During the past two months, we have had Beaconsfield Ave & Station Street traffic strategy being tested, the initial steps taken towards starting our own Neigbourhood Watch and the Community Complex undergoing through some teething problems!

On the issue relating to the completion Station Street & Beaconsfield Ave street works, that make up some of the Traffic Strategy that was presented to the Council and accepted by the BPA over three years ago, we have seen that we have had some teething problems. Upon

However, thanks to many residents and council, works to improve the intersection were undertaken immediately by council and are currently working on a Longer Term solution to the matter.

In response to this, a special meeting was arranged on Tuesday the 15th of March where concerned and interested members of our community came along to listen to Senior Constable Monica Smith from the Dandenong Police station

If, we as a community, are concerned about crime occurring around us, we need to band together and be proactive in fighting crime together! The Neighbourhood Watch Report in this Banner will outline ways which you can help and be involved.

On the subject of community, I also

understand the increasing difficulty people experiencing in obtaining information relating to booking the facility, programs that are undertaken with the Beaconsfield Community Complex. These, along with many other concerns have been taken to the **Beaconsfield Community** Complex Advisory Committee, in which I have the **BPA** been Representative, and I am happy to report that Hours of Operation & contact number relating bookings have been placed on the main entrance of the complex. We are still working on other issues that are of concern, however, I would like to bear in mind that the complex is new and we have to expect initial problems. However, I can assure you that, myself and other members of the BPA. Neighbourhood Centre and Kinder are working together to get a better service for a fantastic community facility.

In closing, I would like to wish all of the members of our community good health and would like to extend an open invitation to the Anzac Day memorial services that will be held on the corner of Wood Street and Princes Hwy at 2.00pm on Sunday 24th of April.

Safety must be in the fore front of our planning. I will be advocating on your behalf to have this intersection signalised at the earliest opportunity.





## PLATYPUS GIVEN NEW HOME

During the first week of April, a small group of local residents were delighted as Geoff from the Australian Platypus Conservancy released 3 more young platypus into the Cardinia Creek following the success of last years reintroduction project.

It is believed that Platypus were found in the Cardinia Creek prior to Ash Wednesday bushfires, which destroyed creek-side vegetation, thus the platypus becoming "locally extinct". It was twenty one years later before sufficient regeneration was evident allowing for the platypus re-location project.

The newly released platypus have been fitted with a radio transmitter and APC Researchers will monitor their behaviour and movements for about a month. This information together with sightings and information from local residents ensures the continued success of the project and the overall conservation of one of the world's amazing animals.

According to Dr Melody Serena, Conservation Biologist with the Australian Platypus Conservancy, the biggest threat to the new platypus population along Cardinia Creek may well be the use of folding "operastyle" nets set to catch yabbies and spiny crayfish. "We have heard many reports of platypus dying in opera nets set in streams and rivers across Victoria. Once trapped underwater, a platypus will drown in just three minutes.

In some cases the animals probably enter the nets accidentally, and in other cases they may attracted by the presence of yabbies, which are part of their natural diet. People also need to be aware that recreational use of folding cray and yabbie nets has actually been banned along natural streams and rivers in Victoria since 2001, so setting these nets in such habitats is not only bad for wildlife but breaking the law."

Local residents who find an illegal net set along Cardinia Creek are advised to contact the Victorian Fisheries Department immediately on their 24 hour hotline number: 133 474 (13FISH).



#### BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE NEWS

#### Fire Safety in the Home

Death, injury and property loss from residential fires are a major concern throughout the year, but especially during the winter months when the number of house fires increases. As we enter the cooler autumn months, a number of fire safety actions should be undertaken in your home.

\* Smoke alarms should be regularly checked and batteries should have be replaced with the end of daylight savings at the end of March. If you have not changed your smoke alarm batteries within the last 12 months, do it now as only working smoke alarms save lives.

