INTERSTATE SUCCESS FOR HPV TEAM

A group of dedicated and enthusiastic students, parents and teachers from Beaconsfield Primary School Human Powered Vehicle Team travelled to Adelaide, to compete in their first interstate HPV event -The Australian Human Powered Vehicle Super Series Telstra 200. The 6 hour HPV Race was held on Sunday 26th July utilizing sections of the ex Grand Prix track at Victoria Park.

In only their second year of Human Powered Vehicle competitions, Beaconsfield Primary School had two teams finish a creditable 6th and 14th in the primary school category 1 section.

Beaconsfield and Berwick Primary School represented Victoria, with both schools making a big commitment to taking a combined total of 86 riders and support crew of parents and teachers with 6 HPV bikes across the border for the 4 day trip.

After the race, Beaconsfield Team Manager and teacher, Mark McKelson, couldn't hide his enthusiasm; "We want to do it again."

PROGRESS ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I hope all of you are well and healthy, especially during these cold winter days!

Since my last President's report, we have had the serious issue relating to the pine trees along Emerald-Beaconsfield Road becoming a safety concern, more new development along the Princes Hwy and increasing problems with car parking and the standard of the facilities at our railway station.

In regards to the pine trees along Emerald Beaconsfield

Rd, a community / resident's meeting was arranged on Saturday the 10th of July at the wetlands reserve in the Berwick View Estate to allow the residents to discuss and decide on the future of the trees. After discussing the issues and having Mayor Gary Runge and a consulting Aborist present to answer questions posed by the residents', it was decided the trees were a safety issue and they have to be removed. A small committee, consisting of residents, Mayor Runge and Wendy (aborist) was

established to work together to decide what sort of trees will be planted to replace the pine trees. We hope that we receive some details in the next issue of the Banner to report to the community.

Furthermore, we have not yet received a formal response from Connex, whom are responsible for the Pakenham Line and the maintenance of the railway stations that run along the line, in regards to our request for maintenance to be conducted on the car parking. Due to the recent rains, residents have reported increased pot holes and insufficient parking spaces created as a result of more commuters using the station. We have sent a follow up letter to ensure that our concerns are heard and addressed.

On a different matter, I would like to encourage fellow residents in our community to take part in a 'Clean Up Burgess Park' day to be held on Saturday

the 14th August at 10.00am at the park. It has been brought to the BPA's attention that the park has not been maintained and is dire need of a clean up.

The BPA with its members have decided, in the true sense of community spirit, to arrange a day where members of the community can give a few hours of their valuable time to maintain this great town of ours and show how much we do care for Beaconsfield! So, bring your tongs, gloves and raincoats and join us on the day! There will also be sausage sizzle for those volunteers at the end of the clean up!

Again, I would also like to take this opportunity to encourage and welcome any new resident, trader and member of our community to attend our monthly meetings held on the third Tuesday night at 7.30pm at the Beaconsfield Community Centre located on Beaconsfield Avenue, as the purpose of these meetings are for our residents to voice any concerns they may have or even any change they would like see within our community. These meetings are open to everyone!



CARDINIA YOUR LINK WITH COUNCIL

Hello all, I thought I would run through a number of issues in the township which have an impact on us all. Firstly, the trees on the Beaconsfield-Emerald Road opposite the tennis courts. I recently called a community consultation morning at the rotunda near the trees to explain the situation. The trees are 80-100 years old and are unfortunately dying at a fast rate. As you know two have already fallen down and they are a real safety threat to traffic and people using the park area.

All present at the meeting agreed that the trees needed to be removed as soon as possible, but they must be replaced by mature trees which in a few years time will create another new entry along the road. The meeting was followed up by another, at which about a dozen concerned residents discussed the species of tree to be selected. Tenders have been called to remove the trees and with community input we will replant after they are removed.

I have discussed the issue with the Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary group and they are aware of the proposal. Thanks to all who have assisted with this issue and thanks for your advice.


Work has commenced on Connecting Cardinia, the construction and sealing of 50 kilometres of unsealed local roads in the shire. This innovative roads improvement program involves a long term contract with Works Infrastructure P/ L to design, construct and maintain 13 local arterial roads at a cost to Council of \$17 million. It is pleasing to see that the following roads have been identified in first group for the construction.

