





FIRE BRIGADE NEWS

New Tanker

The Beaconsfield Fire Brigade took delivery of its new brigade owned tanker during October 2003 and following an initial run in period and equipment fit out, the tanker commenced operational use during November 2003. The new tanker cost just over \$160,000 and replaced a tanker which had been in use by the brigade since 1996. The new tanker was purchased with enormous level of support from the local community and businesses, and major donations from the Berwick Opportunity Shop, Andrews Foundation and TXU.

The new tanker provides for improved crew safety, a more powerful pump unit and a 3000 litre water tank and is in addition to the existing CFA owned tanker. Both tankers provide a strong capacity for the brigade to respond to fires and other emergency incidents, both in the urban and rural areas of Beaconsfield.

Fire Hydrants

Fire hydrants are located in roads around the built up areas of Beaconsfield and in some rural areas.

A fire hydrant is normally identified by:

Either a square lid with white painted concrete surround or a large round black plastic lid with a concrete surround.

- A white post with a red top and blue reflectors on the post.
- A blue reflector on the road if it is a bitumen



In the event of a fire, the immediate identification of the hydrant and access of water from the hydrant for use by the fire brigade is critical. It may mean the difference between a house and the people in it being saved or lost in a fire.

It is important that people who have a fire hydrant located out the front of their property assist the fire brigade and their neighbouring residents by:

- Keeping the hydrant clear of grass and weeds.
 - Not obstructing the hydrant by covering it over with a lawn, building materials, parked car, etc.
- Not interfering with the hydrant marker post or blue road reflector.



BEACONSFIELD KINDERGARTEN CONTINUES TO GROW

In the Kinder world big things are definitely happening.

Beaconsfield Kindergarten is very excited to soon have a brand new state of the art facility in our midst. The first sods of earth were recently turned on the Community development complex in O'Neil Road. This will become the home of another Beaconsfield Kindergarten, making the Committee of Management responsible for two kindergartens. Our new centre should be open by third term of 2004.

Our flagship Kindergarten in Wood Street will remain. This coming year we have had to take an extremely innovative approach to housing the 100 families who will be supporting the kindergarten next year. Recognition needs to go to our talented and lateral thinking staff for there undying efforts in catering for the growing needs to Beaconsfield at being able to fit in all these families.

In a single unit kindergarten these amounts of children is unheard of. In fact when we approached the various authorities for some assistance in extending our service to four individual groups of 25 children spread over the week they were unable to offer any solutions. But the team of Jeanette Bartlett, D'arne Fisher, Cathy McMaster, and Sharon Hancock came up with a proposal. This was accepted by all the surprised groups including the Cardinia Council.

To the general Beaconsfield resident this will mean that next year there will be an extremely congested area around the kindergarten every lunchtime from Monday to Thursday as 25 children get picked up and 15 minutes later 25 children get dropped off to centre. This will intensify on Fridays when this quick change over will happen four times in the day as each group attends their final two hours session.

The staff and the committee are very concerned for the safety of pedestrians and shoppers. This area has certainly had its share of challenges over the years and the traffic just keeps on increasing. It can be a very time consuming and dangerous exercise for cars and pedestrians to move from Wood Street into Princes Highway during peak school periods.

On a lighter note, the kinder children have flourished this year and continue to enjoy the extensive range of activities that our kinder has on offer.

I wish to personally thank all the parents, past and future for all the little things that go towards operating the kinder. Whether this be selling chocolates, or buying them, to helping at the working bees, or donating items for us to raffle. A special thank you goes to the parents who have taken a more active role and become committee members. Thank you.

On behalf of the Staff and the Committee of Management I wish you a great Christmas and trust that every child has a great start to their school life thanks to what they learnt at Beaconsfield Kindergarten.



BEACONSFIELD STRATEGIC TRAFFIC REVIEW - MAKE OR BREAK

When this letter is published in the Banner, the time limit for public comment on this review will have long passed. Whatever is adopted by Council from this review could be the make or break of Beaconsfield.

Clearly the railway line divides this town and similarly any proposal to make Kenilworth Avenue and Station Street a main arterial through road will also divide this community. Major safety issues will arise associated with a severe increase of traffic on an already dangerous railway crossing. Traffic will be funnelled into a major school traffic area around St Francis Xavier and further endanger Primary school pedestrians crossing the Old Princes Highway. Further moves to limit and control access down Kenilworth Avenue to the East under the Freeway overpass and close the Viaduct to motorised traffic will increase angst and resentment from all who live in the area. Let's not kid ourselves! All the time the rail remains, a satisfactory major North South arterial is very hard to plan.

