DECISION BY VCAT

Residents of Mahon Avenue are pleased with the result given by Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) on February 3rd 2005 when they upheld Cardinia Shires decision to refuse a permit for development of a Mahon Ave site.

The proposal (as amended) involved the development of the site with 20 dwellings, 4 x single story detached dwellings, 10 x 2- storey dwellings, both attached and detached, and 6 x 3- storey dwellings in three buildings. A single access was proposed from Mahon Avenue and 9 visitor spaces to be provided, 3 in mid-site and 6 on the eastern boundary.

Following its consideration of all material placed before it and having visited the site on two occasions, the tribunal considered that the key issues to be addressed in the review were:

- * Neighbourhood character including the issue of overdevelopment of the site.
- * Infrastructure
- * Local amenity and specifically visual bulk and overlooking

In the Tribunal's view, it is a site which could be developed for a slightly greater than normal density. However, because of the topography of the site and its relationship with surrounding development, it will require a much more careful, sensitive and innovative approach than that demonstrated in the proposal.

The tribunial findings have been made available.

Hello everyone. I closed last year by thanking everyone for the support I received during 2004. I now look forward to 2005 having been re-appointed as the Mayor for a second term. My first term as Mayor was a real learning experience and I feel very confident that I can take that experience and turn it into practice within the Beacon Hills ward and the Shire of Cardinia.

The new route will be assessed over the next few months and some minor modifications may need to be attended to, but in the meantime I trust it will be well accept by the community.

The next stage in the traffic strategy is the provision of a safe crossing over the Old Princes Highway at our shopping centre. I have raised this matter at council level and have met with Vicroads officers on site. A safe pedestrian crossing or more importantly full traffic light signalisation at Wood Street would provide a safe crossing for all residents. I will continue to work towards this next step to make a safer Beaconsfield.

The new Beaconsfield Community Complex is beginning to get more use with the new Kindergartens opening in Term one 2005. It was great to see so many parents turn up for the working bee to help create the playground. Congratulations to the Committee of Management and all those who helped out.




Over the 28 years Ron has been dedicated to looking after the community of Beaconsfield and has worked tirelessly for the brigade.



BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE NEWS

Firefighters from the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade have been kept busy since Christmas with a number of call outs. Significant fires and incidents have included:

- * A grassfire in the Panorama Estate, which burnt quickly across a number of vacant housing blocks. The fire was started by the heat of the exhaust system of a car parked on a nature strip with long grass. Three tankers from Beaconsfield and Officer were required to control the fire.
- * A crew being sent to the fire at Fulham near the Grampians in western Victoria in early January to assist in fighting the largest fire in Victoria so far this summer.
- *Ascrub fire in Vernon Road to the north of the Beaconsfield township, which is likely to have started from smouldering material from a burn off several days earlier. Five tankers from Beaconsfield, Upper Beaconsfield, Berwick and Officer were required to control the fire.
- * A truck accident on the Princes Freeway near the

- turn off to Beaconsfield which involved the clean up of a large diesel spill from a ruptured fuel tank.
- * A house fire in Cooinda Road in the early hours of the morning on 29 January. The residents were away at the time of the fire that totally destroyed the house and could be seen from over ten kilometres away. Seven firefighting appliances from Beaconsfield, Beaconsfield, Berwick and Narre Warren were involved in fighting the fire, including trucking in water from several kilometres away due to there being no fire hydrants in the Cooinda Road area.

The risk of bushfires or grassfires through to the end of April is high and the community is urged to take care to ensure their actions do not cause a fire.

In particular:

- * Observe any fire restrictions in force.
- * Never leave a fire (including a solid fuel barbeque) unattended and ensure it is cool to touch before leaving.
- * Avoid driving vehicles through long dry grass.







When we left the end of 2004, the issue of erecting sound/safety barriers along the Berwick Bypass area near the Soldiers Rd/ Brookvale Estate section, was in the hands of the member for Gembrook Ms Tammy Lobato. A number of questions from BICRAG regarding when we were to see the barriers being erected, were forwarded to the Minister for Transport office by Ms Lobato for the office's attention. To date we await a response and will continue to liaise with Ms Lobato with a view of hopefully seeing the barriers moving from just one of 25 similar Vicroads projects to a priority matter that has



W I N E & F O O D

With fishing you are always learning and recently whilst fishing with Len Gerdsen we caught what one called arrow squid and the other aeroplane squid. So out came the standard reference, 'The Australian Seafood Handbook' from the CSIRO which usually ends all discussion. It turns

out that both names apply to the same fish, officially called Gould's Squid but a foot note led to important info on cooking methods.

