.... ARE THEY THE NATIONAL **BISCUIT?**

- 1 ½ cups rolled oats
- 1 cup plain flour
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup coconut
- 250g butter
- 2 tablspn golden syrup
- 2 teasp bi-carbonate soda
- 4 tabspn hot water

Combine the rolled oats, flour, sugar and coconut. Melt butter over low heat, blend in golden syrup, then remove from the heat.

Dissolve the bicarbonate of soda in the hot water, add to the butter and golden syrup mixture. The mixture will froth

Thoroughly combine the butter and oat mixtures.

Place teaspoonful of the mixture on lightly greased trays allowing plenty of room for spreading (better to cook in 2 or 3 batches than cram onto one tray).

Bake in moderate oven for 11 minutes or until brown.

Remove from oven and let the biscuits stand on trays for about 3 minutes. Lift onto a rack to cool.

Makes about 48 crisp biscuits.

I would like to congratulate the candidates for Edrington Ward, Neil Lucas, Pakenham Ward, Bill Ronald, and Beaconhills Ward, Gary Runge, for being elected to represent our area. It is sad to see our Mayor, Keith Ewenson, and Councillor Ted Owen defeated at these elections. behalf of the Beaconsfield Progess Association, I acknowledge the efforts of Keith Ewenson and Ted Owen over the years. I know they have worked hard for their constituents and the community and they will continue to be valued members of our community.

Our community is growing at such a rapid rate that things need to happen quickly. A great deal of foresight has to be exercised in planning for the phase next of our community's development. Until recently Beaconsfield and Upper Beaconsfield have developed comparatively slowly. With the recent development of the Berwick Views Estate and subsequently the Panorama, Beaconhill Rise and Bowmans Track Estates the area's needs have overtaken any planning provisions that would have been in place for in the past.

The community complex is a very exciting project, however there are many other infrastructure needs and requirements of the townships of Beaconsfield and Upper Beaconsfield in terms of use and recreational facilities. Issues that need to be addressed in the next 12 to 18 months are traffic, being an absolute priority, then the provision of recreational and sporting facilities.

We are still awaiting a response in relation to the traffic strategy from the Cardinia Shire and after pursuing this we will also be looking at other needs of the community and addressing a plan in the coming months at the Beaconsfield Progress Association meetings. We





Experience China

The snow is falling, the bitterly cold wind is blowing from the Artic circle and everywhere I go people stare at the foreign girl with the blue eyes. This is my immediate experience of China. It is also what I expected. I came prepared with thermals, scarves, beanie and gloves, and I knew I would be stared at. out of curiosity not rudeness. I flew into Qingdao from Tokyo. Flying over Mount Fuji was a sight I'll never forget, as it's snow capped peak poked through the clouds into the brilliant sun above.


I was met at the airport by Hennie, who works in the International Office, at the South Ocean School in Qingdao. Hennie's job is to make the life of the foreign teachers at the school a

little easier. She took me to lunch on that first day in one of the local markets. The owners of the restaurant told her they were honoured to have a foreigner eating at their tables. I was just happy to have final reached my destination and to have my feet firmly on the ground. The school is not actually in Qingdao. It is set across the water. It's like saying you are in Portsea when you are actually in Queenscliff. Therefore the school is quite remote and removed from any sort of city lifestyle. The closest signs of civilization are nearby fishing villages. Every morning you wake to the sight of men fishing in their boats made from logs and concrete. They are there regardless of the weather. I saw them throwing their nets into the

water as I headed off to the Kindergarten each morning.

Teaching in the Kindergarten had its challenges. I was told that I'd be working with children who had a good grasp of English as a spoken language, and that I would be assisted by Chinese teachers who spoke my language, as I don't speak theirs. Neither of these proved to be true. The children had minimal English, which was in fact better than their teachers' Enalish. The other

challenge was the minimal contact hours I would have each day. Working for one hour in the morning and one and a half hours in the afternoon was difficult to say the least. Not because of the lack of work, but because of all the free time I had on my hands. Having too much free time and no way of filling that time is testing at the best of times. This though provided an opportunity to take photos, try to learn some of the language and to write to my family and friends at home.

CARDINIA CATCHMENT LANDCARE INC.

This group was formed just over 12 months ago by a number of residents concerned to save and maintain the remaining native vegetation of the area, especially considering the extreme pressures of development which apply in Cardinia and Casey.