Future policy must be one of freeing up rather than repression and we must accept that the future Soldiers Road – Manuka Road extension and better use of Kenilworth Avenue to the East will certainly help. The viaduct must be kept open to cars at all

costs as it is the best way to separate them from heavy slow moving trucks and away from pedestrians. The viaduct also wins hands down against the railway crossing in terms of efficient traffic flow and safety. There has never been any vehicle to vehicle collision under there in thirty years. If drivers in the past could not have seen a 2.2 Metre low bridge in front of their eyes and crashed into the superstructure are they going to crash into the railway crossing barriers and see the Very Fast Train comina?

Springvale and Clayton used to be like Beaconsfield not so long ago, but their main streets are wider crossing the rail and do not have a flood plain to contend with nearby.

Essentially, what I am saying is let's share the increased traffic load, but reduce parking and ban heavy vehicles from using both Beaconsfield Avenue west of Station Street and from Wood Street, excepting buses of course. Strategic placing of


pedestrian crossings, like in Pakenham Main Street, from the Railway Station to Wood Street and across the North end of Station Street for school children would help calm traffic. A way across give Beaconsfield Avenue where traffic comes from the East approaching Wood Street would help. Furthermore I consider that a marked bicycle lane round the Beaconsfield Ave, Princes Hwy and Wood Street block would be a bonus to recreational cyclists and act as a traffic calmer too like on Bemersyde Drive in Berwick.

Our local Beaconsfield Ward Councillor has tried to assure us that he is not against the Viaduct closing to vehicles but damning statements like "the majority of the community consider the Viaduct to be unsafe for vehicular traffic" and the "viaduct was constructed in the day of the horse and cart" are a flamboyant exaggeration of the truth.

In the traffic review it notes that new traffic directions will protect residential sections of Wood Street and Beaconsfield Avenue which sounds like a wish list for those residents in both of those major streets.

In the long term many streets will have to share the increased load of traffic because in my view the new suggested arterial is a dangerous proposal full of fault. There's no gain without pain and in this rapidly expanding suburb we've all got to share the burden. I say...... KEEP THE VIADUCT OPEN!

Beaconsfield Primary School was one of around 130 schools represented at the RACV Energy Breakthrough at Maryborough, showcasing how they have used environmentally friendly technology to power their small vehicles.

"Star Raiders" and the "Wizards" represented our school in the pushcart events. The children worked with their parents in constructing the pushcarts over the last 6 months. The children participated in endurance, sprints relay, obstacle course and design and construction categories. Our vehicle "Thunder" was the first Human Powered Vehicle (HPV) ever built by our school. It was the brainchild of teacher Mark McKelson and made possible by the dedication of the children and parents who made up the design and building team.

The **RACV** Energy Breakthrough is one of the biggest "Technology in Schools" projects in Victoria and we were only able to take part because of the generous sponsorship of Beaconsfield Tractor & Mower, Astoria Honda. Beaconsfield Garden Supplies, LJ Hooker Berwick, Synectix, Berwick Nissan, Bunnings Warehouse Narre Warren,

Birds in the Garden



To most gardeners, birds in the garden are welcome friends. WINE & FOOD

The Southern Victorian Wine Show is over for another year with the usual mix of results. Some truly outstanding wines, a core of Silver and Bronze winners and just too many also rans. I continue to be unable to understand how a professional Winemaker can send off poorly prepared samples to represent their good name and that of their label. All hope of a medal – gone.

The good news though was that the best wines would hold their own anywhere in the world. The standout wine of the 500 odd entered was

a glorious Yering Station Reserve Shiraz (95%) Voignier (5%), 2002. This wine has only been exhibited three times and already won nine Trophies. Fragrant, powerful & elegant - power in a velvet glove. When released around April 2004 will be \$50 plus, and worth every cent. Runner up to this wine for Best exhibit in two shows has been the 2001 version of the same wine -Tom Carson continues to get it right.

Diamond Valley Blue Label Chardonnay, 2002, around \$20, won Top Gold in its class. I loved this wine on tasting and immediately placed an order. Lo, it went on to win Three Trophies. Diamond Valley Winemaker James Lance also did well with wines made under contract for Evelyn County; the 2002 Chardonnay and Pinot Noir.

A 2001 Shiraz from Warramate and a 2003 Pinot noir from Port Phillip Estate impressed. The Pinot is now made by Sandro Mosel of Kooyong Estate and is not yet released.

Other Wines. The following stood out at tastings over the last month.

