

There is a huge problem within Beaconsfield itself regarding the lack of recreation space. With the Beaconsfield Footy Club on the verge of winning another premiership the lack of playing fields for the up and coming junior members (our future champions) is embarrassing for the town and frustrating for the members.

I feel that Beaconsfield does not have the focus it deserves from the Shire or the necessary funding to that the ensure development of the town is piecemeal and haphazard and to ensure that infrastructure is in place (eg sporting facilities) to ensure the residents retain that amenity. This is partly because we as residents don't make enough demands and aren't outspoken enough and partly because the Shire's responsibilities are for a large and diverse area. I would have thought however that Council has permitted rapid development of the area and part of Council's responsibility should be to make sure this growth only takes place with a full plan for the future.

We as residents need to show some passion and commitment for our town. We welcome your input. Please come along to our meeting on the 16 September 2003. One of the items on the agenda will updating the Association's web page. Any one with any skills or ideas would be more than welcome.

Greetings to all the residents of the Beacon Hills Ward.

Development within Beaconsfield is continuing with the opening of the Aldi supermarket and the ongoing construction of the adjoining shopping precinct. This means an increase in people shopping in the township and leads to the important issue of traffic flow and safety. The revised Beaconsfield Township traffic strategy has been released and discussed with many residents.

The Beaconsfield Progress

Association is active in driving the strategy in conjunction with Council and it is pleasing to see how much input the community has had with the strategy.

Sealing of Kenilworth Ave and Station Street and the widening of Beaconsfield Ave should provide for safe and efficient traffic flow around the township from the south. The viaduct will continue to play an important role in respect to traffic, pedestrian and

cycling movement and any future decision about it will rest with the community.

Tenders for construction of the new Beaconsfield Community Complex have been called for and it is planned that work will commence in the very near future, with the building being ready of opening in the second half of 2004.

I am pleased to advise you that I have been able to donate \$200 to the Beaconsfield Community Centre Toy Library and \$200 to the Officer Pony Club. I trust this money will be well used by the two groups.

I am also pleased to report that the footpaths in our township have been undergoing repairs as part of a maintenance program. The footpath in Wood street, from the railway station to the shops has been completed, so no more muddy puddles to walk through on the way home from the train. You will have also noticed the centre medium strip outside the Central Hotel has undergone some treatment.

As Beaconsfield is the entry to the Cardinia Shire I secured funding to commence a beautification program at the entrance to our township. This promises to be a lovely entry in the Spring time. Cont. page 5.

PAKENHAM BY-PASS

The Pakenham By-Pass project is moving ahead with an environmental impact study currently being undertaken. This major project promises to have a very big impact on the Shire.

SHIRE BUDGET

The Shire budget was approved on 07/07/2003, some of the major items are as follows:

Road Infrastructure:

- Twenty four kilometres of existing sealed roads are to be resealed \$210,000
- Commencement of fifty kilometres of arterial road networks are to be upgraded.

Building Communities:

 The budget has made provision for 120 new preschool places.

- 3 new playgrounds and recreation facilities -\$100,000
- Building will commence on the Beaconsfield Community Complex which will include an infant welfare centre., Kindergarten and Child Care Facility \$3.8Mil
 Over \$500,000 is allocated
- Over \$500,000 is allocated for Maternal and Child Health Services
- Cardinia Aquatic & Recreation Centre \$5m (State Govt. Grant \$2.5m)

Environment

- Tree planting grant program \$30,000
- Weed eradication \$43,000
- Cardinia Catchment Landcare – \$18,000







BEACONSFIELD POST OFFICE

As part of the history sessions held at the Beaconsfield Community Centre information on the postal services offered in the Beaconsfield area is being gathered. A letter from the Australian Post Office, Public Relations Section contained the following information.

"A Post Office first opened in the area under the name of 'Beaconsfield' on the 1st October, 1878. It was a nonofficial office, and was probably operated in conjunction with a general store. The Post master was William Brisbane, who was paid an annual allowance of six pound (twelve dollars) for his post duties.

In June 1891, the name of Beaconsfield Post Office was changed to Beaconsfield Upper. A new Beaconsfield Post Office opened some time between 1896 and 1909.

Residents of Beaconsfield and Beaconsfield Upper were first provided with telephone facilities about 1908."