We are associated with eight other Landcare groups under the umbrella of the Cardinia Environment Coalition, operating in the Shire of Cardinia, all of them working on a particular river catchment. Ours is the Cardinia Creek and includes its tributaries and so covers Upper Beaconsfield, Officer, Beaconsfield, Berwick, Harkaway, Belgrave East and the Clyde area. This is obviously a large and diverse area.

Landcare works with private landowners offering financial and practical assistance to help sustain and improve remnant vegetation and waterways on their properties. This may involve

assistance with weeding, fencing to protect vegetation from stock, the provision of plants and assistance with the planting.


Last spring we were involved with weeding assistance on two properties in Upper Beaconsfield and did our first planting of 1,000 plants, forming a habitat corridor.

So far we have five landowners involved for autumn plantings. These are on properties in Upper Beaconsfield, Officer, Clyde and Berwick. Some of these involve a partnership with Melbourne Water and its Stream Frontage Management Program.

We were successful in applying for funding through the Federal Governments Envirofund and also from the City of Casey's Landcare fund.

We are keen to make a difference and would welcome inquiries from interested landowners as well as from members of the community who would like to be involved particularly on planting days in April and May. The dates for these are Saturday April 26th in Berwick, Saturday May 10th in Guys Hill, Saturday May 24th in Clyde and Sunday June 8th in Officer. They commence at 9.30am and go all day but your participation for a couple of hours would be appreciated. Lunch is provided as well as all the equipment required.



WINE & FOOD

by Keith Goodman

As our days grow shorter so too does the supply of stone fruit, now being replaced by apples, pears and nashi pears. The end of the peach season is marked by the availability of large yellow cling and freestone peaches. While they are just fine as fresh fruit they excel as poached fruit e.g. Peach Melba.

We have been enjoying peaches poached with an Asian influence by the addition of star anise to the poaching liquid. Star anise is most commonly found as an ingredient in Chinese

Five Spice Powder and to flavour those wonderful ducks, which hang in the windows of our Chinese Vietnamese and restaurants. A native plant of Asia their pods are often chewed to aid digestion or sweeten the breath or as we would chew gum and are also used to flavour drinks. The pods are approx 12 -14 mm across and have six legs to the star shaped pod. They can be bought whole or as a powder, ground from the pod and the inner seeds; use sparingly. Do not confuse with anise seeds which are actually seeds of the aniseed plant.

Try this very simple recipe. Poach one peach per person in enough water to just cover the peaches. Add approx half a cup of sugar and three whole star anise and bring to the boil, take off the heat and rest in the poaching liquid for at least an hour. Serve on vanilla ice cream with one or two tablespoons of the poaching liquid over. Delicious and easy. Freestone peaches are best and most peaches will shed their skins in the poaching process, remove before serving.

Wine - Such is the quality of 2002 Riesling based wines currently available that the Winemasters of two groups of which I am a member based our March tastings on Riesling. I know you have heard this before from me but these currently available wines are as good as I have seen in my near

40 years around wine. A warning though needs to be issued. On the whole these wines are crisp, pristine clean, almost cutting on the palate with a chalky mineral texture about them and a smell and taste of limes/ citrus. For the uninitiated they may come as a shock. I have no doubt that cellared well, most will live 10 to 20 years and some in cool, constant temperature cellars will live thirty years. So what, you say. Why wait? Just a couple of years will bring rewards, the freshness will still be there and the fruit will start to grow in intensity into the citrus/ lime flavor base. Most of these wines fall into the \$12 to 16 bracket with some under \$10. Three I like from more than thirty tasted are: Blass Clare Riesling, \$15; Richmond Grove Watervale Riesling, \$13-14 and my current pick is Chrismont Riesling, \$13, from The King Valley in N.E Victoria and made by Arnie & Jo Pizzini.

The Chrismont is not easy to find but is definitely available from Boccaccio Cellars, 1030 Burke Rd, Balwyn, Ph 9817 2257.

The Yalumba Barossa Riesling at around \$8 is the best seen below \$10. All are from the 2002 vintage.





FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

TAXATION UPDATE

There have been many taxation changes announced and/or implemented affecting the majority of taxpayers. Some changes of interest include:

1. "Better Superannuation System" amending Superannuation Guarantee Charges (SGC) provisions from 1st July 2003, including:

- lodgement of quarterly rather than annual SGC returns.
- reduced penalties initially, for quarterly returns.
- adjust salaries and wages exclusion threshold to \$1,350 per quarter instead of \$450 per month.
- allow the Commissioner to deposit SGC vouchers directly into a Superannuation account of an employee.
- allow the Commissioner to make direct payments of SGC received for persons over 65.