Split Road Road (Leadbetter rd – Beaconsfield Emerald rd) 1.5kms
Brown road (Officer Upper Beaconsfield rd – Toomuc Valley rd) 4.8kms
Officer Upper Beaconsfield rd (Full length) 4.1 kms
Payne rd (From seal on O'Neil rd – seal on Payne rd) 2.8 kms

Congratulations to the Beaconsfield. Junior Football club for all the hard work the mums and dads do to make this such a successful club. Both my boys played with the BJFC and I have fond memories of waving the flags on the Beaconsfield Upper Football ground. The sponsors day jumper presentation on 31/07/2004 was great and was a demonstration to the clubs sponsors of how much they are appreciated.



BEACONSFIELD IN CASEY RESIDENT ACTION GROUP

B.I.C.R.AG

B.I.C.R.A.G has continued to push for action and results on several issues that effect environmental, transport and safety matters in our area. The two most pressing issues since B.I.C.R.A.G's inception have been:-

1/ The urgent need for appropriate Sound/Safety Barriers along the Soldiers Road/Brookvale Estate sector of the Berwick By Pass;

2/ The prioritising of funds for the building of a vehicular railway overpass in Brwyn Marr Boulevard.

The long standing push for sound/safety barriers realised some hope, on Monday the 12th July 2004, VicRoads two representatives. James KERNER and John FITZ, inspected the Berwick By Pass with B.I.C.R.A.G spokesperson Ray FLEMING and fellow representative Peter NEALE. The many damaged sections of cyclone fencing, the constant traffic noise and emissions, and the overall unsatisfactory portions of original fencing, were all inspected by the VicRoads reps. It became clear to the VicRoads reps that a minimum of twelve foot high modern fencing system was required along the critical area effected by daily pedestrian crossing of the freeway and where the high and unacceptable level of traffic noise and emissions have rendered some local residents quite ill (medical documentation available re these residents' claims). B.I.C.R.A.G will settle for nothing less than a modern sound/safety barrier system similar to what one sees along the Hallam By Pass. We await updates from VicRoads and will certainly

keep readers informed of any developments. If any reader has suffered a health problem related to the traffic noise/emissions from the Berwick By Pass (medically documented preferably) please feel free to contact B.I.C.R.A.G spokesperson Ray FLEMING on 0407.530.037.

Perhaps B.I.C.R.A.G's most disappointing moment to date was finally getting an audience with Transport Minister Peter BATCHELOR regarding a submission to obtain urgent funding to help build the Brwyn Marr Boulevard railway overpass. After almost 18 months of promises of this meeting eventuating. we informed by the Minister that such funding was not a State responsibility but a Federal one! What frustrated B.I.C.R.A.G even more was the realization that this ruling was apparently known some time before our eventual meeting, thus wasting B.I.C.R.A.G's valuable time and effort which would have been better directed at pushing for funding at the appropriate governmental level. B.I.C.R.A.G continues to push for funding to ensure that the Brwyn Marr Boulevard Railway Overpass is given the utmost urgency, as all residents, businesses and other organizations living and using our roadways would gladly welcome a new road WITH A RAILWAY OVERPASS to take traffic to and from the Princes Highway and the Soldiers Road / Kangan Drive roundabout.



Against Vue de Monde, for us fringe dwellers, is the fight with nearby Lygon St patrons for a parking spot and the one hour each way

has a passion. BullsRaw and Chef Jason Bradford backed by Sarah James are that combination. It is too early to rate after two visits but we were very impressed and of course a one km drive and no parking problems coupled with BYO sweetens the package.

The menu is in two sections. The first mainly concentrates on the finest quality seafood (WA Scampi, WA Leader Prawns and Barramundi) mixed with duckling, kangaroo and chicken. Japanese flavours, methods and ingredients are to the fore.

The second section or char grill features some of the finest steak available. Cooked on an intensely hot grill and presented with a smoky char on the outside

and pink inside with a Japanese pepper sauce was my choice of main on our second visit.

Must mention an appetiser combination Anne and I shared; called "Four Tastes" @ \$6 per person, it was as described, each taste arriving on its own small dish. Char grilled baby octopus, marinated mushrooms (to die for), vegetables somewhat like ratatouille and four biscuit shaped pieces of deep fried belly pork. A fabulous start. Anne followed with a dish of Duckling Stir-fry. Delicious was the verdict.



RAILWAY STATION NEWS

by Tammy Lobato, MP, member for Gembrook

The railway station at Beaconsfield is a vital part of the infrastructure of the town and it was recently announced that some changes are in store that will improve the facility for users.

As part of the Bracks Government's agreement with Connex Beaconsfield Trains, Railway Station is now included on the list of 22 stations that will be staffed, on a rotating basis, in the afternoon peak travel period. This will improve not only service but also, importantly, the safety and security around the station.

The pedestrian crossing at Beaconsfield Railway Station is scheduled to be upgraded in 2005. This upgrade will incorporate newly developed disability access design standards so that it will meet the needs of all members of our community.

