

YOUR LINK WITH COUNCIL

Hello to everyone in the township of Beaconsfield. In this edition I would like to concentrate on some of the planning issues which have causing been some concerns around the town. Development and expansion of the towns in the Shire is an ongoing issue. Beaconsfield we live at the physical beginning of the 9th fastest growing municipality in Australia. Growth through Officer and Pakenham is moving at a rapid rate and must be controlled and regulated to ensure infrastructure is put in place at the time development occurs. There is a real need for playgrounds, parks and ovals to be built as the development grows, not years after. This needs Council to be vigilant when considering planning applications and residents to be involved with the planning process. I am pleased to report that developers are coming to

Council with their proposals, this allows an opportunity for Councillors to require the necessary infrastructure be put in place.

Development is important to this Shire, but development for the sake of development is not necessarily a good As your ward thing. Councillor I am always willing to listen to the concerns of the residents and advocate for what is in the best interests of the town and the people who live here. encourage active involvement the in development Beaconsfield and beyond.

I am pleased to report that I was able to provide \$500 from my ward funds to a young student from St. Francis Xavier School during the week. Tara will be representing her school and Australia at the Global Youth Forum in the USA in June. She is a fine example of a young leader who I am sure will excel from this learning experience.

The Council and Connex are in negotiations about extending the Beaconsfield Railway Station carpark. This area is fast becoming a dangerous location for vehicles and pedestrians and I am sure that I will be able to report in the near future about an extension to the carpark.

In the forthcoming months you will see Kenilworth Ave. and Station Street sealed, this should provide relief to the traffic using the viaduct.

I am also pleased to report that the police Operation Streetbeat will see members from the Pakenham Police Station travelling to Beaconsfield on the train and patrolling the shopping plaza on foot. Foot patrols are the best way for the police to become aware of the local traders and their problems and to show police presence in the local area. Please make these foot patrol members feel welcome in our town.

Again I encourage residents to support the Beaconsfield Progress Association and attend the meetings. This is your voice to Council and I look forward to discussing issues with you at the meetings.







FIRE BRIGADE NEWS

WINTER FIRE SAFETY

Death, injury and property loss from residential fires are a major concern throughout the year, but especially during the winter months when the number of house fires increases.

During 2002 CFA firefighters attended nearly 1300 house fires with most fires starting in the kitchen (30%), bedroom (13.5%), lounge room (11%) or laundry (5%).

Some of the most common causes of house fires are listed below. Please act to protect your family and home by avoiding these situations which can lead to a fire.

- * Stovetop fires caused by fat or oil burning over to hotplate or splattering nearby.
- * Leaving cooking on a stove unattended.
- * Electric cords, curtains, tea towels and oven cloths to close to the stove.
- * Oil burners and candles left on at night or left burning while occupants are away from home.
- * Bedside lamps with incorrect wattage globes installed.
- * Smoking in bed: ensure butts are extinguished before placing in bins.
- * Electric blankets: never leave the house without switching them off.

Never leave heavy objects on the bed when the electric blanket is on - be especially careful of pets.

- * Clothes dryers: always clean lint filters after each load.
- * Flammable liquids: store flammable liquids such as petrol, kerosene or methylated spirits away from heaters and hot water service pilot flames.
- * Fireplaces without screen guards. Never leave an open fire alight when you leave the house or go to bed. Extinguish all flames and embers completely and ensure ashes are cold before discarding them.
- * Clothing drying too close to heaters or open fires.
- * Incorrectly installed flues on wood heaters and stoves. All heating appliances must be professionally installed to Building Regulations and Australian Standards, particularly flues.
- * Overloaded power points and power boards.
- * Appliances such as an iron, stove, oven or heater left on at night or when the house is unattended.



Make sure that your smoke detectors are working properly.



MATTEO DI CARLO FIREFIGHTER OF THE YEAR

The Beaconsfield Fire Brigade held its annual awards night on 15 May 2004. The highlight of the night was the awarding of the Bob Burgess Award for the Firefighter of the Year to Matteo Di Carlo. The Bob Burgess Award is named in honour of Bob Burgess who was a distinguished captain of the brigade for many years prior to his death in 1993. Bev Burgess who is a life member of the brigade presented the award.

