
Steve Comerford from Beaconsfield will compete in indoor cricket in the 2005 Masters Championships in Adelaide.

REWARDING OUR VOLUNTEERS

The community of La Trobe has received \$25,000 through the Federal Government's Volunteer Small Equipment Grant program.

Beaconsfield Neighbourhood Centre is one volunteer organisation to receive a grant under this scheme. I was proud to visit the Neighbourhood Centre in July to meet with volunteers and to personally acknowledge their hard work and dedication. Volunteers make invaluable contribution to the local community and these grants can make their role a little easier.

Over 10,000 applications were received for these grants and Beaconsfield Neighbourhood Centre was one of 2100 organisations to be successful in this round.

The organisation received over \$1,230 to be used to purchase a mobile trolley with storage, an office step ladder, a laminating machine, a vacuum cleaner and a flat computer screen.

Each purchase will make a significant difference to the work of these volunteers, and is equipment they may not have been able to otherwise afford.

This latest round of grants is the seventh time the Australian Government has committed its financial support directly to volunteers, bringing the total funding to over \$29 million, distributed to approximately 13,600 community organisations Australia wide.



CAMPAIGN A SUCCESS

The Beaconsfield Fire Brigade is made up of volunteer members of the community who respond to calls for fires and other emergencies at any time on any day of the year. The brigade recently ran a campaign to recruit new members for the brigade to ensure this commitment can be maintained into the future.

The brigade has been very pleased by the response to the campaign that has resulted in:

* Six new recruits who will undertake training over a six month period to gain the necessary minimum firefighting skills respond to calls for fires and other emergencies (eg: car accidents) as part of the brigade.

- * Two existing firefighters from other brigades who have recently moved into Beaconsfield becoming active members of the brigade.
- * The return of a life member of the brigade to an active firefighting role.

The level of enthusiasm shown by people to become a member of the brigade is good news for both the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade and wider Beaconsfield community.

100th Day of School

On Monday 25th July, all of the children and teachers at Beaconsfield Primary School celebrated our 100th Day of School. This was a terrific opportunity to explore the mathematics behind the number 100 for a whole day! In addition to classroom activities, all children went on a 1-100 number hunt, an exciting challenge for children to find cards numbered 1-100 hidden that were throughout their very own playground! While exploring numbers, children

also practised using their "location language" to describe and record the position of each number. Recess and lunchtime were certainly buzzing with talk of numbers!


The children undertook a wide variety of activities design to stimulate their appetite for creative thinking, problem solving and improving their mathematical skills:

* Young engineers in 1M, who celebrated their 100th Day of School by building free-standing towers using 100 blocks in teams and working together to put together a 100-piece jigsaw puzzle.

- * Prep P cut out 100 words that they could read from magazines.
- * 4D worked together to construct buildings with 100 toothpicks. Their creations even included a 3D model of 100 and the Eiffel Tower! * 4W celebrated their 100th Day at school by designing their own \$100 notes displaying a famous Australian.
- * 5R celebrated their 100th Day of school writing 100

tricky equations.

- * 6F are fit mathematicians! They celebrated their 100th Day at school on the oval playing 100 games and doing 100 exercises.
- * 3/4L spent on an imaginary shopping spree through their 100th Day at school. Each child had \$100 to spend from shopping catalogues. While some children 'purchased' 2 items from the catalogue shop, other children filled their page with catalogue shopping! A very nice way to SPEND the day!
 - * 3D worked out that 100 cents equals \$1. They then worked out all of the ways that they could make \$1 using Australian coins.
 - * 2H wrote and drew about what they thought school would have been like 100 years ago.



Cardinia creates a frog-friendly future

CARDINIA Shire Council has begun work on a major plan designed to minimise the impact of development on the habitat and population of the vulnerable Growling Grass Frog species.

Cardinia has appointed ecologist and frog expert Aaron Organ of Ecology Partners to devise a plan to help council planners manage development and planning issues in frogpopulated areas, particularly in the Casey-Cardinia growth corridor.

