NEW GARBAGE SERVICE FOR CARDINIA TO START IN JULY

Cardinia Shire is introducing a new garbage service from the 1st July 2002.

The current garbage contract expires at the end of June making way for a new service, which according to council, if used properly, will result in a better recycled product.

Cardinia Shire Mayor, Keith Ewenson says, 'The biggest difference is that everyone will now have two bins, however we have managed to retain the same collection days and keep any service cost rise to a minimum.'

Manager of Health Services, David Esmore explained that every household will be issued with a new 120 litre wheelie bin to be used for garbage only. This bin will be collected weekly on the same day as people usually put their bins out. It is the same size in volume as half of the old bin, but the shape of the bin makes it easier to hold bulky rubbish items.

'The big 240 litre bin now becomes the recycling bin,' said Mr Esmore. 'The recycling bin will be collected every two weeks on the same day as the garbage bin, but later in the day.'

To ensure the integrity of the recycled product, the contractor will be doing random checks of the recycling bins to make sure they are not being contaminated with garbage. If the bins are found to have garbage in them, residents will have a sticker put on the bin to remind them what is suitable for recycling.

Mr Esmore said delivery of the new 120 litre garbage bins will begin on the 10th June 2002. Delivery teams will be following the garbage trucks around and replacing all the lids on the big bins with single yellow lids and removing the dividers.

'The most important message we need to convey, says Mr Esmore, is that during June, we need everyone to leave their big bins out all day on their collection day so the delivery teams can make the changes. So, if you usually put your bin away immediately after it is emptied, please leave it out until the end of the day,' he said.

A booklet with information about the new waste service including; how to recycle, what happens with your hard and green waste,

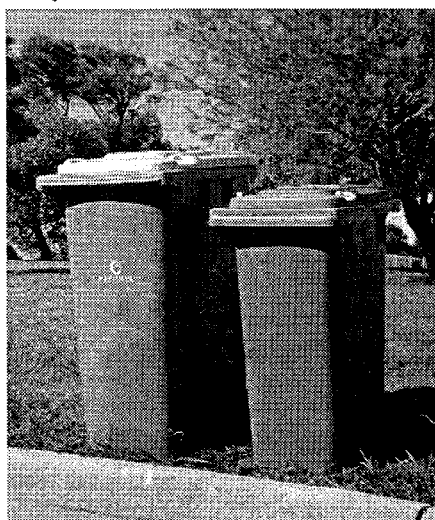

where there is a transfer station and composting advice, will come with the new bin.

There will also be a fridge magnet calendar with recycling weeks marked on it as well as the phone numbers for the contractor's Customer Service Centre.



'We understand that wheeling two bins to the kerb every second week may be a problem for some people with mobility difficulties and some farmers that tow a bin along a long drive,' say Mayor Ewenson. 'We are however researching towing devices for two bins and are also looking at approaching community groups that might be able to provide help to people who need it to wheel their two bins to the kerb, through a registration system.'

'This is however a great opportunity for the council to support it's environmental objectives by encouraging people to reduce, re-use and recycle,' the Mayor said.

TOUGHER SWIMMING POOL REGULATIONS IN FORCE

Pool owners may face fines of up to \$5,000 if they don't comply with strict regulations on backyard pools and spas that came into effect late last year.

'The State Government is demonstrating how serious it takes the issue of backyard pool and spa safety,' said Council's Municipal Building Surveyor, Graeme Geary.

'Pool and spa owners must keep pool barriers properly maintained, regardless of whether they have children living on the premises or not,' said Mr Geary.

The new regulations include:

- An increase in the maximum fine \$1,000 to \$5,000. Councils can also issue a \$200 on the spot fine for certain breaches of regulations.

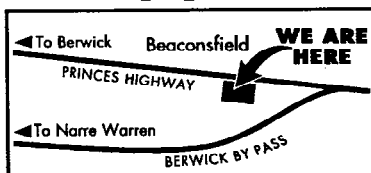

MAKE AND MINGLE

MAKE AND MINGLE started at the Beaconsfield Baptist Church 15 years ago and Peggy Dundas taught painting there from those early days.

Many people remember her beautiful paintings and her kindness and generosity when teaching.

Peggy has just celebrated her 80th birthday and Make and Mingle together with Beaconsfield join in wishing her Happy Birthday and God's blessing for the coming years.

