PUBLIC EXHIBITION

BEACONSFIELD TOWNSHIP STRATEGIC TRAFFIC REVIEW

At its meeting on 20th October 2003, Cardinia Shire Council resolved to place the draft Beaconsfield Township Strategic Traffic Review on public exhibition for six weeks. The document can be viewed at Pakenham Library, Mobile Library, Beaconsfield Community Centre, Beaconsfield Post Office and Cardinia Shire Council, also available from the Web Site www.cardinia.vic.gov.au.

The purpose of the draft document is to update the traffic and transport section of the Beaconsfield Township Strategy.

The main objectives of the review are to prepare a functional road hierarchy for Beaconsfield to assist the council to establish policies relating to:

- 1. Funding and management responsibilities for roads
- 2. The appropriate land use access characteristics and traffic levels on the various road types for the purpose of planning, management and traffic control
- 3. The assessment of local area traffic management issues

The recommendations from the traffic study are detailed in section 11.





Once again the year has flown by and the summer season is fast approaching. Now is the time for residents living in the more fire prone areas to the north of Beaconsfield to be preparing for the summer fire danger period. If you live in a fire prone area, you can expect several days on which you, your family and your house may be threatened by fire. You need to know exactly what you will do on these days.

Some important questions to be asking yourself are:

- Do you have a plan in the event of a fire in the area?
- Will you stay and actively defend your property or leave early before a fire starts?
- Have you prepared for a fire including cleaning up leaves and flammable material in your gutters and around your home, and having the right clothing and equipment to fight a fire?

If you are not sure about the answers to these key questions, it is important that you seek further information from the CFA's brochure "Living in the Bush" which is available on the CFA website -

www.cfa.vic.gov.au from the Cardinia Shire Council, or from the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade.

are well behaved, full of fun and keen to learn.


We work with parents to build a caring and supportive environment for our children and create a strong sense of "belonging" to our school community.

H.P.V.? PUSHCART? WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?



This is the first time Beaconsfield Primary School has attempted the HPV Challenge and the Pushcart section. It has been a school community effort, involving teachers, pupils, parents, as well as the generosity of local businesses.

Human Powered Vehicles (HPV) and Pushcarts are both categories in the 2003 R.A.C.V. Energy Breathrough Event being held in Maryborough on 20th – 23rd November. Entrants design, build and compete using a vehicles powered solely by human power.

The eight children in each of our HPV and two pushcart teams have engage in all aspects of the designing, building, presentation, training and racing.

THEATRICAL EXTRAVAGANZA

Prep, Year One and two students are very excited about performing their production of Little Red Hen and Seven Little Penguins at the Pakenham Cultural Centre on the 27th November.

One can only image a packed house with hundreds of proud parents watching their children preforming on stage.



On Sunday 21st of September The HPV team competed at Maroondah. The children performed brilliantly, attaining the position of 4th in the primary school division. This was a great effort for the first event for the team. Many lessons were learned by the team and support crew, including the knowledge that it is best NOT to have the brakes locked on to one of the wheels!





There are many orchids that can be grown outside under trees & in shade houses. Orchids are usually thought of as hot house pampered plants, but they are really quite hardy plants.

The Rock Orchids are very hardy & can be grown directly into the ground in a sunny spot, or on a suitable barky tree or fern tree, and in between rocks as their name suggests. The psuedobulbs vary in length from 8cm to more than a metre, while the leathery leaves last for several years. The flower stems grow from the centre of the leaves & can grow to 20cm long with many rich creamy flowers along the stem.

One bulb planted soon multiplies into many bulbs with pale to rich creamy flowers.

Dendrobium Orchids can also be grown in the same conditions as the Rock orchid.

Dendrobiums come in many colours & sizes & are usually smaller daintier flowers. These can also be grown in hanging baskets.

Cymbidiums have larger bulbs & are more suitable for pots although they too can be grown in the ground.

These bulbs flower only once & the bulb then becomes what is called a back bulb. This bulb can be cut away from the main plant & replanted, but it can take 2 or 3 years to flower.

Orchids make a lovely colorful show in the garden or shade house & the flowers last for quite a while.

Produces a fragrant, glistening and dark authentic Chinese chicken dish.

1 cup each of kecap manis, regular soy sauce and water

1/3 cup brown sugar
2 or 3 star anise
2 tablespoons sherry
2 cloves crushed whole garlic
2 of 20 cent sized slices of ginger
1 size 20 ckicken


Preheat oven to 150c.

