

FIREFIGHTERS TO NSW BUSHFIRES


Local members of the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade had a strong presence at the recent NSW bushfire crisis. Initially the Beaconsfield CFA had a crew of 5 people working in NSW for the first 3 day shift. A further 3 people went on the second shift and 1 person on the third shift.

They had one person virtually working full time here, to receive information about the health and location of the crews, to pass on information to the fire fighters families, also organising the next crews to go up and to ensure we had sufficient qualified people in Beaconsfield to provide the required local protection.

It is a show of strength of our fire brigade that they can have up to 8 fire fighters away and still have sufficient numbers back at home to maintain full fire protection.

One of the fire fighters comments were "we got the call on Boxing Day, you don't even question whether to go or stay, the call comes through from people in need and you go". Another said " it was a great learning experience to be given to opportunity to work with other fire agencies, you get to see how they operate, get to look over their trucks and equipment and bring those ideas back home".

While there is a lot of focus on the fire fighters who actually go up to the fires, recognition should also be extenuated to the fire fighters that ensured they were around the local area. And most importantly thanks needs to go to the families and friends of all involved. Most people sacrificed their entire Christmas break and things like taking their family to the beach or going to the city because they were on standby for NSW and the local area.

Our deepest sympathy goes to his wife Denise, six children; Robyn, Ross, Valerie, Janet, Ian and Bruce and 19 grandchildren.



There is considerable commercial development planned for the north of the highway being the office and shop complex on the corner of Beaconsfield Emerald Road and the supermarket development on the vacant commercial site which will also include shops and offices. I suspect these projects have been delayed due to a lack of demand for commercial buildings.

There are rumours about town that sale and further commercial development is planned for the Old Hall

Site on the highway. Now Beaconsfield is a fairly small town, and even though it is growing quickly, further commercial development of the centre of town is not necessary or desirable. Council sees this tract of land as a valuable asset which is to be sold to fund other Council projects including the new community centre on O'Neil Road. I don't oppose the sale of Council assets and would certainly not like to see the construction of the new community centre delayed for want of funding. However, the value of open space in such a location should not be assessed on just a financial basis.

The Old Hall Site is an attractive piece of land that provides residents with easy access to the centre of the town. Its location would prove ideal for a park, picnic or play area located close to the shops,

the bus stop and toilet. Unfortunately it is not big enough for the proposed community centre. It would also be an ideal site for the War Memorial, which will need to be relocated when the proposed realignment of the Wood Street and **Princes** Highway intersection occurs. As it is a large piece of land there may be some scope to permit part of the land to be used for some other purpose and part to be retained for public use. To allow the whole of the land to be sold for commercial purposes would be a sell out of this intrinsically valuable piece of land to commercialism.

It is time we stood united and not allow council to sell off a valuable community asset for commercial purposes. We need to tell Council and Councillors what we want to happen in our town and fight to ensure the amenity of Beaconsfield is preserved for now and the future by retaining such assets for us all to enjoy.



TRAFFIC LIGHTS SOON TO BE INSTALLED

You may recall that I mentioned the discussion of the speed limit at Guys Hill in the last Banner edition.

SPEED LIMIT GUYS HILL

"1 have had a request to reduce the speed at Emerald Road Guys Hill to 50KM.

The recommendation will be passed on to Vicroads. It will be interesting to see how they respond. We know they do not like to impede arterial road traffic but surely the residential section of Guys Hill should be protected."

Well discussion took place with Vicroads and they readily agreed to 70km, but the council officer felt there was justification for a greater reduction and subsequently raised the matter again on a later occasion and they approved of 60km.

The signs have not yet been erected but be warned as you drive through Guy Hill they soon will appear.

OLD PRINCES HWY

If you travel on the Emerald Beaconsfield Road at peak periods and try to enter the Old Princes Hwy you would have experienced problems. A solution is at hand.

One of the "Berwick Views" development conditions was for them to install traffic lights at this intersection. The lights are scheduled to be installed in March with addition of appropriate traffic lanes.

HOME & COMMUNITY SERVICE.




Carpet needed

Wonder if the Roulettes will be at the Berwick Show this year?







WINE & FOOD

For me the two most prominent issues of 2001 which will effect us in 2002 are the difficulty of finding red wines of quality under the \$15 price barrier and the penetration of the Stelvin cap as a replacement for the familiar cork; particularly used with Riesling wines.

Wines recommended 2-3 vears ago at \$15-30 are now found at \$30-50 and in some cases \$75, with little more than an artwork change on the label. Wines we bought around \$8-12 are now \$15 to more than \$20. For we consumers the much referred to glut of grapes and resultant lower price per tonne at the winery have not translated into lower bottle prices. Farmers know all about this - we can only hope.

Recent vintages of Riesling have been among the best seen for years, the 2001 wines from the Clare Valley are particularly good. Many of the makers of these wines no longer use corks, which may be daunting for those unfamiliar with the Stelvin cap. Basic, low quality white wines of the 70s and 80s used a seemingly similar screw cap which may lead us to pre-suppose that a current wine sealed using a Stelvin cap is of a basic standard. These new caps mean no longer do we risk opening a Riesling to find a dull, flat or corked wine. The Stelvin

cap retains freshness and eliminates cork taint, which has attracted their use by our specialist Riesling makers. Enjoy with confidence.

Summer (as it was) is coming to an end and soon berries, peaches, nectarines and mangoes etc., will disappear from our table. Fresh fruit either whole or as fruit salad is one of lifes pleasures during hot weather—do not miss the end of the season.

Last February I attended an adult education course on building a wood fired oven, my oven was completed in time for New Years festivities, so long slow cooked lamb roasts, pizzas and bread have been the order of the day. Feb 2002 offers a class of firing the oven and cooking using the age old methods of our mediteranean forebears. I look forward to using the oven and gaining confidence with the dishes and methods of the course and sharing the results with friends.