The 5/6 children of Beaconsfield PS went to Phillip Island for camp during Term 1. The children learnt a lot about oil spills and how penguins get caught in them. The children learnt that penguins have feathers that are waterproof the oil disintegrates into the feathers and forms a hole. If the feathers get water in them the penguin can die from the cold. A jumper is placed on the penguin to stop them from preening their feathers and ingesting the poisonous oil as they wait to be washed.

On returning to school the children developed a project called 'Warm Jumpers for Cold Penguins'. Volunteers were asked to knit jumpers by following a pattern we downloaded from the websitewww.penguins.org.au

The response to our call for volunteers was outstanding! Parents, students, friends, grandparents community groups knitted over 240 jumpers! The success of the project was amplified by a presentation from Ranger Nadine and David Brown from Channel Seven.





Punt Road Shiraz, 2001, \$25 cellardoor is a delight soft, silky and smooth, as the Winemaker described "very tasty"; Maglieri Mc Vale Shiraz, 2001, \$13-14; McWilliam Hanwood Shiraz, \$8 released for the first time is great value; Seppelt Victoria Premium Reserve Shiraz. 2001 \$13: Chapoutier Limestone Coast Shiraz, 2001, \$20, note this is not the Mt Benson version reviewed recently; and amazingly a Jimmy Watson Trophy winner at \$20, Rosemount Traditional, 2001, Cab, Merlot and Petit Verdot one for the cellar or current drinking. Finally a white under the Vintage Cellars own label is a Chardonnay, 2000 from Robe at \$13.

TOUGH POOL FENCE REGULATIONS **IN FORCE**

Cardinia residents face fines of up to \$5000 if they fail to fence their backyard pools and spas.

Under state government legislation all backyard swimming pools and spas must be surrounded by an approved safety barrier, regardless of when the pool was constructed.

Cardinia Shire has developed a program to ensure that local residents are aware of their responsibilities and that they comply with the legislation.

Cardinia's General Manager - Planning & Environment Jeremy Wood said that under the Act all pool and spa owners are required to install and maintain proper safety fences and that the council will be doing everything it can to ensure compliance.

Cardinia Mayor Kate Lempriere said that the council's commitment to pool safety is all about saving lives.

'Too many young children have drowned in backyard swimming pools. Local residents need to be aware that if they have a backyard pool or spa, they must have approved safety barriers to restrict access by young

children,' the Mayor said.

'In some cases, residents don't really understand what their responsibilities are. People need to realise, for example, that things such as roller doors or spa lids, are not proper barriers under the Act because they can be inadvertently left open.'

If they're in any doubt, they can pick up a Pool Barrier Information brochure from the council office or contact the Municipal Building Surveyor for advice,' Mr Wood said.

CARNIVOROUS PLANTS.

Commonly known as Fly-Catchers.

The Venus Fly Trap is usually one of the first Carnivorous Plants bought or found in very damp bush land. It is one of the most active plants in trapping insects. The trapping action can be set off by putting a pencil lightly on the trigger & children are fascinated in the quick reaction of the trigger as it closes over the pencil. Unfortunately, when the human finger, sticks, pencils& the like are used to activate the trigger too often the trap will eventually die & may cause the whole plant to die.

The plant can be grown outside in full sun light during summer quite successfully, providing it is kept moist & not in temperature more than 35 degrees, for any length of time. The pot should be sitting in a tray with 10 to twenty mm. of water & never allowed to dry out. Under these conditions the

inside of the traps should turn red as summer approaches.

If the tall leaves begin to droop downwards this is usually an indication that the humidity is too low. When this happens cover the poot with a plastic bag or glass dome & reduce the sunlight. In this condition the leaves should pick up again & return to their usual position.

There are many different types of Carnivour Plants. The Sarrecenia Pitchers which grow in hanging pots with the green & red pitchers growing over the sides are a real talking point

plant as they are spectacular to view as well as being so different to any of the more common hanging plants.

All these plants can be grown both inside by the sunny windows or hanging in a sheltered position outside, such as a shade house.

Try growing them. They are so different as well as being fun to grow.

SCHOOL SPEED REDUCTION PROGRAM UNDERWAY

There are many exciting events and projects taking place in and around the electorate of Gembrook.

The new public hospital in Berwick now has an official name- Casey Hospital. Work is progressing well and the hospital is due to open on schedule in mid 2004. With 229 beds and state of the art facilities, including а 24-hour emergency department, a 23 bed obstetrics unit. a mental health unit and a special care nursery, this hospital will cater for the birth of over 2,000 babies a year, and an estimated 3,000 elective surgical operations. It will be managed by Southern Health and will

bring specialist health care closer to so many residents in the south eastern growth corridor.