PEGGY'S LOVE FOR ART

Peggy Irene Smethurst was born on 26.5.1922 at North Carlton, Melbourne.

When she was growing up as a child, life on the farm at Thorpdale was not easy. There was no power, they had only a wood fire, a kerosene tin was used to heat water for the bath, and Peggy often looked after the chickens, calves and weak lambs.

She attended primary school in the country at Trafalgar. For her secondary schooling, she attended Methodist Ladies College in Hawthorn. Peggy later left primary school to do home schooling.

She lived with her nana and two aunties while going to college, then later went back to the farm in Trafalgar and did an art course via home schooling or more correctly, correspondence.

After a quiet life on the farm, Peggy found M.L.C. a little daunting as she was not used to mixing with a

crowd of people and was a country girl at heart.

She moved to North Balwyn in 1941 with her parents where she was able to continue her art course. Peggy's dream was to complete her art course and journey to France, Paris, especially to continue her artistic

adventure, however, war broke out and she ended up working at an aircraft factory at Fisherman's Bend where she assisted with designs of aircraft, including the McAlister.

After the war, the family moved back to the farm in Trafalgar. Peggy met Frank Dundas in Trafalgar



where he was working at the time. He had not been back in Australia long as he was captured by the Japanese, while serving for the army in Burma, where he served three and a half years on the infamous Burma Railway. When he returned he was given the nick-name "Slim" as he was 6'2" and incredibly thin as a result of his experiences.

While back on the farm, her father passed away in 1947. Peggy's mother sold the farm and she and Peggy moved back to Fortuna Avenue, North Balwyn.

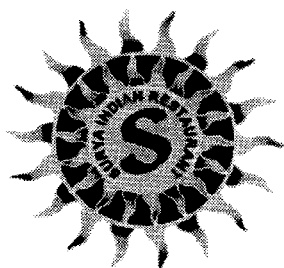
Frank Dundas moved to Dandenong when Peggy moved to North Balwyn and he and Peggy were engaged in 1949. Soon after, Peggy accompanied by her mother, went to England to see relations; they stayed there one year. They returned to North Balwyn in 1950.

Peggy was married to Frank in 1952 and they moved to Beaconsfield where they purchased a house and some land. They adopted Heather in 1956. They sold the weatherboard house in 1965 which, unfortunately, shortly after the sale was burnt down due to an electrical fault in the roof.

Frank had a brick house built on one of the blocks they had purchased, and the address changed from Railway Avenue, to Souter Street where Peggy still lives. In 1988, her granddaughter, Naomi was born and in February 1992, just prior to their fortieth wedding anniversary, Frank passed away in The Valley Private Hospital.

Peggy continued with her painting for many years being involved with the McClelland Art Guild and also the local Toomuc Valley Art Group at its inception. She has painted many landscapes, some for pleasure and some for customers, and also numerous portraits, including about thirty variations of a local shearer, Frank Buck, who passed away many years ago. She has never lost her love for art but, unfortunately, failing eyesight has meant she has had to give up her beloved painting. Nonetheless, she is still independent and spends much time in her garden, another favourite past-time, and walking her dog, Patch.

Peggy has been a regular church-goer all her life and, originally, went to the old

Congregational Church. Since the Baptists moved to the area, she has been in regular attendance and is a member of the Baptist Church (the site which was the old "Yellow Rose of Texas" service station come-take-away food place come-restaurant). She also attends Make 'n' Mingle regularly, and alternates between Legacy and the Mid-Way Group depending on clashes.

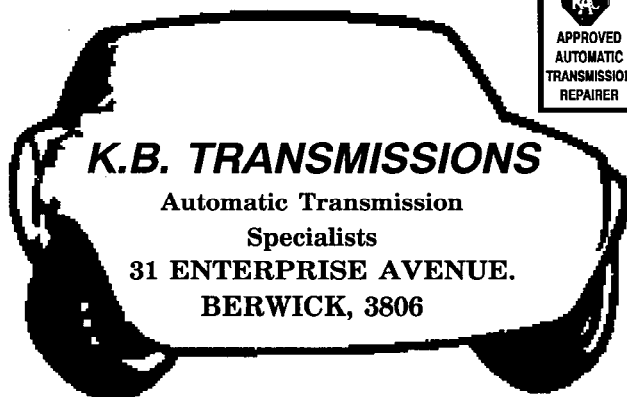
When Heather was young, Peggy was involved with the Infant Welfare Centre, which was held in the old hall on the highway, she taught Religious Instruction at Beaconsfield Primary and Sunday School at the old church and was also in the Mothers' Club at Pakenham High.

