

response from Vic Roads on our requests for improvements to the Old Princes Hwy and O'Neil Road Intersection, Old Princes Hwy merge into Princes Highway and also reducing the 80km/h speed limit on a section of Old Princes Highway to 70km/h to have a uniform speed limit of 70km/h for Old Princes Hwy. Unfortunately, all those proposals were rejected by Vic Roads after a VicRoads Officer conducted a site inspection during afternoon/evening peak period. Our Association will continue to make representations to improve roads and intersections in Beaconsfield.

Cardinia Shire Council has provided an update in relation to the Glismann Road project. The Shire contact person is Lorna Lablache, who will discuss questions and can be contacted via email <u>l.lablache@cardinia.vic.gov.au</u> or phone 5945 4332. A report will be presented to Council on 19 February 2018.

Our Incorporated Association (BPA) held the Annual General Meeting on Tuesday 17 October. All positions were declared vacant and Office Bearers were elected. The Annual Accounts were adopted. The Guest Speaker was Fiona Cost, a Together We Can Facilitator at Cardinia Shire Council.

Carols by the Creek will be held on Sunday 17 December at Bob Burgess Reserve. This event is presented by Beaconsfield Baptist Church with BPA and we look forward to fine weather and a great crowd enjoying the evening.

At a recent meeting of Cardinia Shire Council Cr Collin Ross was elected as Mayor and Cr Brett Owen as Deputy Mayor. Congratulations to them both and we look forward to continuing good working relationships with Councillors and Council Staff.

Ranges Ward Councillors' Report

It has been an honour to serve as Mayor of the community that I have lived in all my life and chosen to raise my family in. Thank you to those who welcomed me so warmly into their groups and activities. Council has achieved so much in the last 12 months and has many projects in the pipeline. In November council elected our new Mayor, Cr Collin Ross from Central Ward.

Construction of the Holm Park Recreation Reserve carpark will commence soon. The sealing of the northern carpark and associated access roads is funded by Council and the Australian Government. Works are expected to be completed by the end of summer. The final design of the Beaconsfield Skate Park at Holm Park Reserve has been adopted. The final design was developed with extensive input of Beaconsfield's skaters (refer page 11). The skate park is expected to be completed by April, 2018.

Council will be conducting a master plan for the O'Neil Road Recreational Reserve. This plan will help guide council for the long term uses of the reserve. Locations of vehicular and pedestrian access, car parking, playing surface/s and change rooms will be considered. Community consultation on a draft plan will be available for resident comment early in the new year.

The construction of Kenilworth Avenue has commenced. The project will be completed in two stages. The first stage extends from Brunt Road to the Princes Highway underpass. The project is being delivered by a developer as part of the Development Contributions Fund to the approximate value of \$2.5 million. The works also includes a shared pathway on the railway line side of the road that will eventually link to the Beaconsfield township. The construction has been long awaited and will alleviate the existing amenity issues for the Kenilworth Avenue residents in this section. Speed control devices will be installed and the speed limit along the road with be dropped to 60km/hr to create a safe environment for all road users.

Stage 2 works, to complete the Kenilworth Avenue connection to Beaconsfield township, planned for construction in the next financial year.

Council is currently undertaking a Planning Amendment, C220 which implements the objectives and strategies of the Beaconsfield Structure Plan (December 2013) into the Cardinia Planning Scheme. The amendment does not propose any new content, but is a direct translation of the objectives and strategies from the Beaconsfield Structure Plan into the Cardinia Planning Scheme with a planning 'tool' called a Design and Development Overlay (DDO). The DDO's are a tool which clearly outlines what the town centre should look like in the future, which includes building height, the importance of windows and uses such as Cafés which make the streets safer, how far the building should be set back from the street and the types of colours and materials that should be used. This makes it clear to the community, developers and Council planners about what is required for development applications.

On behalf of Cardinia Shire Council, I wish residents a very merry Christmas, enjoy this festive season with family and friends and stay safe. We wish you all the best for 2018.

Bowman's Track

JANET BOWMAN Boulevard in Beaconsfield, off O'Neil Road is close to the original Bowmans track.

Janet Bowman left her home in Scotland to come to Victoria in 1840 with her husband David and then to Beaconsfield in the early 1850's. In 1855 David took up the lease for the title to 200 acres on the Panty Gurn Gurn lease, covering what is now the township of Beaconsfield. Later in the year he was granted a licence for the "Gippsland Hotel" which was known as "Bowman's Inn". David and Janet had 6 children and built a homestead believed to be near where Villa Mar now is on O'Neil road.

Life was not easy for this lady and sadly her son drowned in Cardinia Creek whilst shepherding sheep and later her husband died in 1860. This enterprising woman became the licensee for the Hotel, a remarkable achievement for a woman of her time. Even more remarkable and innovative was her achievement of having a track cut through rugged terrain from Beaconsfield into the Yarra Valley linking to the Jordan goldfields. Her 4 sons and some other men worked on the track. It started behind the Hotel and then travelled eastward to where O'Neil Road is today and then north. The track now has the present day names of Hughenden Road, Telegraph, Split Rock Road, Downey, Bourke's Creek Road, Paternoster Road and Mt Burnett to Boyd Road, East Beenak to Basan's corner.

