

SES MOVES TO 132 500

The Victoria State Emergency Service (SES) has a new telephone number for members of the public to call if they require emergency flood and storm assistance.

132 500 is now the number to call from anywhere in Victoria, 24 hours a day, for emergency assistance if you or your property is affected by a flood or storm. SES volunteers (recognisable in their orange overalls) are trained to provide temporary emergency assistance to people protect themselves and protect their property from further damage. They assist with such incidents as a tree down on a building, damaged roofs, rising

floodwater, general building damage, trees down and blocking access, and any storm damage that may be a threat to life or property.

The role of the SES volunteer team is to make the scene safe. It is the property owner's responsibility to arrange for the removal of debris and permanent repairs to their property.

When you phone 132 500 from a landline phone your call will automatically be directed to the closest SES Unit, or an emergency communications centre, where a trained call-taker will dispatch your local SES Unit to the incident. Callers phoning from mobile phones or near the Victorian border may be

asked to identify the State they are calling from before their call is directed to the Unit or an emergency communications centre.

132 500 replaces a range of callout numbers including local SES Unit numbers, regional headquarters and the general callout number in the Melbourne and Geelong metro areas. It is the same cost as a local call in Victoria, although calls from mobiles may be higher.

There is no cost for SES assistance and all our volunteers are trained to national standards. The SES is a community-based organisation meaning that the volunteers are locals with local knowledge and are aware of the critical rescue requirements of your area.

132 500 is for flood or storm emergency calls only. Triple zero (000) is for fire, police or ambulance and should be used in a life-threatening emergency. Write these numbers down and update your emergency services contacts list. You can still contact your SES Unit with general queries on their non-emergency office number.

News from the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade

Once again the year has flown by, and the summer fire season is fast approaching. The Beaconsfield Fire Brigade wishes everyone a happy and safe Christmas and summer holiday period.

Summer Fire Safety -Have you and your family prepared your Bushfire Survival Plan?

CFA is advising that people living in high risk areas need to be self-reliant to protect themselves against bushfires.

"You may not get someone banging on your door to warn that a bushfire is close," said CFA Brigade Support Officer Ellisa Bourne.

"You may not see a fire truck arrive at your house in the nick of time. This is why you should prepare your own bushfire survival plan now before the fire season gets started."

It is important that you obtain information about what needs to be done before making your decision. Will you leave early or stay and defend?

CFA recommends that people make their decision well before the summer fire season to either stay and actively defend their property or leave the area before fire threatens.

Research shows that many people make unsafe choices that can have serious consequences.

CFA advises people not to stay with an unprepared property and not to leave their property too late such as when the fire is very close, or return to your home during a bushfire.

If you would like a CFA "Living in the Bush" workbook to assist you with your plan call the Victorian Bushfire Information Line on 1800 240 667 to obtain a copy.

Victorian Bushfire Information Line

The Victorian Bushfire Information Line is a 24 hour, seven days a week service which provides recorded information regarding fire restrictions, Total Fire Bans and information to assist you to prepare for the fire season. During the summer fire period you can obtain personal advice from trained operators from 8am to 8pm weekdays.

In the event of a major incident the information line can be staffed 24 hours a day in order to provide incident updates and advice on actions to take during bushfires. For example if you work out of the area but during the day a bushfire develops you could call this number to ascertain whether it is safe to return to your home. The number to call is 1800 240 667. It would be a great idea to program this number into your phone.

Alternatively check the CFA website www.cfa.vic.gov.au for more information on preparing for the summer season.





DOROTHEA POSTELLO (1923 - 2005)

In 2001 the sounds of a piano playing rang out in Amelia Close, Beaconsfield, from the front room of Dorothea Postello's. Dorothea moved there after her house in Vernon Road on Mount Misery, Beaconsfield became too big for her. Children would hear her playing and be curious of the sound. They would visit and she would have them in. They were fascinated as they stood around her piano listening to her play.

For many years she played the piano or organ weekly at the Narre Warren North Uniting Church and also in her homeland Yorkshire, England. Her ability to play the piano led her to her first husband, Ron Atkins, who was a trained singer (Tenor). It was wartime when they met and music was one of the few joys they and many who heard Dorothea accompany Ron had. They migrated with their three children in 1958 on the ship Strathard. Settling in Dandenong, Dorothea added to their income and worked as a comptometrist at G.M.H., the Bacon factory and Tip Top Bakeries.

