#### PUBLIC MEETING ON ROADS



A Public Meeting was held on Tuesday 2nd March, 1999. The Community Centre was full to capacity so it was clear that this issue had wide community support. We were fortunate in having a good turnout of officials to hear our concerns including, The Hon Neil Lucas MLC, Councillors Graeme Kidd & Ted Owen, John McCaffrey, General Manager Planning, Graeme Tutt, General Manager, Services, all from Cardinia Shire, Dean Zabrieszach & Steve Brown both from Vic Roads and Trevor Wakefield from the City of Casey.

The questions that we mentioned in the last Banner were raised and it was clear that the meeting felt that they all needed attention. For those who don't have the last Banner the main questions were :-

When the Hallam by-pass is completed traffic will be coming from Melbourne and beyond at a legal speed of 100Kph and it will be unlikely that there will be breaks in the traffic, as there are now, with the traffic lights at Narre Warren.

how will we access the freeway at Pink Hill?

Should we have Freeway access at Soldiers Road?

Is Soldiers Road going to continue straight ahead when it comes over the freeway and go through to the highway near Haileybury?

Should the railway Station be moved slightly eastwards and the level crossing moved to the west so that Wood Street could go straight ahead, over the railway line to join Soldiers Road?

What will happen with Emerald Road with the extra traffic from the new Estate on the Roche property?

What will happen to Emerald Road if Inglis Road is closed to through traffic from Upper Beaconsfield as many residents in that part of Berwick are starting to campaigning for?

Again I would like to commend all the persons involved for their generous support, care and concern. This sort of community spirit is a wonderful aspect of the Beaconsfield Primary School and all those involved with it.

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



#### THEM PESKY RABBITS

You will have noticed whilst in the vicinity of Desmond Court or along the Cardinia Creek Reserve that Beaconsfield is infested with rabbits. This problem was brought to my attention when a friend of mine's pet rabbits sadly died myxomatosis. from Apparently pet rabbits can be vaccinated for the Colesie Virus but not for myxomatosis.

Melbourne Water are currently conducting a clean up of the rabbits along the creek and placed their lethal cocktail down 90 rabbit holes the other day. Ajoining property owners have

been warned to keep their pets in their property.

To have the rabbits exterminated from your property can be done but at a cost of about \$400 to \$800 depending on the size of your property. Of course they may run to the other side of the creek when you start spraying but anything is worth a try.

If you are one of these property owners who cannot walk around your property for fear of falling into a rabbit hole please contact the Progress Association and maybe we can do some kind of joint project.

News from the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade

Tim Mosely Award Beaconsfield firefighter Matt Haines has received the Tim Mosely Award for the Pakenham Group of Fire Brigades. The Tim Mosely Award recognises significant achievement by a junior brigade member and is awarded to a member for each of the four groups which make up CFA Region 8. The award was presented to Matt at the Region 8 fire championships at Clyde on 20 March 1999 by CFA Area Manager, Ewan Cameron and Casey Mayor, Janet Halsell.

Matt ioined the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade in February 1998 and following completion of his recruit training is now a full active member of the brigade responding to fire and other emergency calls. Beaconsfield Captain Ron

Woodfine said Matt is a deserving recipient of the award as he has in a short period of time become a valuable member of the brigade who enthusiastically participates brigade activities. Victorian Building Regulations make it mandatory for all homes to be fitted with smoke alarms. Smoke alarms are a key part of the strategy to reduce the number of lives tragically lost as a result of house fires. Inexpensive battery operated smoke alarms are available from local hardware stores. It is important that smoke alarms are regularly tested and cleaned, and that if battery operated, the batteries are replaced at least once a year.

As the weather starts getting cooler, the incidence of chimney fires increases as residents begin to use open fires and solid fuel heaters in their homes. It is important that chimneys and flues are cleaned to avoid a build up of combustible material which causes chimney fires.

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


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#### **OUR NATURAL WORLD**

King Solomon said, "Wisdom resteth in the heart of, of him that hath understanding." The word understanding, is very important as it does not imply just knowledge or impact on our physical senses, but brings an aspect of spirit into the area

we research. To understand, is to bring into play a knowledge beyond words, or human senses. We tap into resources, that are of a "non thinking" type, we just know. This is where wisdom commences. Solomon also said," wisdom is too high for a fool!" Can we ignore the words of a man regarded by all races and religions as perhaps the wisest man of all. The fool was never wise, but the wiser were sometimes fools. This may involve hurt and suffering at times, but to stand still is to stagnate, we advance by moving forward usually into the unknown.

Quoting from a little book called, "The Quiet Mind"-"Wisdom comes to those who are calm and tranquil in spirit, to those who wait upon the Lord. Through an everincreasing love in the heart you will grow wise."

