From reports, I have been told the official opening of our new Beaconsfield Plaza was a great success and the traders were quite excited and enthused from the response they received from the community.

Unfortunately, I am unable to report such success on the Soldiers Road Overpass & Sound Barrier issues. The meeting held with the Ministerial Advisor to the Transport Minister was supposed to be solely

This caused unnecessary conflict as both parties believed the meeting was arranged to voice THEIR concerns.

After a very disappointing meeting, many broken promises and misleading statements over the past 18 months, we were told there was no way the state government was going to contribute funding for this crucial overpass. After we expressed our disappointment we received an invitation to meet with the Minister of Transport himself, a meeting that we were promised over 18 months ago. disappointing outcome of the meeting was that no funding from the state government can be provided as the road is considered a council road.

So now we are left high and dry and back to square

one. BUT, we will not rest with this and I can assure you, with the persistence and determination of community members such as Ray Fleming, Angela McPhee, Garry Runge and myself, just to mention a few, we will push ahead to get what our community will need now and NOT in 20 years time!

On a brighter note, I had the privilege to inspect the progress of our new Community Centre on O'Neil Road and was left quite excited and encouraged that as a community, we will have a wonderful facility for all to enjoy. I would like to encourage everyone to make it a point to get to know what the centre has to offer so that we can use it to its fullest potential.

Furthermore, another 'win' for Beaconsfield occurred recently and that was the election of our ward Councillor, Garry Runge, as the Mayor of the Shire of Cardinia. I would like to express my congratulations to Garry and look forward to him serving his term in council as Mayor. We thank him for the on going support and encouragement he has provided our community.

In closing, I would like to wish all of the members of our community good health and would like to extend an open invitation to the Anzac Day Memorial Services that will be held on the corner of Wood Street and Princes Hwy at 2.00pm on Sunday 18th of April.




The playground was finished late last week and local children, from teenagers to toddlers, have been swarming over it ever since.





GLYNN OWEN RECEIVES TIM MOSELY AWARD



SALLY'S GARDEN



PEONY & TUBEROSES

The lovely peony which is very popular in European gardens, will also grow in our cooler area.

Two types to consider are the tree and the herbaceous peony and both produce glorious flowers-some single, some double- in mauve, white, pink and red. Choose their position in the garden very carefully as they do not respond to being shifted and need to be left in that position for many years before doing any root division. The root stock is very brittle and needs to be lifted with care. Division can be carried out during late Autumn or in early winter.

Peonies need a deep, cool, moist, rich soil. Before planting, enrich the soil with heaps of rotted organic material and make sure the area drains easily.

When planting, cover the crown to a depth of no more than 5cm. Plant in a semi-shaded area which receives morning sun & afternoon shade.

The tree peony will tolerate more sun than the herbaceous type but they are deciduous and drop their leaves in winter. After a few years the tree peony will have developed into a shrub about 2 mt. high and quite wide.

TUBEROSE bulbs produce tall stems of white, single or double flowers which exude an intensely sweet fragrance. They will flower from the 2nd year of planting and as our summers are so very warm they will flower each and every year. Plant in a sunny, open position in rich, moist soil and where the fragrance can waft into an open window to be enjoyed in the house.

24 UNITS TO BE BUILT IN MAHON AVENUE

Residents of Mahon Avenue, Beaconsfield, are up in arms over a 24 unit development site proposed for their court. An action group has been formed to fight the development, with residents investigating all grounds for objecting to the proposed development.

Major concerns for residents are the all ready congested traffic problems surrounding the primary school. With the burden of additional cars from the unit development parking problems in and around Mahon Avenue, Beaconsfield, will continue to grow raising serious concerns for the safety of students walking along and across surrounding roads to the school.



We are currently taking enrolments for the 2005 school year!



Our popular Craft Fair and craft display will take place in November. Details to come.



W I N E & F O O D

At time of writing we near the end of the Melbourne Food & Wine Festival, the largest festival of it's type in the world. Held over 16 days and nights, featuring more than 200 events, many with multiple locations or happenings, there is an event or location to suit all tastes and interests. A small sample is: eight cheese events at different locations; Worlds Longest Lunch at 25 locations held mainly at outer metro or country locations; an "exploration of the fine foods and wines of far north Italy".

I had the pleasure of attending this fabulous function at Church St Enoteca and a range of wine tastings at every level and price point at too many locations to mention. The list though goes on and on.

On of our favourites is Restaurant Week, which began in 1995 at \$19.95 a head for a choice of two food courses, a glass of wine and tea or coffee. Today we pay \$25 per head.

This year some of Melbourne's finest city and suburban Restaurants and nearly 20 out of town or 'lunch among the vines' operators formed a group of more than 220 who supplied lunch over eight days. These lunches are keenly attended and around late February, devotees scan the magazines food newspapers to make an early booking at what you hope will offer the most interesting food and or location. Try www. melbournefoodandwine.com.au for the earliest info.

