



BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE

Since my last article the calls for the brigade have slowed somewhat, but the calls still come. Some serious, some not so serious.

We still train regularly every Sunday plus every third Tuesday of the month to teach new skills and hone old ones in preparation for the expected bad fire season due the El Nino.

What is El Nino? El Nino is the name for a big change in the normal weather pattern right across the tropical Pacific.

El Nino - It affects millions including Australians. El Nino is blamed for destructive flooding rains in the Southern United Stated and Peru and in the Western Pacific, drought, poor harvests and the bushfires in South-East Australia.

Usually there is heavy rain over the western side of the Pacific but El Nino moves the rain area eastward from Australia.

El Nino - Now According to the Bureau of Meteorology,

Australia is under the spell of the strongest El Nino since the 1982 drought. From October 1996 to mid 1997 rainfall has been well below average throughout Victoria. In the Wimmera, Central, West and West Gippsland (Beaconsfield area) rainfalls have been the lowest on record.

If the El Nino "Dry" continues as predicted, Victorians face conditions like the 1982-3 summer that saw the Ash Wednesday fires in February 1983 with the loss of 47 lives and 2090 homes. The El Nino makes the outlook ominous.

Getting Ready - Fires Can Be Prevented. I take this opportunity to remind the community that it is time to eliminate or minimize risks of fire. Clean up fuels around homes, check pumps and water supplies etc. Plan ahead to survive if a bushfire comes your way. Don't forget to check your Smoke Alarms. Are they in good working order?



STRATEGY PLAN FOR BEACONSFIELD TAKING SHAPE.

A further meeting with Shire Officers and community representatives took place on Wednesday 24th September. A draft strategy plan will be presented at the Beaconsfield Progress Associations Annual Meeting on Tuesday 28th October.

To date the meetings considered that Kerb and Channelling be completed in Beaconsfield Avenue and that Wood St traffic be better controlled. Railway Station parking should be improved and Roundabouts be planned for Wood St., Emerald Road and Glisman junctions with the Old Princes Highway. It was considered that many unmade roads should be sealed and recognised that the Freeway By-pass of Officer will be built, eventually. Shop parking should be improved also.

In infrastructure, it was established that the Authorities have made satisfactory provision for Water, Sewerage and Drainage in line with future population growth In Urban design, building plans, business signage, street

furniture and Welfare Bins were all up for discussion.

Many local buildings and landscapes were considered for heritage listing, mostly in line with Council's Heritage Study Sites.

It was agreed that commercial developments be shaped to provide a focal business centre Beaconsfield.

Recreation needs have to provide for current and future growth needs as well community facilities in the way of Halls, Public Toilets. Childcare, Maternal Care and Elderly Citizen centres.

Industry will never grow too large in Beaconsfield but it was recognized that existing schools should be enlarged and more added. There are significant traffic and parking problems to be solved associated with existing schools.

Housing development needs to be well planned with as high a standard as possible maintained on new estates. There needs to be a variety of housing built to provide for all segments of the community.

It is now with the Corporate Planners of Cardinia Shire to formulate initial strategy plans for Beaconsfield. It is hoped that a final draft will be completed by Christmas to include as much consensus of local opinion as possible.

Please assist by considering the preliminary draft at our next Progress Association meeting on Tuesday 28th October, 1997.



We had seven minutes to weave our magic into the hearts of the audience and the Judges. Making lots of friends was easily done with 1500 students on the premises to meet, and chat with too.



LINEAR PARK DEVELOPMENT.

Public are advised that the new Park south of Cardinia Creek is open for use. There are seats and tables and a roofed shelter. Parking is easy, as is the access off Soldiers Road.

Two electrically operated barbeques have been installed and are free for general use at the push of the button.

Around the park there are dry level walking areas along the picturesque Cardinia Creek. There are also well defined wet areas that are constantly used by Ibis.

Newly planted native trees and bushes now compliment the large Eucalyptus trees along the creek banks. Planted recently, many have now outgrown their protective plastic sleeves. With so much moisture from floodings and being close to the creek they

are in ideal growing conditions. South of the Park a wire fence border defines the area well. Along this, authorities are going to plant more trees which will shield the area from the Freeway.

The modern designed toilets will be opened for use at the time of the Ministerial opening ceremony which will happen soon.

It is also intended to give the Park a name. Because it is an important integral link in the chain of linear park development, a local identity's name will not necessarily be chosen. It will most likely be named after early aboriginal tribes (who frequented the area before settlement), or after local Flora or Fauna. Well worth visiting, it is a great spot for walking the dog, just strolling or family 'get togethers'.

JAPANESE STUDENT 'AT HOME' IN BEACONSFIELD.

She went shopping at the local Supermarket and was fascinated with reading the labels on each product. She was also went to the Queen Victoria Market. Ay, was also a guest at the Anniversary celebration at the Beaconsfield Scout Hall.