2. R & D Start Program

- The Commonwealth Government has announced that this Program will continue until 2006. This program provides a range of assistance measures in addition to existing 125% and 175% R & D tax concessions, as well as the rebate for small companies.

3. Medical Expenses tax offset threshold

- From 1st July 2002 the threshold above which the 20% rebate applies has been increased from \$1,250 to \$1,500.

4. Superannuation

- From 1st July 2002 individuals aged over 70 but less than 75 will be allowed to make personal contributions of superannuation providing they are working at least 10 hours per week, however, the contributions will not be tax deductible.
- From 1st July 2002 recipients of the Baby Bonus will be allowed to contribute the Baby Bonus to superannuation. This measure is aimed at allowing parents at home caring for children to save for retirement.
- The government has indicated its commitment to introduce legislation for choice of Superannuation Funds and portability of superannuation benefits.

The Senate Economics References Committee is conducting an inquiry into the structure and distributive effects of the Australian Taxation System. The Committee will examine matters including the level, extent and distribution of the current tax burden on individuals and businesses. the impact on taxpayers families, expenditure of tax revenues, long term social and economic impact of taxation, government spending and employment and the roles of the states in tax collection and distribution.

Sunday the 2nd of March was Clean-up Australia Day and along with a small but determined group volunteer's, an estimated two ton of rubbish was removed from the creek, Emerald road and Ingles road. The most common items were plastic, beer bottles and cans. Some of the more unusual items found were a Hills Hoist cloths line, broken computers, advertising signs, a tractor tyre and roof guttering.

March was also the 5th anniversary for the Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary. Not many thought the group would make it this far but here we are five years on and still going strong. In that time approximately 5000 *Pittosporum undulatum* have been removed. Other weed species such as

Honeysuckle, Winter Cherry, Gorse, Broom and the bad infestation of Wandering Jew are now under control.

Several revegetation projects have also been undertaken in the past five years with thousands of trees, shrubs, grasses, sedges, ground covers and creepers having been planted. The result has remarkable been а transformation with new bird species having been identified and now the possibility of platypus being re-introduced into the creek.

The Friends group meet on the 4th Sunday of the month at the car park opposite Holm Park rd. at 9.00am. Morning tea is provided and everyone is welcome to join us.



GIVING THE GIFT OF SIGHT

As a society, Australians are known as a generous and caring community. We are renowned for our ability to stick up our hands and help others in need. A fine example of this is the fact that more than two million Australians have registered on the Australian Organ Donor Registry, to donate organs and/or tissues upon their death, to save or improve the quality of the life of others.


Whilst organ donation and transplantation is widely recognised, tissue donation is an unfamiliar notion to most of us. The most common form transplantation in the world, be it organ or tissue, is the transplant of a cornea. The cornea is the clear window at the very front of our eye. It allows light in and is the main focussing element. Each year approximately 300 Victorians require a corneal transplant because a penetrating injury or a chemical burn has damaged the cornea, or the cornea is infected or in fact has a medical condition which prevents it from working effectively. Such patients may be blind, have little sight, be in pain or even be at threat of losing an eye. A corneal transplant is the hope for such patients.

Whilst the transplant is a relatively uncomplicated

surgery, usually performed as a day procedure in hospital, the benefits to the recipients are remarkable. Those with little or no vision have the opportunity to see again and the 'Gift of Sight' is gratefully appreciated.

In Victoria, the Lions Corneal Donation Service coordinates corneal donation. We are located at the Royal Victorian Eye and Ear Hospital. As a Transplant Coordinator, I am fortunate enough to work with very, special donor families who generously think of the misfortunes of others at what is an often tragic and unexpected time in their own lives. It is also very rewarding to see the delight on the faces of our recipients as they face a world with new vision and new dreams.



SALLY'S GARDEN

In the last Banner I spoke of preparing the soil in preparation for this years new roses and to be adventurous when choosing new roses for your garden.

Roses like many other plants can be clipped & trained to form a hedge, climber, standard or in bush form. If a standard rose is required, allow one only stem to grow & allow it to branch out at the top of the stem. Bushy & densely growing roses can be clipped into a hedge. There are roses which can grow metres high & these can be clipped free of lower growth & shaped into an umbrella like shape.

