been included as a 4 page supplement to this newsletter. It is time that the Beaconsfield Community again considered this report with a view of bring matters forward for Council to consider in the forthcoming Budget.

PEDESTRIAN REFUGE CROSSING

Subject to the agreement of the Beaconsfield Progress Association, Council is to install a pedestrian refuge on the Highway, generally opposite the kindergarten. (As per attached sketch).

RECOMMENDATION: THAT THE PEDESTRIAN REFUGES FUNDED IN THE 1990/91 ESTIMATE ON BER-WICK-BEACONSFIELD ROAD BE LOCATED WEST OF WOOD STREET.

I was very interested to read the charts for electricity consumption in the Australian Government's recent "Energy Guide" booklet. Please take them seriously. They are a helpful guide in choosing electrical appliances.

There was household power rationing when electricity was first connected to our Soldiers Road farmhouse in 1951. I can't remember how much we were allowed to use, nor what happened to consumers who exceeded their quota, but my parents regarded it very seriously. The only way we could establish which items we had bought were

"heavy" on power, or "easy" on power, was by switching off everything. Then one person stood on the verandah and watches how slowly (or how quickly) the meter spun around as one appliance at a time was given its test run.

We got such a fright to see how fast the radiator made it spin around that we never used our brand new radiator at all the first winter, fearing it might put us away above our quota!

But we enjoyed the miracle of switching on an electric light instead of candles, lanterns and the Aladdin lamp. And possibly our greatest blessing was being able to switch on the electricipus to make anyone a cup of tea quickly without the former method of lighting the wood stove and waiting around impatiently for the kettle of water to reach the boil.

Were they the good old days? In some ways, but I feel a great thankfulness to inventors and the S.E.C. for the useful appliances we have today

IT'S MOBILE AND ITS FREE

Didyouknowthat there is something FREE in Beaconsfield? Its a service which has been given to people living within the Shire of Pakenham and is called the Bookmobile. On every second Tuesday, for over a decade, the familiar bus has pulled up outside the Kindergarten. It is manned by two obliging competent assistants, Helen and Heather who are always there to advise and help.

The 'mobile' was inaugurated in 1973, yet few people realise that they can change their reading matter so near to home. Strolling along the crowded shelves, one can choose from a wide range of literature both in the range of fiction and nonfiction. There is also a choice of magazine, books for the very young up to the senior students. If the eyes are failing don't despair as there are plenty of large print books. For the totally blind the 'talking books' are available. No matter what is needed and not already in stock, the books will be obtainable on request, the time lapse being a couple of weeks. All categories

are easily identifiable by the coloured 'spots' on the book spine.

If you are not already a member, why not go along when the bus visits Beaconsfield on Tuesday 25th of June and Tuesday 9th July It only takes a few minutes to fill up a form and collect your choice of reading material. If you miss the regular time of the Bookmobile which stays one hour from ten to eleven, then it can be found at Charing Cross at Upper Beaconsfield during the following hour.

On an average seventy books a fortnight are on loan, which considering the growing population of our township, is not too encouraging, so why not take advantage of this service? By doing so we shall be thanking and encouraging the Pakenham Council for enabling us to save petrol and time by providing us with the library. Who knows, with a boost to the membership, we may, in time even see the arrival of a new bus....but let us hope Helen and Heather are still with it for it's great to have such cheerful attention.

BEACONSFIELD NETBALL CLUB

The Beaconsfield Netball Club started this year with a slow attendance.

Radio 3RPH - Information Station has daily readings from The Age, The Herald-Sun, Bulletin, Australian, Suburban Newspapers, Women's Magazines, Time Magazine, Broadcasting B.B.C. Round-up as well as Women's, Cultural and Religious programmes. You can tune in to your Information Station which is on 1179 on your Radio dial.

If you are retired or have the time and you would like to represent the interests of Consumers, then the Ministry of Consumers Affairs would certainly like to hear from you as they need people to act on panels in their newly created Credit Tribunals and the Appeal Committees under the House Contracts Guarantee Acts. You can phone the Bureau for more informa-

tion regarding this item.

Did you know that Skin Protection needn't cost the earth? A recent survey by the Ministry of Consumer Affairs through the Office of Prices in conjunction with the Anti-Cancer Council have produced an information "HOW NOT TO booklet BUYING GET BURNT SUNSCREENS" showing prices don't really count when purchasing protection. We have sent for some copies and they should arrive shortly. Remember cloudy days do not necessarily mean you are safe from the effects of the Sun.

