AMBULANCE STATION LOOKING AFTER YOU

The Progress Association, together with the financial support of the advertisers, is able to distribute 1800 copies FREE to the residents of Beaconsfield.

Beaconsfield now has a new Ambulance Station situated in Wood street. The doors of the Station were opened on the 9th of July and the station will be manned from 9am to 9pm seven days per week.

The process started back in August 2000 when an Application for Planning Permit was applied for by a developer for the site to construct offices facing the Princes Highway and an Ambulance Station facing onto Wood Street. The Progress Association made an objection mainly in regard to safety issues which were ironed out and approval was granted by the Cardinia Shire Council on 10th January 2001.

The Metropolitan Ambulance Service chose Beaconsfield as an ideal site to improve coverage of this most important service. The targeted response time is 14 minutes.

We are waiting to hear from the Metropolitan Ambulance Service, who in turn are waiting to hear from the Minister, to organise an official opening date. We will keep you informed.

Following on from an article in the local newspapers recently about emergency services PLEASE USE THE 000 NUMBER for any emergency. It will take you longer than 14 minutes to drive to a hospital when in need of assistance.


Most of you will have seen the Shire's July issue of "Connect Cardinia". The back page of this shows the Shire's projected budget for the next financial year.

Not wanting to be a dummy spitter but it strikes me that good old Beacy gets a raw deal when it comes to the shire forking out funds. Let me see - Pakenham gets a cultural centre (\$5.1M), Koo Wee Rup gets a community centre (\$1.1M) ... and we get \$110,508 for Improvements to the Bob Burgess Reserve and \$200,000.00 to design the Beaconsfield Community Centre. Ah, but wait, that \$200,000 is conditional on selling the old hall site.... Are the Pakenham or the Koo Wee Rup Projects conditional on any major council assets being sold to fund them? I don't think so.

The only major project the township has seen in the last 10 Years is the Loo, oh and possibly the sealing of some roads (essential in my view and not something to be used as an example of how well our town is being looked after by the Shire!). It's a bit woeful don't you think that we get a paltry \$300,000 and have to sell prime real estate to fund it? It is just not good enough.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

BEACONSFIELD UPPER

Salisbury Road.

Tenders are to be called in August to rehabilitate the Post Office end of the road. The unnamed section (the extension of McBride Road) will also be treated.

Work has commenced on the turning circle in McBride Road. It was expected that the work would be completed by the end of the month. Of course, weather is a factor in this timeline. The parents of the Pre kinder have waited a considerable time for this work. I am sure they would be pleased to see the project started.

Fencing of the Shire land behind the war memorial is about to start. It has been suggested to me that it would make sense to remove the old pine trees on the land prior to fencing but this is not quaranteed at this stage.

In the budget just approved there is a figure of \$20,000 for work to include detailed design of the landscape proposal, which accords traffic with the management plan for Upper Beaconsfield. Works to be undertaken this year include preparation of a detailed landscape plan for Charing Cross Reserve, and commencement of stage one of the identified works. The design and staging plan is to be developed in consultation with the Upper Beaconsfield Association.

The budget has a provision to seal the footpath along Salisbury Road to A'Beckett road. Abutting property owners will be contacted prior to construction.

The Upper Beaconsfield Community Centre has been successful in obtaining a \$28,000 grant towards the extension and upgrade of their crèche, whilst the Upper Beaconsfield Kindergarten will receive \$6053 to replace wooden playground equipment to meet health and safety requirements.

BEACONSFIELD

At Beaconsfield the Preschool will receive \$8000 for upgrade of existing equipment in compliance with Human Services regulations.

\$200,000 is provided in the budget to finalise the plans of the new Community Centre at Beaconsfield.

An innovative employmenttraining plan will be used to landscape and build paths in the Bob Burgess Park. The work will be planned with the Beaconsfield Progress Association. This area which has immense potential should considerably enhanced with the work to the value of \$110,500.

The Council is working with the residents of Wood Street with their traffic problem.





H.M. ADAMSON 1925 - 2001



Hugh Malcolm (Peter) Adamson passed away on the 17th July 2001 at Cabrini Hospital, Malvern aged 75 years.

Hugh was a member of the Adamson family which moved to Beaconsfield in the late 1880's and had a family presence in the area until 1996.

Hugh was born on the 28th October, 1925 at Berwick Private Hospital, the second son of John and Elaine Adamson. John Adamson had taken up the family trade of building carpenter. He was one of three brothers who served in the A.I.F. in France during the First World War.

The harsh experiences and sacrifices of his father and uncles and other brave men of the district during W.W.I. deeply affected Hugh and gave him a deep sense of service to others, which remained with him throughout his life.

Hugh and his two brothers, lan (Bill) and Bruce were also in the Australian Armed Services during the Second World War. Hugh served in the Royal Australian Navy in Australia and New Guinea.

Hugh's mother was a warm and gentle woman who was well known in Beaconsfield from the 1920's to the 1970's. She was a trained teacher and had a deep commitment to obtaining a quality education for her three sons.