A study is also being undertaken to audit the facilities and the conditions of interchanges at stations. This will include examining the carparking facilities, bike facilities, shelters and seating.

Fantastic news for cyclists is that, as of early next year, bike lockers at all railway stations will be made available free of charge. There will be an extra 250 bike lockers installed at stations on metropolitan

lines, giving a total of 850 lockers for bike storage. This means that it will be more affordable for cyclists to travel with both the use of lockers and the carriage of bicycles on trains being free. The use of pollutionfree bikes is also great for both the environment and the health of people in our community. Having free lockers available also takes away the worry about theft or vandalism of bicycles.

Of course, it is important that in encouraging the use of bicycles, this is coupled with attention to an adequate bicycle network. Local government has an important role here, along with the State Government. 30% of the metropolitan Principle Bicycle Network already been completed along with 63% of regional Priority Bicycle Routes.

The Department Infrastructure is also currently developing a strategy for park and ride on the metropolitan rail network which will be used as the basis for prioritising future car park programs.



THE VOICE OF THE BAPTIST CHURCH

THE MOST IMPORTANT QUESTION.

Last month Ronald Reagan died. Newsweek summed him up as the man who changed the world. Reagan brought to an end the cold war. He oversaw the end of the bitter struggle with the USSR.

Born in 1911 he died at the age of 93. He was the son of an alcoholic shoe salesman. His first wife (Jane Wyman) left him, he was never close to his children.

His first job was as a lifeguard. But his mum pushed him to do a small spot on the stage at their local community hall. Reagan loved the experience and decided on a career in acting. He moved to Hollywood and went on to become a midlevel start.

In the early 1950s at about the time his acting career was flagging he married Nancy Davis. She proved to be a powerful support. He switched from films to TV becoming something of a local TV star.

However the most significant career change took place in 1966 when he entered politics as the governor of California. The man had found is calling.

He came to the presidency at the age of 70. An age many thought was too late in life for the stresses and strains of the role. But he proved equal to the task. The Reagan years saw the USSR implode. By the time Reagan left the White House there was only one Super power. By 1991 the old Soviet Union was dead. The pulling down of the Berlin wall being one of the most obvious fruits. Reagan's hard line approach, his willingness to keep up the pressure, his determination to see the Soviet Union back down paid off.

In one particular interview in which a number of folk were firing questions at him someone asked something along the lines, "if you were to die and stand before God. what would you offer to God as the reason to be accepted by Him?" Until this point Reagan had been answering the questions rapidly. But to this question he went silent. He sat there and said nothing for a full 45 seconds. Then slowly, he sat up straight and said in sombre tones, "I don't deserve to go to Heaven. The only thing that I could say would be, "for God so loved the world, that he gave His only Son, that whosoever believes in him should no perish, but have everlasting life".

Great life, ordinary life, nice life, not so nice life. No matter what sort of a life we have lived the only reason any of us have to believe that God will accept us is the fact that Jesus has died for us. The only real question is "do you believe?"

TAX RETURN TIME AGAIN

Many people will be contemplating the preparation of their 2004 income tax returns and may wish to consider the following:

- If you owned shares in AMP Ltd then it is necessary to make capital gains tax calculations resulting from the demerger by AMP of HHG PLC and the associated AMP rights offer.

The transactions are reasonably complex however help is available by using the online calculator by visiting www.ato.gov.au and select Rates & Calculators **AMP** Demerger Calculator. You will need the Statement provided by AMP and also details of purchases of AMP Shares other than from the original demutalisation or dividend re-investments.

The Calculator is user friendly and will save time and worry. The Calculator will also calculate a cost base for AMP and HHG PLC Shares.

- For taxpayers who have made an undeducted contribution to a Superannuation Fund and are eligible for the Government Co-Contribution of up to \$1,000 then the taxpayer must lodge a 2004 income tax return and the Co-

Contribution will be paid to the Superannuation Fund after the Fund has lodged the Members Contribution Statements, which are usually due by 31st October.

- Individuals who earn personal services income (PSI) through a personal services entity will now be allowed to deduct a PSI loss made by that entity against their other income in their 2004 income tax return. The amount then becomes non-deductible in the personal services entity.
- individual An receiving a meal allowance on a PAYG Statement must declare this as assessable income. If the amount paid for is an overtime meal allowance in accordance with an Industrial Award then a deduction is allowed for employees of up to the amount spent on meals etc (\$19.75 maximum however deductions is excess of \$19.75 must substantiated in full by receipts and supporting documentation). deduction is allowed where the meal allowance is not separatelyshown on the PAYG Statement. Self employed persons must substantiate the full amount of meal costs eg. interstate truck drivers working on a sub-contract basis.