A word of warning. There is a range of "SCAM" chain letters going around promising instant wealth. Don't be fooled by these as the only one who makes any money out of these are the "cheapskates" who run them



It was women who invented overarm bowling in cricket.

In the 1952 Helsinki Olympics three medal winners in the diving were prognant at the time they competed.

Gertrude Halley was among the first women medical students at the University of Melbourne. She devised an eye test for children which was adopted throughout the British Empire.



Florence Taylor was Australia's first woman architect, structural engineer and civil engineer. She was also a town planner and a leading feminist. Before she was 26, Florence Taylor had designed 100 houses and was in charge of the firm's drawing office.

Dr. Constance Stone was refused admittance to Melbourne University to study medicine because she was a woman. She undertook her training in the U.S., Canada and Britain. Later she played an important part in starting the Queen Victoria Hospital in Melbourne.

It was a woman, Ada Lovelace, who invented the first computer.

The most intelligent person on earth is a woman. The Guiness Book of Records lists Marilyn vos Savant of Missouri as recording the highest IQ score ever of 228.

Ruth Lawrence became the youngest person ever to take out a degree from Oxford University when she graduated at the age of 13 with an honours degree in maths, which she managed to do in two years in-

stead of the usual three.

At the age of 12, Barbara Holland was the youngest person ever to be accepted into an Australian University when she applied to study maths at the University of Melbourne.

She sat huddled up in an old armchair; her poor deformed body was contorted into a crippling curve. Her sightless eyes turned towards the front door as I entered, and her beautiful smile lit up her wrinkled face.

It had been 'one of those' days in our household. Everything that could go wrong had done so. The electricity had failed, the gas stove had broken, two cups had been broken, we'd all overslept and the cat had produced four kittens in my shoes. I never felt less like visiting anyone to cheer them up, but as a Welfare Visitor it was my duty, and usually a pleasure, to pay monthly calls to the less fortunate. It was with dragging steps and a dismal mind that the approach to the unit-for-the-aged had been approached.

The welcome that the dear, athritic lady gave me was like receiving a sunbeam on a wet day. Near her, on the table, I noticed a collecting tin with the words, 'The Sunbeam Home For Blind Babies', and I thought how appropriate!

We exchanged pleasantries, and the lady told me she detected a depleted air...was I in trouble. I found myself telling her of many problems that had to be confronted. She nodded her head and said,

"Was the sun shining when you came in?"

"Yes it was", I replied.

"Put a coin in the box for the babies"...In went the first coin.

"Could you walk up to the front door?"

"Yes I could"

"Then drop in another"

"We can talk together...you have a voice. So how about another cent?"

"Can you hear what I say?"

It cost me fifty cents.....in donations....but what a lesson. I'd gone into the home feeling sorry for my own troubles, depressed, worried and disturbed. Here was a woman who could not move, unable to see and she had given me the opportunity to be thankful for my 'sunheams'.

It's an episode I have never forgotten especially when I next visited a totally blind, deaf and mute person, also crippled with arthritis...how really lucky we are to be able to have the abilities we enjoy without even an appreciative thought.

So...maybe instead of concerning ourselves with the big problems in life, why don't we sometimes count our "sunbeams".



BEACONSFIELD SCOUTS AND GUIDES



BEACONSFIELD SCOUTS

The aim of Scouting is to encourage the physical, mental, social and spiritual development of young people so that they can take a constructive place in society as responsible citizens. The principles of Scouting are that all should serve God, act in consideration of the needs of others, and develop and use their abilities to the betterment of themselves, their families and the community in which they live.

Those of you with children know that they can be less than perfect at times, and we certainly don't guarantee to make them angels, simply to try to lead them on the right path.

The Beaconsfield Troop was established in the 1950's and has had a lot of success with it's past members. The latest of these were the District Competition Camp, with three of our patrols being placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd, and the Stradbroke Cup...This was a camp held at Gilwell Park where our boys numbered just 6 of the 650 who attended. Random inspections were held continually throughout the camp's duration by the examiners, and points deducted for any faults found.

There is no first, second or third place getters, you just achieve a certain level. The Beaconsfield Patrol scored 282 points out of a possible 295. If you're not too good with figures like me, it's losing just 13 points. For this they were presented with the Gold Award, the highest award and I believe it is the first time that has been achieved by any Group in the Toomuc District.

Unfortunately like many other organisations in this current harsh economic climate, finding the funds to operate has become extremely difficult. This is made worse by Beaconsfield being positioned on the edge of the Berwick/Cranbourne growth corridor, causing an influx of potential members, who we are unable to accommodate.