Tranquility and love then, are important in the gaining of wisdom. Are the truly wise not possessers of these attributes. It would not make must sense to say that someone possessing the opposite qualities could be wise and understanding. Wisdom is usually a "quiet achiever" in the world, generally something precious that passes between individuals at times of trauma, despair or one person seeking the better pathway in life, to avoid traps and pitfalls that would be harmful. Wisdom alone and unused is useless. It must be placed in circulation (like money) to be working for the good of someone or something. We only recognise the wise, when they voice their wisdom, then we, if we be wise use their wisdom as a goal we aspire to.



Well done girls.

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
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



#### **BANNER COMES OF AGE**

For ten years the Beaconsfield Banner Newsletter has faithfully served the local community. Starting out as a single page news sheet to announce public meetings for the Beaconsfield Progress Association, it has grown 'like topsy' into a 28 page bi- monthly paper with a circulation of nearly 1500. Outstripped in age by the Upper Beaconsfield Village Bell, many other local communities are envious of the current standard of the Beaconsfield Banner. This is due mainly to the untiring nucleus of enthusiastic volunteers who produce a publication that comprehensively serves the needs of the Beaconsfield people.



The ingredients for its success has been continuity in layout and presentation, creative advertising at competitive rates and accurate reporting of local issues and events. There is also a focus on social happenings such as anniversaries, births, deaths and marriages etc., plus some very good feature articles.

There have been three 'co-

ordinators' over ten years with a production committee of five or six that include a photographer, printer, proof readers, and advertising coordinator. The collating evenings have traditionally been jovial "social events" with anything up to 12 pairs of willing hands compiling up to 1500 copies with 24 pages plus, involving up to 19,500 sheets of printed paper. All this takes up to two and a half hours with time out after for cups of tea, scrummy cakes and much lively chatter. Townsfolk over the years have looked forward to getting their bi monthly Banner due mainly to good variety and local content. Peter Hansen has written 'Our Natural World' for almost every issue over ten years.. Almost all articles are contributed from residents like Peter within the township and unlike most commercial newspapers, little is edited or cut. It is this factor that keeps the Banner on a local personal level and



Beaconsfield township is without a public hall, without a central focal shopping centre, with much of its population travelling away to work, has many young newcomers and many aged residents. Its housing areas are divided by highways, hills and creeks. Beaconsfield needs a publication like the Banner to bind the community together. The Banner is clearly of service to local traders with its advertisements proving most popular. Being a free publication, the ratio of half news and half 'paid' advertising makes it break even, after some help from an annual

The future of the Banner is firmly linked to the future of the community. It will develop further. There's always a need for 'new faces' on the production committee.

There has been some thought about publishing monthly, fortnightly, or even weekly, considering the current workload for volunteers. that may be impractical. It would have to be commercialised to come out more frequently and that would detract from its style and popularity. There would probably be far less local input and contributions.



With the enormous growth in population happening in the area, it will be interesting to see how the Banner does develop, or whether it does get swallowed up by commercial interests.




No Country Fair was held in 1990 due to the combined effort to support the Beaconsfield Primary School Centenary Fair.




The Beaconsfield cenotaph was unveiled by Brigadier-General Brand on Saturday 13th March, 1920, and bears the names of nine fallen WWI and three WWII soldiers from the Beaconsfield district.

President of Beaconsfield Progress Association, reflecting on the way Beaconsfield was during the period when these WWI men enlisted, followed by the events that led to Paul Cohen being commissioned to reproduce the Honour Board and the gaining of sponsorship by Akoonah Park Committee. Joy introduced Marcel Fahkry, a representative of Akoonah Park Committee and a WW2 Fighter pilot, who unveiled the board.

A booklet with history (service and family) of each of the 33 men pictured on the Honour Board was distributed to all who attended. Copies are still available from Beaconsfield Post Office and Berwick Library.

To conclude the afternoons programme, Joy introduced John Hughes (Past President of Berwick R.S.L.), John Wells (writer and historian) and June Epstein, OAM (music educator and writer) who all paid tribute to the book "A Valley in France", compiled and edited by Elizabeth Whiteside. Following the launching. Elizabeth Whiteside took the opportunity to reflect on the culmination of 3 years work, from a single statement of "we don't seem to have much history on your father", to the printing of 200 letters written by her father, T.C. Whiteside, during war-time and the story of his return and involvement in the local community.

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

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


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#### **BEACONSFIELD BUSINESS ASSOCIATION**

Further questions and requests were made by people present including the following:-

Traffic lights at Officer Our Country roads now need to be upgraded to cope with the new city traffic that we now have.

The Kindergarten representative stated that there was an urgent need for upgrading of the parking around the kindergarten and a problem with traffic accessing the shops.