Commonly we refer to squid and/or calamari as the being same thing; well in a pile at the fishmongers they can look the same though the calamari will be dearer and should be skinned and cooked quickly, say 2 minutes and squid (and octopus) require around 60 minutes of poaching or braising. So how do we tell the difference? First if you trust the fishmonger, ask, or if not then a basic difference is that the Arrow Squid has a long slender narrow and arrow shaped head and difficult to remove skin, it freezes well. The Southern Calamari has a much rounder head and the skin

is easily removed. Why am I telling you all of this? Recently Len and I returned from that early morning fish with arrows, so what to do with them. First the above book for ID then to my seafood reference cookbook. 'Jean Jacques Seafood' (remember Jean Jacques of North Melbourne) recommended a simple but truly fabulous dish which we will long remember.

First clean the squid. Run your finger round inside the head to free the intestines. Pull head from body, slowly. Cut off tentacles between the eyes and beak. Discard the head and intestines. Rinse under tap. Unless a very large squid of 2 kg or more do not cut into rings. To cook: for 1 kg squid or octopus you will need; 2




tablespoons olive oil, a few peppercorns, some sprigs of fresh herbs. I used lemon thyme, oregano and some Italian parsley and celery tops. In total about 2 handfuls and lastly 2 cloves of unpeeled garlic.

Place all ingredients into a large casserole dish with a tight fitting lid or cover tightly Alfoil. Mix with ingredients until squid well oiled. Cook in a 125c oven for 1 hour. While cooking mix a vinaigrette made from a good handful of chopped parsley, virgin olive, lemon juice and about 12 kalamatta olives that you stone and half. Remove the hot squid from the pan cut into bite sized pieces and toss in the vinaigrette while hot. Serve over a mixed salad containing some red leaves. The squid skin will take on a rich red colour during cooking and the flesh will remain a beautiful contrasting white.Looks great on the plate.

Enjoy with a bottle of Riesling or Sauvignon Blanc. The 2004 New Zealand Sauvignon Blancs are all very good.



Tsunami Disaster Reconstruction

The tragic tsunami event cast a pall over the start of the new year for all of us. Local residents have been generous in donating to the cause with one bank branch in Berwick collecting over \$50,000 in donations. The **Bracks Government has** established a \$10 million Tsunami Disaster Reconstruction Fund which will support medium to long term rebuilding projects over the next 3 to 5 years.

On Tuesday 8th February, a meeting was held with local residents and Parliamentary Secretary in the Office of the Minister for Transport, Carlo Carli MP, to discuss the Beaconsfield railway station upgrade. Topics for discussion included the pedestrian crossing upgrade and the condition of facilities at the station. Feedback provided by residents is a vital part of the process for this upgrade, and is a way of ensuring infrastructure upgrades are

meeting the needs of all members of the community.

With the school year now back in full swing, I was delighted that the Education Maintenance Allowance has been increased by the Bracks Government to assist low-income families to meet the needs of educating their children. This allowance will now also be indexed to inflation. The \$400 amount for secondary school students and \$200 for primary school students

helps meets the costs of books, excursions and uniforms and ensures all children have access to educational opportunities.

Late last year, the Treasurer, The Hon. John Brumby MP, removed land tax from caravan parks to help keep accommodation affordable for both holiday makers and long-term residents such as pensioners and retirees. The managers of Blue Gum Caravan Park in nearby

Officer, Mark and Rhonda Bell, have said this tax exemption will allow them to further improve the facilities at the park and will keep prices down. Tax reforms are set to continue: over the next 5 years, over \$1 billion dollars in land tax will be cut to keep jobs, businesses and investment strong.