Hugh was educated at Beaconsfield State School, Dandenong High School, Melbourne Boy's High School and eventually completed trained teacher qualifications at Melbourne Teachers College and an Arts Degree at Melbourne University.

Whilst such an extensive education is not particularly uncommon these days, it was relatively unusual at this time and involved considerable sacrifices for Hugh and his family both in terms of time and money.

Hugh's professional life and his calling revolved around his deep commitment to providing top-class education to the children of Victoria.

He began his teaching career in 1943 and his period of service with the Education Department, which included his War Service lasted for 42 years.

In this time he taught in numerous schools throughout Victoria including Narre Warren East and was a departmental liaison officer at the A.B.C. coordinating the famous "Programs for Schools" broadcasts.

H.M. ADAMSON (Cont.)

He was appointed an Inspector of Schools in 1964, working in this capacity in the Stawell, St. Kilda and Oakleigh districts.

In 1979 he became as Assistant Director of Primary Education in Victoria, a position that he occupied for most of the period till his retirement in 1985.

His retirement years were largely devoted to the care of his three grandchildren whom he loved dearly.

Despite a busy person and professional life which often took him far away from his home town, his memories often returned to thoughts of his happy childhood in Beaconsfield.

His reminiscences of his experiences with his schoolmates, his brothers and cousins, his parents and the colourful characters of the what was then a little country town, brought joy to his eyes and smiles to the faces of those listening to him.

Although he was keenly aware of the realities of the modern world, he had the pleasure and sanctuary of being able to return to the Beaconsfield, and indeed the Australia, of a bygone era.

Peter was honoured to read the Soldiers Prayer and attended the services held for the next two years.

Peter contributed a very graphic account of his families involvement in the World Wars. He made mention of the fact that his father and 2 uncles served and returned from World War I.

Wine & Food

During the mid 1990s I heard of a top quality Sauvignon Blanc from Gembrook Hills Vineyard. Over the next few years visits to Dononvans Restaurant were always an opportunity to try the excellent Gembrook Hills white. This is not one of your lean, acidic wines smelling of mown grass and described by some as 'cats pee' wine. They are rich and full of flavour, showing the benefit of a small amount of barrel ferment addition.

A recent visit to the vineyard just off Launching Place Rd about 2kms out of Gembrook was a revelation. Ian And June Marks generously showed us all of the young wines in barrel, the current release wines and a vertical tasting of older vintages.

The Sauvignon Blanc was as good as expected. The Chardonnay was all class but the Pinot Noir just blew me away. We saw the seven or so components which will go to make the 2001 Pinot Noir - each batch fermented at different temperatures, some with wild yeast and some inocculated yeast, some crushed and all destemmed. Finally the wine went to barrels from different makers with varing degrees of toast. We look forward to seeing and buying the final blend.

In the meantime we will enjoy the case of 2000 we had to have. \$27.50 per bottle for all wines, and a bargain.



FORMER BAKER TURNS 90

On Sunday 24th June 2001, family and friends gathered to celebrate Ted Unwin's 90th Birthday with an afternoon tea.

Ted was born on 28th June. 1911 at Loch to William and Letitia Unwin. Ted's early life was not easy as his father died when Ted was 6 and his mother died 4 years later. Ted's sister Florrie took him in and brought him up as one of her children. When Tedleft school he began an with apprenticeship McCarthy's Bakery in Loch as a Baker and Pastry Cook. He was also a very keen sportsman, playing football and cricket.

After finishing his apprenticeship Ted moved to Footscray where he stayed with his elder brother Fred and his family. During this time Ted became involved with his beloved Footscray Football Club. It was at that time that Ted met Eileen O'Connor, Ted and Eileen later married on 9th November, 1935.

With the outbreak on World War II, Ted joined the Air Force, but due to a shortage of "Essential Services" Ted was sent to

Beaconsfield as the town baker in 1940. The Bakery was on the north east corner of Wood and Arthur Streets, where the units are now.

When Ted and Eileen moved to Beaconsfield housing was a problem, and they lived with Peg and Fred

Wright (where the Earlsmere Estate is now). Peg and Ted were old friends from Loch. Later in 1940 the family moved to

the house on the south side of the highway where the shops are presently, on the corner of Horner and the Old Highway. The willow tree in the car park was once part of the chook pen. The only other house on the south side of the highway was a house and kiosk, where the Garden Supplies is now. At the end of the War, Ted's contract with the "Essential Services" was over, and owing to the health of Eileen's mother the family moved back to Footscray. Ted worked for Bradshaw's Bakery until a finger injury stopped him baking bread.

In 1951 Ted started work with the Melbourne City Council until he retired in 1976. In 1963 Ted bought land on the Happy Hills Estate and in 1965 moved back to Beaconsfield. where he grew vegetables. Ted joined the Berwick Bowling Club and continued playing until 1997. In 1996 owing to poor health Ted and Eileen moved to their daughter's in Souter Street. Eileen died in 1997 after 61 years marriage. Three years ago Ted moved to the Emerald Nursing Home.