The future of the Beaconsfield Reservoir is now more certain. I have received a written assurance from Minister John Thwaites that this site will remain in public ownership. This area has the potential to become a permanent public reserve or parkland, which is fantastic news for the community.

Those who travel through Upper Beaconsfield will soon notice substantial improvements. To address the incidence of motorcycle crashes on Beaconsfield-Emerald Rd, the section

between Stoney Creek Rd and St Georges Rd is being resurfaced and sealed by the Bracks Government to improve safety and reduce fatalities.

Also on road safety, the Arrive Alive! strategy, which includes the School Speed Reduction Program, is underway. This program, which is being rolled out on a region by region basis, will reduce speed limits outside every primary secondary school in Victoria and make the roads safer for our children. Schools in the Shire of Cardinia are scheduled into this program for next year. It may seem some time off, but it is important that implementation of the program is done carefully to take into account the circumstances and particular traffic conditions of each individual school.

As of 29th September, I will be in my new office at 1/5 Gloucester Ave Berwick. I look forward to meeting more residents and talking with you about issues of importance to the community.



SALARY PACKAGING ARRANGEMENTS

Salary packaging is where an employee agrees to forego receiving some of their future remuneration in return for their employer paying for benefits of a similar amount. The remuneration could be wages or salaries or bonuses provided there is not a present entitlement to payment. The Australian Taxation Office accepts the of salary principle packaging in Taxation ruling TR 2001/10

Where the arrangement is made for future benefits, the employee is taxed on a lower salary however the benefit may be subject to Fringe Benefits Tax which would be onward charged to the employee.

Prospective salary sacrifice arrangements would include future amounts due for bonuses, annual and long service leave accruing in the future and superannuation contributions to complying superannuation funds.

Depending on whether the benefits paid are subject to fringe benefits tax (FBT) and whether the employer has to pay FBT or is exempt, then the comparative table below demonstrates salary sacrifice amounts required:


Rebatable organisations (A) includes non-profit organisations exempt from income tax including religious institutions, non-government schools, trade unions, employer and employee associations. Employers (B) that are FBT exempt include public hospitals and certain charities.

There are financial benefits to be gained by salary packaging, however the implementation must be carefully administered otherwise benefits paid under retrospective salary sacrifice arrangements will be deemed to be salary and wages from which PAYG tax must be withheld.




The Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary will hold their AGM on Wednesday 17th of September at the Cardinia Park Hotel at 7:30.



PRIMROSE PARK

Circa 1888 (Pictured overpage)

Primrose Park was built in 1888 for Edward Hanley, a former Berwick Shire President (1882-1883).

An Italianate Victorian Villa with a polychrome façade constructed from bricks manufactured at an Officer brickworks. The house is historically significant in the Cardinia Shire, as at the time the district was known for an ample timber supply and consequently dominant timber construction.

Surrounding the home are several significant trees including Bunya Bunya Pines, Canary Island Pine, Himalayan Cypress and Irish Strawberry tree, also dating back to the 1880's and earlier.

Past owners of Primrose Park were: Mrs Fanny Ann Gower (late 1880's-1925)

Mrs Rebecca Stevens (1925-1949)

Reginald & Ethel Barlee (1949-1969) Raymond & Shirley Hayes (1969-1988)

Richard Bell (1988-1999)

Primrose Park was painted white in the 1960's to "freshen up" for sale. In the years following, many of the Victorian features were removed or covered over and the home fell into a state of disrepair.

In 1999, the current owners commenced restoration of Primrose Park, starting with huge task of stripping the paint from the external brickwork. Thousands of hours have followed since restoring the home inside and out to its former Victorian glory.

Many hours of work still lay ahead to finish the home (probably a never ending project) with the creation of a Victorian Era garden, a large part of the work still to be completed.

The main goal of the present owners was to restore Primrose Park to a standard that would ensure the home would never be demolished (a real threat in the 1990's, with the development of the land immanent.), hopefully this has been achieved.

Footnote:

The present owners, Annette & Rob Aldersea, are eager to hear from anyone who may know more about the history of Primrose Park, its past owners or have any old photos, etc.



GROSBY SLIPPER FACTORY

The Grosovsky family, originally from Minsk, Russia, started the Grosby Shoe Company in Melbourne in 1925 where their two-story factory was on the corner of Flemington Rd. and Racecourse Rd. in North Melbourne.