Jot down Sunday 20 November in your diary as it will be a special countdown day as we head towards the Commonwealth Games in The 2006. Bracks Government has funded a \$4.5 million Getting Involved program to enable residents throughout Victoria to take part in a host of healthy activities in the lead-up to the games. All municipalities have applied for funding to host events on this day, which will range from swimming carnivals, fund runs and dancing classes. A particular focus is being placed on involving young people, older citizens and people with a disability to ensure all members of our community have the opportunity to participate in the fun. Those wishing to get even more involved can apply to be a volunteer through the Commonwealth Games Volunteer Program. Applications are open now at www.melbourne2006.com.au It will be a fantastic opportunity for those involved no doubt, and, experience of a lifetime.



SALLY'S GARDEN



CACTI & SUCCULENTS

If your garden has an area that receives the hot afternoon sun and the soil is always very dry, try making it into a rock garden or simply a cacti growing area.

Cacti come in various shapes, colours, prickles and hairs, and need to be handled very carefully as some of these fine hairs are very difficult to extract if they penetrate the skin.

All the small cacti can be grown in pots, which can be dug into the ground (half way up the pots) and then all the garden area scattered with pebbles to make the area look professional and neat and tidy. When it is time to divide the plants, take the pot out of the ground, as it becomes so much easier to handle each individual plant.

Borders can be planted with mini cabbage like plants called Echeveria, commonly known as Hen & Chickens. Flowers are small orange and yellow.

The Orbea variegatta-Starfish or Toad cactus- is a remarkable flat star flower, originally from southern Africa. Grows to about 7.cm across, in an extraordinary colour scheme of pale yellow all mottled and streaked with brown and purple. Unfortunately it has a very pungent smell but is very attractive in appearance.

Lithops are curious little plants known as Living Stones, and are often hard to distinguish from the pebbles scattered about them in nature. You can reproduce their environment in shallow containers of sandy potting soil with extra gravel for drainage. Top with a layer of river pebbles and place a few polished stones here and there around them. The single, daisy-like flowers, which may be twice as large as the plant, appear in autumn.

Melocactus neryli, commonly known as Turk's Fez, has a bizarre beauty, as do the fluffy, hairy Mammarillarias.

The smaller cacti can be placed at the foot of a tall cacti, such as the old man cacti, or can be planted in the front area with the taller larger plants behind them in a more landscaped style.

Before deciding on the size or shape of the rockery, it would be wise to attend a cacti nursery to decide on colour, shape and type of cacti that appeals to you.

A rockery can liven up a dry area with bounteous colour.





FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS DESK

INCOME FROM OVERSEAS

If you are an Australian Resident for income tax purposes then you are required to include income from all sources derived in Australia and from overseas unless the income is specifically exempt. Examples of taxable overseas income would include pensions, annuities, superannuation payments, interest. dividends, Capital Gains and possibly Wages and Salaries. A tax credit is allowed for any foreign income tax paid on this income. Exempt income includes employees working on an approved overseas project.


Foreign income and foreign tax credits if applicable are converted into Australian currency at either the rate applicable when the income is received in an Australian Bank Account or when the income was earned. If income is not remitted during the year, then the exchange rate at the end of the financial year is used as a basis of conversion.

Australia has entered into treaties with many countries whereby both countries provide relief from double taxation. Specified rates of withholding tax normally apply to Dividends, Interest and Royalties. Salaries and Wages are normally taxed in the country of source if the person is present for more than one half of the financial year. If the employee derives wages and salaries income overseas but has lived in that country for less than one-half of the year then the income is generally assessable in Australia but an income tax credit allowed for foreign tax credit of up to the amount of the applicable Australian income tax.

All Australians who are residents of Australia for income tax purposes should ensure that they include income from foreign sources including interest, dividends, royalties and possibly wages and salaries in their income tax returns and only claim allowable foreign tax credits. If in doubt you should seek the services of your Accountant or Registered Tax Agent.



- ❖The Mornington Farmers Society held its Jubilee Show at Berwick in November 1906.
- ❖ Name changed to Berwick and District Agricultural and Horticultural Society in 1918.
- ❖ It was reported in Australasian of 24th November 1906 that:
- "Next to the Ayrshires was the wonderful collection of ponies, ridden mostly by girls in a style that their mothers would have thought excessively bold and masculine. Girls and ponies were everywhere, pink cheeked girls, with flying curls and flop hats,

all riding exceeding fat ponies. It was a picnic as much as a show."

