day today. The birds are doing what birds have always done. I have always envied the birds. I have just sent D's letter to him on the Hibachi barbecue which is on the patio. I had a cup of tea and a cigarette. I also put a photo in with the letter. I hope it reaches him. At the moment I don't seem to feel very much. I hope this little ceremony helps me. It probably won't help D. I am feeling down because of the last few days. I have probably put off this

ceremony because it feels so final. I have kept a diary for the last three years. It seemed to help me when I put my feelings on paper. The file was called HOPE at first. I suppose in the hope that I would get through the mess and survive. Now I called it HEALING. What shall I call it next? WINGS? I could never figure out why the Beatles called their album Wings. I think I have some understanding now. It is a metamorphosis of the mind and spirit more than the body. Perhaps I am wrong, about the Beatles, I mean.

Its funny how the mind and spirit can be governed by the physical body. They are two different entities, but at times they are one. I would like to know how some people can separate one from the other. I can't.

One thing I have discovered is that it is okay to feel as you do. There is no right or wrong way to feel. There are no rules on feelings. To be told that you shouldn't feel like this or that, is wrong. To be a carer of a terminal loved one is not normal. Consequently what you feel will not be normal. At times I doubted my own sanity.

My feelings were at times rage, despair, desperation, helplessness, regret. confusion. D said, "its not fair". No it's not! Not to him, not to any of us. D was a husband, father, son, brother in law, uncle, friend, neighbour, workmate. M: sister was only eight when D came into our lives.

I was asked once if I was ever lonely. No I wasn't. Although at times I felt alone.



Its funny how the mind and spirit can be governed by the physical body. They are two different entities, but at times they are one. I would fantasise that it starts to like to know how some people can separate one from the other. I can't.

> One thing I have discovered is that it is okay to feel as you do. There is no right or wrong way to feel. There are no rules on feelings. To be told that you shouldn't feel like this or that, is wrong. To be a carer of a terminal loved one is not normal. Consequently what you feel will not be normal. At times I doubted my own sanity.

My feelings were at times rage, despair, desperation, helplessness, regret, confusion. D said, "its not fair". No it's not! Not to him, not to any of us. D was a husband, father, son, brother in law, uncle, friend, neighbour, workmate. My sister was only eight when D came into our lives.

I was asked once if I was ever lonely. No I wasn't. Although at times I felt



OUR NATURAL WORLD

Plants, apart from their practical or decorative uses to man, also have interesting myths and legends attached to them. Many of these have come down through the centuries. The list is long and would fill a large book, but we'll mention a few here to convey the "substance" of our article.

Thyme is well known to all cooks and hardly needs further comment in the art of cooking. During mediaeval times the plant symbolised courage and to keep up their spirits, the knights departed for crusades with scarves embroidered with a sprig of thyme from their ladies. There was a popular belief that a leaf tea prevented nightmares, while another held that the tea enabled one to see nymphs and fairies. To sleep on thyme and inhale it was also regarded as a powerful remedy for melancholy and epilepsy.

Tansy or 'stinking willy' is a very handy member of the daisy family and its name is a corruption of the Greek word for immortality -'Athanasia'. Because of its strong smell. Tansy is a natural insect repellent. In the Middle Ages dried tansy was scattered across floors to keep pests away. Housewives hung it from rafters, packed it between bedsheets and mattresses and rubbed it on meat to discourage lice, flies and other vermin. In England the leaves were used to flavour Tansy cakes eaten during lent. Their bitter taste symbolised Christ's suffering.

Solomon's Seal (Lily Family) was used by mediaeval herbalists to heal wounds due to the deep scars along its rootstock that had been set there by that very wise King of Israel and legendary magician after whom the plant was named. The sixteenth century herbalist, Gerard, claimed that Solomon's Seal was a panacea for wounds, cuts and bruises of all kinds including those ' gotten by falls or women's wilfulness in stumbling on their hasty husbands fists". Domestic violence is not new!

St John's Wort, or hypericum, was a plant of supernatural origins. The ancient Greeks believed that the fragrance of St John's Wort would cause all evil spirits to fly away. The early Christians converted the herb into a symbol of St John the Baptist because it flowers about the 24th of June, the day the Church designated as St Johns Day. However Christian priests in the middle ages continued the pagan rite of using the plant in exorcisms and European peasants used a sprig as a charm against witchcraft and because of these beliefs the plant was used to treat madness and melancholia.

Sacred Basil, of the mint family, is a holy Hindu herb revered in India as an incarnation of Tulsi, the beloved of Lord Krishna. Sacred Basil is also a native of Australia and Northern Aboriginals were well informed of the herb's medicinal prowess. The explorer Ludwig Leichart even used it, adding it to soups and stews.

The plant kingdom is interesting for other reasons than for food preparation and medicine. Each has a story to tell, their own personal legend.

GARDENERS PAGE FROM BERWICK GREENERY

Plenty to do and enjoy in the garden at this time of year.

Fertilising is still high on the list of priorities. Carmel has, Rhododendrons and Azaleas that have finished flowering will benefit from fertilising and trimming back, as will any shrubs that have finished flowering.

Spring flowering bulbs that have finished flowering should be fed as the foliage dies down, assisting the formation of flower buds for next season. Do not cut off the leaves of daffodils and other bulbs until they have turned yellow, as this prevents the nutrients going back into the bulbs. If they look untidy, try tying the leaves in knots.

Lawns will benefit from fertilising at this time, as well as the removal of weeds and oversowing if necessary.

It is also a great time to If you have passed the prepare and sow new lawns.

Watch for aphids on new shoots, particularly on roses, and treat appropriately with a pyretherum based spray. Roses should also be preventatively sprayed for fungal disease such as black spot and powdery mildew. Snails and slugs are also about, particularly after it rains. If you are worried about animals eating the snail pellets, there are products on the market which we can recommend that are both safe to animals or contain animal deterrents.

Lots of vegies in stock for the home vegie garden, and of course now is the ideal time to get most of them going. Tomatoes would be the best seller, but leafy vegetables, cucumbers, strawberries, parsley and basil have all been popular as well.

GARDENERS PAGE FROM BERWICK GREENERY

Plenty to do and enjoy in the garden at this time of year.

Fertilising is still high on the list of priorities. Carmel has, Rhododendrons and Azaleas that have finished flowering will benefit from fertilising and trimming back, as will any shrubs that have finished flowering.

Spring flowering bulbs that have finished flowering should be fed as the foliage dies down, assisting the formation of flower buds for next season. Do not cut off the leaves of daffodils and other bulbs until they have turned yellow, as this prevents the nutrients going back into the bulbs. If they look untidy, try tying the leaves in knots.

Watch for aphids on new shoots, particularly on roses, and treat appropriately with a pyretherum based spray. Roses should also be preventatively sprayed for fungal disease such as black spot and powdery mildew. Snails and slugs are also about, particularly after it rains. If you are worried about animals eating the snail pellets, there are products on the market which we can recommend that are both safe to animals or contain animal deterrents.