After her children had grown up and married, tragedy struck when her husband Ron was killed in a road accident in 1974.

Dorothea lived alone then until she married Michael Postello who worked with Ron and Dorothea on a voluntary committee bringing poor migrants from all over the world to Australia and setting them up in a house and getting them on their feet till they could get a job and support themselves. There were some incredible stories of migrants who now deservedly call Australia home. Michael was Spanish and was helpful in translating to some new Australians.

Dorothea and Michael married in 1977 and built their home in Vernon Road, Beaconsfield. Dorothea joined many groups in Beaconsfield and was one of the founding workers, volunteering her time in the Narre Warren opportunity shop.

At this time she was asked to play the national anthem every Monday morning at the Beaconsfield Primary School. She was also asked to accompany the children at several plays but insisted she had a telephone book to sit on, for the stool for the piano was missing and a chair was too low.

Sadly Michael, who had survived the Spanish Civil War, serving in the French Foreign Legion and onto



Korea for the Americans where he was shot but survived, died in 1991 of Cancer. Dorothea became a widow but continued to make more and more friends in Beaconsfield. CHILDREN TAKE THE CHALLENGE

In October, new laws were introduced into Parliament to punish hoon drivers, who do 'burnouts', 'donuts' or intentionally allow their vehicles to lose traction.

This will see first time offenders having their cars impounded or immobilised for forty-eight hours. Second time offenders face losing their cars for up to three months while drivers convicted of three or more offences will have their cars permanently seized.

Other serious offences for which drivers face car impoundment or confiscation include exceeding the speed limit by 45 km/hr or more, engaging in a race on the road, and dangerous driving. These laws will make the roads safer for all

of us and provide appropriately harsh penalties for those who choose to use our roads in a way that threatens the safety of all drivers, passengers, pedestrians and cyclists.

The Victorian Parliament is celebrating its 150th anniversary and sat in regional Victoria, in Geelong and Colac, in November. A series of events and activities will be taking place in both regional and metropolitan Victoria over the next year, including а cartoon exhibition, lectures, an exhibition of past petitions, art displays and an open garden day at Parliament House. There is also a multi-media travelling exhibition, "Bills, Bells and Ballots", which will include many treasures, documents and items rarely seen in public. Contact my office for more details.

Other recent news is that the new urban growth boundaries have been released, providing certainty of land supply for housing for the next 25 years in the five areas of Casey-Cardinia, Hume, Melton-Caroline Springs, Whittlesea and Wyndham.

80,000 new jobs will be provided in these areas, allowing people to both live and work locally. Levies have been placed on developers on a per hectare basis to ensure that they assist local, state and federal governments in contributing to the necessary infrastructure for new residents.

As a result of new growth areas, it is estimated that the price per hectare for these tracts of land has increased from \$33,000 to \$478,000 so it is right and proper that beneficiaries of these land value increases do not impose a burden on existing ratepayers to provide new services and infrastructure. A Growth Areas Authority is being established to act as a watchdog on housing affordability, monitor price movements and advise on the release of land.



SPECTACULAR BULBS

There are bulbs that can be grown under trees and allowed to multiply freely, or in part shade and shady corners or grown between shrubs as space fillers.

The Blood Lily (Haemanthus), from southern Africa, is a very spectacular bulb with broad fleshy dark green leaves and a brilliant scarlet red flower. I have seen them grown as a border in park gardens and also under shady trees and allowed to just multiply. To view mass multiplication of the blood lily when in flower is certainly spectacular.

The large bulbs should be planted out in a light, sandy compost with a little animal manure, with the neck of the lily at soil level. Can be started in a pot in semishade and watered regularly till roots have developed, allowing them to dry out between soakings. The plump flower stems will appear while the plant is bare of leaves. The stems will bust into a mass of red florets enclosed by showy scarlet bracts.

The Pineapple Lily (Eucomis) from South Africa, is another unusual

plant and can also be grown enmass for a striking effect. This plant sends up 60cm/2ft cylindrical purplespotted stems bearing hundreds of greenish flowers, sometimes tinged with mauve. They grow amid tufts of green leaves just like a pineapple top. The flowers can be cut for indoor use in a vase and last for quite a few weeks. These plants prefer full sun and should be left alone for vears.

The Hippeastrum (Barbados Lily) is a native of tropical America, make gorgeous house plants, but can also be grown in the grown in sunny position.