In the forties Nathan and Ralph Grosovsky took over the business and in about 1945 they opened the Grosby Slipper Factory in Beaconsfield. It was started in Roberts store on the corner of Beaconsfield Ave. and Woods St. opposite the railway station. Ralph was in charge of this factory and used to travel to Beaconsfield and then onto Koo Wee Rup to another Slipper Factory that they owned.

About thirty girls worked at the factory cutting out the slippers and shoes, sewing, binding and putting in the eyelets. Once a week the Grosby truck would come to pick up the slippers to have their soles put on at the Melbourne factory. The truck driven by Charlie Tasker brought the materials for more slippers.

Originally the staff was paid a wage for their forty-hour week but later it was piecework, where they were paid for the amount of work they did. As they had no phone they would send a telegram for the wages and Postal notes would be sent to the Post Office for the pay for the girls, later the pays would come on the truck.

Pfaff sewing machines were used which some of the girls found a bit frightening at first as they were only used to the treadle machines and the electric ones were so fast. About twice a week Mr. Baker from the Melbourne factory would come out to fix the machines. Later Mr. Bill Rankin was the mechanic. The main accidents they had were needles through fingers.

On cold days they had two smoky smelly kerosene heaters which were shifted around the factory to keep everyone warm.

Ralph Grosby was a generous good-looking man with black wavy hair. He would let the girls who travelled by train work until it was time for their train



so that they didn't have to wait for long periods in the cold.

In about 1951 Mr. Ralph Grosby invited Amy Warner and Beth Coombs for afternoon tea at the Central Hotel where he asked them to work at the Melbourne Factory, both girls went and soon afterwards the factory in Beaconsfield closed.

Most of the workers were single women, about two or three were married. Some of the girls lived at Mrs. McNaughtons boarding house in Woods St. while others travelled from as far away as Nar Nar Goon. During some of the train strikes (which would last for up to six weeks) the girls would hitch a ride on the milk truck with the cans on the back. Other girls rode bikes to work as none of them had cars.

Union fees were three pence a week and Irene Chambers was the union

representative.

At Christmas time all the staff would be taken to the Central hotel for their Christmas breakup. The photo of the staff (above) was taken about 1946. outside the Central Hotel and the Grosby truck is in the background.





CFDC is currently undertaking a quality

assurance process and will shortly be undergoing validation both at coordination unit level and careprovider level.

Family Day Care Quality Assurance (FDCQA) aims to provide children in Family Day Care with quality care that best promotes their learning and development in the vital early years. FDCQA is a Commonwealth Government initiative. The broad objective of FDCQA is to ensure that children in Family Day Care have stimulating, positive experiences and interactions that foster all aspects of their development.

Cardinia Family Day Care is required to achieve and maintain the quality standards required for accreditation. These standards are outlined in 6 Quality Elements which are:

- 1. Interactions
- 2. Physical Environment
- 3. Children's Experiences Learning and Development
- 4 Health, Hygiene, Nutrition, Safety and Wellbeing
- 5.Carers and Coordination Unit Staff
- 6.Management and

Administration.

Quality child care draws on a sound base of knowledge about early childhood, including how children learn and develop. Careproviders are expected to provide


including how children learn and develop. Careproviders are expected to provide appropriate experiences for and have appropriate expectations of children of different ages, and also to be sensitive to their individual and cultural needs. Communication in Family Day Care is also important.

Quality improvement is a collaborative process that

encourages careproviders, scheme staff and the parents of children in care to work together in their complementary roles.

Accreditation is ongoing, and CFDC will continue with self study improvement cycle to provide quality child care for the families in Cardinia Shire. This is an exciting time for CFDC. 

FOSTER CARERS URGENTLY NEEDED

Are you caring, committed, patient and ready for the most rewarding challenge of your life?

Wesley Youth Services urgently need foster carers from the local community to share their home with young people in need – you can make a difference!!

Through no fault of their own, young people may be victims of abuse, neglect, family breakdown or rejection. Such young people desperately needing homes include Kelly, who is currently studying VCE but unable to live at home due to abuse from her father. As a caregiver, Wesley Youth Services will provide you with ongoing support, tax free reimbursement of a minimum \$350.00 - \$370.00 per fortnight and ongoing training. Foster carers will be required to participate in interviews and undergo a police check.

People who feel they cannot provide accommodation are also encouraged to volunteer their time and offer support to a young person.
