



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

After many years of service to the local community Joy Bishop has stepped down as President of the Progress Association and I am honoured to have been offered the position. I hope I am able to fill her shoes. Joy will continue to take an active part in the Association and I look forward to her guidance.

Most, if not all of us, were attracted to Beaconsfield by its quiet rural surrounds. Sadly, with the township being absorbed by the south eastern growth corridor, this is no longer the case. With Berwick Views Estate well established and filling quickly, Panorama and Bowmans Track estates being established, and the Beacon Hill Rise Estate (between O'Neil and May Roads) on the drawing board our population is expected to grow six times over the next 10 years. Current commercial developments - the hotel redevelopment, supermarket site and offices, shop and showroom complex on the corner of Beaconsfield/Emerald Road, will see focus brought back into the centre of the township providing many services for the area.

The Progress Association has recognised this change and will focus on ensuring the following:

- 1. That there is infrastructure in place to support the growing population.
- Traffic safety issues like Wood Street, the intersection of Old Princes Highway and Beaconsfield/Emerald Road, and safe pedestrian access between the north and south of the highway.
- 3. That council assets are not sold as a short term measure to the long term detriment of the township (i.e. the old hall site).
- 4. That any development enhances the township.

Many of these issues are currently being considered by Council and the Association, i.e. the new Community Complex, traffic issues and the complex on Beaconsfield/Emerald Road. It is incumbent on both organizations to ensure that measures are not piecemeal, that all development will enhance the amenity of the township and make it a great place to live. It is essential this occur when the development is taking place, not afterwards. I hope the Association, the residents, traders, developers and the Cardinia Shire Council can work together to achieve this.

I look forward to your support and input in what will be a busy time in Beaconsfield!





WHY DO WE PAY RATES?

In my 45 years of residing in Beaconsfield, I have never requested anything to be done from the Cardinia Council, except for the last two years.

Unfortunately, I reside near a very neglected property where the blackberries grow in abundance and of course over all the neighbouring fences. When a request was forwarded to the council to have this property cleared of the blackberries and high grass, which is a fire hazard, the reply from council was "If we cannot see the property from the road we do not bother about it". But all the neighbouring properties pay their rates and isn't it their right to have action taken to make sure their properties are not hampered by this fire risk neglected property? Why should all the residents be paying for weed killers to control the weeds and blackberries from the fence lines to their properties?

Is the Council pride only reserved for what the eye sees and not concerned at all by the frustration and the lack of respect from the people who live in their Shire?

Council also said that the blackberry problem was now taken over by the Conservation Department.

Council was also contacted about rats coming from this neglected property, but once again their reply was that the Environment Department had taken control of those problems. The Department made a feeble attempt to the owner, by letter, but nothing much if anything at all was done. Once again residents footed the bill for rat killer, as everyone knows rats are a health risk.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

When the garbage bins were changed to the yellow/green bins there was talk of ratepayers paying for each collection or by weight. I am very aware of recycling, composting etc. and as my bin is emptied once a month only, I find paying \$115 for 12 collections quite exorbitant. Council information is that they are still considering a fairer form of collection and payment. But how many more years do we have to wait for some action? Not as long as Beaconsfield has waited for the much needed toilet block I

The dangerous traffic problems in Lyle/Mahon Avenues horrendous. This is where a twolane road is made into a four-lane road, where one cannot see a small child blindly dashing across the road to the car parked on the opposite side. There is certainly provision in the existing roads to make these roads a one-way in school hours.

With each year my rates have been increasing, with this year's rates going up by \$200. Why?

I placed an objection to the increase in rates three and a half months ago and have been informed there may be another months wait for a reassessment. Just great!

May I suggest to the Cardinia Shire that they cease building houses on every spare square inch of ground and concentrate on existing properties and allowing the Beaconsfield residents to be proud of their township? After all isn't it our rate money that allows the council to work for and improve facilities in our township?

With all the negativity I've received these past two years from Council, I can't help but ask, "Why DO we pay rates?"




The term 1 programme is well underway with all the regular groups resuming in early February. However all groups welcome new members at anytime during the year.