The plan will:

* Map known and likely frog locations and breeding sites in the urban growth corridor and immediate surrounds.

- * Determine the frog's habitat needs.
- * Identify what impact urban development may have on frog habitat and population and assess possible threats to frog populations. * Devise strategies to help Council and developers protect and enhance frog populations in the area.

Part of Mr Organ's work will involve field surveys and estimates of frog numbers to be conducted this spring, when frogs are "growling".

When completed early next year, the plan will instruct planners on designing and

assessing applications for estates and other developments for their "frog friendliness". It will advise planners on how frog populations could be linked by "frog habitat highways" to help them survive, and help Council better manage its own wetlands, parks, gardens, roads, and drain design and maintenance.

Mr Organ said the large, green and gold Growling Grass Frog was considered nationally vulnerable, but could be found locally in dams, swamps and even waterway developments with suitable fringing and floating vegetation.

"Frogs are an important part of the local ecosystem," he said. "As amphibians living on both land and water, they are a powerful indicator of the overall health of our environment."

WINE & FOOD by Keith Goodman

The time has come the walrus said.....

After many years of contributing to The Banner I feel my time is up. Finding material to stimulate myself and hopefully in the process give readers something of interest becomes harder with every issue. Only so many new eating houses can open in our little town and Anne and I find we are not travelling Melbourne to eat as much as we did previously. On the wine side changes are happening. For the past 30 years I have worked in some way at the Southern Victorian Wine Show and it was starting to outgrow itself - more entries than one Judging Panel could handle in one week. So we bit the bullet and have changed the format by

restricting entries to Yarra Valley wines only; starting with the next show, my last.

I would like to pay tribute to The Beaconsfield Banner and all those who contribute. The writers. proof readers, collators, deliverers and the four people who are the glue who hold the paper together. Firstly that enigma of a man Tony Rushton, originally the printer and now flitting around in the background in his unique way, secondly Willem Boon and Maurice Potter who like sheep dogs round up the advertisers and keep the money coming in, third and the heart and soul of everything that happens surrounding the paper, Margaret Boon; her contribution to the Banner, Beaconsfield Primary School, the Toy Library and the town of Beaconsfield deserves recognition by the community. Mind you I keep telling her she does too much.

A Wine Club of which I am a member has only one dinner a year so it is of some import to us that we choose carefully. This year we dined at Maris, 15 Glenferrie Rd, Malvern (near Glenferrie Rd). Correct choice. I can recommend the baked baby piglet or the wet roasted veal. Every dish is done with care and long slow preparation or cooking and the prices would not break the bank. BYO wine \$3 per bottle and interesting wine by the glass or bottle. Open for lunch and if on, try the



Community Trust Model for Beaconsfield Reservoir

Beaconsfield Primary School, which I recently announced is set for a \$4.4 million upgrade, received a visit from the Minister for Education Services, The Hon. Jacinta Allan MP on 14 July. Along with School Principal Gary Methven, I had the opportunity to discuss the school's redevelopment with the Minister.

On the same day, the Minister paid a visit to Upper Beaconsfield Primary School to participate in a 'turning of the sod' celebration for its redevelopment, which is now underway. This school has also been given approval to start masterplanning for Stage 2 of its rebuilding.

This means designers and architects can work with the school community to plan the next stage of building works. It is exciting times for local education with this ongoing investment in our children's education.

There has also been more great news regarding Beaconsfield Reservoir, which I announced last year would remain in public ownership. The Minister for the Environment, The Hon. John Thwaites MP, has now confirmed that the land around 170 hectares - will be transferred to the Crown. An innovative move will see the Cardinia Environment Coalition manage the site based on a community trust model.