Matteo Di Carlo has been a member of the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade since 1985 and credits the initial development of his skills and knowledge to Bob Burgess. Matteo recalls his first fire on an old blue train near the Beaconsfield Station and recognises that equipment and training of firefighters has advanced significantly since then.

Matteo currently holds the position of second lieutenant and is responsible for training within the brigade. Matteo has held the position of a lieutenant in the brigade for 10 years, and is well respected by his peers both within the brigade, and the wider CFA region.

NETTI CELEBRATES 80 YEARS

Nettie Abeling was born at home in Groningen, Holland in 1924. She was eldest of 10 children, and was educated at the Catholic Primary and Secondary Schools. At age fifteen Nettie left school to help her mother with her other siblings. Nettie attended evening classes three times per week to acquire her Nursing Diploma after three years.

During the 2nd World War she nursed German, Dutch, and American soldiers. In March 1945 the Red Cross Factory was bombed and they then had to use a makeshift hospital. Nettie was injured with shrapnel in her legs, and had to give nursing away in May, 1945. Nettie continued to help her Mum and met John again, (an old school friend) and they married on 16th September, 1948.


They rented one room in Groningen.. Whilst there they had two children Wilma and Hans. Later they rented a three bedroom house, and in 1954 their second daughter Trudy was born.

Nettie arrived in Australia with her husband John and three children on 5th November, 1957. They Bonagilla went to Immigration Camp near Wodonga. John stayed 10 days and Nettie and the children were there for a month. John went to Silvan, where he got a job on a Tulip Farm. They rented for six months and worked there. General Motors Holden came and offered John a job at Dandenong in 1958 as an Electroplater. John worked there to get the plant set up, and it opened in 1959. John became Leading Hand when it opened.

The family moved to Beaconsfield in May, 1958. They rented a house opposite the Garden Centre(White House) for about a year. They began building their house in Hudson Street in 1959. John helped a carpenter build it in his spare time.

The second day they were here, John drove into the petrol station (now Goodyear Tyres cnr. Wood St and Princes Highway) and hit the pump. This was his first encounter with well known identity Bill Hudson at his garage. Bill told him to go forward, but he went backwards into the petrol Bill and Helen pump. became their best friends and still are. Bill got Nettie a job cleaning other people's homes to help make ends met. From her earnings she was able to go Dandenong to get her first washing machine.

In the community John helped Ted Turner in building the Scout Hall and Nettie making curtains, cleaning, and of course making many cups of tea. Wilma was a Cub Leader with Margaret Turner for the 1st Beaconsfield Scouts. Hans received his Queen's Scout award when in the Venturer Unit and second one for 1st Beaconsfield Scouts.



John died in January, 1992 from cancer and was sadly missed by everyone. In 1995 Nettie sold Hudson Street home to move to her current unit in Beaconsfield Avenue.

Nettie has been involved in Berwick\Upper Beaconsfield Red Cross Unit for approximately 30 years. She was in charge of loans of Medical Equipment wheelchairs, crutches, etc. and also volunteer worker at Red Cross Shop and Blood Bank when they visited. The Country Women's Association Nettie also gave time for about 5 years. Recently, she has been member of U3A in Berwick and Berwick Ladies Probus.

There were big celebrations recently when Nettie celebrated her 80th Birthday at Berwick R.S.L. Hall. The highlight was her son Hans and daughter in law Gwen turning up when they said they wouldn't be able to make it. There were many friends and relatives there to help her in celebrating this milestone.

Nettie has three children, nine grandchildren, and four great grand children, and she is a wonderful friend to all who know her in Beaconsfield.

children enjoy their run. At noon the staff and students from Grades 3-6 walked together to Akoonah Park to run the 'bush track.'


The students exhibited the habits of the 'You Can Do It' program.

SALLY'S GARDEN



COFFEE GROWING

I have received some green Arabica coffee beans, sent down from Queensland.

