

For the past three years I have been honoured to be one of the two Beacon Hills councilors to represent you. It has been a period of challenge and change. Many significant projects are close to fruition. The Cardinia Cultural Centre is about to be opened. The Council recently chose a tri directional policy, which reflects the desires of the Hills area, the Growth Corridor, and a rural theme for the fertile plains. As an ongoing project we have been working for the improvement of local matters with other levels of government, for example the Pakenham Bypass to mention but one.

During the last year it was my pleasure to represent the Council as Mayor of this municipality. In that capacity I was able to share in the activities of many community organisations, Senior Citizen Groups, Community Centres, Fire Brigades, Schools, and Boy Scouts etc. All these Community Groups represent an amazing contribution by local people.



Sporting clubs, local organisations and local identities. Our efforts are supported by our local councillors with a contribution of up to date information relevant to Beaconsfield.

After our writers have completed their task the typist and typesetter set to work - placing articles, photographs, advertising and adding 'local humour and chatter' about the people of town, which all highlight the importance of variety and local content.

this point proofreaders 'swing into action', as timing with the printer is at a premium. Our printer requires time to print and fold the 2000 copies, now in A3 format, in time for the next enthusiastic group of volunteers. Anything up to 15 pairs of willing hands, young and not so young, help collate the individual pages to accomplish the final product -Beaconsfield Banner.

Distribution of the Banner is mainly via 'leg walkers', to not only the township, but to outer lying areas such as Mt Misery.

If it were not for the tireless contribution of a lot of volunteers and the financial support received from our local advertisers, it would not be possible to maintain the high standard that we have set ourselves. It would not have been possible to continually, over the 14 years, to improve the quality of our newsy publication or to reach the homes of so Beaconsfield residents. Well done on a great achievement.





COUNCIL ELECTIONS BEACONSFIELD DIVIDED INTO THREE WARDS

Three wards will encompass parts of Beaconsfield. BeaconHills and PakenhamWards as part of Cardinia Shire and Edrington Ward in the Shire of Casey.

The western end of the Pakenham Ward starts at the viaduct, then everything south of Beaconsfield Ave.,

continuing to Princes Highway and up to Brunt road, along Brunt road to Rix Rd onto Pakenham.

Therefore the Beaconsfield Community Centre, St. Francis Xavier, Kenilworth Ave., Desmond Court area and Panorama Estate are all now within the Pakenham Ward.

Nominations officially open on 6th February and close on 11th February for the forthcoming council elections. Election ballot papers will be forwarded by post to residents of the wards in the last week of February and postal voting closes on 14th March 2003.

The Banner is a nonpolitically aligned or biased newsletter however we will will continue to be politically informative.

The Banner contacted those people that had already indicated their intentions of standing for election, as at 1/02/03, and offered them the opportunity to write to the Beaconsfield residents.





BEACONSFIELD IN CASEY RESIDENTS ACTION GROUP

(B.I.C.R.A.G.) by Ray Fleming, Spokesperson.

As we all know the Manuka-Soldiers Road extension is urgently needed now. The present access via the viaduct and Soldiers Road with heavy vehicles using unsealed Kenilworth Avenue has been hopelessly inadequate for the development already in our area. With future development such as schools, hospitals and increase in housing currently underway adding to an already chaotic traffic situation, this highlights the urgent need to have this Manuka-Soldiers Road extension built now.

The bridge over the railway is the big hurdle. Estimates from Casey Council put the cost of the bridge at \$5,000,000. We need a grant from the State Government to help towards the cost. Dale Wilson, State Lower house member for Narre Warren South with Tammy Lobato, Lower House Member for Gembrook is giving us full support. B.P.A. and B.I.C.R.A.G. will form a delegation from both groups and prepare a submission to be presented to Peter Batchelor, Minister of Transport at a meeting to be arranged by Dale Wilson. We think the meeting will be sometime in March. We also have support from Eumemmering Upper House members Gordon Rich-Phillips and Adam Somyuek. With our submission we invite all residents to get in touch with us with your views and ideas about the extension. This will help us to put in a thorough submission.

With the sound barriers on freeway, Vic Roads has acknowledged that the barriers through noise testing are needed. We have been told that we are high on the priority list and we have in our campaign highlighted the safety, privacy and noise issues, we will continue to push for immediate funding as the safety issue alone with children crossing the freeway warrants the barriers to be built now.

With the speeding problem in Soldiers Road we would like residents (in Soldiers Road) to get in touch with B.I.C.R.A.G. and give us their views on whether the action Casey Council has done in regards to speeding has had an impact or not. We will take this matter further if it is proven that the speeding problem still exists. The ultimate solution is to have Manuka Road-Soldiers Road extension take all through traffic away and leave the viaduct and Soldiers Road (in Beaconsfield) to local residents.





