BUS SERVICES - BEACONSFIELD

The following is an extract from a letter received from the Public Transport Corporation, by Mr W Bayley, Shire Engineer.

"As you may know the Corporation conducted a comprehensive review of private bus services in the metropolitan area earlier this year. Faced with severe budget cuts the Corporation was required to rationalise the contracted route network to reduce costs and redeploy under utilised bus resources." "Route 826 was improved between Hampton and Berwick because of passenger demand along the corridor between the two regions. However beyond the Berwick area loadings dropped substantially and a frequency greater than 60 minutes cannot be justified in the present economic climate and given demand for other services elsewhere."

OUR NATURAL WORLD

When did civilization start? Why did it start? Before it did, we know that the races of man were basically nomadic, living in harmony with nature and their various GODS. They followed the migratory paths of their ancestors, vitally concerned with the cycles of animal, and plant life, and the progress of the seasons. The more astute also followed the guidance of the heavenly signposts, movement of planets and various heavenly bodies.

There is of course, no specific record of the beginnings of civilization, as we are talking of pre-history. The only source of assistance is the "Sacred History", or "Writings", to which we turn. Mythology and Legend are our only spring of refreshment here.

The "Golden Age" of Greece, was presided over by Cronus, otherwise Saturn, and the Godly rule gave way to Zens, when the wandering tribes, under "new" Gods began settlement and adopted a pastoral, agricultural economy. Crude technology in the form of fire, and permanent dwellings came about. Water supplies were sought and crudely tapped to supply the settlements needs.

The settlement of tribes however involved the loss of contact with the "Nature Gods" that had ruled for ages past. This removal of life's deepest reality and certainty caused a deep frustration in human nature, which survives to this very day in our "modern" settlements, the Cities. Remove man from Nature and he truly takes giant steps backwards.

The philosophy of the wandering man was, "All is in the flow", the great river of life. The settlement man was bound to the opposite; i.e. "there is no more flow". "Stagnation" was his unhappy philosophy. His territory was confined to his neighborhood, and in compensation for his loss, he tried to reproduce on a small scale the sacred landscape of his ancestors. These are represented in our suburban gardens of today.

In 1889, a sturdy English radical, Edward Carpenter, published a book with the provocative title "Civilization: Its Cause and Cure", which in its opening paragraph referred to Civilization, "as a kind of disease which the various races of man have to pass through". This greatly upset the Merchants and Industrialists of the day (making fortunes out of Industry and Science).

Settlements lead to the establishment of social hierarchis, to specialization, the development of arts and sciences, the building of temples, (high rise?) and houses. The very heart and purpose of Cities is economic, with it's attendant greed and exploitation of man, without reliance on nature or seasons.

Plato believed that, "civil life has been going on for a vast and incredible length of time, during which many thousands of Cities have come into being, and the same number have come to an end". This view supposes that Cities rise and fall through the folly and arrogance of their inhabitants, or through natural disaster (visited by the Gods as a cleansing action).

The earliest town know to Archaelogy is the biblical Jericho, and it's history is fascinating indeed. The original structure dates to about 8000 B.C. and the reason for it's erection will make interesting reading in our next article as we pursue our topic.