Ted was well enough to come home and celebrate his birthday. Congratulations and Happy 90th Birthday.

FRIENDS OF THE CARDINIA CREEK SANCTUARY

The past two months have been an exciting and productive time for the group. The May working bee was held in the Allen St. Reserve where 500 trees were planted with the help of the Narre Warren North Scout Group and a BBQ lunch provided by Nick Masters of Greening ·Australia. Some of the plants were replaced at the July working bee due to rabbit damage and tree guards placed around them.

The 27th of June saw the presentation of the results of the Fauna Survey conducted by Ed McNabb. This was a great opportunity to see the wonderful and diverse range of native animals in the area. Some of these included the rare and threatened Powerful Owl,

Southern Boobook and the impressive Wedge-Tailed Eagle.

The friends group, along with Corrective Services are still removing weeds like Pittosporum, Holly, Winter Cherry, Bridal Creeper, Honeysuckle and Wandering Jew from the reserve. This is an ongoing that requires persistence and patients however, it's not made any easier by the inconsiderate few who dump their rubbish in the reserve. It would also be appreciated when walking in the reserve if you could stay on the made paths and not make your own as this only helps to spread the weeds around.

With the onset of the colder months, it has been brought to our attention that fire wood collectors are visiting the reserve. This is disappointing to know because those logs are home to many of our native animals, insects and fungi. These are all essential to the maintenance of unique ecosystem in the reserve. (It is important to remember that it is illegal to remove firewood from the reserve).

As the urban sprawl swamps the area, it becomes even more important to protect and preserve our natural assets so that our bushland reserves don't become fragmented and fenced in by urban developments. 
Because of the large common land and significant engineering works in this development, residents have a considerable financial and lifestyle interest in the maintenance of these The developer areas.

WALLACE STREET TREE PLANTING





CONTRACTORS BEWARE



The new rules relating to the alienation of Personal Services Income apply from the 1st of July 2000 and will therefore affect 2001 income tax returns. The rules treat income gained as a reward of personal efforts or results an individual as attributed income of that individual rather than the business structure e.g. Trust. Company Partnership which has earned the income. If income is attributed to an individual. then only limited income tax deductions are available.

These new Personal Services Income rules apply if 80% or more of gross income is derived from one source unless the taxpayer obtains a Personal Services Determination. If less than 80% of income is derived from one source then the taxpayer may self assess to avoid the impact of these new rules provided they satisfy one of the following tests:

- 1.Business Premises Test - the exclusive use of business premises. An office at your residence will not satisfy these rules.
- 2.Unrelated clients test i.e. advertising to the public at multiple large and unrelated clients.

Employment testemployees perform 20% or more of the work or employ an apprentice for at least 6 months.

Recent announcements by the Australian Taxation Office have eased the pain of these rules, however the impact on income tax remains. The changes announced include self assessment in lieu of applying for a Personal Services Determination, an amnesty on penalties and interest charges taxpavers who make honest mistakes and an undertaking bv the Australian Taxation Office to discuss, explain and provide extensive documentation to the different industries affected. In addition the unrelated client test has been relaxed where a client /agency relationship applies e.g. financial planners. These new measures may encourage non-action by affected taxpayers, however I recommend urgent attention otherwise delay in paying income tax and arrears of PAYG may become insurmountable to many small businesses.

scenes especially the roof top ones, are very "Mary Poppins" like).





Cardinia Creek Parklands Future Directions Plan

The Cardinia Creek Parklands are a series of linked parks along the Cardinia Creek valley extending from the Harkaway foothills to the open plains south of The Beaconsfield. regional proposed parklands will be 440 hectares in size and contain land suitable for recreation as well as areas of significant natural bushland and wetlands.

A Future Directions Plan is to be prepared for the areas of the Cardinia Creek Parklands managed by Parks Victoria, within the context of the proposed boundary of the parklands.

Currently only small areas of land within the proposed parklands are owned or managed by public agencies including Parks Victoria, Melbourne Water, the Department of Natural Resources and Environment, City of Casey and Shire of Cardinia. Implementation of the complete series of parklands will be dependent on purchasing land from private owners. As land cannot be compulsorily acquired, the timing of purchases will be dependent on the wishes of landowners, with the expectation that it may be many years before all of the proposed parkland has been acquired.

The Future Directions Plan will provide a broad strategic framework to guide management of the parklands.

This will include:

- * Identifying an overall vision for the parklands
- * Outlining the current conditions and values
- * Identifying appropriate roles and objectives for the various zones within the parkland and providing a framework for decision making over time.

The first stage of the project is the development of a Public Discussion Paper that will identify key issues that Parks Victoria needs to address in the Future Directions Plan. This Discussion Paper will be publicly released in August/ September and public comment will be sought for a four week period.

The issues identified during this process will then be considered and addressed in preparation of the draft Future Directions Plan. The Draft Plan will be released for public exhibition at the end of the year.

The release of these documents will be advertised in the local newspapers.


I said, "The fence is half a kilometre long." She said, "Hold the line."