- Claims for car expenses and in particular the cents per kilometre basis, are likely to be scrutinised this year. You should ensure that claims are made for a vehicle actually owned by you and the calculation of the distance travelled can be supported. If the vehicle is not owned by you, a claim

can only be made for expenses paid eg. fuel.

If taxpayers are not sure of the contents of their tax return they should seek advice from the Australian Taxation Office or a Registered Tax-Agent.




UPPER BEACONSFIELD INDIGENOUS NURSERY.

The nursery continues to be busy and to bring in funds for the Landcare group. We work within a network of local indigenous nurseries and look forward to including the new C.E.C nursery in this. The demand for indigenous plants continuing to grow and there is still much unmet demand. I would like to think this means the majority of local people value their indigenous vegetation but know that the amount of clearing occurring in Cardinia far outstrips the amount of revegetation. With the pressure of urban development in the growth corridor this will only increase.

Apart from Landcare most plants go to Friends groups and to many local schools, many with large new campuses, who are aware of the value of local plants, as well as to the Shire of Cardinia and the City of Casey for planting into parks. 

FRIENDS OF THE CARDINIA CREEK SANCTUARY

September is Threatened Species Month. One of Australia's well-known threatened species, the Helmeted Honeyeater, was once a resident of Beaconsfield. It was once found throughout the Pakenham/Westernport area and around the mid-Yarra region. It lived in forests dominated by Mountain, Swamp and Manna Gums with a dense understorey of Scented Paperbark and Woolly Teatree for protection. It would build nests in the dense shrubs and feed on insects, manna (sap) and nectar from the gum trees. It required its habitat to be intact, as it would not leave its territory to find food when rearing young. It was first discovered in 1867, and within 50 years, it had disappeared from most of its range as a result of habitat destruction. The species survived along the Cardinia Creek in small numbers until the Ash Wednesday bushfires in 1983, which killed many birds and destroyed its habitat. Today the species is only found in Yellingbo, Bunyip State Park and Healesville Sanctuary.

Beaconsfield is still home to some rare and threatened species. The Powerful Owl is a large, nocturnal bird that visits our local area in search of food. It is threatened by the destruction of its forest habitat. It nests in large tree hollows and feeds on ringtail possums, sugar gliders, birds and large

insects. The Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna Reserve and surrounding area is also home to a threatened species of fish called the Dwarf Galaxias, and the Wedge-tailed Eagle, which is a rare species in our region.

It is not only animals that are on our threatened species lists. Many native plants have become threatened as a result of land clearing, grazing and development. The Hooker's Fescue is a species of grass that is found in the reserve and is a threatened species in Victoria. The reserve is home to another 33 plants that are rare in our region (Gippsland / Greater Melbourne) and another 7 plants that are rare in the Berwick-Pakenham area.

The conservation of threatened species is a responsibility of the entire community, and we can all play a part in protecting our local habitat. The Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary assists the Cardinia Shire Council to care for the Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna Reserve on Emerald Road in Beaconsfield. New members of all ages are always welcome. We have working bees on the fourth Sunday of each month. 9am - 12 noon, meet at the carpark opposite Holm Park Rd. Morning tea is provided.

PUPPIES

In a series of articles we will be looking at puppies about them, how to look after them and giving them the correct veterinary attention. Can newborn puppies

see?

All puppies are born with their eyes closed and so cannot see. Puppies start to open their eyes at about 10-12 days old.

What colour are puppies' eyes?

All puppies are born with grey eyes which will not change to the adult colour until about 12 weeks of age.

What age will the puppy be able to hear?

Although puppies may respond to vibrations they will not begin to hear until about two weeks old. As they cannot see or hear puppies are born with a fully developed sense of smell which allows them to locate their mother for a feed. They also seek out the warmth of her body.

At what age do puppies

Puppies are unable to walk when born and will drag themselves to the mother for a feed.

At approximately three weeks they will be able to walk and by 4 5 weeks they will run.

Are puppies born with teeth?

All puppies are born without teeth but by the age of 8 weeks they will have their milk teeth. The permanent teeth appear between 12-18 weeks.


What age do puppies start to play?

Puppies begin to play with their litter at about 3-4 weeks old and at 6-8 weeks will chase and wrestle each other.

When should a puppy have its first vaccinations?

Puppies should have their first vaccinations for the dog diseases Canine Hepatitis, Distemper and Canine Parvo Virus at 6 weeks old, with the next vaccination at 12-14 weeks