This year we visited Livebait at Newquay at Docklands

and Bacash at South Yarra, both are seafood specialists and did not disappoint.

This was my first visit to Newquay and it was certainly an eye opener with it's many food outlets, million dollar yachts and apartments. I would imagine weekends are ultra busy and colourful.

Bacash being opposite the Botanical Gardens offers a peaceful and good for the soul walk before or after lunch.

So next year try and attend one of the functions from around 20th March onwards at the princely charge of zero through to \$150 or so.

Enjoyed Jamiesons Run Limestone Coast Chardonnay, 2003, \$11 winner of two Trophies and a lovely clean and fresh wine. Pol Gessner French Champagne, NV, \$28-30 only at Safeway and less with the 10% off for 6 bottles offer.

Vintage Cellars have a lovely sweet wine from the Rhone area of France at \$17 for 375ml, which is less than you might expect to pay for an equivalent local wine; it is Muscat Beaumes de Venise, 1999. This wine will keep and develop.

Reds:

The Age Uncorked Wine Guide recently awarded Best Red Wine to Seppelt Victorian Premium Reserve Shiraz, 2001, \$15-18 and Best Budget Red to Gramps Barossa Valley Grenache, 2002, \$15; both lovely now or will keep.

Penfolds Bin 28 Kalimna Shiraz, 2001, \$20 currently at Nicks normally \$28, my best red of recent tastings.

Favourite Ingredient:

Kikkoman Teriyaki Marinade with Roasted Garlic (a mouthful) try as a marinade with steak, in a casserole over winter or with some of those last ultra ripe tomatoes from your garden served with poached eggs.

In February I was delighted that the Premier of Victoria. the Hon. Steve Bracks, accepted my invitation to visit Beaconsfield. The Premier accompanied by the Minister for Community Services, Hon. Sherryl Garbutt MP. announced \$250,000 in State Government funding to establish a new children's centre to be based at the Beaconsfield Community Centre that is currently under construction.

The centre will host a range of services in one location: to create a one-stop shop for parents of children. The new centre will offer occasional care, preschool, consulting rooms and a mobile library. It is vital that

we give all our precious children the best possible start to life. Funding this facility is one way that the state government shows it is working with local government in partnership to improve facilities for the community.

another Last year, significant step was made to ensure that development and learning are optimised for children from pregnancy through to transition to school (0-8 years). 

FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

WILLS AND DECEASED ESTATES

Every adult should have a Will, so that assets of a deceased estate after payment of liabilities are distributed to beneficiaries in a manner that the deceased directs. In the absence of a Will, the laws of intestacy apply and allocate assets from a deceased estate to dependents and other relatives in a specified manner, which may not necessarily conform to the wishes of the deceased. Wills should be reviewed regularly and either amended or new Wills prepared where appropriate. Some taxation factors to be considered when making a Will would include:


Testamentary Trusts can be set-up in a Will and these can be useful in Estate Planning where the primary beneficiary has family dependents in a lower tax bracket and who also requires protection of his assets against claims of creditors. The typical arrangement is that the Wills of Husband A and Wife B are worded to bequeath monies to infant children or even grandchildren of A & B. Because the infant beneficiaries are deriving income from Testamentary Trust then the income is taxed at adult tax rates and not punative tax rates normally applicable to

income of minors. The assets of Testamentary Trusts are protected within each Trust and would not be available to any creditors claims against the surviving spouse or be available in the event of separation or remarriage.

Superannuation of a deceased paid to a surviving dependant eg. Spouse directly or indirectly through the Estate is generally taxfree. A dependent for this purpose includes the legal, defacto or former spouse and children under 18. However, Superannuation paid to non dependants of the deceased eg. to adult children of the deceased is taxed on the post 6/1983 portion at either 16.5% or 31.5% without any tax-free amounts.

Tax on Income of deceased estates is at the adult tax rates for up to three years after date of death. The Estate is taxed on the income up to the time that assets can be distributed to beneficiaries without inpediments ie. Grant of Probate has been received and there are no significant liabilities or claims outstanding against the Estate.

Capital Gains Tax would apply to assets sold by the Estate or by beneficiaries if transferred. It may be preferable to distribute assets in specie to the beneficiaries rather than dispose of them. In addition, a principal residence owned by a deceased is usually free of Capital Gains Tax if sold within two years of the date of death.

Donations made during a persons lifetime to an approved Charity that are tax deductible would have a tax saving whereas a bequest in a Will would not have any income tax benefits.

You should discuss with your Accountant your circumstances and wishes for bequeathing your Estate prior to consulting a Solicitor for the preparation of your Will. A Solicitor should also be consulted on the appointment of a Power of Attourney should a person be unable to attend to their own affairs due to illness or extended absences away from home. A new Act extensively changes the law relating to Enduring Power of Attourneys in Victoria.