HOW TO USE THE EXELOO



As you can see it is not your normal type loo in that it has three buttons on the front - open door, engaged and closed.

You have to press the button to enter. You have to press button to close door once inside, however the door will close after 2

minutes if you just stand there.

You do not have a button to push to make the toilet flush as this will happen automatically once you open the door to leave or as you wash your hands.

Everything is literally automatic. The toilet paper is dispensed by pushing the button. A fully automatic wash station dispenses soap and water and then blows air to dry your hands by just putting your hands under the three sections marked.

The loo will lock up for a short time after so many uses, while it self cleans by spraying high pressure water and cleaner around the entire cubicle and will then re-open. If there is a power failure the doors can be opened manually from inside.

To address the many concerns about the availability of use, there are restricted opening hours.

The loo will be monitored by workers three days per week and by local residents daily. If there are any problems you can report them by phoning the number shown on the outside of the loo or phone Glorraine Hardy on 9796 1361.

IMPORTANT NOTE

Small children have to be accompanied by an adult otherwise the sensor may not detect they are there. If the door closes on an unaccompanied child, who cannot reach the 'open door button' you will have to wait 10 minutes before an alarm will sound and the doors will automatically open.



TAXATION UPDATE



Whilst all businesses have gone through a big learning curve in the past twelve months with the new GST tax system, the Government has been active in proceeding with further tax reform. The Government has now introduced draft legislation for significant changes to the taxation of business income with the New Business Tax System (Simplified Tax System) Bill 2000(STS) which was introduced into Parliament on 7th December 2000. The new tax system affect eligible businesses in income years commencing after 1st July 2001.

The main features are:

- -STS is available for businesses with a turnover of less than \$1m and depreciating assets (other than land and buildings) of less than \$3m.
- Under STS ordinary income is generally assessable when received and expenses deductible when paid. At present, most businesses are required to pay tax on income earned but not yet received (i.e. on trade debtors) but are allowed deductions for expenses incurred but not yet paid

(i.e. on trade creditors). This may defer tax if trade debtors are high and trade creditors low. Ιt would assist businesses on a cash basis for GST purposes. A STS entity can elect not to undertake a physical stocktake provided it can be reasonably estimated that the stock value has not increased by more than \$5,000 from the start to the end of the financial year. In this case, the value of trading stock on hand at the end of an income year is the same as at the start of the year.

- Assets costing \$1,000 or less are immediately d e d u c t i b l e. Depreciating assets over \$1,000 are allocated to a STS pool with an accelerated depreciation rate of 30% WDV.
- If an STS business opts out of the system, it must wait 5 years before re-entering STS status. Entry and exit rules prevent double counting or omissions of income and deductions.

All eligible businesses should be carefully reviewed for the benefits and disadvantages of entering the new simplified tax system as opting in and out has long-term implications. These matters should be discussed and planned with your Accountant to enable a transition from 1st July 2001.

OUR NATURAL WORLD

The stories of "Ghosts" and Campbelltown in 1826, and hauntings have intrigued men and women since the beginning of time, with the majority of reports coming from overseas, particularly from the British Isles and Europe, but we in Australia have just as rich a history in these matters as any other place on earth. It just doesn't go back as far. Australian ghost stories could fill many books, and one of the most famous investigated and recorded was the case of "Fishers Ghost", of the year 1826.

This story was authenticated that it received world wide publicity, and also published in a magazine edited by the great Charles Dickens in 1853. The full story reads like a well written "whodunit", and is contained in a book written by Frank Cusack in 1967, entitled simply, "True Australian Ghost Stories".

Frederick Fisher was 35 years old, when he met his death at the hands of a man called George Worrall, near N.S.W. town of

the only reason the killer was caught and brought to justice, was because of the sighting of his ghost, or more correctly, his "unquiet spirit", and this sparked off line of determined investigation that was quite extraordinary for those very early and rough days of Colonization. Fisher was an interesting man, being the first man in N.S.W. to attempt to make paper in Australia. He owned land in several districts, and also worked a farm of 30 acres successfully. Not a bad effort for a man who came to these shores as a convict.