Except chicken, mix all ingredients in a casserole dish with lid and bring to the boil on stove top. Add whole chicken or can be pre-cut into serving pieces, bring back to boil. Lid on and into oven for 40 minutes, turn chicken and cook a further 40 minutes. Let sit for 20 minutes or so. Cut into serving pieces if cooked whole.

Serve over boiled rice surrounded by steamed asparagus cut into 25mm pieces and some of the sauce over -looks fantastic.

Freeze remaining sauce for the next time.

A perfect combination would be a Pinot Noir like Gembrook Hill or Cannibal Creek.

WINE & FOOD

Somebody once said, " Nothing is new". Consider. A cake, pastry, biscuit or pie mould (tin) which doesn't need to be greased, doesn't stick, preparation can be done in the mould (less washing) and even the most complex flan or cake shape just falls out of the mould at end of baking and they are easy to wash. Foods frozen in the mould can go straight into the hottest oven. They can be used to make fancy shapes for icecream, frozen mousses or iceblocks. At first look and feel of this floppy bit of 'plastic' you just know that it cannot work. Believe me it will.

Made from alimentary silicone, Wonderflex moulds are not inexpensive but clearly outperform traditional tins and trays and are guaranteed to last for a longer period. They are available locally at Cooks Kitchen, High St, Berwick.

Anne and I recently visited old friends at their Glenburn farm for lunch and were served a tasty salad of local smoked trout, vegetable quiche and greens. To accompany it was a perfectly mature example of

a classic Riesling; a Jacobs Creek, 1996 and bought 5 or 6 years ago for \$5-6, a bargain. This was another example of the benefit of putting wines down for a few years. This wine had transformed from what many consider a 'basic' wine to something that was a pleasure to drink. Thankyou Bev and Jim.

Asparagus is at its best at the moment, see recipe on page 10.

Any 2002 Clare or 2003 Eden Valley Riesling can be put down with confidence and at fear of repeating previous recommendations the Peter Lehmann, Semillon, 2002, \$8 will make a lovely food wine in 2-5 years.

Our Current house white is the Zilzie Buloke Reserve Chardonnay, 2002, \$8 at Dan Murphy.

Recently tasted and recommended wines are:

Kingston Estate 'Echelon' Shiraz, 2001, \$15-18 a new flagship wine for Kingston voted in the top 10 of the Top 100 Australian Shiraz Competition. Gibson's Barossa Vale Shiraz, \$28 stylish and restrained, will develop: at Nicks. Sandalford Cab/Merlot/Cab Franc, Margaret River, 2001, \$20. "SECURING OUR WATER FUTURE"

On 15 October I attended a water forum in Pakenham run by the Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE). This forum was one of many being held around the state to discuss the water reform Green Paper, "Securing our Water Future".

This Green Paper grew out of the realisation that in order to achieve a sustainable supply of water, all sectors of our community need to make changes about how they use water. The paper proposes 80 initiatives for water reform, covering six main policy themes. These are: water resources and their allocation; smarter water use

in cities and towns; smarter use of irrigation water; dealing with stressed rivers; pricing for sustainability; and an accountable and innovative water sector.

A key strategy in the Green Paper is to substitute drinking water with alternatives such as recycled water, greywater, stormwater runoff and rainwater collected in tanks.

Community feedback is vital to guide the development of water policy and lencourage all interested to make submissions until the deadline on 30 November. Copies of the Green Paper are available through my office. Other ways to save water are by purchasing water-

efficient appliances around the home. Until 1 December, all Victorians can obtain a range of rebates from the Bracks Government. These are:

- \$150 rebate on AAAA rated washing machines;
- \$100 rebate on AAA rated dishwashers;
- \$300 rebate for a rainwater tank with connection to a toilet;
- \$50 rebate for replacement of standard toilet with a dual flush system;
- \$30 rebate for a pumpoperated high-pressure cleaning device;
- \$10 rebate for AAA rated shower rose;
- \$30 rebate for water conservation home audits; and
- \$30 rebate for every \$100 or more spent on a range of water-saving products such as tap timers, compost bins and trigger nozzles.

The Rebate Application Form is available from water retailers, from DSE on Tel: 136 186 or by downloading from the website at -www.dse.vic.gov.au., where there are also more details on the rebate scheme. Free Water Saver kits are also available by ringing DSE.

I encourage all residents to take the opportunity to do their bit to save water at home.





FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

by GRAEME J TAYLOR C.A.

Recent announcements by the Australian Taxation Office and the Treasurers' Office continue at a furious pace. The changes affect the broad community of taxpayers and include the following:

Cash Economy

The Tax Office has announced that it is targeting industries operating predominately in the cash economy in 2003/4 including building and construction, hotels and clubs, business services, restaurants, cafes and takeaways, hairdressers, cleaning services, scrap metal dealers and computer retailers.