EXPERIENCE CHINA

"How come I've never heard of it?" is a question I hear a lot when I tell people I'm going to live in a city, in China, of over 7 million people. Qingdao, in North East China is a beautiful port city on the Yellow Sea, famous for it's Tsingtao brewery and German architecture. By the time you read this article I will have made it my home for the next 12 months.

I'm going to China for two reasons. Firstly, to work as an English teacher, and secondly to fulfill a dream to traveling in this amazing country. I am the new Oral English teacher at the South Ocean School in Qingdao. I'll be teaching 3 to 6 year old children at a private boarding school that is, apparently, the only Chinese private school recognized by the Chinese Government. Teaching in Qingdao will consist of 16 to 20 lessons a week. Each lesson only runs for 40 minutes so fortunately, for me, I will have plenty of time to explore the surrounding areas and make huge improvements with my very basic grasp of Mandarin. In addition to this, students return to their homes once a month for 5 days allowing the foreign teachers at the school, of which I am one of seven, to travel. My aim is to not only see the famous landmarks such as the Great Wall and the Terracotta Soldiers in Xi'an, but to also get onto the back roads and see things

that the privilege of an extended stay in a country allows.

Qingdao is situated in the province of Shandong, and is considered to be one of the most beautiful parts of China. Well-loved by the Chinese for it's golden beaches and mild climate, Qingdao has an interesting recent history. In the late 19th century the Germans occupied Qingdao. During their short stay of 17 years they dramatically influenced the look of the city with the building of European style houses and government offices. Later, the Japanese forces moved in and controlled the city, on and off, until 1949 when liberation came at the hands of the Chinese Liberation Army.

So I head off with the promise of living 100 metres from the beach, the chance to learn a new language and the opportunity to experience a culture that dates back 6000 years. I look forward to sharing with you the sights, smells and sounds of this country as it continues to open its doors to the world.

SIMPLIFIED COMPANY ASIC LODGEMENTS

Proposed government reforms to be effective from 1st July 2003 will simplify document lodgement and compliance procedures for proprietary limited companies. The reforms are part of the Government's Corporations Law Economic Reform Program Bill No 7 (CLERP 7). Key features of the reforms are:


- 1. Annual returns will be abolished (20002 Annual Returns must still be lodged)
- 2. The Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) will give each company an Annual Statement based on the date of registration. It will include a "statement of details" to review and changes to be notified within 28 days of the review date.
- 3. An annual review fee will be payable within 2 months of the review date. It is anticipated that this annual review fee will be the same as for a company at present i.e. approx. \$200
- 4. Changes to company details must be notified to ASIC throughout the year as they occur, otherwise late lodgement fees will apply.

- 5. The notification period for most changes will increase from 14 to 28 days.
- 6. One form (Form 484) must be used to notify a wide range of changes including:
- registered office and principal place of business
- officeholder details
- members
- share structure
- ultimate holding company.
- 7. Proprietary companies will have new reporting requirements for issued shares, members and ultimate holding details.

Whilst these long awaited changes relieve the lodgement of Annual Returns has extended the time period to notify changes and simplified the reporting of changes, the responsibility for promptly notifying changes and the payment of fees and late lodgement penalties are substantially the same as previously.

SALLY'S GARDEN

Let us all start the new year of 2003 with new & fresh ideas for our gardens.

Autumn is the time to plan & prepare for the rose garden. Roses like at least 5 hours of full sun to ensure plentiful blooms. Enrich poor soils with good garden compost & manure, & work it all well into the soil. Fresh manure needs a couple of months to rot down before the roses are planted to prevent damage to the new root systems as they develop.

Autumn is an ideal time to take cuttings. Place cuttings in a pot of potting mixture to ensure a strong growth before planting them in the garden. If you know the name of the rose, name the cutting so you can identify the cutting & know where to plant it when ready.

There are so many magnificent roses to grow, so be adventuresome & try growing some that have a different appearance & appeal.

The "Wingthorn Rose" (Rosa serica pteracantha) is a tall angular shrub rose which becomes stiff & rugged with age. Its older wood is brown, with numerous fawny vicious thorns, & will reach a height of 3m., if left unpruned.

Kept to much lower proportions, its most ornamental features which are displayed in the new cherry-red shoots with wing like thorns along their length. The fern-like small dark green leaves are hairy on their undersides. The flowers are about 4cm across and compose of only four white petals grown on the stem and at the base of the leaves, appearing in late Spring and flowering through summer.