Any of the "Moss" roses, which are of dense growth & are very vigorous in growth, can be clipped into a hedge, or allowed to grow as a tall well shaped plantthese can grow to 5ft.- the pom-pom flowers range in colours from crimson to reddish purple & are similar in appearance to a David Austin cluster rose.

Another interesting & very spectacular rose is Rosa Stellata Mirifica, also known as the Gooseberry rose. This is a 5 petal single rose coming in a vibrant deep lilac-pink bloom with it's orange-yellow stamens. Globular to urn shaped inconspicuous rose hips follow. A very hardy rose to grow.

Have a garden that is spectacular in colour & also different in the type of plants that you choose. In other words "put your own stamp on your garden!"

Henry died on 20/11/1967 age 77 at his farm, Lot 43 Quamby Road, Beaconsfield Upper, Victoria.

Additional Information - Worked in timber mills around Warburton area. In 1923 Henry known as Harry married Margerat Maud Ferguson (nee Keenan) known as Maggie. Had 3 children- Nancy, Larna and Keith (who took his own life).

They ran a dairy farm in 1924 having moved from his parents farm at Woori Yallock.

Although he embarked with the 6th batallion on the 7th of March 1916 he was transfered to the 5th division when they doubled the size of the A.I.F in March 1916. He never went to Gallipoli and his first battle was in August 1916 where he lost his left eye.

Private Henry Ferguson is listed as one of the soldiers on the Beaconsfield Avenue of Honour.

"CLAREMONT", WHITESIDE ROAD, OFFICER.

More often than not, in earlier times the property "Claremont" used Beaconsfield address being situated on its borders and where most services were available. It had the convenience of a continuous telephone service and the number on its exchange was Beaconsfield 10.


The original four-roomed cottage was built in 1887 by Solomon Reece, a brick and tile manufacturer. The house presumably was built with bricks made on the property. Reece's eleven year old Elizabeth was one of the fifteen students to first enroll at the new Officer Siding State School in 1886.

Reece sold to a McDale. The property then came into the ownership of Rev. W.S. Whiteside, in 1909, and he and his fifteen year old son, Clair, set to develop a mixed farm and orchard. Eventually the orchard became the main industry. Ledger books from that early period are still held in the family.

Prior to the 1914 -1918 war. the wattle and daub kitchen on the north side of the cottage was removed and a timber extension gave a new lounge-room, kitchen, bathroom, pantry and laundry. It was built by George Tivendale of Officer.

At this time the verandah was extended along the east wall of the cottage to match up with the north. In 1918 the brick were roughcast by Berwick Builder Alex Miller, who was paid £26 for the job plus repairs to the roof and small weatherboard hut for a young boarder.

On returning home from three years war service, Clair restored and developed the orchard further. In 1923 he Kathleen Cunningham daughter of the

Rev W.R. and Mrs. Cunningham of Berwick. Clair and Kath had six children. Their second daughter Mrs. Kathleen Clarke is a long term resident of Beaconsfield. Two sons Ken and David carried on the forming orchard partnership in 1950.

Between the two world wars fruit from West Gippsland was exported in large quantities to Europe and many parts of the world. The industry was important to the country. Claremont was one of the many local orchards to contribute greatly to the trade.

The main property and orchard remained in the family until the early 1990's. The original homestead "Claremont" has had several owners since 1973. Further extensions and quality improvements have been made - allowing a more modern and indulgent lifestyle.

More detailed information can be obtained in a book written and published in 1999. It gives a glimpse of former days and the lives of occupants during the First World War and onwards. Available by contacting M. Boon on 97075053.



THE VOICE OF THE BAPTIST CHURCH

As I write this we are under the threat of going to war. Saddam Hussein is proving very reluctant to back down. George W. Bush, Tony Blair and John Howard are certainly not talking of backing down. 



UPPER BEACONSFIELD INDIGENOUS NURSERY.

Upper Beaconsfield Indigenous Nursery is situated in Halford Rd, Upper Beaconsfield, behind the Post Office and is open to everyone on Fridays from 12md – 5pm, although I am usually there from 10.30am and on Mondays also.

The nursery provides local native (i.e. Indigenous) plants from seeds and cuttings sourced in the Cardinia catchment area. Most plants grown are used in Landcare plantings, by Melbourne Water for its Stream Frontage Management Program, by the City of Cardinia in local parks and by Friends groups caring for local bushland.