- \* Chimneys for fireplaces and woodheaters should be cleaned to avoid a build up of material in the chimney, and the roof space should be checked to ensure bird nests have not been established next to the chimney, as this is a common cause of fires in the home.
- \* Lint filters on clothes dryers should be cleaned after each load.
- \* Electric blankets should never be left on when no one is home. Heavy objects should not be left on the bed when the electric blanket is on.



## WINE & FOOD

The life of a Winemaker/ Vineyard owner does not get any easier. A strong dollar. increasing international competition and two years of high volume and quality across Australia means grape prices are falling and finding a market for finished wine at a fair price is difficult. We continue to see top quality wine discounted by many dollars.

Of course we the consumer benefit in the short term but I fear for the future of many small vineyards. Get to know the going rate for wine you like; watch advertisements for discounts and pounce, there are many bargains to be found and I expect this to continue for at least the next 12 months.

**REDS** - For a quality Pinot Noir at under \$10 try De Bortoli, Windy Peak, Pinot Noir 2003, \$9.85 at Vintage Cellars, you will not be disappointed, this wine will hold its own against much dearer wines. De Bortoli's, Deen De Bortoli, Shiraz Cabernet, 2003, \$7-8, recently won the Trophy at the Sydney Royal for reds under \$20. Boccaccio Cellars have just released a Clare Shiraz, called Odds On, 2002 for \$7, a terrific wine and will keep.

The best wine I saw in 2004 was the Yering Station Reserve Shiraz Viognier, 2002, selling for \$58. It won a Trophy every time it entered a wine show. Now it's little brother has been released; similar wine without the Reserve label. At \$19 at Boccaccio Cellars it is a steal. Perfumed and

enticing nose, followed by a silky mouthfeel and lasting flavour. Highly recommended.

WHITES - Christmont have recently released their 2004 Riesling, this wine just gets better and better, \$14 from Vintage Cellars, look for further discounts.


A favourite of mine with 2-3 years of bottle age is Peter Lehmann's Barossa Semillon, the 2003 is recently released at \$10-12. Our house wine over the summer has been the Yalumbe 'Y' series Viognier, it can still be found for \$8-10. A recommendation from Huon Hooke is Hardys Sir James, Vintage 2001, Sparkling which showed out at a Trade tasting against French Champagne at Double its price of around \$25, but it does get discounted.

#### **SERVICE BOOSTS**

Great news for the local community is that the emergency department at Casey Hospital is now open every day from 8am until 8pm. It will open on a full time basis in the coming months in line with the policy of bringing all departments on line incrementally. With the obstetrics open, babies are now being delivered as well, with the first birth, of Taesha Joy Westendorp, on 22 March 2005. Over 1000 babies are expected to be born there in the coming year.

Some services, like a new hospital, are obvious signs of where money is being spent. Other expenditure can be less visible but just as vital to users of a service. One of these is Home and Community Care, or HACC, which enables older people and people with disabilities to receive nursing care, delivered meals, home help and personal care services. The usual deliverers of these services are councils as well as agencies like MECWA and Cardinia Community Health Services. The Bracks Government has announced a \$127, 715 boost to these HACC services for the Cardinia area, which will enable more people to get more assistance. On top of that, there is an additional \$18,026 for allied health care services. I know this extra funding will be

welcomed by users of HACC services in Beaconsfield.

The state government has also given \$30,000 to the Shire of Cardinia to help this area celebrate the Commonwealth Games. \$10,000 has been given for the day of state-wide physical activity on 20 November 2005, the Warming up for the Games day. This will enable all Beaconsfield residents to take part in local activities. Commonwealth Games will be held from 15-26 March 2006.

With the height of summer over, fuel reduction burns have been taking place across the Port Phillip area and an extra eight fire specialists and six firefighting officers have been employed for the region. This year in Victoria, an additional \$34.1 million is being spent on extra firefighters, equipment and staff.

Bushfire preparedness is the best defence against the ravages of bushfires and these extra people and resources will assist in securing the safety of the Port Phillip region.

I will be taking part in the Beaconsfield Anzac Ceremony to be held at the Beaconsfield Cenotaph at 2pm on Sunday 24th April. I would encourage Beaconsfield residents to attend this special occasion of remembrance and I look forward to seeing you there.



