BERWICK VIEWS

Although the development of the blocks was not completed pre-selling began at the exciting new estate in the last week of June and within a few weeks almost all of the 48 blocks had been sold.

You will have noted that Oliver Hume Real Estate will have dropped into your letter box a flyer showing the landscape design of the Berwick Views wetlands area adjacent to the Beaconsfield /Emerald Road.

An informal gravel path is proposed allowing pedestrian access through the wetland environment. Some paths will lead to a seat and will be a network for passive recreational activities. Another concrete circulation path will run through the open space and will become a shared pathway.

The species of vegetation selected for rehabilitation works are from the plant communities that are presently found within the area and would have been there prior to European settlement.

It is stated that the developer acknowledges the necessity to reflect the rural character of the area and build on the urban environment. Locals may be interested to know that the blocks of land which range from 700m² to 1000m² are priced from \$49,000 to \$79,000. Stage 2 of the development is in the preparatory stages and we will keep you advised as to future progress.

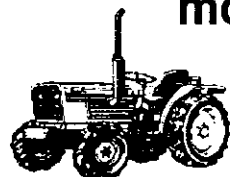

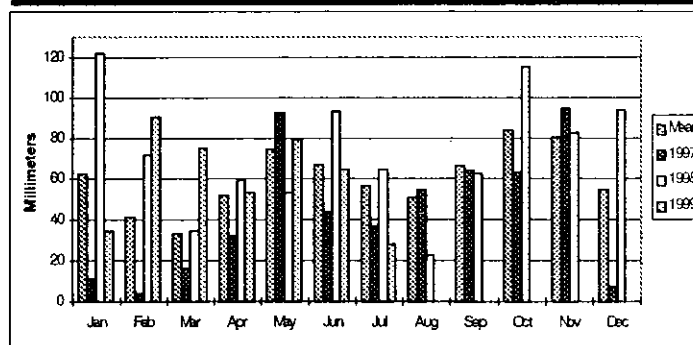
NEWS FROM THE BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE

The last few weeks has been a busy period for the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade responding to calls including car fires, house fires, telephone lines down and false alarms. Two of these calls involved people going out and leaving a pot on the stove causing the house to fill with smoke. In both cases smoke alarms operated alerting neighbours or passers by who called the fire brigade. These incidents highlight the importance of ensuring that potential sources of fire such as a pot on the stove are switched off before you go out, and the importance of having smoke detectors in your home and maintaining them in a working condition.

The Ritchies Southside Supermarket in Berwick has recently introduced a community benefit card scheme which includes the donation of 1% of money spent by a customer in the supermarket to a community group of their choice. If you shop in Ritchies and are asked to nominate a community group for your community benefit card, the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade would ask that you consider nominating the brigade. As a volunteer fire brigade, we rely on the support of the community we serve and gratefully appreciate the support we receive.

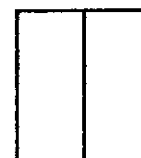

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

From the President of the B.P.A. Joy Bishop



The year is flying by and development in our town is really starting to happen. The Berwick Views Estate is starting to take shape and I think we are all pleased that it is looking so good.

The biggest unresolved issues in our town still seem to be Roads and the Hall. Firstly to bring you up to date Tony Rushton and I went to a BADCA meeting in Berwick on "Roads". The meeting was mainly about the congestion in the High Street, Lyall Road and Inglis Road. At last the City of Casey is realizing that there is a problem on the eastern side of Berwick and that this problem effects the residents of Beaconsfield, Upper Beaconsfield and the residents on the east side of Berwick Hill.

Those present including Councillors and Council Officials were at last able to see that there has to be an alternative route to Melbourne, via the freeway, without going right through Berwick township. It appears that the City of Casey is seriously looking at a road connecting the Princes Highway (somewhere in the vicinity of opposite, Manuka Road) to both Kangan Drive and Soldiers Road. The only problem is the enormous cost of a railway bridge, but it seems that once the

developer of the land builds a road to the railway line, and with further development on the south side of the railway line a bridge will be built, time frame possibly 10 years (too long in my opinion). An entrance to the freeway at Soldiers Road is quite likely as it is the only possible place between Clyde Road and the Princes Freeway and the distances between these entrances and exits make it feasible.

Residents of Lyall and Inglis Roads are now starting to get active in their objections to all the traffic that they are experiencing, and, with the Berwick Views estate taking shape are starting to agitate for the closure of these roads to through traffic. If we all work together we may get action sooner than we think.

Who would have believed back in the 70's when we worked for the By-Pass that we would see the traffic so heavy again in such a short space of time?