I thought it would be interesting as well as fun to try and grow them.

It took approx. 6 weeks for them to germinate and send forth a greeny brown stem with the coffee bean on top of the stem. When the bean splits open, 2 shiny lush strong green leaves burst forth. These leaves are flat and saucer shaped with scalloped edges.

At this stage the coffee beans need to be protected from the birds as they tend to pick off the bean and therefore the plant will not continue to grow. The plants also need a reasonably warm sheltered area to become established.

When the seedlings are between 8-12 months old they can be transplanted into wet fertilised holes to continue to grow into mature trees. When these trees are between 3-5 years old, they begin to produce fruit. The Coffee Arabica fruit take 6-8 months to ripen.

In growing coffee commercially, the red cherries (fruit) are regularly hand picked from the tree as they become over ripe after 10-14 days. Each tree can yield an average of 2-4 kg of cherries.

If I can keep my coffee beans growing, I will keep you updated on their progress bi-monthly.

The on again off again "Bulls Raw" has finally made it to opening. Set for June 9th with a foot firmly in Japan but with enough variations on Jason Bradford's standards to satisfy the unadventurous. With Sarah James out front we who remember Jasons Terrace with affection look forward to the opening.

Our family will celebrate our eldest daughter Melissa's completion of a Post Graduate Diploma of Hospital Administration and will take some old bottles from the cellar as it is BYO wine.

Bookings on 9707 4999.

Wines: White - Previously recommended was Diamond Valley Blue Label Chardonnay, 2003, normally \$24, now \$18 at Nick's Wine Merchants, a Best in Show winner and bargain.

Peter Lehmann Semillon, 2002 is developing nicely. Buy and put some away, around \$9.

Pewsey Vale Eden Valley Riesling, 2003, \$12-14, floral aromas and citrus palate, a delight to just drink. Shaw and Smith M3 Chardonnay, 2002, around \$32 at Nicks. This Adelaide Hills wine is a magnificent Chardonnay for that special meal, now or cellar 3-4 years. Adelaide Hills is producing some very high quality wine from a range of makers.

Sweet Wine – A half bottle of Johnsons Pirramima Late Picked Riesling, 1999, \$18 at Dans was all class with a Citrus Tart to end a recent Wine Club tasting.

Margan Botrytis Semillon, 2003, around \$20.Made by my cousin, this Hunter River double Gold Medal winner is a smoky, rich and clean desert wine.

Red – Penfolds Bin 28 and 389 were to me the standouts of this years somewhat ordinary Penfolds release. Bin 28, \$18-20 and Bin 389, \$32-34. Usually I enjoy and buy



the Wynns Coonawarra Shiraz but not this year (2002).

Hardys Oomoo (yes thats right) 2002, around \$11 and a Gold Medal winner is widely recommended.

Tyrells Rufus Stone Heathcote Shiraz, 2001, \$18-20, continues to impress and out tastes wine of more than twice the price. Breath for at least an hour. This represents some of the best buying for some months.

Finally Water Wheel, Memsie, 2002, blend is a bargain at \$10.


Citrus Zest finds its way into many dishes at our house. Lemon zest, anchovies, fried breadcrumbs, garlic and capers over pasta is a favourite.

Orange zest or rind enhances a heart winter stew or braise, especially, ox tail.

Lemon zest in apple pie makes a nice change as does dried mandarin peel with chicken or duck done as a Chinese red braise.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING

by Tammy Lobato, MP, member for Gembrook

Recent newspaper articles have highlighted the issues of planning in Beaconsfield and alerted us all to the importance of ensuring that appropriate development occurs in and around the Beaconsfield township.

Planning involves collaboration between state and local government. The state government provides policy direction and the local government devises a local planning scheme with appropriate controls.

Planning itself also operates at two levels: at a strategic level which is forwardlooking and maps out a vision or future plan for an area, and at a statutory level, which responds to and processes actual applications for specific developments. The two, obviously, need to work together.