JOAN ARMITAGE ENCOURAGES YOUNG WRITERS

Iris Lewis is the pseudonym (pen name) of Joan Armitage (wife of the early printer of the Beacy Banner) who produced numerous articles over the past years. Having lived in Beaconsfield for nearly 40 years, she and her husband, George, have made a valuable contribution to community.

When they first moved to the town, some 37 years ago, Beaconsfield was no more than open paddocks, a small post office and butcher, general store, grocers, a plant shop and newsagent. There weren't any take-away shops and the Baptist Church was actually the Yellow Rose of Texas café.

Joan has been an actress, editor, teacher, musician, callisthenics instructor, artist, author, podiatrist and mother in her 86 years. A struggling family, they lived through World War 2 -bombing of Britain (a landmine dropped into their backyard in

Birmingham) and they travelled to Australia with their two sons in 1955 on the Strathnavar.

1965 saw Joan's greatest loss (her son Antony died in a tragic road accident, aged 17) and her greatest achievement (finding her sister after 48 years). Having been orphaned at the age of one and living in orphanages and foster care for the early part of her life, Joan had never really known her family.

Joan recalls the harder times with fondness 'As long as you've got love, that's everything'. For their first years in Beaconsfield Joan and George lived off the meagre income of her paintings, which she sold at the local hotel each month. Joan now paints for enjoyment; her Vernon Road home adorned with paintings and tapestries of English cottages. Now Joan claims she has many friends, but can no longer stop and chat in the local grocery store. Joan suffers from a bone disease and has been physically inactive for 12 years. She can walk to the kitchen and on a good day can walk to the letterbox to collect her mail. She has found ways to keep busy with writing to pen pals the world over, knitting for charities, publishing two of her own books, and painting.

After having her first poem published in the Birmingham mail, aged 10, Joan loves to encourage young writers and gives the Iris Lewis award each year. Still being young at heart herself, Joan believes 'It's not how old you are, it's how old you feel.'

Joan has had many highlights in her life; passing with honours in Podiatry at 42, having her own art exhibition, singing with John Farnham, seeing her husband's business 'Lithocraft' flourish, meeting relatives she never knew existed, raising her own family and bringing happiness to others through her writing.



Diane Jean Aurisch was born at Warrigul, Victoria on the 27th September 1951 to Margery and Peter Aurisch. One of four children, Di grew up on dairy farms in several districts. As a child she had beautiful blond curls and an enormous cheeky grin. She was a joy to have around but was quite a chatter box. On one occasion her frustrated mother implored her "For heaven sake Diane will you dry up!" Then moments latter, turned to find her with a tea towel in hand still nattering away.

She had many interests growing-up, she was an enthusiastic Girl Guide for ten years from brownies to group leader. Hockey was her favourite sport with many

bruised shins and one memorable smack in face causing two beautiful shiners lasting many weeks. It may surprise many to learn she was excellent at Judo, winning trophies etc. It certainly came as a surprise to John, who found himself flat on his back many years later.

Diane's school years were happy times. She matriculated in 1967, her favourite subjects being English and Biology. She was completely undecided as to what her career might be, until one day she flew into the kitchen and announced "Mum, I'm going to be a nurse!"

Diane's dear friends Sheena Hammond (nee Hair) and Cheryl Green told us a little of this time in her life. They started their nursing training at the Royal Melbourne Hospital in 1969 becoming firm friends. In their second year they moved into a, wild, shared slightly accommodation, with six other nurses (you can use your imagination). After graduating and completing Midwifery they found themselves in England with numerous other Aussies.

Back in Melbourne, after the adventure of a life time, Cheryl, Sheena and Di were housemates again and as usual Sheena's numerous cousins attended the House-Warming Party. One of these cousins was John. Di opened the door to John in a particularly groovy caftan. John thought he must have been early and that she was still in her nightie!

Married in Albury Gardens on the 4th of February 1978. John and Di bought a caravan and soon decided to move north looking for opportunities adventure. Soon after settling in Mackay, Di and John were thrilled with the birth of Adrian. After enjoying a few months of new parenthood amongst the sugar cane they moved to the gem fields at Rubyvale, Queensland, 300km west of Rockhampton and settled quickly into the mining community. Whilst living there Katrina, Ryan and Liam were born. The role of Motherhood was extremely important to Di. At which she excelled. Diane also at this time was doing some part-time general nursing at Emerald Rural Base Hospital. Towards the end of her years at the gem fields she worked with St Vincent De Paul, visiting clients in their homes. She also worked at the newly built Health Centre. Her expertise as a nurse was highly valued and lasting friendships were formed.

After seventeen years at Rubyvale, with the decline of the Sapphire prices, the decision was made to move to Lightning Ridge. Di started work at the Accident and Emergency Centre and they bought a camp on the mining fields. Di later went on to become the Early Childhood and Family Nurse. From Melbourne to Mackay she bought many new lives into the world. At Lightning Ridge, being so isolated many parents have relied on Di's help in caring and raising their children.