The Hall - at our last public meeting discussion took place about our proposed hall and it was decided to form a Hall Sub-committee. Gwen Neve has been very active and realized that there was a strong feeling in the town for a hall on the existing site. With the help of a retired architect, a member of the Midway Group, she came up with a concept plan for a 300 seat hall suitable for the existing site. A petition for this has been circulated in the town if you agree, please make an effort to sign it.

There is of course the Council preferred option of a Community facility on the corner of O'Neil Road and Princes Highway funded in part by the sale of the existing site. The other question that comes into the equation is the existing Community facility in Beaconsfield Avenue.

As all this offers a lot of food for thought we are making this our issue for the public meeting on August 31st.

If you want, need and will use, a hall or community facility come along to the meeting and let us know. Would you use it for special birthday celebrations, your sporting interests, social groups, schools, churches any use you can think of come along. If we can prove we need a facility we will, by all working together and making a major show of support get it.

BEACONSFIELD'S HANDYMAN

My wife made her motivation speech. She suggested ringing a Handyman (note the capital 'H') and asking him to paint the bedroom. That took two days from the working week. I don't notice the difference, I have my eyes closed most of the time.

The previous week was spent pine panelling a couple of entry foyers at a school. The pine offers better protection in high traffic areas. A clear finish was required and I used a water based clear

varnish in preference to the oil based Estapol. The water based material retains its clear Finish and does not yellow. Besides you can apply two coats per day even in winter.

The English people use different paint to ours for the outside of houses. It smells different to the enamels we use. I think a similar material is now available here and its advantage is that it dries quickly even in cold conditions. Of course you can only use it in winter. I used an undercoat and it dried in 2 hours allowing me to apply the finishing coat that day.

The battery powered go-kart is complete and has been thoroughly tested by the little lads. The girls have nearly mastered the tandem bicycle, but it is not as easy to

ride as one would think. Used bicycles seem to be in good supply, but two joined together are a bit rare. They are a good lesson in co-operation.

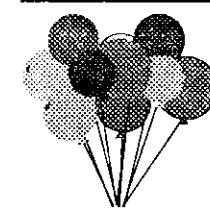

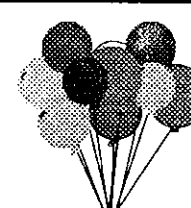

IF (I WERE)

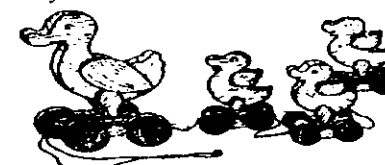
If I were a bird, I'd soar so high,

AUGUST 1996

Tuesday 30th July, 1996 was a wet day to remember in Beaconsfield. Whilst the water that came down may not have broken any records, the water that came up broke the banks of the Cardinia Creek in many places throughout Beaconsfield and surpassed previous recorded levels. Rarely does the high ground south of the creek ever flood but it did this time as well as the road being cut between the Cardinia Creek Bridge and the railway line. Under the railway bridge the flood level marker nearly disappeared as the water lapped its way underneath.

10th. ANNIVERSARY OF THE BANNER

In 1989 Mrytle Wilson wrote an article about "our little creek". The creek never runs dry now in droughts, thanks to the regular releasing of water from Cardinia Reservoir. Timber were harder before the reservoir was built. Once dry weather made the creek stop trickling, the big holes became porous and it was very difficult to start the creek flowing again. Many a time farmers walked or rode horses looking for water, checking that nobody had diverted it out of the creek bed for their own use. I remember in the 1960's good rain had fallen at Upper Beaconsfield, but four days later we still had nothing in the creek and were terribly

disappointed. My father was working near the creek when he heard a loud rustling. Mistaking it for a reptile, he picked up a snake-stick and began looking around.

Then he realised the sound was coming from the creek and he saw a wave of water, about a foot high, bowling over the dry bank and leaves. It paused to fill a deep hole, then gained momentum and moved on again. It was the miracle of the stream's rebirth.

My father arrived home shortly afterwards grinning broadly and said, "You'll never guess what I've just seen!" And in 57 years on that farm it was the only time he saw it happening.

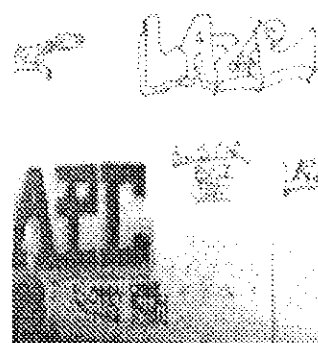


BRICKBATS AND BOUQUETS