Mount Pleasant Elizabeth, Early Release Semillon, 2001, \$13 under screwcap from Vintage Cellars; an old favourite and will keep for years. Also from Vintage Cellars under their own label is a lovely rich Chardonnay, 2000, from Robe, \$13. This was made as a small batch experimental wine and

Vintage Cellars jumped at the offer of the entire batch. Two Voigners of very different style stood out. This fragrant white grape is added to Shiraz (see the Yering Station)in the Rhone area of France and is starting to appear in Australia as a straight varietal. The first from Shadowfax made from Adelaide Hills fruit, flavours of peach and apricots with a clean finish, \$18. The Yalumba Eden Valley, 2002, \$25 is a more powerful wine with a nose of fresh crunchy Nashi pear and lingering finish. Banrock Station Chardonnay, 2002 tastes at least \$5 better than its \$8.

Just loved a Leasingham red, the Bin 61, Shiraz of 2001, \$18 beautiful now and will last for years.

FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

COMMENCING A NEW BUSINESS

If you are acquiring an existing business or setting up a new business there are many matters that need to be attended to. It is important that these issues be attended to before the new business is commenced so that you are adequately prepared for the record keeping compliance procedures. Some key items to be considered are:

1. Business Structure

Consider whether to operate the business as a Company, Trust (Discretionary or Unit), Partnership or as a Sole Trader. The main benefits of companies include low tax rate on profits (30%) and limited liability in certain instances if the Company is insolvent. However, a Company costs more to setup and to operate, including compulsory superannuation and workcover.

2. Business Plan

Prepare a Business Plan to set goals and performance indicators for the business operations. The Plan will detail projections of the business in the future and usually include Budget and Cash Flow forecasts. Business operations should be regularly monitored against the Plan and adjustments made to the Business Plan. The Business Plan should identify funding required for the business commencement together with ongoing cash flow requirements.


3. ABN and GST Registrations

All business entities must have their own Australian Business Number (ABN), which cannot transfer from the previous proprietor of the business. When registering for an ABN you must also decide whether to register for Goods & Services Tax (GST). The registration for GST is compulsory if annual turnover exceeds \$50.000. The main benefit of registering for GST is that GST paid on purchases are refundable, however the main disadvantages include charging GST, which results in your services costing 10% higher and the need to lodge BAS Returns each quarter within 28 days.

4. Other Registrations

Check for other Commonwealth, State or Local Government registrations needed eg. Business Name,

Secondhand Dealers, Health/Food Licences, Shop registrations etc etc. The Sale of a business generally requires a Section 52 Statement from the Vendor providing operating results for the past three years, business premises particulars etc.

5. Insurances

Seek advice from an Insurance Broker on a insuring business assets, liability protection for loss of profit, public and product/ services liability. In addition, WorkCover is required where there are employees including working proprietors if there is an employer/employee relationship through a Company or Trust.

6. Accounting Records

It is vital to record the accounting transactions regularly so that the financial position can be monitored and necessary returns prepared eq. BAS and Income Tax, otherwise significant late lodgement penalties may apply plus general interest charges. Most businesses use computerised ledger systems designed for GST including MYOB,

Quickbooks or Erecord from the Australian Taxation Office (provided free). Alternatively, spreadsheets or manually written cash books may suffice for your Accountant.

7. Agreements

You should consult your Solicitor for Agreements on the sale/purchase of a business, property lease and other Agreements eg. Sales Territories and Commission rates. It is much easier to enforce written contract than rely on a verbal agreement.

You should ensure that you consult professional advisors prior to purchasing or setting-up a business and continue to utilise these services whilst in business to enable you to concentrate on managing the business.





OUR ORCHARD HOME

Childhood memories of the 1930's come back to me, of those years spent with my family.

My responsibilities on arrival at home after school were - cleaning my boots, collecting kindling wood for the next mornings fire, feeding the horses, the chooks, the pigs and any jobs that a young fellow was asked to and capable of doing.

I went to the local Boys Club, going camping once to Warburton. Football and cricket took up my time at weekends.

My best pal Bob was a brown curly retriever and we went everywhere together. He was a hunter and killed several snakes. On Saturday mornings I would go down to collect the mail at the store and many's the

time he got into some beaut battles with other dogs and won them all. Never lost a fight! Well, hardly ever. One day when I made Pop really furious, I got a few hard whacks from him. Bob became upset and immediately pounced on him and tore his arm.

Grandma, when she got angry with me, whacked me with a butter pat, but it didn't hurt. It made a loud noise, but I felt no pain.

I kept canaries in an aviary beside the house. Their whistling was a delight. Each of my uncles had them in turn and when they developed other interests, the responsibility fell to the next in line. I inherited them when they left home. When I began work in the later 1930's, a few good whistlers were purchased from a stall at the Camberwell market.