She was sad to go home and has since corresponded with the de Hamer family, thanking them for their hospitality, and indicating that "I want to stay in Australia". She was very taken with our "nature", which I am sure meant the open spaces, paddocks and hills that surround Beaconsfield.

She has a vastly different school system to ours Students take many more subjects than we do, study extremely long hours and noone but the teacher speaks in the classroom. Aya was required to sit an exam to be chosen to come to Australia, and since returning to Japan has been sitting further end of term exams.

If she does really well at her studies she will possibly go to University and would like to be an Interpreter.

The de Hamer Family enjoyed having Aya with them and found it difficult to say goodbye. They hope one day to see Aya again.



OUR NATURAL WORLD

We are used to thinking we live in a world where magic and mystery no longer exist, but this is far from true. Strange and inexplicable things do happen but are usually ignored, or mentioned on the bottom of page 57 of the newspaper in a ten line box paragraph.

If we know where to look (old or recent records) we can find a history we thought belonged to the realm of fiction

Armies of animals and birds Battling? In 1970 in Northern Malaysia a pitch battle between two rival species of giant bullfrogs took place. Their total number exceeded two thousand, and they fought it out in a swampy valley near the town of Ipoh. Many were killed but the battle was inconclusive, and approximately eight weeks later they resumed their bloody warfare, leaving hundreds dead out of four thousand combatants

Going back in history to the 12th and 14th of October 1621, the famous Battle of the Starlings took place over the City of Cork in Ireland. The full documented history of this event is held by the British Library, which was witnessed by thousands of people in and around Cork The sky was black with birds who faced each other and at a curious signal struck at each other. The sound of collision and battle amazed the people of Cork and countless multitudes died (birds that is...

The Battle raged for 3 days extending at times as far as the Thames Estuary East of London. Groups of "Negotiator Birds" eventually brought a halt to the slaughter.

Cats with Wings? Don't scoff, as there have been many such animals, all authenticated. catalogued and photographed. The Oxford Zoo in England had one in captivity in 1933, and it was given to them by a local citizen. The cat could not fly, but used the wings to jump higher than normal cats making escape easier.

In 1966 however, two flying

cats were shot at a town called Alfred, in Ontario, as they swooped down on terrified pets and farm animals. The Police were called and verified that they were indeed cats with peculiar long growths on thick matted black fur protruding from their backs forward of their hindquarters. They finished up in a veterinarian laboratory at the Kemptville Agricultural School. Raining cats and dogs? An old well known saying not entirely without foundation. Showers of animals from clear skies have been reported through recorded history and include, rats, snakes, shrimps, snails, lizards, mussels, toads, frogs. In 1969 multitudes of rats fell into ricefields outside the town of Bajudjai (Indonesia), and ate the farmers crops. They fell in bunches of six or seven at a time. A full report was contained in the Ultra-Conservative "Wall Street Journal" of 25th August,

These are just a few of such events reported over various time spans, and while we may take such things with a grain of salt, truth is usually stranger that fiction, and the world still holds many secrets.

Extracts from out of the Pakenham Gazette dated 19th March 1920 we note the following :-


The unveiling of a memorial to fallen soldiers took place at Beaconsfield on Saturday afternoon last and attracted a fairly large attendance including about twenty of the district soldiers, who were in uniform."

"The Memorial is made of polished granite. It bears the names of nine fallen soldiers"

"Mr. W. Nixon, President of the Memorial Committee, acted as chairman. O behalf of the committee and the public he extended a hearty welcome to General Brand. Beaconsfield, he said, was proud of the fact that 33 men had enlisted from the area. All regretted that nine of these had been called upon to make the supreme sacrifice"

"The memorial had been raised by loving and affectionate friends to the memory of those that had fallen and to those that had fought and returned. It would serve to perpetuate the memory of those men that had fallen for future generations."

"Cr Geo Martin felt honored to have to say a few words. He felt the ground on which they were standing was holy ground. The fallen soldiers had preserved to us our hearths and homes. They did not seek glory or gain, but liberty and freedom." He hoped later to see the memorial surrounded by green turf, bordered with forget - me - nots.


Figures taken from the Bureau of Meteorology (http:// amdisa.ho.bom.gov.au/) have been used to show the monthly averages measured at our closest weather station in Dandenong. These figures represent readings from the past thirty three years.

For those who are interested, the Bureau offers far more information than just mean rainfall data including Mean Daily Max Temps, Mean Air Temps, Mean Wet-bulb Temps, Mean Dew Point

Temps, Mean Relative Humidity, Highest Monthly Rainfall. Lowest Monthly Rainfall. Highest Recorded Daily Rain. Mean no. of Clear Days, Mean no. of Cloudy Days, etc, etc. So if you are a nut for statistics (with Web access) you'll find the Dandenong data at; http://amdisa.ho.bom.gov.au/ climate/averages/tables/ cw_086224.shtml

This information is of great interest to many people, and more so now than ever with what could be the worst drought on record coming upon us very soon. It is my intention to update this graph each month in The Banner and develop a yearly comparison as time goes on.