At present we have 50 members in the Group and another 20 on the waiting list, with barely enough leaders to handle present numbers. So we have an immediate shortage of leaders, and I would be more than pleased to talk to anyone who would like more information about the role of a lead or even assistant to the leaders. Ideally, we require 4 leaders to enable the formation of another Group within Beaconsfield and accommodate all those children on the waiting list.

Back to finances - Beaconsfield Scouts have always enjoyed the support of the community - but again times are hard and funds are diminishing. Even the regular fund raising projects such as recycling have been hit.

Other avenues have been explored one of which is catering, but difficulty is to find a regular source of funding. Again I'd be happy to talk with anyone who thinks they may have an idea or project that may be beneficial.

These funds are used to purchase the large amount of equipment now needed in scouting and of course running costs. At this stage \$500 has been spent in the last few months just in training new leaders. So if we do locate the leaders we desperately need, we still have to find the funds for their training.

Several approaches have been made to the relevant Government Department but as yet we have no answer. We are looking for support to have the land on which the Scout hall stands purchased by the public, through the Pakenham Shire Council, or ultimately by the Beaconsfield Group itself, if enough money can be raised.

In finishing I would like to say that the Scout Association is a totally voluntary Group of people working together to develop leadership qualities of our young people - of which Beaconsfield are proud to be a part of.

SUPPLEMENT - ACTION PLAN FOR BEACONSFIELD TOWNSHIP

SHIRE OF PAKENHAM



Background: At Council's Corporate Planning (Land) Committee Meeting KLM Development Consultants Pty Ltd presented the final "Action Area Plan" for Beaconsfield.

The Committee resolved to adopt the report and requested that the Shire Engineer and Town Planner report to Council on the recommendations in the Action Plan.

Councillors have requested an update on Action Plan.

1. INTRODUCTION

The report includes 12 recommendations for Council's consideration and owing to work priorities Officers have not reported to Council on future action to date.

Each of these recommendations is discussed below:

- 8.1 That approval of commercial development of suitably zoned land on the north side of the Princes Highway only be given when a traffic management strategy for the Princes Highway has been adopted which considers matters including:
- Vehicular ingress and egress.
- Traffic flow on the Princes Highway.
- Pedestrianisation within the Beaconfield Township
- Suitable measures to achieve integration between land on the north and the south sides of the Highway.

Comment

Development of the Council/Department owned site is subject to a detailed legal agreement which requires preparation of a traffic management plan for the Princes Highway and the site. All works identified by such plan would be completed by the developer prior to opening.

8.2 That Council develop a car parking policy for the Beaconsfield commercial area. The parking strategy should be based on the issues outlined in Section 7 of this report and provide for the achievement of adequate and accessible car parking provision in an appropriately landscaped environment.

Comment

Additional staff in the town planning section for Stra-

tegic Planning was not approved in the 1990/91 Budget. Officers have been unable to commence work on the parking strategy to date.

8.3 That Council develop guidelines for building and landscape treatment of new and (where appropriate) existing commercial development which will create a sense of identity appropriate for the Beaconsfield Township.

Comment

See comments 8.2

- 8.4 That a traffic strategy in accordance with the matters outlined in Section 7 of this report be developed for treatment of the Princes Highway reservation to provide for its functioning as a road within the Beaconsfield township community.
- **8.5** That a planting and beautification program which takes account of the traffic management strategy for the Princes Highway be developed and implemented to enhance the character of Beaconsfield township for both the short and longer term.
- **8.6** That a program be developed to implement the range of local area traffic management issued which have been identified and addressed by the consultants.

Comment

Officers have made a preliminary assessment of the works required to implement the Highway treatment recommended by the Consultants at approximately \$500,000.

Council's Riding Works Program would be unable to fund these works for some years. A planting/beautification program could be commenced, however it would be restricted to the existing road configuration. As significant planting will be necessary in the long term, major road works should be completed before landscape works commence.

Local traffic management opportunities are currently being investigated and implemented by the Engineering Section including the temporary pedestrian refuge on the Highway.

8.7 That Council pursue with the Ministry of Transport and other relevant authorities the resolution of public transport and public transport related matters identified in the Beaconfield township.

Commen

No action has been taken by officers on this issue to date.

8.8 That Council review its multi-unit housing policy to provide more emphasis on the quality of housing. The policy should also specifically address the appropriatness and performance requirements of dual occupancy.

Comment

Council has completed the review of the Flat Code and the issues raised by the Consultants were considered by Council. The new Code has "separation" rather than "saturation" controls and is more design oriented than the previous code. The Code has directly addressed the issue of dual occupancy and site requirements and amenity issues as specified.