Having lived in the area now fifty years, Peggy has witnessed a lot of changes, and although at first hesitant about moving to Beaconsfield, has certainly settled in well and loves the town and the local community.

Peggy still regularly enjoys going to Make and Mingle, a friendship and craft group, which meets every Wednesday, 10am-12 noon during school term at the Beaconsfield Baptist Church.

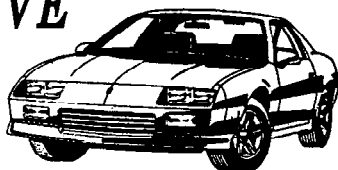

WINE & FOOD

Anne and I spent most of April cruising some 2000kms of the Kimberley Coast of W.A., one of the last true wildernesses. The fish caught and eaten soon after have reinforced my belief in fresh fish. Threadfin Salmon, caught mainly in shallow water and mangrove creeks. Mangrove Jacks and of course Barramundi, to 30lbs (fishermen always use pounds). The Barra cut into 200gm steaks, barbecued and served with a simple sauce and salad will long be remembered. As will Mud Crab caught one hour before and converted from a pile of crabs to a pile of shells. So rich and sweet.

Winter is almost upon us and the last

fruits of autumn are almost gone. Don't forget to try cooking some Quinces. Field Mushrooms are still around and must be one of the best wine and food combinations with Pinot Noir. Try pan frying with a little olive oil and a teaspoon or two of one of my favourite sauces – Kikkomin Teriyaki Marinade with Roasted Garlic – a little goes a long way and adds a lot of flavour.

Built in the shell of the old Guys Hill Post Office is Café Bel Posto.

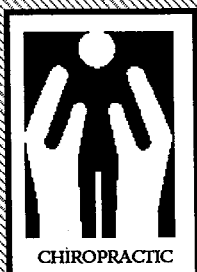

There is a wide range of cakes to be had with excellent coffee. The amount of people meeting for lunch or to sit over their coffee and provided paper indicates there is plenty of local support. A BYO licence has recently been granted which for me is an extra attraction.

TOUGHER SWIMMING POOL REGULATIONS IN FORCE

-All swimming pools and spas over 300mm deep must have a childproof safety barrier.

-A building permit is required for installing a swimming pool or spa, safety fence or barriers. Even if swimming pool safety fence is being renewed, a building permit is needed before work begins.

-Childproof safety barriers must be completed within six months of building work starting on spas and pools.

-Any spa or pool fence, gate or door must be maintained in good working order.

-It is an offence to prop open any gate or door providing access to a pool or spa.

-All gates and doors providing access to a pool or spa must have self-closing and self-latching devices – even those built before laws were introduced in 1991 to make barriers compulsory.

-For pools and spas built before 8 April 1991, a grace period to 30 June 2002 is provided for pool owners to

install self-closing devices.

Mr Geary said many people have questions relating to fencing above ground pools. 'The walls of an above ground swimming pool or spa provide a barrier if they are at least 1.2m in height and do not have a surface which enables a child to gain a foothold and climb into the pool or spa. Any objects that a child could climb on, such as a pool ladder, pool filter and pump equipment should be properly fenced,' he said.

'The new owner of a house is responsible for ensuring that safety barriers are provided. Even an inflatable pool, which is capable of containing a depth of water greater than 300mm, requires a safety barrier. A cover or lid over the pool or spa does not comply with the law and is not acceptable,' he said.

SCRATCHING YOUR HEAD...?

Head lice - the word that most children's parents dread hearing. However it is a problem that seems to keep occurring. The good news is that with the correct treatment you can eliminate and control head lice.

Head lice have been around for thousands of years and they move from head to head easily.

They are small, wingless, blood sucking insects. Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brown and they only survive on humans. If taken off the head they usually die within 24 hours.

Anyone can get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with someone who also has head lice. They do not jump, fly or swim, they can only crawl. Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalp to feed, the eggs are laid within 1.5cm of the scalp and are attached firmly to the hair.

If lice or eggs are found, the hair and scalp should be treated entirely. Nothing kills all of the eggs so treatment

must involve two applications seven days apart. The purpose of the first treatment is to kill all the lice, the second treatment is to kill young lice hatched over the next six days.