This will allow for the creation of a biodiversity sanctuary with unique opportunities for scientific work, education and ecotourism. This type of model is already in use at Karori Sanctuary in New Zealand and it means that local people with ongoing commitment to environment in the region will take responsibility for it. I also have great hopes that this reservoir can become a home for the protection breeding and endangered species from the local area such as the Helmeted Honeyeater (the state's fauna emblem), the Growling Grass Frog and the Powerful Owl. With the continuing rapid growth in the area, it is vital that land is set aside for recreational. environmental and other uses, for the well-being of both residents and native wildlife. I know that many people who live in this region appreciate its unique which atmosphere, combines the best of both the country and the city.



Keeping areas protected from overdevelopment will enable that atmosphere to continue.



RECENT TAX CHANGES

Changes continue to happen at a rapid rate including the following:

Entrepreneur's Tax Offset

- From 1st July 2005 a tax offset of 25% of a persons tax liability attributable to STS business taxpayers whose gross income is less than \$50,000 applies for income years commencing on 1st July 2005.
- Reduced tax offsets apply where gross annual turnover is more than \$50,000 and ceases when turnover exceeds \$75,000.
- An entity must have net STS income to be eligible.

Simplified Tax System (STS)

- Taxpayers who enter or reenter STS on or after 1st July 2005 can calculate their taxable income using the accounting method best suited to their circumstances ie taxpayers can choose to use either cash or accruals basis.
- -Transitional provisions apply to taxpayers already in STS who choose not to

continue using cash basis for income and expenses whereby they will have to make adjustments for income and expenses not already accounted for in the year the business changes to the new accounting method.

30% Child Care Tax Rebate

- This tax rebate is to apply to fees incurred since 1st July 2004 but cannot be claimed until the next years' income tax return ie costs in 2004-05 year are claimed in 2005-06 tax return.
- To be eligible families must receive Child Care Benefit (CCB) and meet tests for work or study or training.
- The rebate covers 30% of fees for approved child care costs less CCB entitlements.

All taxpayers should talk to their Accountant on changes to taxation laws for compliance and ensure that you receive your correct taxation benefits.

JOEY'S JOY

Joey was a 16 week old labrador when he first came to us at the Beaconsfield Veterinary Centre. He presented one morning with a sudden onset of vomiting and diarrhoea from the night before. He was not eating (unusual for any labrador) and was very depressed. On examination he was very dehydrated and both his gums and the whites of his eyes were yellow. Joey was placed on intravenous fluids and some of his blood and urine was sent to the labarotory. Whilst waiting for results he was started on antibiotics and anti-emetics (drugs to help stop the vomiting).

The lab results showed Joey had problems with both his liver and kidneys. Given these results and his clinical signs we were suspicious of an infection caused by Leptospirosis, a rare infection of dogs, but of concern as it is not only debiltating to dogs, but can

be passed to humans. Further blood tests were run and Leptospirosis was ruled out.

Treatment was continued and after 4 days Joey started to show improvement. He was finally able to hold down food and water and if he kept this up for 24hrs he was ready to go home.

The night before Joey was to go home he started vomiting again. On palpation of Joey's abdomen we could feel an unusual mass. From all his vomiting Joey had developed an



intussusception, complication where a piece of Joey's intestine had telescoped (folded) inside itself causing a blockage and now surgery was needed. Bloods were again taken which showed his kidneys and liver were improving, but not yet Despite not healed. knowing if Joey's kidneys and liver would heal fully, a decision had to be made regarding surgery as without it his condition would deteriorate to be life threatening. Joeys' owner made the decision to pursue surgery.

Surgery involved removing the section of affected intestine (about 15-20cm in length) and suturing the 2 healthy ends together. This was major surgery in itself, let alone what Joey had already been through! After surgery Joey continued to show good progress and finally got to go home 9 days after coming to the



clinic. Blood tests 6 week later showed that Joeys liver and kidney function had returned to normal. Joey was now acting like a typical puppy again and enjoying life, and his food. He was now close to the weight of his other litter mates.