The government wanted to encourage miners and said they would compensate the expenses of those people who had opened up the country to the goldfields. The track cost 1500 pounds and Janet applied to the government for payment for the work and after 20 years, compensation was paid of 300 pounds.

In the April of Australia's Bicentenary Year, 1988, Pakenham Shire honoured this visionary lady with the marking of the site of Bowman's track with a plaque and 14 signs along the track. The Shire President Cr Jeune Matthews unveiled the plaque at the corner of O'Neil Road and Old Princes Highway along with other local dignitaries and more than 150 descendants of the Bowman family who had come to a family reunion that day.

Over time the signs have fallen into disrepair or gone missing. So, almost 30 years from the Bicentenary, Cardinia Shire Council are replacing the signs along the track and making a new interpretation plaque with a map and story of Janet Bowman and the history of the track.

The new interpretation plaque will be on the corner of Janet Bowman Boulevard and O'Neil Road on the Bowman's Track Wall.

Cardinia's Connections to State Emblems of Victoria

Victoria has five official emblems:

1. Flora - Pink Heath - Common and widespread across Victoria



2. Mammal - Leadbeaters Possum - Critically endangered



3. Bird- Helmeted Honeyeater - Critically endangered



4. Marine - Weedy Sea Dragon - Not endangered: just difficult to see



5. Mineral – Gold - Precious but scarce and depleted



Both Leadbeaters Possum and the Helmeted Honeyeater were described from specimens collected at Bass River. They occurred across the Koo Wee Rup swamp, up the Cardinia Creek and its tributaries into the Yarra Ranges.

The Weedy Sea Dragon is still present in Westernport Bay.

From 1862 Gold was mined in Haunted Valley and the area around the southern part of what is now the Beaconsfield Nature Conservation Reserve. It is known that at least 51 oz was mined and while that does not seem to be a lot the current value would be \$7 million.

This leads me to the claim that Cardinia is unique being the only municipality in which all five of the State Emblems of Victoria have occurred. I'll hold this opinion unless some authoritative person can contest it.

We are Knitting Poppies Again

Knitted poppies are being requested again this time for The Australian War Memorial in Canberra.

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of WW I, on Remembrance Day, November 11 2018, the Australian War Memorial in Canberra plan to create a carpet of 60,000 poppies, to represent each soldier whose life was lost.

If you would like to knit or crochet poppies they can be sent directly to the AWM in Canberra or delivered to the Beaconsfield Neighbourhood centre or Make and Mingle, Beaconsfield Baptist Church who will organise to send them to Canberra.



Poppies at Federation Square Patterns are available on the internet or from Make and Mingle or BNC. Many of you will remember seeing the wonderful display of knitted and crocheted poppies at Melbourne's Federation Square on Anzac Day 2015. This started as 5,000 poppies and became 300,000 and then toured around Australia, then to the Melbourne Flower and Garden Show and then to England for the Chelsea Flower Show. Poppies were mounted on stems and taken to Fromelles to commemorate the Centenary of the Battle of Fromelles.

We are excited to introduce a new After Kinder Occasional Care program beginning next year. O'Neil Rd Beaconsfield Kindergarten staff can escort children through the connecting door between the services for occasional care on Mondays and Tuesdays from 2.00pm to 6.00pm for just \$26 per session.

This program is also available to any children in the community aged over 3 years requiring occasional care. Numbers are limited, so act quickly to secure your child's place.

Recipe

Do you want to try something a bit different from gingerbread men for Christmas? These Chocolate Roll-Out cookies from familyspice.com look yummy!



Ingredients:

- 2 1/2 cups plain flour
- 1/4 cup cocoa powder (unsweetened)
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 cup unsalted butter (room temperature)
- 1 1/3 cup white sugar
- 1 large egg
- 90g chopped dark chocolate chips
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract

Instructions:

- 1. In a medium-sized bowl whisk together flour, cocoa powder, baking powder, salt, baking soda and cinnamon.
- 2. In a larger bowl or electric mixer, cream butter and sugar then whisk in egg.
- 3. Melt Chocolate chips and add to the butter mixture along with vanilla extract.
- 4. Gradually add flour mixture with mixer on low, and beat until incorporated into a dough.
- Divide the dough in half and roll into balls, press down and form two discs. Wrap each disc in baking paper and refrigerate for 4 hours.
 (Dough can be made 2 days ahead. Keep chilled. Let stand at room temperature 30 minutes before rolling out.)
- Position rack in the centre of the oven and preheat oven to 180°C.
- 7. Remove one wrapped pack of dough from the refrigerator at a time.
- 8. Roll out dough between 2 sheets of baking paper.
- 9. Using decorative cookie cutters, cut out cookies.
- 10. Place cut cookie pieces at least 2-3cm apart on greased baking tray or baking paper.
- 11. If not icing cookies, decorate with sprinkles or other sugar toppings, if desired.
- 12. Bake 1 tray at a time until cookies are firm on top and slightly darker around edges, about 9 minutes for smaller cookies and up to 12 minutes for larger cookies.
- 13. Let sit on baking tray for 2 minutes after removal from oven and then move to a cooling rack.
- 14. Serve as is or ice and decorate as desired. Store in airtight container for up to 1 week.