Bartering

The Tax Office is aware of the operations of barter trading and expects that all barter transactions are assessable and deductible for income tax purposes to the same extent as other cash or credit transactions. In addition there is also a liability for GST on taxable supplies between members of a trade exchange.

Superannuation

The Government has announced that it has negotiated an agreement with the Australian Democrats under which maximum superannuation surcharge rate will be reduced from 15% to 12.5% over 3 years. It was originally proposed for a reduction to 10.5%.

Under the co-contribution measure superannuation contributions will be matched by government payments of up to \$1,000

annually for those on incomes up to \$27,500 and cutting out at \$40,000.

The Government legislating to enable single income couples to split superannuation contributions with access to two ETP low-rate thresholds and two reasonable benefits limits. This split is proposed to take effect from 1st July 2004 and will be done each year but existina superannuation benefits will not be eligible for splitting.

Family Tax Benefit

The current system requires you to lodge within 12 months otherwise FTB topup is not available. New proposed legislation will give families 2 years to receive topup payments or to claim a lump sum payment for FBT and their Child Care benefit.

\$100 write-off rule

Expenditure of up to \$100 (including GST) incurred to acquire a depreciable asset in the course of carrying on a business can be written off in the year of expenditure. An example for a tradesperson is small tools costing \$100 or less, including hammers, screwgrivers, drill bits etc.

The Australian Taxation Office recognizes that taxagents play a critical roll in the efficient operation of the tax system. Most compliance issues involve working with tax agents as they lodge 75% of individual tax returns, 97% of business returns and 55% of activity statements. I don't recall the last time I saw so many different plants in flower at the same time in the sanctuary.



Cape weed flower



Ripping off the System.

As I write the papers are full of stories concerning people who have rorted the First Home Owners Grant. The First Home Owners Grant is a generous initiative of the Federal Government in which folk purchasing their very first home are given a grant of \$7,000. The grant has been the means whereby many a young couple has got into their first home. I have no doubt that many of our new neighbours on the surrounding Estates have benefited.

However it has come to light that some 40 kids one as young as 4 months have obtained the Grant. Some unscrupulous folk have bought their "second" home using the name of their child to pretend they are "first home buyers". Over a quarter of a million has been drained from the Grant fund in this way.

The response of the Government? The only response there can be. A new law to stop anyone under 18 years from obtaining a Grant.

But my question is; Why do we need laws to make us do the right thing? Would you not think that anyone with a conscience would know that to use a "First Home Owners Grant" to buy a second home is wrong?

Another question; between 1981 and 2001 the percentage of Australians who claim no religion rose from 22.16% to 27.1% meanwhile in the same period the number of Australians affected by serious crime rose from 26.1% to 30%, any connection? (The Bulletin. 21 Oct 03. P27).

The conscience is a fascinating phenomenon. It is our guide to right and wrong. But it needs to be educated. For all its faults the church certainly does its best do to so.

THE BEACONSFIELD POST OFFICE 1936 - 1956

My father Herman (Mac) Roberts, having been a long time resident of Beaconsfield had written to the Post Masters General Department with a request if the Post Office was ever up for sale he was interested in buying.

The Misses Craven, Mattie, Brenda and Alice had been there for a number of years and in 1936 we took over the Post Office in November, while still carrying on the general store on the Princes Highway. We were unable to live at the Post Office till major renovations were done to the premises. Bill Watts ran the Post Office, sleeping by the switchboard at night, as it was a 24 hour exchange.

What changes have taken place? In one day, we had two mails in per day from Melbourne and two mails out per day by rail. The first mail arrived about 8.30am brought from the station by the mail contractor/bus driver who also took the mail to Beaconsfield Upper. He waited while mail was sorted for Guys Hill and the private bags which he delivered on the way to Beaconsfield Upper. 11.30am saw the first mail out to Melbourne carried to the station by my father. 5.30pm another mail from Melbourne and 8pm another to Melbourne, taken to the station by my father who had to wait for the train and get the guards signature for the mail bag. The night train was almost always late so it made a long day.

My mother, Kath Roberts, learnt the office routine, was in charge when Bill Watts joined the Army when war came. Heft school in 1942 and worked with my mother in the office, also an agency for the Commonwealth Bank, till I left for overseas in 1951.