8.9 That Council recognise the need to establish a community centre/meeting hall within the Beaconsfield township. Having regard to the options identified in Section 6.5 of this report it is noted that with the development of a new commercial centre on land situated on the north side of the Princess Highway, the opportunity exists for the development of a community facility which would integrate with such a cente.

Comment

The joint venture proposal on the Council/Department owned site is in direct response to this issue. Due to the state of the economic climate commencement of development in the near future is unlikely. Officers are confident that the principle of the proposal will be achievable.

8.10 That Council in conjunction with the Dandenong Valley authority and the City of Berwick develop a strategy for the enhancement of the Cardinia Creek environs and the proposed retarding basin and its development for recreational purposes.

Comment

The Cardinia Creek Environs Working Group was formed in February 1991 with the purpose of developing an open space strategy for Cardinia Creek.

Four meetings have been held to date and representatives include:

- * Office of the Environment,
- Department of Conservation & Environment
- Department of Planning & Housing
- * VicRoads
- * MMBW
- Dandenong Valley & Western Port Authority
- * Shires of Cranbourne, Sherbrooke, Pakenham
- * City of Berwick
- Two Community Representatives

The Working Group also has the ability to second other parties a necessary. Funding shortages are a significant problem for the Group and grants are being sought from Government at present. Environmental and Cultural studies of \$60,000 have been identified as requiring funding.

8.11 That Council recognise the significance of the wooded hill top area located in the north-east corner of the study area and seek to retain this site for recreational purposes.

Comment

The South Eastern Growth Area Minister's Directions includes the Beaconsfield area in the 2002/5 program. Detailed physical planning as identified in this recommendation will be addressed when local structure plans (outline development plans) are prepared for the town. The regional Structure Plan notes the significance of the wooded hill top.

Consultants Fisher Stewart are currently preparing a detailed submission for the Minister of Planning and Housing with the objective of advancing the timing program for land owned by the Roche family. If this submission was successful preparation of a detailed local plan for the town would also be accelerated and could be completed by consultants paid for by the land owner/s. It would be necessary for Council to be closely involved with this process and officers will further advise Council when additional information is provided by the Minister.

- 8.12 That following the resolution of the Government's corridor review planning, an Outline Development Plan be prepared for the Beaconsfield urban area. This Outline Development Plan should provide for:
 - (1) Identification of suitable sites for future schools, pre-schools, recreation reserves, local shops, etc.
 - (2) Emphasis on vehicle/pedestrian separation.
 - (3) Future road infrastructure including:
 (a) A northern arterial road located in the vicinity of Holm Park Road.
 - (b)An arterial road within the City of Berwick as a northern extension of Soldiers Road connecting to the Princes Highway.

Comment

Government funding for preparation of local plans in Beaconsfield has been deferred in accordance with the timing program in the Minister's Directions.

If the Minister authorises an advancement of this timing a consultant study to complete the ODP would be possible. On this basis the total project including hydraulic and other service investigations would be totally funded by private enterprise.

Council would be responsible for setting goals and objections and the overall completion of the local plans. Officers have had preliminary discussion with Consultants regarding this. It was commented that provided all costs are met by the developer and there is no imposition on officer resources, Council could consider a proposal for consultants to undertake preparation of the Outline Plan.



Keeping the bush in our backyard

Working together to develop a community climate of valuing native vegetation on private land

Welcome to the first 'Keeping the Bush in Our Backyard' news sheet. We now have around 80 people on our mailing list; about half of whom live in the Berwick - Pakenham region; the other half from further afield. We have people from conservation groups, local Councils; Government Departments and interested individuals.

What the Core Group are up to.

The core group are the local people who are actually doing the hands-on work for the project. They meet every second Thursday, with working groups meeting more often.

They have decided on the main priorities of the group for the next few months. The first is gathering information about native vegetation in the region. This will be used as a data-base and as the basis of a community map of the vegetation of the region. The second task underway is organising training and skills workshops and information sessions to help people gain the skills and information needed to carry out community education projects in the local area. Thirdly the group plans to get as much media coverage as possible of the issues of native vegetation on private land to raise awareness of its importance in the local community and to involve more local people in our work.

Once these projects are underway the group wants to organise a series of walks and other activities for the general public through native vegetation on private land, and to target groups such as landowners, real estate agents and Councillors.

The community map is the major project of the group at present. It is to be a map of indigenous vegetation on private land of the region which is to be attractive and accesible to the general public. Its aim is to get people's interest, and begin their involvement in activities and campaigning to protect native vegetation. The map will not only highlight scientifically significant sites, but also areas of vegetation which are valued by the community because they are just 'nice bits of bush'.