On speaking to the lab further, the likely diagnosis was that Joey's problems had all started from eating a particular form of plant. The love, devotion and care shown by Joey's owner meant that he was able to overcome all of his problems. Joey was to be rehomed as a puppy, however his owner tells us that he is not going anvwhere. We look forward to seeing Joey enjoy life to his fullest and we thank his owner for the trust placed in us. The photos show Joey as a puppy, just prior to his surgery and him fully recovered 12 weeks after his (and his owners) ordeal.

Garlic is a very well known member of the onion family and all the cooks of the world have used it at one time or another. It flavours the food and gives it that "bite" so popular with the diner. But there is so much more to this wonderful bulb that history has sidelined, so let's reveal the past and so gain a new respect for Garlic.

Before the advent of pharmaceutical drugs, garlic was the treatment of choice to eradicate intestinal worms from the human and animal species and had been used very successfully for thousands of years. The reason being that garlic is a natural antiseptic and antibiotic providing a medium in which "nasties "cannot

exist. A better killer of bacteria and worms does not exist.

An old cure for body sores is to crush a clove of garlic into a paste and put it over the sore just once, and a crust will form. Leave it on until it falls off and healing should be complete. If you mix it with lanolin it makes a wonderful salve for skin diseases and blemishes.

The use of garlic in the First World War was probably the most sensational of uses that it has ever been put to. It was used in Hospitals to treat the terrible suppurative wounds of soldiers injured in battle. The death toll was extremely high before someone realised that garlic could cure these

wounds like nothing else could. There were no antibiotics in those days. The raw juice, diluted with water, was expressed into a dressing and placed over the wound. It was proved conclusively that not one case of sepsis resulted after this treatment, and thousands of lives were saved using this simple method. There were no side effects and healing was always complete.

In 1916 the British Government asked farmers to provide tons of the bulb for use in Hospitals, paying one shilling per pound for all that they could produce. Sadly after the war finished the use of garlic fell away and is a sorry fact of history.


During the European Plague in Marseilles in 1722, four thieves discovered that by drinking garlic vinegar and applying it to their bodies they were able to plunder the dead bodies of the plague victims with complete impunity from the dread disease. This resulted in

the famous "Four Thieves Vinegar" as the answer to the Plague.

Garlic was also used with great benefit for Smallpox and was applied to the soles of the feet in a linen cloth, daily.

During an outbreak of Infectious Fever in London at the beginning of the 19th century, in certain poor quarters, the French Priests who constantly used garlic in all their dishes visited the very worst cases and did so with complete impunity, while the English Clergy caught the infection and often paid with their lives.

The history of Garlic goes back a long way and was at one time worshipped as a Deity in ancient Egypt and enjoyed a special place in ancient Greece and Rome. The romance and medicinal properties of Garlic could fill many books so next time you have it, respect it for one of natures treasures given to man for his wellbeing.





CARDINIA CATCHMENT LANDCARE

Winter rains came late and we found ourselves planting our first three plantings into hard, dry ground. These needed to be watered in well and were followed by good, steady rain which we hope will be sufficient.

All told there have been six properties planted this autumn/ winter. Three in Harkaway including an area of land owned by Casey Council which was severely weed infested and totally neglected. Our hope is that this site will be a demonstration site and illustrate how creeks and waterways can rehabilitated. Most of Casey's creeks are in a similar condition the exceptions being those which have a Friends group working on them. The three other properties which had Landcare work are in Upper Beaconsfield.

You may have noticed roadworks along O'Neil Rd, Payne Rd and Officer Rd. The contractor has tried hard to remove as few trees as possible whilst sealing these roads. Council intends to remove weeds from the roadside verges and replant indigenous vegetation. Beaconsfield has many roadsides of conservation value and we need to value and protect them. It is disturbing to see so many residents planting environmental weeds along these roadsides.

All Landcare plantings

involve the restoration of understorev groundcover plants as well as trees and so restore habitat for birds and other wildlife.

We are thrilled that the State Government has legislated to make the Upper Beaconsfield Reservoir а Nature Conservation Reserve rather than to allow its subdivision.