Petrol tickets had to be collected from the Post Office when petrol rationing

came in, pensions were paid fortnightly and many people were having the phone connected. Our area of subscribers stretched from beyond the end of Soldiers Road to almost Officer on the Highway, Manuka road, well up the Upper Beaconsfield and of course the local township.

My father died in 1953 and my mother was appointed Post Mistress and continued in that role till the Post Office was sold in 1956.

Others who worked in the office at different times were Alice Daniel (Berwick), Mary Holohan and Valerie Doherty (both Beaconsfield girls) and Edwards from Upper Betty Beaconsfield.

A CARING GENTLEMAN PHILIP WYNNE-YORKE

PHILIP WYNNE-YORKE, a descendant of Philip Yorke, the Earl of Hardwick, will be celebrating his 90th birthday this November.

Philip was born in 1913 in Duffryn Aled, Nth Wales. He was the eldest of 4 children and his family moved to Christchurch New Zealand, when his father was asked to manage his wife's family sheep farm of 4,000 acres.

Philip's father had been educated at Cambridge and after a number of years on the farm, he was asked to teach at Christ College. Christchurch, where Philip was educated.

Philip loved singing at Cathedral Square and regularly on the radio. He is an excellent self-taught pianist playing mostly by ear and he has always enjoyed playing for family and friends.

After Philip left school he began training as a chemist, but when the depression hit he had to go out to work. He worked at sheep farming like his father, breeding stud sheep at Gisborne and later moved to Kaikoura where he bred Romney Marsh sheep. Philip loved his Border collie sheepdogs and became very proficient in dog trials and entering competitions which he enjoyed.

He met a beautiful Australian girl Daphne Elizabeth Wood, and in

1939 they married. They lived in Governors Bay where he worked on a fruit farm and later worked with wholesale woollen garments. Today, he still has one of the woven plaid woollen rugs, an enduring legacy of the quality of New Zealand wool and the craftsmanship of those times.

In 1949, Philip and his wife Daphne and their son and daughter moved Australia. They went to Yallourn, Victoria and worked for the S.E.C. first in the transport workshop and later in the tool store. He and the family were there for a total of 13 years.

Philip embarked on a new career and his friendliness and love of people was evident in his work at a milk bar in Richmond. After 5 years, Philip and his family decided to be more 'out of town' and moved to a business in Mordialloc, which in those days was a seaside place for holidays and day trippers-very different from today. His soda fountains at his café were very popular and this was an enjoyable time for them.

He then moved further south again to Frankston in a brand new milk bar in a new housing area and built up the business again. He and Daphne finally retired to their own home Frankston and then to Rosebud where they lived

for 23 years and enioved bowls. Philip loved gardening and had a glass house and shade house where he propagated

flowers and vegetables.

In 1995, they moved to a unit in Berwick to be nearer their families and sadly a year later Daphne passed away.

The name Wynne-Yorke is a Welsh name and the family has been able to trace the family tree back to the 7th century. Philip Yorke born in 1764 was Earl of Hardwick. Whilst he was Chancellor of Exchequer, the Yorke Peninsula was named after him as was Hardwick Bay nearby.

Previous generations had a family home in Wales; 'Erddia' built 1684-1687. It is now owned by the National Trust and open to the public today.



Despite ill health, Philip still leads a busy life. He meets with his friends at Senior Citizens and the Low Vision clinic. He is a regular at Make and Mingle where he has many friends young and old. He has a real love for the Lord and attends Beaconsfield **Baptist** Church each Sunday. He also enjoys the outings and get togethers with the church's retirees group 'Evergreens' each month.

When you meet Philip you are warmly greeted by a real gentleman, who is loving and kind and always asking after 'you'. He just loves spending time with his family and 3 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.



AROUND THE BAY IN A DAY

After talking about the ride for months and training for as many months the big day finally arrived - October 19, - cycling around Port Phillip Bay in a Day, a distance of 210km.

Our starting point - Albert Park Lake - where we met with a group of like-minded cycling enthusiasts. A final check - bike, food, tickets, money and rain jacket. It was time to leave. 5 a.m. and still dark.

After a few kilometers we reached the West Gate Bridge. It was truly an amazing sight. Hundreds of bikes crawling up the bridge. The weather was still perfect, very mild and hardly any wind.

This soon changed when the wind picked up to near gale force.

A quick stop at Werribee then onto the Geelong Freeway into the wind which only seemed to get stronger. Another stop at Little River where we had something to eat and drink. We have now ridden 50kilometres and its still only 7am.