For an area that is experiencing rapid growth, as Beaconsfield is, it is important that community can develop a shared vision, or, if you like, a map showing what will be the characteristics of this area will be in 5, 10, 20 years time. If we had to draw a picture of how Beaconsfield would look in 10 years time, how many of us would draw similar ones? Yet it is vital for community well-being that there is a common and shared sense of where we want to head and that each particular

application for a new development is able to be incorporated in that future picture of Beaconsfield.

Local participation in neighbourhood planning is vital to ensure that we create a community rather than iust estates or developments. You may remember I referred to the topic of workable, functional communities in a column earlier this year when discussing the potential role the future Beaconsfield Community Complex can play. Planning is another area that can help with-or detract fromthe development of communities.

It is important that the processes in planning are open, accountable and understandable so that change is managed in a consistent way. Planning is not just about new buildings or land uses but also their potential effects the surrounding neighbourhood in terms of the environment, transport and social outcomes.

For those who are novices about planning issues, I would encourage you to

visit the website at www.dse.vic.gov.au and under the Planning heading, you can have access to all the planning schemes in the state, along with the maps showing exactly where each zone is and what are the requirements of each zone. All the state government's policies are also accessible at that site. Getting involved in and informed about planning allows you to help shape the Beaconsfield of the future.

FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

TAX TIME TIPS

As the end of the financial year (30th June) approaches you should take time to consider tax planning ideas. Each year many tax changes are made so you cannot rely on last years' tax planning ideas to again be tax effective.


Some ideas for consideration by individuals include:

- Tax effective investments eg investments in afforestation schemes. Before investing in any managed investment schemes you should ensure that it is appropriately covered by an ATO Product Ruling specific to the Scheme.
- Investment income eg Rents, Dividends and Interest are assessable income at the time of payment or when credited ie when the legal entitlement arises. This should be kept in mind in arranging rents or renewing term deposits as some financial years may have in excess of 12 months income, which may result in extra tax being paid at marginal rates.
- From 1st July 2003, the Superannuation Co-Contributions initiative allows a \$ for \$ Co-Contribution of up to \$1,000 for superannuation

contributions made by people earning up to \$27,500 pa (shading out at \$40,000 pa) who are employed, are less than 71 years of age and who received employer support during that year and are not wholly or substantially selfemployed. If eligible to the co-contribution a taxpaver must lodge a tax return and the ATO will pay the cocontribution into the employee's Superannuation Fund account.

- If you have realised some Capital Gains during the financial year and are holding investments that will realise less than the cost base, you should consider selling these investments and realise the capital losses, which can be offset against Capital Gains which will reduce the Capital Gains Tax payable. To be effective the losses must be realised in the same tax year as the gains.
- The Superannuation Surcharge applies to adjusted taxable incomes for 2003 / 2004 year commencing at \$94,692 with the full rate of 15% applying to superannuation contributions for adjusted taxable incomes of at least \$114,981.

Adjusted taxable income includes taxable income plus reportable fringe benefits and tax deductible s u p e r a n n u a t i o n contributions.

If superannuation contributions are substantial it may be appropriate to maximise deductions eg tax effective schemes and Donations or negative gearing tax losses or review investment income derived eg private Company dividends to reduce any superannuation surcharge payable.

- The tax offset for Medical Expenses relates to medical etc expenses paid in excess of \$1,500 after rebates received or receivable from Medicare and Private Health Insurance funds.

It includes expenses paid for a Spouse and for children under 21 years and is not income tested. Accordingly, it is most advantageous to pay as many medical expenses within the tax year that is possible ie by 30th June as the threshold amount of \$1,500 is deducted for each financial year.

All taxpayers should carefully review their income tax affairs during the year and prior to 30th June and discuss with their Accountant to ensure that they comply with income tax laws and derive the best tax outcome.


In my opinion, nothing is more iconic in the Australian bush in winter than our state floral emblem, the Native Heath.

OUR NATURAL WORLD

"Truly it was to our amazement that the ailing said that they were well. Being Europeans we thought we had given away to Doctors and Priests our ability to heal, but here it was, still in our possessionit was ours after all, we were more than we had thought we were". So said Alvar Nunez de Vaca to the King of Spain in the early Sixteenth century.