- ♦In 1938 saw the change of Show Day from Thursday to Saturday.
- ❖ It was traditionally a Spring Show but in 1959 this changed to the current format.
- ♦It was in 1975 that the event became a two-day

The Show has had a number of changes since it began and has faced a variety of adversities including rain (floods), heat and worst of all the Ash Wednesday Fires.

The Berwick Show has evolved over the decades with plenty of hard work from the volunteer committees. Recent rains created much have discussion for this years show committee as they prepare for the show to be held on Saturday 26th and Sunday 27th February. 2005.

OUR NATURAL WORLD

They say that travel broadens the mind while it shrinks the wallet and both are probably true. A pre-Christmas tour of the South American continent and some Pacific Islands gave my wife and I a wealth of knowledge and some understanding of the cultures and political and economic conditions under which the various peoples live and work. The overwhelming impression of our travels was that people were friendly and helpful to strangers often going out of their way to help us out if we struck some minor difficulty. The fact that many were poor and uneducated made no

difference; they wanted to help and more than happy to do so. Smiles came easily and without being forced. Poverty is the norm in most countries and making a living is a daily grind which they seem to accept as their lot. Beggars line the streets in some cities and having no social security schemes and with unemployment rife, whole families are reduced to this way of life. Toddlers who can barely stand are taught early to beg for money, a confronting sight for a member of our humane society.

They do have pride though as we found in Brazil. Shoe

shine men in the streets all wore balaclavas over their head and it was explained to us that having lost their normal jobs they wished to hide their shame by wearing these "terrorist masks", a strange sight indeed.

To balance it out the geographical and ancient structural sights can only be described as breathtaking, to numerous list here. Α predominantly Catholic continent there are churches and cathedrals everywhere and many are truly magnificent and seem to represent the main hope of the people, as little else Gold leaf can. wonderful frescos abound and there is always ongoing restoration work. The cities are usually huge with populations that make our own here look like small villages. Sao Paulo, Brazil, boasts

population of 17 million, only 3 million short of Australia's total population. The countryside is generally sparsely populated where people eke out a precarious living usually without electricity and running water. Medical services are unknown in the rural areas and people rely on traditional herbalists and midwives for basic help. The cities have Hospitals but in the main all people must pay for services.

No Medicare here. A pleasant surprise was the quality of the various airlines we travelled on. (Thirteen separate flights in all, some long hall) Modern planes, clean, great pilots and cabin crews and pretty much keeping to schedules. The top hotels were as good as you could get anywhere and the food was excellent.

Whilst not ignoring the crime that exists, as it does in all countries and cultures, listening to local guides and using common sense enabled us to enjoy an amazing journey, and confirming that a common thread runs through all

peoples. The desire for basic needs, family unity, and hope for the future together with a religious or philosophical foundation smooth over the sharp edges of life. Treating others with courtesy and respect begets the same in return and crosses the barriers of race and status, economic or otherwise.

Truly every man is your brother, and that will never change.





CARDINIA CATCHMENT LANDCARE

After a few weeks break we are getting set for another busy year. Our first event for the year is at Cardinia Civic Centre for Australia Day, where together with other Landcare groups throughout Cardinia Shire we will be participating in a Plant Giveaway and information session. This event will be over by the time you read this.

Summer is not the time to be planting but at the Upper Beaconsfield Indigenous Nursery we are "pricking out' seedlings in readiness for autumn. Our plants are on a watering system so with the warm weather are growing well. If you are wanting to plant understorey, midstorey or upperstorey species we have the lot, specifically for your area. Call in on any Friday between 10.30am to 5pm for advice.If you have a front or back garden consider planting a section to indigenous plants, or plant them amongst your other plants. This way you will enjoy the company of our beautiful native birds and butterflies. You might be interested in converting your nature strip to native tussock grasses and wildflowers - no more grass cutting and a much more interesting look.

Anyone needing help with large plantings is encouraged seek Landcare assistance. Landcare will help with the costs of fencing off remnant vegetation from stock or fencing waterways and wetlands. The cost of plants, guards and stakes are covered and volunteers, including other landowners who have had work done on their properties will assist with planting. This way we can plant out 500 plants in a morning and enjoy the experience. This is our third year of operation and we are

to visit our first three properties next week to see the results of our efforts. It is exciting to see the growth and hear of returning wildlife.