#### FRINGE BENEFITS TAX

Annual Fringe Benefits Tax (FBT) returns for the year ended 31st March, 2005 are due for lodgment and any outstanding liability paid by 23rd May 2005 (Tax Agents are granted further extensions) The value of reportable fringe benefits must be included on an employees PAYG Payment Summary as it can effect some income tax levies and surcharges.

Some employment expenses and benefits exempt from FBT include: -portable computers (laptop, notebook etc) limited to one computer per person each FBT year. -tools of trade

## FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

 -mobile/car phones and computer software, predominately used for work purposes

- -electronic diaries, calculators and briefcases -minor benefits under \$100
- s u p e r a n n u a t i o n contributions
- -private health insurance cover
- -certain employment relocation expenses
- -expenses that would be tax deductible to the employee
- -certain membership fees

The major employment related expenses on which FBT liability arises include: -motor vehicle

- -car parking fees if in a commercial parking station in within 1 kilometre
- -private expenses paid-loan benefits if interest charged is less than FBT

benchmark note (currently 7.05%)

- -business entertainment is not tax deductible
- -in house benefits of goods or services provided
- -accommodation or housing provided
- -some living away from home allowances

The most common fringe benefit provided to employers is car benefits which can be calculated for each vehicle using either: operating cost method using actual expenses based on business usage percentage from a log book maintained for a continuous period of 12 weeks within the past five years,

or alternatively:

-statutory formula methods calculated on the vehicle cost at rates varying from 7% to 26% depending on annual distance traveled

Fringe Benefits Tax rate is 48% of a grossed up value which is approximately double the annual benefit. There is concessional FBT treatment if fringe benefits are provided by FBT exempt organisations (eg. Hospitals) and certain rebatable employers.

The value of benefits subject to FBT are generally liable to GST and the full amount of an employee's contribution is used to reduce the total value of a fringe benefit. Any fringe benefits tax paid is often charged to the employee as part of salary package.

Fringe benefits tax equates the highest level of personal income tax and the legislation is very complex. Accordingly, care FBT planning administration and compliance procedures is necessary to ensure that any benefits are not negated by FBT paid or penalties. You should seek the advice of your accountant.





#### 2014 PRIVATE ALFRED ERNEST WARMBRUNN

A Soldier on the Beaconsfield Avenue of Honour 1914-1918 War.

Alfred Ernest Warmbrunn was the second of five children of Australian-born parents Ernest and Catherine (nee Stevens) Warmbrunn, having been born on the 5/8/1884 in Spring St. Prahran Victoria.

On enlistment for World War 1 on 7/3/1916, Alf was described as an orchardist, 5 foot 5inches in height; brown hair with pale blue eyes and his age was 31 years 6 months. His Next of kin address was "Tarilta", Beaconsfield, Victoria.

He was allocated to the 57th Infantry Battalion which predominantly was composed of men from the suburbs of Melbourne and after initial training at Broadmeadows military camp for 4 months he embarked with the 3rd Reinforcements on the troopship Ajuna on the 8/ 7/1916. By this time, most convoys from Australia sailed via South Africa and the Cape of Good Hope, a voyage of 7 weeks and 4 days.

He arrived in the United Kingdom on 31st August 1916, disembarked at Devonport and proceeded to the 15th Training Battalion at Larkhill camp on the Salisbury Plains, south west of London. Most bases were within 16 to 30 km from the town of Salisbury, some of them within sight of ancient Stonehenge.

After 3 months 8 days training he proceeded to France aboard the troopship S.S. Princess Henrietta, as a reinforcement, and disembarked at Etaples on 7th December 1916.

The area held immense British reinforcement camps, hospitals and was also home to the 5th Australian Division Base Depot. It was during this time that Private Warmbrunn was posted to the 59th Battalion, part of the 15th Brigade, 5th Division.

