BEACONSFIELD STRATEGY SCHOOL PARKING AND TRAFFIC FLOWS

Action was recently initiated by Beaconsfield Primary School Council in running a forum with parents and residents of Lyle Avenue and Wallace Street to consider possible solutions to parking and traffic flow problems at school drop off and pick up times. Being an issue identified within the Beaconsfield Strategy document, support was provided by Cardinia Shire by attendance of their Planning Department representative who viewed problems at first hand prior to, and participated later at the forum. A number of possible solutions were brought

forward and will be taken by the Shire for consideration and possible development. Regretfully all agreed that problems would not exist but for the few with their own self interest at heart.

Beaconsfield Progress Association supports the school in their efforts and as part of their 1999 activities plans to drive this and other initiatives outlined within the Strategy document. These include Wood Street Old Highway intersection controls, median strip beautification, parking problems in general, bylaws enforcement and public toilet provisions.

BEACONSFIELD'S HANDYMAN

The Hills Rotary hoist was once a national symbol along with Holden FJ's and Merino sheep. The Hills hoist is great until it seizes up and it can't be raised or lowered. Such was the case with ours recently and I was "urged" to put it right. It didn't take long to dismantle and clean the cogs, apply some new grease and it now winds up to catch the breeze and down again to take in the drys. Don't put up with a stiff hoist - call the Handyman.

Many pergolas these days are roofed with Laserlite and other similar materials. It keeps the outdoor living area dry but it can be quite warm on sunny days particularly if there isn't a draught of air. Faced with this situation recently I

made and fitted a shade cloth blind on the underside of the pergola roof. This lowered the temperature immediately and provided a nice shaded area. In Winter it slides back on wires and parks at either side in neat folds. The 7 metre long pergola was "shaded" for \$240. including materials all purchased at Loveridges.

Clothes dryers emit moisture and clothes fluff which can be messy. I have fitted ducting to one dryer through the brick wall; another was ducted through the plaster into the wall cavity. I don't fancy too much wetness in the wall but the fluff is harmless.



OUR NATURAL WORLD

Christmas is coming and brings good times to many, sad times to others. It is the most widely celebrated festival in the world, and still has many images of the Victorian era about it, log fires, snow, hot food, Christmas pudding, stockings and other trappings of this yearly celebration.

Unique expressions of Christmas by different peoples throughout the world have been lost or diverted by commercial interest and stripped of their true meanings.

Many of the practices and rituals of the Christian season are so old that their true significance can only be guessed at. The customs of evergreens and fire, feasting and present giving had origins going back long before the birth of Christ, and were eventually incorporated into the new Christian religion, and thus losing their pagan origins. The year and date of Christs birth are uncertain and after four centuries of bickering, the 25th December was selected as the official church approved date by Pope Julius 1, after an appeal by St. Cyril of Jerusalem to settle the matter once and for all.


The dispute did not end there however, as Russia and most European countries only accepted this date in 1918 - the longest on going row in Christianity. In Germany an 8th century missionary, St. Boniface dedicated the fir tree to the holy child in place of the sacred Oak of Odin, which he chopped down. That is why the Pine or Fir tree is the world wide symbol of Christmas.

Holly came to represent Christ's crown of thorns. In the middle ages many strange practices were introduced by the all powerful Christian Church leaders. This included Kings and Lords throwing their castles open to all and sundry, with banquets for any who came. Disorderly revels by uneducated lower clergy took place, they dressing as animals or women and burlesqued senior churchmen and mocked senior rites.

St. Stephens Day (26th December) was devoted to horses. They were bled for luck, or ridden into church and blessed by the priest, or fed consecrated salt, bread or corn. This day we call Boxing Day, and was so called hecause that was when servants and tradesmen called for their annual tips which were put into little earthenware boxes that had to be broken to release the money.

Holly Innocents Day (28th December) commemorates Herods massacres of the infant and was considered unlucky the no one would wish starting a business or getting married on that day.

Whatever it's strange and chequered history. Christmas is really a celebration of the basic goodness resident in the heart of man. The birth of Christ, (what matter the date) and the beauty of his philosophy given in his short ministry, is that which is the springboard from where we all that we hold dear emenates from. All power to Christmas!






BEACONSFIELD SCOUT NEWS


Ashley retained his dominance in the mud fight while running the 'gauntlet'.





GARDENERS PAGE FROM BERWICK GREENERY

With Christmas fast approaching, and all activities this time of year brings, time to garden is often hard to find. Yet we want our outdoor areas looking good for the friends and family who inevitably call over the festive season. Don't despair, there are plenty of colourful selections available to brighten your garden.

Summer brings some delightful treats including bougainvilleas, hibiae is, roses, geraniums, pelargoniums, fuchsias and hydrangeas. Now is the ideal time to select these and other summer flowering plants to brighten vour garden. Pots of flowering annuals such as Petunias and Impatiens are also looking good.

Plants and garden products make ideal gifts. Whether you plan ahead and plant your own baskets or pots to the last minute and purchase something in flower, plants are always well received and a constant Now is the time to prepare reminder of your best Traditional favourites like Poinsettias and Christmas lilies are also great to decorate the Christmas table.

Potted living Christmas trees, which can be enjoyed outside all year and brought inside for a few weeks at Christmas, are a good alternative to the cut ones, and can be purchased in various sizes. When taking your potted tree back outside, acclimatise it in the shade first and gradually move back into full sun over a two to three week period.

African Violets, Gerberas, mini roses and pots of colour all make affordable gifts for

with colourful flowering teachers, work colleagues and plants or herbs or leave it the like. We will gift wrap your selection free of charge at any time of the year.

> for the hot weather ahead. Check hoses and watering systems to ensure they are working correctly. Mulch garden beds to preserve moisture. Apply Debco Saturaid to garden beds and lawns to help get the water to the root system and cut down the watering requirements. Water is taken up by the root systems of plants, so remember that a good thorough watering less often is much better than an occasional sprinkling.

You may still need to spray for black spot on roses, and watch for caterpillars on vegetables and ornamentals. And after wet weather, snails and slugs will still

appear from nowhere. It is a good idea to keep up the liquid fertiliser to flowering plants. Petunias can be cut back after the first flowering (usually January) and fertilised so that they will give you another autumn flush. Roses should also be cut back late January and fed to encourage new growth and therefore more flowers.



FIRE 000 FIRE PREVENTION

No burning whatsoever is permitted on any land during the CFA declared Fire Danger Period or a day of Total Fire Ban.

As the summer months approach it is time to be prepared. The best defence is the removal of any possible fire hazards. Property owners are encouraged to slash grasses and identify hazards before the fire danger period each year. Some property owners who do not remove hazards on their land, are served with a fire prevention notice by council's fire prevention officers. These notices specify a time period in which the property owner must remove the fire hazard or face a \$200 on the spot fine. Owners must comply fully with the fire prevention notice, otherwise

their property will be cleared by council's contractors at the property owners expense.

With the risk of each bushfire season, it is important that you maintain your preparedness. Where you feel that you may not be in a position to safely stay during an emergency, then you should turn your mind to 'evacuation'.