A BEACONSFIELD SOLDIERS STORY 3054 Private John Leslie CHRISTIE

Researched By Bob Sutherland

Enlisted from Beaconsfield, Victoria on 22nd July 1915 was aged 25 years, single and stated his occupation as a labourer.

He embarked on the troopship Commonwealth on 26th November 1915 with the 23rd Infantry Battalion, 7th Reinforcements and arrived in Egypt six weeks later. He was transferred to the 59th Infantry Battalion which was raised in Egypt on 21st February 1916 as part of the expansion of the Australian Imperial Force (AIF).

Approximately half of its recruits came from the veteran 7th Battalion [back from Gallipoli] and the other half were fresh reinforcements from Australia. The men of the Battalion were predominantly composed of men from rural Victoria.

In May it arrived in France as Part of the 5th Division. On the night of the 19/20 July 1916 the Australian 5th Division and the British 61st (South Midland) Division assaulted a German salient near the town of Fromelles on the Western Front. They entered the enemy front line, and the 5th Division

held on till next day, but the penetration of the

Germans on the flanks and the murderous enfilade fire from a well-protected machine gun nest able to enfilade over two thirds of the front line made the position hopeless. The survivors scrambled back to where the attack started.

The Official AIF casualties were given as 5533 [1917 killed or died of wounds, 3146 wounded, 470 taken prisoner] which for an overnight battle, 6pm to 9am, were extraordinarily high, even by the standards of that terrible war.

Private Christie was seen to fall by some of his mates, but his body was never identified and he has No Known Grave. He is commemorated on a listing of names on the VC Corner, Australian Cemetery, France.

Footnote: Bob Sutherland will be at the Beaconsfield Anzac Day Memorial Service being held on 18th April. If you have any information that may be helpful for Bob's research about any of the Beaconsfield soldiers he would be pleased to hear from you.





FRIENDS OF THE CARDINIA CREEK SANCTUARY

For the fourth year, a group of twenty-four hard working volunteers helped to clean up the Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna Reserve and Cardinia Creek as part of Clean Up Australia Day on Sunday 7 March. Items collected included 35 bags of rubbish, car tyres and parts, steel posts, guttering, and even an empty fire extinguisher, plus a ute load of rubbish collected from a 200 metre stretch of the Cardinia This rubbish Creek. included a car seat, hubcap, steel and wooden posts, four car tyres and numerous bags of bottles, plastic and packaging. Some of this rubbish is dumped purposely, and some reaches the creek via stormwater drains from local streets.

Clean Up Australia Day was an opportunity to clean up before welcoming some new residents to our area. In April, the Cardinia Creek will become home to a small number of young Platypus that are being released as part of an experimental re-introduction project by the Australian Platypus Conservancy. It is believed that Platypus were found in the Cardinia Creek prior to the Ash Wednesday bushfires, which destroyed the creek-side vegetation. Twenty-one years later, sufficient regeneration has occurred to enable this firstever attempt to re-locate platypus to an area where they have become "locally extinct". You can help look after our new residents by reporting any sightings to the Australian Platypus Conservancy on 9716 1626. If you live along or visit the creek, avoid disturbing the creek bank (including trampling by stock) and keep your pets locked up at night-time when these nocturnal animals move along the creek to feed (travelling up to 14km in a night!)

April is also time for another important project WildWatch Australia. From April 3 to April 7, ABC TV, Online and Radio will run this national Urban Wildlife Survey. Everyone is encouraged to observe the wildlife using backyards, from small butterflies to birds and possums. It doesn't matter if you live in a unit or on 50 acres - everyone can participate. As our urban areas grow, the survey will help to discover how our backyards contribute to native wildlife conservation.





Commiserations to our D grade captained by Craig Douglas they enjoyed a great year and fell 41 runs short on day two.



VET CHAT

PET PAIN

Getting arthritis under control before winter is much more effective than waiting until the cold is making those joints ache. Don't wait until your dog has already stiffened up.

Aspirin, the original antiinflammatory has been in use for a very long time. In both human medicine and veterinary medicine there is a group of anti-inflammatory medications called "cox 2 inhibitors" which have had the undesirable gut and kidney affects of aspirin largely eliminated in beef flavoured chews from your Veterinary Surgeon. Dogs eat them out of your hand as a treat!

If you have a dog who is slow to get up in the morning, especially on cold

days or a dog who no longer chases that tennis ball with the same enthusiasm, talk to your vet about Rimadyl or other cox 2 anti-inflammatories. If however your spouse is slow to get up in the morning and won't chase a tennis ball, ignore the above advice and send him or her to the doctor. If humans and dogs go for a walk each day it will help everyone's ioints.

If you have any further queries on arthritis in your pets contact Dr. Stewart or his helpful staff on 0500-525-003 for a visit to your house (mobile service) or to our base in Officer (Officer Veterinary Services). They all work in a well-oiled joint!