I shared the same bedroom with my uncles. At one time, they began wrestling on the bed and the metal framed bed bent! I sat on the other bed, barracking and cheering them on. Grandma came in to see what all the noise was about and went and got the broom to try and stop them! They then took the broom off her, chased her out of the room and continued their frolicking. OUR ORCHARD HOME

Му cousin Evelyn, daughter of my Auntie Dot, was a lovely little baby and when I went to Mitcham in 1939 and stayed with them, I was allowed to push the large wicker pram along the foot-path. I was always tempted to let go of the handle and run at a really fast pace alongside it down the sloping street, but I wasn't that game to do it. However, we always returned safely after each outing without any mishaps.

All my Uncles and Aunts seemed very grown up but, on reflection they would have been quite young some merely teenagers, Uncle Tom being just six years older than me.

In March 1933, when I was almost nine years old, my Aunt Evelyn passed away. Like my mother Edna, she suffered for some time from tuberculosis, a distressing and debilitating disease of the lungs, incurable at the time. Her coffin was brought to the house via the side door and taken to the front room. I was forbidden to enter during this time and didn't attend her funeral or burial. This front room was used only for special occasions. such weddings or when visitors and the minister called. It contained a piano, lounge suite and several other items, ornaments, photos, pictures and various vases. It may have had more use before my time when the family members were younger.

Electricity and telephone were already installed. There was one large yard light and one smaller one into the shed. Hurricane lamps were carried outside when the horses were fed their supper at 10.00pm.

Main water was installed to the property in the early thirties. I remember seeing the large pipes being laid.

The orchard house in the 1930's was much different to what it became ten years later. In 1940, due to a severe housing shortage, several extensions were made to temporarily accommodate Uncle Fred and his bride and vast alterations improvements in 1941, by making two dwellings under the one roof when Uncle Bert and his wife moved in. A section of the front verandah was converted into a bedroom for me. It had fly-wire walls and a canvas awning.

When we sold the cow about 1940, milk deliveries began. It came in one pint glass bottles with cardboard lids.

There were never any mail or paper deliveries. There was no cellar under the house. It is difficult to remember exact times. The only important dates for a child were birthdays and Christmas Day.

Grandpa grew beautiful roses, which were sold to Irelands the florist. A grey bush hedge grew in a row alongside the driveway. Empty fruit cases were stored under the large pine tree.

Tanks collected rainwater for the house and the runoff fed the trees. Brick paths in the form of spoon drains carried excess water away from the house toward the trees. The well was never used in my time, but was held as a reserve. A wire crate containing bottles of soft drink and home made ginger beer was

lowered into it, keeping them cool in summer.

"Roan" a former baker's horse was sold after the war, when tractors and trucks became available from the sale of surplus war materials.

Grandpa bred special breeds of poultry as a hobby and had many successes at the Royal Melbourne Show. Silver and White Wyandotte, Silver Hamburg and several other breeds were his specialty. Many settings of eggs – 15 to the dozen – were sold to fanciers all over Victoria.

Several varieties of apples kept fresh under the pines at home until required. These were many pie apples which had a natural that coating helped preserve them. Other lesser fruits were stored in a shed built on the boundary between Uncle Walter's and Grandpa's. They were left there until requested by the buyers at the market. In 1934, after the severe floods damaged our peach crop this shed was demolished and rows of apples were planted in its The blossom place. encouraged the bees for pollination of the other trees. Fruit growers were always concerned at the amount of damage and bruising done to fruit during the picking season, particularly with fingernails cracking the peel.

Orchardists belonged to a co-operative and members had use of the local Cool Store. It was administered by a committee and the engineer had sole control over the running and maintenance of it. It was the meeting place for all the local growers. There were no privately owned stores on any of the properties at this time. The perishable fruit such as Jonathan were

stored at a controlled temperature, run by two donkey engines in the centre of the store, fuelled by power kerosene. They were reliable and practical and they chug-chugged away, never stopping. The co-op didn't rely on electricity for two main reasons; it was too expensive and the supply was weak and unreliable due to occasional power failures and the distance from the poles. There were about ten or twelve chambers each 1000 holdina cases. Because pears ripened quickly, they were stored at near freezing temperatures. I went there occasionally, but couldn't help much as the fruit cases were far too heavy for me to carry.

The township consisted of a post office store, a garage, a butcher shop, church, football and cricket oval, a hall where dances, films and card nights were held. It was close-knit community.

Folk from this era survived two world wars and depression.

Our orchard home was well built, large, comfortable, homely and warm.