You only need to treat those people in the family who have head lice. Any lice found on chairs, clothing or bedding are usually injured or dying and so normal household cleaning is all that is required. However wash pillow cases in very hot water or use a clothes dryer on the hot setting.

There is nothing available that prevents head lice. However there are a number of products available to treat them. Insecticide resistance is common, so it is important to test if the lice are dead. If they are, treat again in seven days using the same product. If the lice are not dead, the treatment has not worked and another product should be used with a different active compound. The best treatment is thorough regular weekly inspections of the hair. Use a comb to find any head lice and tie back long hair to prevent their spread.

Children with head lice are required under the Health (Infectious Diseases) Regulations to be kept away from school, day care or crèche until treatment has commenced. A child with head lice can be treated one evening and return to school the next day, even if there are still some eggs present.

THE VOICE OF THE BAPTIST CHURCH.

Christian worship is both simple and profound. There is nothing very complicated in a group of very ordinary people gathering together, singing some songs and listening to a speaker. But there is equally something very profound in the words that they sing and the message that the speaker brings. For two thousand years Christians have done this every week. They sing and speak of Jesus. A Jesus who died but who was raised from the dead and who meets them in their worship. The spiritual nourishment that Christians find in their worship services is rich.

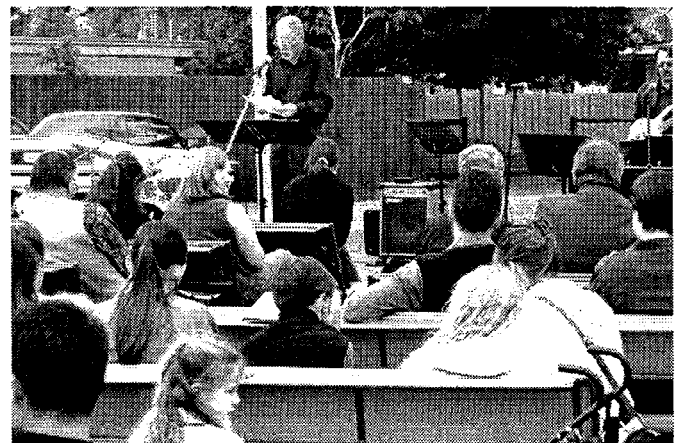
Church may not be in the car park each week but the door is wide open each week.

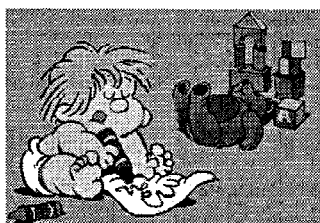

FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

BUSINESSES - SHOULD YOU BE AN "STS"?

Commencing with the 2001/2002 income year many businesses will have to elect whether to enter the Simplified Tax System (STS). To be eligible there must be a business carried on with an average turnover of less than \$1 million and depreciating assets of less than \$3 million (at WDV). An election in the tax return is required to enter STS. If an STS taxpayer fails to meet one of the above tests then they cease to be an STS taxpayer. If a taxpayer voluntarily leaves STS they cannot re-enter for at least five years.

Some main advantages of being an STS taxpayer are:

1. The cash basis of accounting is used ie. income is based on monies received and deductions allowable when paid. This benefits taxpayers where Debtors exceed Creditors. A non STS taxpayer must use accruals or cash basis as appropriate.

2. Depreciating assets including software costing less than \$1,000 are fully deductible in the year of purchase. Assets costing in excess of \$1,000 are allocated to the general pool or long life pool and depreciated over their effective life. A non STS taxpayer cannot write-off small value purchases eg: a \$10 hammer and depreciation claims are generally higher under STS.

3. The STS allows small business taxpayers to

continue to claim upfront deductions for prepayments including rent, leases, interest and insurance. A non STS taxpayer must usually apportion the deduction on a time basis except for amounts less than \$1,000, salaries and wages and pre 21st September 1999 contracted obligations.

4. A STS taxpayer will have simplified treatment of trading stock whereby eligible businesses can choose not to account for stock movements if less than \$5,000. It may not therefore be necessary to undertake an annual stock take.

If a taxpayer changes from an accruals basis to become a STS taxpayer there are transitional rules to ensure that income is only taxed once and expenses allowed as a deduction once only.

There are many factors including the above-mentioned to consider whether a business taxpayer is eligible and wants to elect to become a Simplified Tax System (STS) taxpayer commencing on 1st July 2001.