To plant them in pots, plant them in a rich loamy mixture with a small amount of sand added. Leave a third of the bulb showing above the surface. When the flowers have finished, store bulbs dry until the signs of next year's growth. But, they also flourish in the garden in a sunny position and give a spectacular display.

Snails, unfortunately, find the buds and leaves irresistible - and need protection.

grandchildren of World War Two veterans – a true indication of the impact World War Two had 60 years ago and how Australia has grown as a nation since then.



SPLITTING OF SUPERANNUATION

The Government has brought forward the commencement date of new rules for splitting of superannuation contributions to now apply from 1st January 2006. New bills and amendments have been introduced into Parliament. The new rules splitting Superannuation Contributions will enable share spouses superannuation benefits hence enabling each spouse to have their own -Reasonable Benefit Limits (RBL) and

-Low tax threshold

(currently \$129,751 tax at zero rate on post June 1983 component)

The new regulations will apply to employer contributions and personal deductible and nondeductible contributions but only in respect of contributions made after 1st January 2006. It will not be possible to split existing superannuation benefits: amounts rolled over or transferred or employer ETP'S. The Superannuation fund must agree for contributions to be split.

The normal rules of claiming tax deductions for superannuation contributions tax seminar the same or currently any split is subsequently done on a predetermined split of each contribution or an annual split.

superannuation contributions are split to a spouse who is not an existing member than the eligible service date would commence when the split contribution was made.

The benefits of being able to split future superannuation contributions with a spouse minimal who has superannuation benefits will provide tax benefits on retirement by extra RBL amounts and zero taxes and payments. You should discuss with your accountant the strategies of splitting superannuation future contributions.

IT'S A GREAT LITTLE TOWN - AT THE MOMENT

Further to the excellent article 'Taking Charge of Your Town' by Willem Boon in the last edition of the Beaconsfield Banner, I thought I might throw my 'two-bobs' worth into the mix.

On August 20, 2005, The Age newspaper launched a series of articles under the heading 'Liveable Melbourne'. The first instalment looked at fourteen 'liveability' indicators across 314 suburbs, including transport, traffic congestion, education, shopping, open space, tree cover, crime, proximity to the CBD and the coast, culture, topography and cafes and restaurants. Every suburb was ranked against each indicator and the ranking converted into a score and the score for each suburb was added to produce a 'total' indicator score.

A map of Melbourne's suburbs were included in the article and each was coloured according to its total

score. There were thirteen tones used ranging from dark blue for the most liveable, a lighter blue for the next and continuing through with various greens, yellows, oranges and finally reds for the least liveable. Generally, the results indicated that the lower ranking suburbs were mostly on Melbourne's outersuburban fringe.

A closer inspection of the map does seem to confirm this finding. In our own south-eastern region orange and red hues abound. Endeavour Hills, Doveton, Narre Warren (including north and south), Harkaway, Hampton Park, Lysterfield, Cranbourne and yes, even Berwick are all quite similarly shaded.

But there is one little oasis of green. The shade seems to correspond with an index that places Beaconsfield somewhere in the region of the $122^{nd} - 146^{th}$ most

liveable suburbs. While Beacy obviously isn't in the same league as Toorak, Brighton or Parkville. In terms of what our little town currently offers us, we compare well with Mitcham, Doncaster East, Balwyn and Lower Plenty.

Now while this doesn't quite amount to bragging rights, it should serve as a warning to all in Beaconsfield. The results of inappropriate developments are now reflected in the rankings achieved by our neighbouring suburbs.

Sadly, Beaconsfield is slowly being re-coloured by some developers who seem not to care one jot about the charm of our little town. It is even alleged by some people that a number of our local representatives (both elected or unelected) actually care very little, being excited only by the prospect of gathering

additional rates by squeezing more and more buildings onto every available hectare.

In the area of commercial development, our main street, the Old Princes Highway, is a classic example of poor planning. Sure, it's a beaut place to run a business from, but thanks to the reduced parking requirements granted by council to several recent developments we now have businesses unable accommodate their staff and clients with adequate parking facilities, thereby causing increased, unsafe and congested parking along the highway.

With what has already taken place, as well as what's proposed, this stretch of road with its increasing traffic load, and inappropriate parking provisions, is fast becoming both frustrating and dangerous for local residents, school children, the elderly and shoppers.

A Good Oil Returns to Haunted Gully

The area called Haunted Gully has, for many years, had an interesting history.