The 59th Battalion spent the winter of 1916-17 rotating in and out of the Somme region front line, enduring one of the coldest winters in living memory. The snow, had begun to fall in the previous November; and by mid-January it had frozen the ground, ending the worst hardships caused by the mud. Cases of frostbite and trench fever increased and artillery shells, no longer cushioned by the soft ground, struck with deadly effect at targets brought into clear relief against a white background.

Boiling tea froze within twenty paces, hands exposed were numb within five seconds, bread could not be cut with a knife, and water had to be chopped with an axe and carried in blocks to the line. In the billets boots had to be warmed before they could be put on.

In March 1917 the battalion participated in the advance that followed the German retreat to the Hindenburg Line, but it was spared having to assault it. Small wonder that Private Warmbrunn reported sick with trench fever on the 20th April 1917 having endured nearly 4 months active service. It took a full month for him to recover.

The area of operations had switched to the Ypres sector in Belgium and Private Warmbrumm took part in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Battle of Ypres, the collective name given to the campaign fought between September and November 1917 aimed at capturing the Gheluvelt plain. (Often called the battle of Passchendaele)

The 59th major battle there was at Polygon Wood on the 26th September 1917. This area had been fortified by the enemy and was covered by concrete pill-boxes. Trench systems with massed barbed wire protection were also in existence and the whole area was continuously shelled.



Alf Warmbrunn at Beaconsfield with a captured German Helmat.

The 4th and 5th Divisions took its objective after much bloody fighting and casualties were severe, 27 Officers and 518 other ranks being killed, 69 officers and 2234 other ranks wounded and 170 other ranks missing.

The Division rested in the reserve area until 8<sup>th</sup> October until ordered north of Polygon Wood, but with the winter coming, it was known that its activity would be defensive only.

Another move to a new sector of great tactical importance, which included the Messines – Wytschaete Ridge was carried out on 28th October. It stretched south from Hollebeke to Warneton.


On 16<sup>th</sup> December the 5<sup>th</sup> Division was relieved by the 1<sup>st</sup> Division and moved by train to Samer area, about 10 miles south east of Boulogne for its rest and training and it was during this time Private Warmbrunn attended a snipers school.

With winter snow, freezing temperatures and much work, Private Warmbrunn's health again suffered and he was admitted to hospital with a large abscess to the groin area on the 4th March 1918. After treatment at various hospitals in France he was transferred to England by Hospital ship to the 4th Stationary Hospital in Plymouth, England and finally to No1 Australian Hospital, Harefield. A picturesque country estate owned by the Leake family, well known Australians. who had donated the use of the land and buildings for the war effort.

Having been medically down graded to being temporarily unfit for a further 3 months he was given leave from the 15th-29th June 1918 and on return sent to No1 Command Depot at Sutton Veny situated on the Salisbury Plains. Soldiers convalescing after injury required 'hardening' rather than training and so they were allocated ťΟ Command Depots.

Having recovered he attended a 5<sup>th</sup> Division signals course and various training courses between 26<sup>th</sup> July and the signing of the Armistice on the 11<sup>th</sup> November 1918.

After the Armistice Alf Warmbrunn went to No15 concentration camp. staging area at Codford for return to Australia. Finally on the 19th February 1919 he embarked on the Troopship Orca from Liverpool in England and 41days later disembarked Melbourne. Victoria. Australia. He had served 2 years and 11months in uniform. Of that time 12 months was spent fighting with the 59th Battalion. The rest of that time he was sick, training or on transport ships.

Other locals who served with him were Cecil Grant, 57<sup>th</sup> Battalion, John Christie (Killed in Action 19/7/1916) and Thomas Clair Whiteside of the 59<sup>th</sup> Battalion.

During his working life his occupation was linesman, and he was stationed at Mildura, Noojee and Warragul (where he lived), coming home for weekends to his cottage on the family property at Beaconsfield, to where he eventually retired. His sister Mary lived in the family home nearby, until her death in 1952. He laughingly called himself "the man from the bush". For many years he had a Chevrolet car, complete with open sides and crank handle.

He was frequently visited by his youngest sister Millicent and her husband Hallmon Trenberth of Brighton.