Increased traffic on Kenilworth Avenue was also a problem

O'Neil Road was also pointed out as a problem area and it was suggested that it should be sealed from the Princes Highway to Payne Road. There was also a suggestion that May Road be connected to O'Neil Road inland so as to avoid the dangerous and difficult Princes Highway intersection.

It was suggested that something needed to be done to slow the traffic in Beaconsfield Ave and Wood Street as they had become a speedway, and that cars were doing wheelies in the Station Car Park at night.

Semi-trailers were a problem in some side streets.

School parking was another problem, one participant suggested it was the responsibility of the school to supply parking and deal with its own problems. The President of the Beaconsfield School Committee commented that the committee was working with the Council to deal with the problem.

A Soldiers Road resident commented that if the O'Shea Rd. extension was togo ahead it would certainly make traffic lights in Officer a necessity.

In Reply -John McCaffrey, Cardinia Shire

(a) recommendations to solve many of the problems are outlined in the Beaconsfield Strategy Plan (b) The recommendation in the Strategy Plan will be considered when council starts to look at the next budget and will be given consideration over the next few months.

(c) Access to freeway needs priority.

Emerald Road needs attention.

Sealing of O'Neil Road will take place as development occurs as this is part of the permits for development on both sides of O'Neil Road.

(f) The requirements for both O'Neil Rd. and May Road are noted in the Strategy Plan. (g) The connection between Manuka Road and Soldiers Road - this idea should not be dismissed.

It was noted that part

of Kenilworth Avenue will be sealed from Brunt Road to Soldiers Road when the Pink Hill development proceeds and contributions are obtained from the developer.

Mr. McCaffrey then went on to say that many of the comments had been outlined in the strategy Plan and a few new ideas had been outlined and we all need to get down to the task of prioritizing. He added that our Strategy Plan area included the area from the Cardinia Creek to Whiteside Road and it is anticipated that 10,000 -12,000 residents will be living in this area in 10-15 years from now. There were a few detailed questions from the floor which were answered. Mr. McCaffrey stated that if changing access to May Road can be justified he will have it looked into.

Councillor Graeme Kidd then told us that he had noted all the ideas and matters raised and would bring them up at Council's budget meetings over the next few months.

Graeme Tutt commented that Goff Street, Beaconsfield Avenue and Wood Street would all need to be part of a local traffic plan.

Trevor Wakefield from City of Casev said that Soldiers Road was mentioned in the Casey Strategy Plan. He felt that On/Off ramps may worsen the problems. Eventually Kangan Drive would be linked to Soldiers Road. O'Shea Road would eventually be sealed as development proceeded and developers paid the cost.

Mr. Steve Brown stated that Vic Roads was responsible for the by-pass and highways. He noted that issues had been identified in relation to the freeway and that community consultation will happen. He commented that there is a need to work

within both Councils Strategy Plans. and when the Councils advise Vic Roads of their requirements then they will take this to the Government.

Neil Lucas MLC told us that the Pakenham by-pass will follow the Hallam by-pass and that the Government had made no announcement on the Hallam as yet. It is now stated that the Hallam by-pass will cost \$175m and the Pakenham bypass \$180m. Cardinia Shire have put up a good argument, and the community needs to keep pushing.

The President then thanked all the speakers and all present for their attendance. There will be reports back to the community at future Public Meetings to keep everyone informed and to stay focused on the issues.

Supper was served and many people took the opportunity to discuss informally, their particular concerns with the guests.

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
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
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#### VIDEO VIBES WITH DAVID GRIFFITHS

Check out our autumn catalogue for some suggestions and inspiration including camellias, cyclamen (this year available in a punnet), daphne, the new Red Flower Carpet Rose, as well as other seasonal favourites.

Autumn is the perfect time to plant everything but the most frost tender plants, which could suffer over the winter. The soil is warm, there should be ample rain and the weather is still good enough to promote strong growth. When planted in autumn, things have time to settle in and put on some growth ready to perform even better in the following Spring.

A highlight of the autumn season in Melbourne is the Melbourne International Flower & Garden Show.

Again to be held at the Exhibition Buildings and surrounding Carlton Gardens, this year from the 14 to the 18 April, the show theme of "Reflections" promises some great displays.

Roses have performed extremely well this season and many varieties will continue to flower well over the autumn months. Remember to keep pruning and feeding your roses to promote new healthy growth and flowers, and to watch out for insect pests and fungal problems such as aphids, black spot and downy mildew. Treat appropriately at the first sign of pests or diseases for perfect roses over many months.

Our fabulous Rose Catalogue will be available mid to late March. If you do not receive one in your letterbox, call into the nursery to collect your copy. Remember that this catalogue is for bare rooted stock that arrives from May to July each year. Order early to ensure you don't miss out on your favourites. We have also produced a catalogue for pre-ordering of fruit and ornamental deciduous plants, look for this one too.



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

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
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