As family, friends and colleagues, we all have our special memories of Diane. But some that we will all share, are;-admiration for the courage she showed throughout her illness, her tenacity in facing her hurdles head-on, and finally her compassion towards us, in that she always spoke of this experience in a positive way and encouraged us not to grieve, but to celebrate our relationship as family and friends.

Her last words were "Live and Love", and if we can do that, even in a fraction of the way that Diane did, then her legacy of celebration will continue.



It's not often that one of the best films of the year comes out in January, but that's exactly what has happened in 2003.

As expected '8 Mile' has a killer soundtrack made up of all original songs from Eminem and some of his other hip hop/rap buddies. However I will offer you a warning. The high level of coarse language is easily forgotten about and it allows the film to flow more freely and seem more realistic.







BEACONSFIELD'S HANDYMAN

We have just enjoyed the flurry of the painting season and it was indeed a flurry, mostly interiors away from the burning sun.

The New Year will see a fresh lot of facia repairs — they do rot at the corners. My new 3-metre step ladder has been very helpful and you feel safe on it. It is no good working on a springy ladder. The facia timber used to be Oregon which is prone to rot from its ends. The new facia I see is treated against rot and should last longer.

Another interesting new product that I tried recently is a spray on bleeder sealer. When you have walls stained with marker pen and things of that

nature, the paint will not cover it. Once you have tried and failed to remove the stain, apply the spray sealer and it works, hooray.

We bought paint for walls and I specified top quality washable acrylic. It did not cover the old finish completely, so we gave it a second coat. When we bought the next lot I asked if there was a better quality and they sold me "Premium Quality" Scrubable. It covered in one coat.

For the little extra cost we saved the time of second coating and got a more durable finish. Always buy the best paint, cheap paint is false economy.

I made a set of timber steps to replace rotted ones. I used the angle iron and bolt method of assembling them and not my usual method of checking in the steps. I think it maybe a more durable job.

CANDLE WAX

Candle wax can be removed from washable items by putting the article in the freezer to harden. The pieces then easily break away. If any wax is left, put the fabric between two clean pieces of blotting paper or paper towel and press with a warm iron. Keep shifting the paper towel until no wax remains.





OUR NATURAL WORLD

The mystery of prayer has teased the minds of men since people first started praying. What is it? Who do we address? How should we frame the words? Can we expect results? Is it right to ask for things? Is one Religion better than another for prayer? Many questions with conflicting answers, depending on who you ask. Does the Creator of all things listen more carefully to a Pope than an average person? One thing is certain, anyone can pray without having to get permission off any other individual, whoever they may be.

The famous musician, Duke Ellington, put it well when he said, "Everyone prays in their own language and there is no language that God does not understand."

A well known author and authority on prayer was giving a Seminar on Prayer when he was asked by a member of the audience, "Doctor, how should I pray? The answer was immediate, It's very simple, ask God." Many experimental studies have been carried out which suggest that prayer is effective, but the precise method of communicating with the absolute is almost never controlled or specified. As Dom Chapman put it, "Pray as you can, not as you can't".

Harvard Medical School carried out research on the benefits of prayer and meditation some years ago, particularly where the use of mantras was used, and these by people of many faiths. The purpose of the study was to ascertain whether there were health benefits in

prayer. All the mantras worked, and all were equally effective in stimulating the healthful physiological changes in the body. Blood pressures lowered, heart rate slowed with lower metabolic rates. In other words the individual became calmer and coped better with daily stress.

The Spindrift Organization in Oregon, U.S.A. has performed simple laboratory tests showing prayer does work. They made distinctions between "directed" and "undirected prayer", finding that the two types of prayer worked equally well. Directed prayer was specific as to the end result desired. such as the curing of a cancer or heart problem to be relieved. Undirected prayer was an open ended approach which had no specific results in mind on

a personal level, but was more of a "group" approach. The full story can be read in the book by Larry Dossey M.D., called "Healing Words".

Many times people feel that prayer has gone unanswered, say in the case of someone suffering from an illness that is horribly painful and clearly beyond cure, and for which pain medication is no longer working. In such a case what is sometimes best for the individual may be the death of the person to remove them from an intolerable situation involving pain and suffering. It could be rightly that God has said answered the prayer and "healed" the person by taking them away from the body, the source of the pain and distress. How often have we spoke of our relief when someone desperately ill has succumbed to the passage we call death, and we offer up a prayer of thanks for the end of the suffering.

The words of St.Augustine (a.d. 400) are worth remembering here, "Seek not abroad, turn back into thyself for in the inner man dwells the truth".