Alf spent his last few weeks with the family, Millicent having died in 1965.

He died on the 27/7/1966 at the Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital, Victoria, Aged 81 years.


In 1881 at the age of 41 Earnest Warmbrunn married Catherine Stevens aged 24 years who was born at Tarilta, a town south of Castlemain. When they married Earnest was discribed as a wood and coal dealer of South Yarra. The couple had 5 children Mary, Alf, Fred, Catherine and Millicent.

In 1904 Earnest and Catherine bought 9 acres of land at Hill View Estate where they built "Tarilta" a wattle and daub house which survived until the fires of 1983. The entrance to the property is oppisite Montuna Grove in Guys Hill.

Ernest farmed the property, producing flowers and vegitables for local sale.

When Ernest died in 1915, Mary who was a tailoress by profession and did not marry moved back to Tarilta to care for her mother until she died in 1946. Mary died at Tarilta in 1952.

Fred married Alicia Crossley, they had two children, and lived in Quamby Rd. Catherine married Robert Gorwell, they had four children, and lived at Wonthaggi. Millicent married Norm Trembath, they had four children and lived at Brighton

#### With winter approaching ...

by Steve the Vet

Arthritis is a progressive degenerative joint disease commonly found in dogs and less commonly in cats.

Arthritis can occur in young animals but more commonly occurs in the older pet.

Signs of arthritis include: difficulty in getting up from a sitting/lying position; difficulty in jumping onto furniture, into the car etc; limping; less enthusiastic to walk or play; yelping/crying when touched; licking of affected joints.

Causes of arthritis include poor conformation (this is genetic –and some breeds of dogs are more prone to particular disorders); trauma ageing, and general wear and tear on joints. Overweight animals suffer more from arthritis because of the greater load the joints are expected to carry.

Many animals affected with arthritis can be helped to lead a happy and pain free life. The vets of Beaconsfield Veterinary Centre can examine your pet if you suspect he many have signs of arthritis. Sometimes radiographs and a general anesthetic may be needed.

If your pet is overweight we can provide you with a suitable diet and exercise regime to achieve weight loss. In winter swimming in a heated pool is preferable to cold water in dams, the beach etc.

Supportive bedding located free of draughts is also important for your pet with arthritis. Reducing the number of stair and steep slopes your pet needs to negotiate will help.

There is a range of medications we may prescribe for a pet with arthritis. Some drugs prevent further destruction of cartilage in the joint. Some drugs reduce active inflammation and pain in the joint.

If you think your pet shows any of the signs of arthritis with the onset of winter please don't hesitate to give us a call at Beaconsfield Veterinary Centre and we can discuss your concerns.

### OUR NATURAL WORLD

by Peter Hansen

The growth and evolution of Medicine over the centuries is quite a fascinating study. Concepts in the Healing arts never remain constant and like most things in life are forever changing. Medicine started to become

"scientific "around the time of the American Civil War in the 1860's in obedience to the eternal dictum of conflict advancing knowledge in all the areas that affect the conduct of the warring parties. The obscenity of slaughter also advanced the practise of healing due to the dreadful numbers of injuries and

death that is the normal companion of conflict.

Prior to that time patients suffered procedures such as leeching, bleeding, purging, and brutal surgery without the benefit of anaesthetic. These crude attempts at healing were either ineffective or in most cases, resulted in the early death of the unfortunate patients.

Medicine can be roughly divided into three eras from the 1860s to the present. Era 1. The era of Physicalistic medicine that dominated medicine from

the 1860's to about 1950, and which is still influential. Era 2. The era of mindbody medicine that arose in the 1950's and which is still developing.

Era 3. Our era of non-local science and medicine towards wholistic, and which is just being recognised.

Western Medicine today is still mired in the physical approach (Era 1) which is reflected in drugs, surgery, radiation, chemotherapy and so on, guided by the Newtonian laws described in the seventeenth century. If these laws are to be affective the thinking goes then the physical approach must be followed closely to find causal principles.