Worrall, a neighbouring farmer, weaved a web of lies and deceit, that would do Hitchcock proud as a movie plot, eventually persuading all and sundry that Fisher had fled to England to escape the clutches of a designing woman. He further forged letters purporting to have been written by Fisher, giving Worrall authority to sell all his lands and possessions and making Worrall his Executor. This


was all carried out over a period of approx. 2 years and was very convincingly done, fooling friends and the authorities of the day.

This incredibly detailed scheme started to unravel only when a local farmer, one David Weir, was coming home late one night and saw Fisher seated on a rail of the bridge, which carried the road he was on. He reported seeing Fisher as though in the body, and thinking that Fisher must have returned from England, as everyone thought that was where he had gone, he stopped and called out greetings to the he well knew. Receiving no reply, he impatiently kept going, probably annoyed at this rudeness. A week later he passed the same spot, this time giving a lift to the local Constable, and another friend. All three saw Fisher sitting on the same rail, although this time the light seemed to shine right through him, as all attested later. Farmer Weir was a brave man, walked right to the spectre, and spoke to it, placing his hand on the shoulder of Fisher, but it was thin air, although he looked reasonably solid. The Ghost pointed in a certain direction and Weir suddenly realized that this was a genuine Spirit sighting, telepathically understanding that Fisher was telling him he had been murdered, and pointing in the direction of his bodily remains. He also displayed a gaping and bloody wound on his forehead, which was clearly visible to the three men.

His body was eventually recovered a short distance from the haunted bridge, and George Worrall was soon arrested, tried for murder, and hanged on the 6th of Feb.1827. This case has the unique position in Australian Jurisprudence, of the murdered man's appearance leading directly to the arrest and execution of his own killer, and created much controversy at the time. His ghost was witnessed by others, who only spoke out about it after the revelations of others were made public, so it was regarded as a genuine case of Spirit manifestation, and Australia's premier haunting story.

Surya Indian Restaurant has settled in now after 10 months (doesn't time fly) to become one of our regular local haunts – mainly for take away. We like the Onion Bhajia, the Butter Chicken, the Chicken Korma and either the Kashmiri Pulao or Lemon Rice. Friends regularly drive from Pakenham for the food. Also BYO.

We know of many people who drive a long way for the home cooked style meals at the Beaconsfield Hotel. We tend to eat from the Specials Menu, recently a Mushroom Risotto and an Oxtail Soup (which was a meal on it's own) were great hits. The Wine List while basic is good value e.g. Banrock Station Shiraz Cabernet \$10.50.

Beaconsfield Fish and Chips has new proprietors in Mark Liao and his wife Yan Huang and they are doing a great job. We like our chips well done and not wrapped till we get there and we think they are our "best yet". Their smiling faces are a welcome addition to Beaconsfield.

Recently enjoyed an outstanding family dinner watching the sun set over the bay at Donovans on the St Kilda Esplanade. Two wines stood out, the Mitchelton Blackwood Park Riesling 1993 and the Narkoojee Chardonnay 1999 a multiple Trophy winner. Our daughter Megan asked "Do they all age like this?" Well some do. The Peter Lehmann Reserve Riesling 1995 (\$20) is close to as good and the

current Leasingham Riesling 2000 (\$10) is a fabulous drink now wine or one to put away for up to 10 years. The Narkoojee from Gippsland was served with Char Grilled Leader Prawns from Queensland, for me one of the best food and wine combinations of the last couple of years.

Other wine recommendations are: Red – one of the outstanding quality/bargains of recent times is the Water Wheel Shiraz 1999(\$15) a deeply purple coloured shiraz which just hangs on the glass with an intense blackberry, fresh pepper and licorice flavours in the mouth. Drink now or keep for 5-10 years.

White – Two lovely full flavoured and not expensive Chardonnays currently available are the Ashwood Grove 1999 (\$9) and the McWilliams Hanwood (\$8), both done well at Shows.


Sparkling Reds—The Seppelt Sparkling Shiraz 1994 or 95 or 96, all likely to be available (\$15), has long been the family favourite. Nick's Wine Merchants currently has a McClaren Vale Sparkling Shiraz Cleanskin at \$10 for current drinking.