You should seek your Accountants' advice as the decision must be made when preparing the 2001/2002 tax return for the business taxpayer which will have long term effects on your taxation and cash flow position.

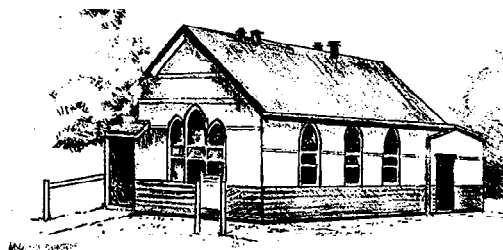

SALLY'S GARDEN

ROSEMARY:

This very fragrant herb has many various uses.

Strip the leaves from a stem & use the stem as a skewer through BBQ meats.

Use a sprig as a brush when oiling fish. Place a sprig on top of a leg of lamb when roasting the meat. A marinade of rosemary, olive oil & black pepper can be used on fish, lamb & eggplant. Small sprigs can be placed in a bottle of oil & used on salads. Rosemary in a bottle of vinegar is also nice over salads. Sprigs of rosemary



can be frozen for future use. When needed simply slide the fingers down the stalk & slide off the leaves for use.

Rosemary is an evergreen shrub and can be propagated any time of the year.

Slowly simmer rosemary sprigs in a saucepan & let the aroma penetrate the house for a very refreshing aroma.



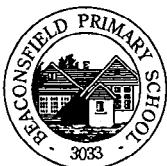

Edgerton, Jack Thompson, Jay La'gia and Temuera Morrison are just some of a few that appear.

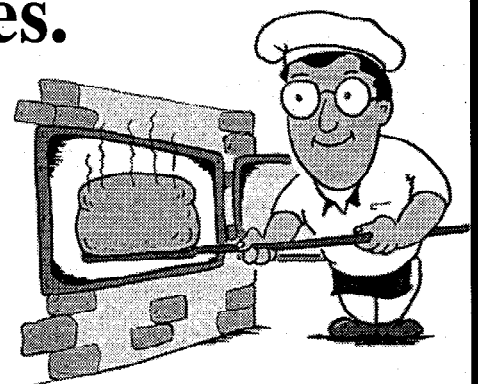

OUR NATURAL WORLD

Palmistry is an old and fascinating art, which involves the study of the hands to tell the past, present and future history of the individual. Whilst the modern image of Palmistry is that of a "mystic" holding your hand and "reading" your life history to you, there is much more to it than first meets the eye. The most famous scientific development from this ancient art, is the result of the work carried out by Sir Charles Bell in the 19th century when he discovered that each individual human being had corpuscular markings on the tips of their fingers which were unique to them, and them alone. From this came the bane of all criminals, the certain conviction arising from fingerprints left at the crime scene. The study of hands can be traced back to the earliest known civilisations such as India, China, Persia, Egypt and Rome. The early Christian Church was very jealous of Palmistry and bitterly denounced it and persecuted it at every opportunity, calling the practitioners "pagans and heathens". It was called sorcery and witchcraft, and eventually laws were passed outlawing it. This ancient science then fell into the hands of vagrants, tramps and gipsies, where it survived until more enlightened times arrived and it was given back its rightful place in the science of the world.

An interesting fact of history is that the first book printed in the "modern" era, was one on Palmistry called "Die Kunst Ciromantia", at Augsburg in 1475. Palmistry appears to even get a mention in the original Hebrew in the Book of Job, Chap.37, Verse 7; "God caused signs or seals on the hands of all the sons of men, that the sons of men might know their works".

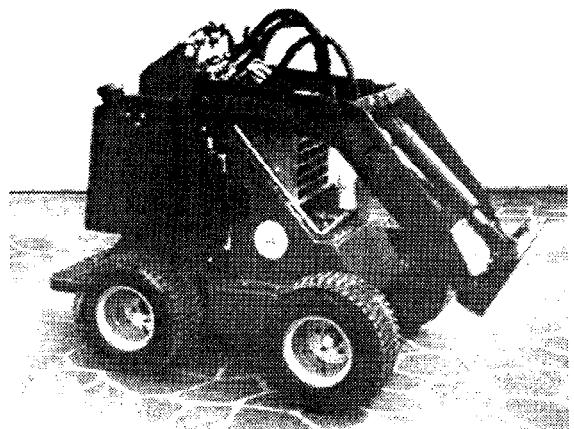

On Sunday 26th of May, the members of the Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctury held a tree planting day.