What does this mean? It means that healing potential often lies within us rather than being imposed by others, whatever they are called. History is replete with cases of people being cured of the most dread diseases by forces we do not always understand or comprehend, and many and varied are the explanations given to these events in an

attempt to give logic to happenings that do not respond to human reason.

The paradox of health and illness co-existing is one that perplexes most everyone at some stage of life, and is well illustrated by this little story written by a thoughtful lady. "When I was a small child, my sister and I used to play a game we invented, called Perfect Leaf. We would go into the backyard search diligently for a leaf on any tree or shrub that was perfect. The first person to find one was the winner. This may sound unbelievable but the game could go on for hours, particularly in late summer and winter. By then almost all the leaves were imperfect --- chewed by insects, shrivelled on the edges, marred in endless ways.

Perfect Leaf was more than a game. It taught us a lesson we didn't know we were learning at the time — that beauty and ugliness, perfection and imperfection, can co-exist——not only in the same leaf, but probably in ourselves as well."

When healing is discussed at all, away from the professional areas, prayer and appeals to higher powers comes into play. There is no question that prayer can, and does, bring about healing in many people, and is usually labelled "spontaneous remission" by the Medical Profession. This phrase simply means they don't know why, and placates Professional pride for something inexplicable. Large and ongoing studies particularly in the last 50

years, prove that healing through prayer does work, but not for everyone, and therein lay the real mystery. If for one, why not for all?



Dental Health for Cats and Dogs

Caring for our teeth and gums is part of our daily routine. We brush our teeth to remove "plaque" (scum that accumulates on teeth). In the wild, dogs clean their teeth when they pull flesh off the animal they have hunted and killed and then chew on the bones. Just like you, your pet needs dental care too. Has your pet got:

- * Bad breath
- * Visible hard brown tartar on the teeth
- * Red inflamed gums
- * Loss of appetite
- * Dribbling, difficulty in chewing or pawing at the face.

There are some things you can do to contribute to your pet's dental health at home. These include:

Bones are a great way to keep teeth clean and should be given to pets twice a week for dental exercise. Large bones that are chewed on and not eaten, or brisket bones that are cartilage and so don't splinter are recommended for dogs. Raw chicken necks are best for cats.

Regular brushing helps reduce plaque build up. Special toothpastes are available. Human toothpaste should not be used.

A variety of toys are available that will keep your pet's teeth clean.

Pet food formulated to clean teeth and reduce signs of periodontal disease is also available. A good example of this is Hills T/D diet. This is a prescription dog food which grips the tooth rather than shatters as the dog or cat chews it.

Prevention is better than cure. A thorough oral exam should be performed every time your pet receives its yearly vaccinations. Inadequate care of dog and cat teeth is the most common problem seen by yets

LOANS AVAILABLE TO LOW INCOME EARNERS

Cardinia Combined Churches Caring (4C's) the emergency food bank for the Cardinia Shire wishes to announce our new "No interest Loan scheme" that we are providing to all low income earners in the shire. who are in desperate need to purchase white goods. such as refrigerators or washing machines.

For the low income earner. it is often necessary to use credit for the purchase of essential items, as it is virtually impossible for most of them to save the full purchase price of household goods. The cost of consumer credit for low income earners has long been recognised as a poverty trap by welfare and consumer groups. Other possible options available for obtaining essential items have а number of drawbacks, as second-hand purchases can prove to be highly uneconomical due to

costly repairs or have highenergy usage due to defect equipment and this in turn leads to more financial costs.

We believe that by offering "no interest loans" within the shire we will help low income earners avoid other more problematic credit options, such as payday lenders, pawnbrokers or in some cases credit cards. These loans will enable people to participate in the market place on fair and equitable terms, restoring dignity, giving a degree empowerment and a vital credit record.

Loans are available to low income earners who have lived at their current shire address for the last 6 months and repayments are made fortnightly via their Centrelink payments.





A fishing trip has been organised for early October