The stretch between Little River and Geelong was some of the hardest cycling I have done, gale force wind and driving rain. You couldn't see much and it took every bit of concentration. From Geelong we turned towards Queenscliff, the rain had eased and the wind was a little behind us. By 10am we were in Queenscliff. Half way – 110km in 5 hours.

Our ferry didn't leave till 11am. The hardest part now was to find shelter and stay warm. At this point lunch packs were provided. By 12 noon we set riding from Sorrento. It took a little time to get warm but the weather was on the improve, with only light rain and the wind was on our backs. With 100kms still to go we needed every bit of advantage.

The hour from Sorrento all was fine but the hills near Mt. Eliza were hard, for me anyway, the legs were hurting. Once at the top it was a fantastic downhill! A few more smaller hills and before we knew it we could see Frankston from the top of Oliver's Hill.

A beautiful descent, 63 km per hour, Wow!!

The weather by this stage had greatly improved. The sun was trying to shine through and the gale was long gone. With a quick stop in Frankston and only 40km further, it was through to Mordialloc and 20 kms to go. The legs at this stage are very tired and the small hills on Beach Road seem like mountains.

We can now see the city buildings and the speedo verifies it - 210kms. Spectators on the roadside applaud which is nice and a glance at the watch confirms 4pm. The final ride into Catani Garden in St. Kilda to the Official Start and Finish. We succeeded. We were very tired but satisfied that we had completed the whole 210km in a day, together with 8,000 cyclist from across Victoria and interstate.

Thankyou to the volunteers who also withstood the adverse conditions in the coldest and wettest 'Around the Bay in a Day' ever, to support us at check points.

FORMATION OF CARDINIA RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION (CRRA)

CARDINIA CATCHMENT LANDCARE INC.

As we approach spring the bright yellow of wattles and the diversity of local shrubs and flowers in bloom is a joy to behold. Our winter rains have been substantial so we are looking forward to a good planting season this spring. The 3,300 plants we planted onto properties in last autumn are doing well – it is good to see them rising above their plastic guards.

The Upper Beaconsfield Indigenous Nursery is full of small plants waiting for some warmth before taking off. The demand for indigenous plants is increasing all the time as there is a growing awareness of their importance – in spite of continuous clearing, particularly of understorey, by many landowners. The nursery is open to all – on

Fridays from 12md-5pmor by appointment (97072415). It is situated in Halford Rd, Upper Beaconsfield. For large orders a lead time of 6 months is required.

The Landcare network has begun a mammal survey of properties using hair tubes. These contain food which attracts the animal to the tube where they leave hair samples which can be sent away for analysis. If anyone is interested in having this done on their property please let us know. There is a charge to cover the hair analysis.


The information gathered is sent to a central authority and is important in determining the extent and range of our native animals.

By the time this goes to print we will have planted 3,400 plants during October and November into 5 properties from Clyde North to Upper Beaconsfield, Berwick and Harkaway. We have been assisted by the Pakenham Greencorp team in achieving this.

you might be interested to know that an audit has been completed of Landcare works since the first 3 Landcare groups were formed in 1999 in the Shire of Cardinia . 187 projects have been completed. \$822,000 has been spent, this money coming from the Shire of Cardinia, Melbourne Water, the EPA and from NHT funding. The Shire of Cardinia gives \$20,000 which annually particularly noteworthy as

they do not stipulate where it is to be spent. The City of Casey also helps with funding in its area of responsibility. At least 200 hectares have been protected and 170,000 indigenous plants planted. The 3 original groups have grown to 9. Some landowners have 25% of their property set aside for indigenous vegetation which has actually increased the productivity of their land. The Catchment Cardinia Landcare group is a recent addition to this network and is unusual in that it covers two local government areas.

We thank all the landowners who have participated and who are helping to restore the indigenous bushland which makes this area a very special place. Wall Tiles do get shabby unless the grout is kept clean. Wall tiles can lose their grip on the wall and have to be removed (without dropping them) cleaned and relayed. I have recently seen two alternatives to tiles which certainly look great.

One is the use of the "marble trend" design of shower, which has a shiny smooth surface and is installed by gluing it to cement sheet and sealing around the base. No more cracked tiles or grotty grout.

The other, used around kitchen benches, is pressed metal as used on old ceilings. The metal sheeting, with pressed in pattern, is cut to size with simple tools then powder coated to your colour choice and fixed to the wall.

If you buy a new door and you don't fit it straight away be sure to store it flat and well supported. Even solid



I stand or have stood for the last 115 years near the Beaconsfield railway Station with my old friend "Woody" the Buna Buna pine out front.







New players are wanted and always made to feel welcome. Senior training is Tuesday and Thursday evenings.