In the 1830's it was a gold mining area. In fact, its name is said to have come from a tragic incident where a gold miner was shot by his very inebriated mates. He was in the nude at the time and they thought he was a ghost!

In the early 1900's the area housed a eucalyptus still, producing high quality oil for the local as well as the Melbourne market.

Now in 2005 high quality oil is coming out of Haunted Gully.

Just four years ago olive trees were planted on a north facing slope overlooking the gully. Olives were chosen as a suitable crop because, like eucalypts, they thrive on poor soil, very little water and lots of sunshine. By 2004 a small number of

olives emerged from the trees, this was considered to be fairly normal for such young trees.

However, perhaps it was the drought, perhaps it was the Beaconsfield location, but the 2005 crop was amazing. Haunted Gully is again in the oil business! Being confronted with harvesting several tons of fruit suddenly became a challenging but satisfying family affair. The fruit was sent to the processor within 24 hours of picking and the green, gold oil that resulted is very flavorsome, unique and good for you too.

The oil is now available locally as a varietal oil. Each of the four varieties has its own distinctive character, ranging from a mild, buttery taste to one with a strong, rich olive aroma.

So, 100 years later, quality oil has again come out of Haunted Gully. I wonder what the old-timers who ran the eucalyptus still would think about the sunny slope that no longer contains dense stands of eucalypts but neat rows of vigorous and well-groomed olive trees?

Wood Street is an historic area with a number of houses from early last century.



ENSURE PETS ENJOY NEW YEAR'S EVE CELEBRATIONS

Fireworks look fantastic during New Year's Eve celebrations however they can have an adverse affect on our pets. Animals have very acute hearing and the noise of fireworks can cause them actual pain in their ears and frighten them.

Sadly, many animals terrified by fireworks escape their properties, and end up lost, injured by traffic, or handed into animal shelters." Advice for pet owners when fireworks are discharged:

- Always ensure animals are wearing identification (even when inside the house)
- Keep animals, particularly dogs and cats inside when fireworks are likely to be let
- -Block out the noise by drawing curtains and turning on the TV or radio -Try to distract pets with games and food
- -Do not use a choker chain or slip collar to restrain

dogs, as they can choke on these when panicked

Small animals such as rabbits, guinea pigs, mice and birds all need to be brought into a secure and quiet place where the noise of fireworks is minimised. Horses should be securely stabled or temporarily removed from areas that are near fireworks.

As with dogs, all pets should be identified so that if they do run away, you can

be easily reunited. A collar (or head collar) and tag is suitable for larger animals and any sized animals can be microchipped.





OUR NATURAL WORLD

It's difficult these days to read a paper or watch T.V. without some reference to the fact that the population is aging, and listing the problems that the march of time is bringing on a personal and national level. It becomes so shrill at times that you would think that science has just made a stunning new discovery.

Adding to the noise is the talk of postponing the inevitable by some remarkable theory of science that predicts living forever in some future time. It is a process that will eventually deliver us from the thraldom of the earthly incarnation that we selected for ourselves and allow a return to our true home. At the end of aging we have death, or more correctly, transition.

And what is Dying

"I am standing on the seashore. A ship at my side spreads her white sails to the morning breeze and starts for the blue ocean. She is an object of beauty and strength – until at length she is a streak of white cloud, just where the sea and sky mingle with each other.


The club is now actively seeking people who are interesting in "recreational" cycling.





Is there a solution? I'd have thought it was blindly obvious. If a development site is to small to incorporate the necessary infrastructure, then the developer should be left one of two choices. Either construct a building that is more appropriate for that site, or find a bigger site.

So when you notice an application for a planning permit, or hear about one, take the time to investigate. See if the applicant wants reduced parking, what signage they intend installing, hours of business, density proposed etc. Even make the time to travel down to the council offices and inspect the plans. Make a

note of such things as the consultant's traffic and parking reports, or whether the proposed building has any architectural merit, or looks like nothing more than a big shoe box standing on its end, etc.

Even if you believe the proposed undertaking won't affect you, put yourself in the place of those who might be and hopefully they'll do the same for you should the need ever arise.

Beaconsfield is more my street or yours. It's a community. And it's the community that will be left to pick up the pieces long after inappropriate developments have been foisted upon us.

This is a wonderful town, so take a look at the bigger picture, get involved and help keep Beaconsfield 'out of the red'.

As Willem Boon so aptly put it - don't leave it to someone else.