I was part of a large, caring family and never worried where my next meal would come from.

There was always someone at home.

The door was never locked.

I felt secure.

I belonged.

Footnote: Bob passed away in June 2000, two weeks after writing this.

The land Bob grew up on in the East Burwood area was eventually bought by Ansett for the Channel 10 station. Bob and Kath Baker moved to the Beaconsfield area in early 1990.



The Sanctuary is alive with birds of all kinds feeding on the abundant seeds and fruits. The small red berries of the Cherry Ballart are almost ripe and provide a tasty treat for all kinds of animals, (including me).

Native grasses are a standout in the Sanctuary at the moment especially in the ecological burn site behind the sports oval. Three species are dominant in abundance and they are Kangaroo Grass (Themeda triandra), Weeping Grass (Microlaena stipoides) and Red Veined Spear Grass (Stipa rudis). Emerging from among the grasses are young Wattle and Eucalyptus seedlings which is very encouraging and the main reason for the ecological burn.

Weeds are also growing well in the Sanctuary and also around town. I've recently seen some Paterson's Curse (Echium plantagineum) in the car park behind the pub and again along side Inglis Rd. Thistles are always a concern as is the badly degraded area between the sports oval and the creek. We are however slowly getting on top of the weeds and winning the fight.

There will be no December working bee but we will be back working in January.

Country Women's Association of Vic. Inc. Berwick Branch have been busy recently.



When building a pergola as so many of us do, the decision must be made as to material. Posts maybe oregan, treated pine or Cyprus pine - but should we not consider steel? Dry rot is the enemy of timber, no matter whether you keep it well painted or not. Cyprus pine and treated pine do resist rot but Cyprus does crack without affecting its strength. This brings us to the square steel tube, not as rustic looking but there forever. Cost wise Cyprus costs about \$34., treated pine about \$25. and steel about the same. Of course there is a bit of welding required for the steel.

The main function of a pergola is not those balmy



evenings spent beside the barbecue, rather it is a useful dry area at the rear or side of the house so ignore those yummie pictures in the Harvey Norman catalogue while you give a thought to a suitable parking area for your gardening shoes.

OUR NATURAL WORLD

As we enter into another period of time that is the Christian Religion celebrations, thoughts can turn to the innumerable Religions of our planet and certainly not all of them have their Religious Festivals at the same time. or are even similar to Christians. To even begin to understand what may be termed The Dawn of Belief. we have to look at the wider expanse of Comparative Religion for some answers.

Firstly, it can be truly said that mankind has always had a belief system of one kind or another. The exact moment is forever lost in the mists of a great expanse of time. The people of the stone age ritually buried their dead, placing food, flowers, and personal artefacts in the graves and then covered the

site with large rocks and stones, not so much to protect from animals but in the belief that this would ensure the spirit would continue on and not return to haunt the living. The afterlife was very real to these peoples, and they had strongly held emotions regarding birth and death.

Leaping ahead, in 1724 a Jesuit Scholar, Joseph Lafitua, who had served as a missionary in Canada wrote the first voluminous account of Comparative Religion. This book was a veritable landmark in the study of Religion as Lafitua noted similarities in the religion of the American savages, the ancient Cult of Bacchus, Cybele and Isis and Osiris, and Catholic Christianity. These similarities seemed to him to point back to a common

origin. Many other books with similar themes followed in the 18th century. These attempts rationalize the complex phenomena of the Religious ideas and practises of mankind, prepared the way for the more scientific approach of later times


The comparative study of Religion in the 19th and 20th centuries characterised by the rise and decline of various "schools" of thought, which sought to explain the essential nature of Religion according to some preconceived principle of interpretation. Friedrich Max Muller (1823-1900) is justly regarded as the pioneer of the scientific study of Religion, and he argued that language analysis would often provide the key to the origin of a

deity. He traced Religion itself back ultimately to "an ineradicable feeling of dependence upon some higher power that was innate in the human mind".

Anthropology soon concerned itself with the question of the origin of Religion, in the study of the beliefs and ritual practises of the so-called primitive peoples of the world. Out of this new science came one of the most notable theories of the origin of Religion, namely "animism", as propounded by Sir Edward Tyler. To some extent this theory still holds great sway today.

Belief when it comes down to it is a very personal thing. and our view of the world governs it. If we can understand that a greater intelligence than ours is running the Universe, then whatever we believe is absorbed into a greater reality even if we can't understand it. What will be will be if you like? Relax and enjoy the ride!



George was a life member and former secretary of Berwick Senior Citizens and was a member of the Dandenong Choral Society. George was college mate to Joan – then sweetheart and husband.