Roadsides are an area of interest for us as they often significant contain indigenous plants cleared from other areas. The Shire of Cardinia have a 'Tree scheme' Planting encourage you to restore indigenous plants and remove weeds from your roadside. You can apply for funds to do this. I am presently holding a number of Eucalypy Caladulensis(River Gums) at the nursery for planting into the wetland at **Springs** Berwick Beaconsfield/ Emerald Rd. The seed was gathered from the only remaining tree of this type in the area when the road was widened last year. In Upper Beaconsfield the Landcare group is to plant indigenous species back into the Split Rock Rd reserve to replace trees removed. In Harkaway we have worked hard to eliminate weeds and plant indigenous species into the upper reaches of Warlsdorf Creek which runs beside King Rd.

We urge you to think about the plants you put into your garden. Be sure they are not environmental weeds and will not become a problem in the bushland near you. Agapanthus is such an example. Casey and Cardinia have a new brochure available with information on weeds which is well illustrated and has information on how to tackle them. If you would like one call into the nursery or give your Council a ring.

Spyware

Narre Warren - a client turned on his computer one day and launched his web browser, just as he had every day. This time http://ninemsn.com.au/ did not automatically open. Instead, the page was a search engine he'd never heard of. My client tried changing the browser settings back to http://ninemsn.com.au/ but the search engine would return whenever he rebooted.

The Narre Warren man is yet another victim of spyware.

What Are Spyware and Adware Software?

Spyware and adware are software that is installed on your computer, generally without your knowledge, that monitors or controls your computer's use. The software may send pop-up ads, redirect you to an unrequested website while you are on the Internet, monitor your Internet activity or record your keystrokes while you are online. This recording of keystrokes may lead to identity theft or credit card fraud.

The most common type of spyware is more properly termed adware, its main goal to generate pop-up and other ads.

Browser hijackers, the kind my client got, direct users to rogue search engines.

Dialers scam users by making international phone calls that carry hefty perminute surcharges. A rare but malicious form can steal passwords and other confidential data.

The biggest method of distributing spyware is to secretly bundle it with free software that you download from the Internet. Sites that offer music sharing, videos, weather data, games, screen savers, a tool bar, or program that synchronizes your computer's clock often are paid to distribute this

spyware as adware.

A lot of people think "I'm going to get free smileys in my email or some sort of free download" without realizing the potential damage the software is going to cause. Users themselves invite spyware by breezing through prompts and not reading licensing agreements they are required to accept. Consent to spyware is often buried there!

In a technique known as driveby downloading, code embedded within pop-up adsor on Web sites that offer free songs, games or even pornography can instruct computers to begin downloading the spyware programs with minimal warning.

In the rush of doing things, people get confused and end up hitting one wrong button, and all of a sudden stuff is on your computer and you can't get it off.

The less harmless spyware programs can usually be removed manually or by running one of several antispyware tools, many free. The nastier ones, however, immunize themselves and persist which makes removal very challenging because many spyware files carry names that mimic key Windows components and even hide among them in folders typically reserved for system files.

There are some free spyware removal programs and I recommend one of the following:

LOOKING AFTER YOUR PETS IN THE HEAT

Almost half of the unwell dogs I saw the day after a recent 37C scorcher had symptoms related to "getting too hot".

Heat Stress Symptoms:

The signs can be very mild to very severe.

Mild signs - have you noticed your dog a little bit

dull the day after one of our 35C days recently?

Severe signs - heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid pulse, unsteadiness, a staggering gait, vomiting, or a deep red or purple tongue.

Treatment:

If your pet becomes overheated, you must lower his/her body temperature immediately.

Move your pet into the shade and apply cool (not cold)

water all over his/her body to gradually lower body temperature.

Apply ice packs or cold towels—to your pet's head, neck, and chest only.

Let your pet drink small amounts of cool water or lick ice cubes.

Take your pet to a veterinarian right away — it could save your pet's life. Without treatment, heat stroke can worsen over a period of days to weeks. Early treatment, even if it seems to the owner that the dog will be OK, is important

to prevent this potentially life-threatening condition.

Common sense is the most important thing with your pets and the heat. We wouldn't sit out in the direct sun with nothing to drink all day or sit in a closed car so why do this to your pets. A heat-stricken animal can die in hours, but proper care may save its life.

Pharmacy and you will see their name on the bright yellow club caps walking around town