In Era 2 the mind was becoming a major factor in healing within the person rather than isolating the physical as the only cause of ill health. The mind was regarded as a causal factor in illness and disease, and spawned approaches such Psychotherapy, as counselling, hypnosis, biofeedback, relaxation therapies and most types of imagery-based "alternative therapies ".

Era 3 ushered in the era of non-local or transpersonal medicine, where healing encompassed not only the individual but also other persons who may be involved in the health profile of the patient.

The mind is not completely localised to points in space or time, but could be described as unbounded and infinite in space and time. In these cases healing at a distance is possible such intercessory prayer, shamanic healing. diagnosis at a distance. telesomatic events which is the connecting with the body of another far -distant from the source of healing intention. This form of healing is easier to understand if knowledge of the famous Carl Jung can be retrieved, particularly his theory of universal consciousness where he regards humanity as living and moving in an ocean of knowledge that spans all of eternity. It is available for our benefit if we know how to access it.

We can only surmise what the next 100 years will bring in Medicine but clearly the physical part is being looked upon as the end result of illness, rather than the cause. To find cause we must go back to something prior and the further we go back the more we approach something within us that is non physical.

It is reasonable to assume then that healing starts here and must be the focus of healing intent if we are to achieve the results we desire.



#### SALLY'S GARDEN

## Planting Hints for Spring



Ranunculus: Plant the bulbs with the claws pointing downwards to a depth of 5cm.Grow to 50cm in height x 8cm in width


Anemone x Coronaria: Bi-colour anemones glow like poppies in late winter. Plant tubers 8cm deep with pointy end down. Grow to 50cm in height x 5cm in width.

Ipheion "Blue Stars" These milky blue star shaped flowers multiply quickly. Perfect for edging, or growing in pots. Plant in full sun.

Freesia: These not only have very colourful flowers but the perfume is very strong which gives one a feeling that spring is really here. Plant corms 5cms deep with pointy end of corm facing downwards. Mine seem to grow in both poor and rich soil and in full sun and semi-shade. Plant them near a window or open door and enjoy the colour and perfume.

Grape Hyacinth: These are an old time favourite in the garden. The bright blue blooms on a 15cm.stem, make for a very colourful edging or in drifts under roses and trees. Plant at a depth of 5cm. The flowers last well when cut and placed in a vase.

**Tulips:** Tulip bulbs require cold winters, so plant bulbs in late autumn at least 10cms. deep.



Daffodils: There are so many different daffodils to choose for planting. one I particularly like is the Narcissus "Yellow Cheerfullness" which has fragrant double lemon flowers in late spring. Plant bulbs at least 5cm. deep in full sun.

It is also time to plant Primulas, Pansies, Sweet Peas and any other bulb family of your choice.

Rhubarb is a prolific growing productive plant. Plant the crowns just under the surface of the soil, water and fertilise with lots of manure & mulch. Seems to thrive on sheer neglect but is a very rewarding plant to have. There are so many uses for rhubarb, such as rhubarb and apple pie, stewed with plums and ice cream, and gives a rich colour in parfait glasses with rich custard and icecream.

Grow as many vegetables as you can, fertilising with manure and mulch and you will enjoy organically grown vegetables.

## EASTER BUNNIES AND OTHER RABBITS

Easter is over for another year and some of you may have seen some "Easter Bunnies" - not the chocolate variety!

If you've been confronted by a rabbit and wanted to know what he was going on about, here's something to help; a starting point to understanding rabbit speak:

1. Chinning:

Their chins contain scent glands, so they rub their chin on items to indicate that they belong to them. Same as a cat rubbing its forehead on people and objects.

2. Territory Droppings:
Droppings that are not in a pile, but are scattered, are signs that this territory belongs to the rabbit. This will often occur upon entering a new environment. If another rabbit lives in the same house this may occur often and be a nuisance.

3. Stomping: He's frightened, mad or trying to tell you that there's danger (in his opinion) 3. Teeth grinding: Indicates contentment, like a cat's purr. Loud grinding can indicate pain.



by Nathan Boon