No doubt you have been struggling to keep your garden alive throughout our dry summer. Water is a precious and scarce commodity and increasingly gardeners have taken to mulching their plants to save using water. Obviously native plants, particularly indigenous ones, demand less water and will survive our summers better than any others. Not only this, they provide habitat for our native butterflies, birds and wildlife.

The nursery has groundcover plants. including wildflowers and grasses, mid storey plants and trees. If you have some remnant bush in need of understorey or would like to set aside an area of your garden to encourage birds, butterflies and other creatures, come and see what is available. Perhaps you would like to develop a wetland at your place for frogs and other creatures we can help with this also.

Autumn is by far the best time to be planting. If you would like some advice as to which plants are suitable for your situation call in and see us. The nursery has a Hamilton tree planter available for hire. Tree guards and stakes can also be purchased if you have a rabbit problem.

The nursery is operated on a voluntary basis with funds raised going to Cardinia Catchment Landcare. If you would like to help in the nursery on a casual basis, particularly on Monday, you would be very welcome. Contact – Margaret Cromb, Ph 9707 2415.

BEACONSFIELD'S HANDYMAN

In Europe the doors of the toilets open outwards, here they open inwards, except the Beacie Public has a sliding door.

The danger of the inward opening door is that should a person collapse, faint or take a funny turn, their partner, spouse or live-in concubine may not be able to come to their aid. I was recently called to solve the problem for a client who has been known to suffer from blackouts, dizzy spells and severe wobblies.

At first the job was to remove the door and hinge it to open outwards but by the time I got there they had found that such an alteration would present unacceptable side affects.

I removed the door stops and hinges and rehinged the door with 2 way spring hinges (cost \$24.75), because these hinges are some 15mm thick, I saved 12mm off the leading edge of the door and glued the strip between the hinges.

The original handles were retained but in place of the

lock mechanism I fitted a ¾ inch (19mm) spherical catch. This catch locked into the doorjamb but could be pushed or pulled open (cost \$4.60). Usually there are fitting instructions on the bubble pack of things like door fittings. These hinges carried no guidance at all, which is unfortunate.

Next issue will be about repairing termite damage.

OUR NATURAL WORLD

"There is a superstition in avoiding superstition". So wrote Francis Bacon. One could not imagine life without the superstitions of human beings to make it more interesting than it already is. What is superstition, and where did it originate from? Why is it still alive and well even in today's scientific age?

It has been defined as" Religion without truth", and in some ways has more impact than Religion itself. Do you blanch when a black cat crosses your path? In Britain it's actually a very good sign. A cat on board ship will not have its name pronounced while at sea, as that's sure to bring disaster. If a cat passes its paw over its ear three times it's a sure sign of rain. (Could have used that to break our

drought). There's another custom to remove illness, where throwing the patients bath water over a cat and driving it out of the house, is supposed to cure the patient's illness. A wet floor and angry moggie seems a high price to pay though! There is the story about the occasion when the devil asked St. Dunstan to shoe his single hoof. The saint recognised his customer, tied him fast to the wall, and carried out his job as painfully as he could, making the devil roar for mercy. He was released on condition that he promised to never enter a place where a horseshoe was displayed. This is why they were nailed above doors, to keep the home Devil free.

The danger of walking under ladders is probably one of

the most observed superstitions today. Apart from the worry of a falling paint pot, or of stepping around a ladder and getting run over by a bus, the fundamental idea is that a ladder propped up against a wall forms a triangle, which is a Cabbalistic sign, and to be avoided at all costs. More practically, when gibbets were in common use, ladders would be left propped up against them until the body was taken down. The body was left for some time as a warning to others, and if one passed under a ladder in the dark there might be an encounter with the dangling feet.

The breaking of a mirror is regarded as the beginning of seven years bad luck, and to ward off this ill-fortune one must wash the pieces in a running stream, or burying them. The seven year period refers to the time it takes the body to regenerate its cells. Also mirrors must be covered when there is a death in the house. Also you can tell who's a witch, as they don't have a reflection. If there was doubt about superstition being alive and well today, consider this report from modern Britain.

"Consideration superstitions directs thought to the past, but the following newspaper report in the summer of 1979 demonstrates the power of cursing to be strong as ever. A local Midlands Council planned to build a motorway right through the middle of a farmers land. He did not bother with official avenues of protest; he simply announced that he would put a curse on every workman who set foot on his land to carry out the project. The Council's reaction was to cancel that particular part of the development, stating simply, "We cannot expose our workers to such danger".