Wines Lawson Dry Hills, Sauvignon Blanc, NZ, 2001 around \$18 is a lovely rich wine quite opposite to the dry mouth puckering acidic Sauv Blancs we too often see. Rieslings of 2001 from Chrismont, King Valley, \$12-15, made by the Pizzini Bros, tends to the limey style and will keep. Leasingham Bin 7, Clare Valley, \$12. All will reward.

Galli Shiraz, 2000 from Rockbank, outside Melbourne is a sumptuous mouthful which concentrates on fruit with a low to medium tannin finish. I have seen this wine twice now and think it is delicious. Reportedly the 2001 is an even better wine. Contact the vineyard or try Nicks wines. A red under \$10 that I would happily have in the cellar is Leasingham Bastion 1999, A blend of Shiraz and Cabernet, around \$9.

Bouquet to the residents of Holm Park Road who removed the fallen tree off the road to allow traffic to get through after trying to contact Council to no avail.

Brickbats to those pet owners who do not lock up their cats at night and Dog Owners who do not remove their dogs dropping from other people's nature strip.

SALLY'S GARDEN

Lawns will need a regular soaking. If the lawn needs feeding, moisten soil before applying fertilizer & water it in well. Do not cut lawns very low while the weather is hot.

Roses will be sending up new buds, feed with an all-purpose plant food. Petunias can be cut back & will bloom again during late autumn.

If lemon trees look a bit yellow, be sure they get enough water & the soil drains properly. Inside plants can be fed, using the plant food at half strength as recommended for other plants. Use the atomizer 2 or 3 times a week to create a moister atmosphere.

March:

Sow seeds of broad beans, carrot, parsnips, kohlrabi. Seedlings: broccoli, silverbeet, cabbage, cauliflower.

Plant bulbs before end of month, such as; freesias, daffodil, dutch iris, ixia, ranunculus etc. Keep all well watered.



THE VOICE OF THE BAPTIST **CHURCH**

Over the holidays I read Walter Mikac's book, "To Have And To Hold "

(Macmillan, Sydney 1997). The book is both an account of the terrible grief that Walter experienced following the death of his wife Nanette and his two daughters, 6 year old, Alannah and 3 year old Madeline. It is also a tribute to the lives of his wife and daughters.

They all died on Sunday afternoon 28 April 1996. They were victims of the terrible massacre that took place at Port Arthur. They were shot dead along with 32 other innocent people. The actions of the deranged gunman were evil personified. The description of the way he shot little Alannah left me feeling numb (P 206).

It is a moving book. Walter takes his readers deep into his grief. There are places in the book where one is so affected by the sheer agony of Walter's loss that one feels drained. As you make your way through the book you cannot but ache for the man.

Walter's suffering is far beyond anything I have ever I feel tasted. uncomfortable referring to him. And indeed I would not but for the fact that he himself has put his story in the public arena.

At about the half way mark in the book he deals with the matter of faith (P150-152). He tells us that, 'spiritually he feels bankrupt and alone'. He has some doubts about God.

God may even be nothing more that 'a guiding force'.

But Walter is not the only one who has suffered terribly. Let me mention Horatio Spafford. Horatio was a lawyer. He lived with his wife and four children in Chicago. He was 46 years old in 1874 and that year his wife and children went on a holiday to France. They travelled on the large French steamer, the Ville de Havre. In the mid Atlantic the ship collided with a sailing ship. Within 30 minutes the ship went under. Horatio's wife survived, but that day all four of his children drowned.

Goodness knows what anguish this man suffered. In his grief he did not write a book but a hymn. Part of the first verse of his hymn says 'When sorrows like sea billows roll, what ever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say, it is well, it is well with my soul'.

So for the one man God is distant and, it would seem, unhelpful in the midst of his agony. For the other man God is the primary source of comfort. What does Horatio know of God that Walter does not seem to know? This is a hard question. But one that we would be wise to consider, for the day will come when we too will suffer. And even though our suffering may not be in the league of Mikac's or Spafford's the thought of God's being without presence is not a nice one.





NEW SUPERANNUATION CHANGES



The Federal Government has been active in reviewing and pursuing further changes in superannuation laws. Some possible changes and the proposed dates are as follows:

From 1st July 2002

- The current superannuation deduction for self-employed persons of \$3000 plus 75% of the excess is to be increased to \$5000 plus 75% of the excess.
- The current 15% surcharge rate will reduce by 1.5% each year during the next three years to 10.5%
- Age at which working Australians can make personal superannuation contributions will be increased from 70 to 75
- Non-residents will be able to access their superannuation entitlements when they have permanently departed Australia.
- Deductible contributions of up to \$1000 p.a. can be made for children.
- In lieu of the superannuation rebate for undeducted personal s u p e r a n n u a t i o n contributions a scheme providing contribution

payments of up to \$1000 for low income earners who make superannuation contributions of up to \$1000.

From 1st July 2003

- Spouses who are members of accumulated funds will be able to split their superannuation contributions allowing the use of separate tax-free threshold and reasonable benefit limit.
- Employers will be required to remit superannuation contributions quarterly rather than annually.

In addition the Government intends to strengthen the supervision of APRA regulated superannuation funds including:

- Licensing of all superannuation funds.
- Minimum share capital for all funds
- Funds to hold annual general meetings where members can question fund trustees
- Reviewing ways the Government can help funds that suffer big losses.

Whilst some of the above proposals have not yet been legislated they should be borne in mind when considering tax planning and retirement. Always talk to your Accountant.

Here are my favourite films of the year.


- 1. **Moulin Rouge** There can never be enough said about this film.