The event was attended by a number of volunteers and their assistance was greatly appreciated. 2000 trees were planted throughout the morning and a BBQ lunch was provided. On Sunday the 16th June a further 1000 trees will be planted in the same area along the creek bank.

This was once full of weeds, which were sprayed and then burnt to enable the planting to take place. This might seem like a lot of trees for the one area however, it is important to plant out the area densely in order to out compete and smother new weeds that start to germinate.

Some of the species planted include Manna Gum, Swamp Gum, Silver Wattle, Blackwood Wattle,

Tall sedge, Kangaroo Apple and the Common Tussock Poa.

Having recently driven through the new estates around Beaconsfield, I was disappointed to see so few natives being planted in gardens and public spaces. I believe that too many exotic species are being planted in nature strips and median strips in new estates. In most cases a native alternative can be found for almost any situation. Even more disappointing was to see that one resident has taken it upon themselves to plant agapanthus in the wetlands at Berwick Views. It is because of these attitudes that I am worried about the protection for the remnant vegetation in these estates.

I replace a lot of doors. Internal doors are by no means robust and if, as many are, exposed to the weather than 10 years is a fair life. They cost about \$35. each but add \$90. to fit them, using existing lockset and hinges. I checked with a door specialist who contracts the fitting work for \$154. for a single door reducing to \$258 for two.

The solid timber door costs just under \$100 each and are better for outside exposure. They are fearfully heavy and are better fitted with a centre hinge To ensure maximum life from any door it is necessary to paint (or varnish) the edges as well as the faces.

External doors should not be painted a dark colour. A light colour will reflect heat and

heat is the enemy of long life. With one side of the door facing the cool interior and the outer side facing the sun, imagine the stresses imposed on the structure of the poor old door.

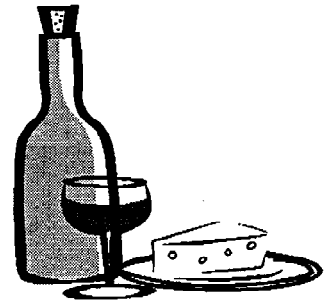
If your home faces East or West and you have a security door it would preferable to paint your door rather than stain/varnish it. The pattern of shadow thrown by the security door mesh will bleach the stain and leave the varnish door with a permanent pattern.

The need for "draught stop" is probably because the door is not filled correctly. It is advisable to have the fit of the door checked before adding another item.

Wine

The release of The Age's Uncorked magazine always causes a flurry around the trade or with those looking for a bargain or a tip on what to buy. In this winter edition over 130 of the seasons best were reviewed.

The Tatachilla Partners Cabernet Shiraz 2001 seen as low as \$9.90 (Dan's) was seen as the 'Best Budget Wine'. At the release price of \$15 is still good value but at \$9.90 is an absolute bargain. Fruit driven with soft tannins, drink now to 2 years. Best Red was Orlando St Hugo Cabernet 1998, \$35 but was \$15 a year ago. Worth the money.

A favourite of mine is the Richmond Grove Clare or Watervale Riesling, in this case the 2001 Watervale was chosen as Best Budget White - \$12- 13. This wine

stands out in any price range.

Recently I saw a bottle of Stoney Rise, Cotes du Robe, Shiraz 2000, \$18-20. A new young wine made in the Rhone style (hence Cotes du), spicy and full of flavour. One to follow. Diamond Valley Estate Chardonnay 1999, \$30. Seen last year at the Victorian Wine Show and described as one for those who like French White Burgundys. It has grown in complexity and is rich and long in the mouth. For that special occasion.

Another wine tasted at the Show which attracted attention and a High Silver Medal was a Shiraz from Jinks Creek Vineyard, near Bunyip. The fruit was grown at Longford near Sale and has produced a wine of great style. Reds made by Andrew Clarke at Jinks Creek have received attention around the trade. The Longford Shiraz is \$28 at Winery, the Yarra Valley Shiraz, \$24 and the Pinot Noir \$22. Ring Andrew on 5629 8502.

One of the standout wines seen at our Wine Club last year was the Sanguine Shiraz, 2000 from Heathcote, it sold out in four days. The 2001 is to be released in June and is available for pre-release tasting at Nick's Malvern Store. \$35.
