

NOXIOUS WEEDS

The Department of Conservation & Environment has advised that it will no longer have a work crew operating from Pakenham. Two officers will remain to provide advisory services and for the hire of spray equipment and the sale of herbicides to rural landholders.

The Department will now only address noxious weeds on a priority area basis. The only policy now will betoencourage landholders to form groups to tackle the community's weed problems.

Pakenham Council is extremely concerned at the almost total with drawal of the Department, which already has resulted in a proliferation of ragwortand blackberrythroughout the entire area.

A crowd of 130 attended the official opening including MP's Ken Smith and Fred Van Buren, Shire President Charlie Rundell, our Riding Councillors Peter Meeking, Keith Ewenson and Ted Owen and other Councillors, the community of Beaconsfield, representatives of community groups and the Centre Committee of Management showing a greatamount of support for our new

The Centre opened at 10.00 a.m. giving members of the community a chance to inspect the new facility before the official program at 2.00 p.m.

The official opening was conducted by Shire President Cr. Rundell, who unveiled a commemorative plaque. He said that when the project was first introduced to the Council mid last year, he thought it would take quite sometime to get off the ground.

His help with the planning of our Centre, in particular with gaining Council funding has been invaluable and we would like to offer our appreciation for his assistance.

Cr. Meeking echoed the words of Mrs. Miles in saying "Today I really do feel a sense of excitement for the Beaconsfield Community Centre Committee - for the team of people which has worked non-stop over many months to make today happen" He outlined the efforts of Riding Councillors and community Groups to establish the Centre. Councillors were shown by Kathy Hunter and Marg Boon that child care centres were being held in doorways to emphasise the town's plight when the former Pakenham Library building was offered as a "base for the centre". With the help and co-operation from the Scouts and Public Transport Commission (Railways) land was made available for a site.

Facilities at the centre include a multi purpose room, kitchen, meeting room, storage, office, fover and toilets.

It will be managed by the Committee of Management which includes representatives of many groups throughout Beaconsfield. The Centre will operate similar to a neighbourhood house, and already has a three year old Playtime, Playgroups, Toy Library, and Over 50's Group.

The Committee of Management would like to thank the Beaconsfield Progress Association for their assistance in getting this facility as well as their generous donation of 180 chairs to use at the Centre. We would also like to thank the Beaconsfield Community Church for their help with painting and working bees at the Centre. Thankyou to all who have contributed.

CHURCH STARTS WITH A SPLASH.

Beaconsfield Community Church started with an amazing splash. The first service, held at the Community Hall last Sunday afternoon was swamped with more than 100 people as dignitaries, interested people and well wishes enjoyed a bright, relaxed and extremely friendly afternoon.

The Church was set up in response to a need that was expressed by the Beaconsfield community for a church that is geared to the character and needs of Beaconsfield. A recent study of the area showed that from as far back as it is possible to establish Beaconsfield has had a character of its' own. Originally it was a resting place for the Aboriginal peoples. Later it became a stage coach stop, a place of rest for the early white settlers and then a holiday resortin the country. Today that same sense of community, friendship and refreshing country atmosphere is still a part of the Beaconsfield Community

The senior minister of the new church, Pastor Don Press said that he believed the new church "had something very positive to add to the Beaconsfield community". The goal of the church he said "was to

take the existing character of friendship and community and to build a church that adds to and enhances that feel of community. We believe that God has called us to build a base that will provide a sense of identity, of friendship and love that will give back to Beaconsfield the sense of purpose and identity that suburbia has been trying to take away."

In opening the church the National chairman of the Christian Revival Crusade, Pastor Mike Cronin commented that like any good thing to build a church in a community took "commitment, commitment, commitment, commitment". "Everybody is invited to come and participate and to be involved. It is definitely not a church for a select few, it is a community church there for the benefit of all." Pastor Press com-mented later. "The church will be a fullgospelstyleofchurchwith bright singing, lots of care, a little laughter and aimed at developing something for all the family."


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BEACONSFIELD SCOUT GROUP

Did you know? Recycling plastic milk bottles saves the country more than recycling cardboard ones. Plastic can be used for a number of years and can become six different recycled products.

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OUR NATURAL WORLD

Chocolate! The very word can bring a sparkle of desire to the eyes of child and adult together. Out of all the sweet things available in this world, surely chocolate is supreme. Loved and loathed, it is nevertheless the biggest selling palate pleasure giver on earth.

Where did it come from this insidious Jeckyl and Hyde almost decadent plant?

The custom of drinking chocolate originated among the Aztecs of South and Central America, who called the cocoa plant, "Cocoaquahuitl". It is not difficult to see where our modern world "cocoa" came from.

Chocolate was very highly esteemed by the Aztecs, the Mexicans, and of course later, by the Europeans. The plant is a tree, attaining the height of about 12 metres, and is indigenous to Mexico, but widely cultivated in tropical countries.

The flowers arise from the older branches or trunk, and develop into large ovoid fleshy fruits that are 10 furrowed longitudinally, are yellow or reddish, and contain 5 rows of seeds, 10 or 12 in each row. The seeds are separated from the pod and allowed to ferment, and they then change from white to dark reddishbrown. They are then roasted to lose water and they then develop their characteristic odour and taste.

In it's early state, the chocolate is very bitter and is only made palatable by the addition of sugar, vanilla, or other flavouring substances. Normalchocolate contains up to 50% fat (cocoa butter) before the addition of anything else.

Drinking cocoa contains about 22% fat. Clearly, you will never lose weight on chocolate!

Returning to the Aztecs, chocolate was reserved for the privileged classes only, and used in special ceremonies at crop planting times.

Cocoa seeds were also used to pay tributes; at the time of the Spanish conquestitwas recorded that Montezuma had 40,000 sacks of cocoa beans, the equivalent of a million pounds in weight, in just one warehouse.

The Europeans added cinnamon and vanilla to the cocoa to make it more enjoyable to the palate, but even so only the Spanish originally accepted Chocolate, and when Dutch pirates found loads of cocoa beans on board Spanish and Portugese merchant ships, they tipped it all into the sea.

The first English "Chocolate House" opened in 1657, but was madevery expensive by Customs Duties. Chocolate became fashionable in France during the 18th century after the death of Louis X1V, but it was still only for the Courtiers, and not available for the masses.

Gradually, however, this new taste took hold and spread all over our world. Today there would not be a country on earth free of chocolate in one form or another.

As with may things, small amounts infrequently is the key to enjoyment of chocolate. Remember it's loaded with fats, sugars and caffeine - and tastes terrific! Doesn't seem fair does it!?

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

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SOFTWARE PRICES -OVERCHARGE?

Last month I wrote about the Prices Surveillance Authority investigation into software in Australia. Since then they have completed their inquiry and released their findings. They concluded that we are not being overcharged for software. Whilst prices are generally higher in Australia (not always however), the price differences were accounted for by our small market size, with extra costs of support and distribution.

The PSA also noted that prices were coming down. It is quite likely that this is a result of increased competition in a depressed market. At Platypus, we think the PSA's findings are correct but re-iterate our comment of last month, that many of the software distributors could try a bit harder to improve customer support.

NEW TO COMPUTERS

Recently I conducted a couple of free talks, at the new Beaconsfield Community Centre, on computing. The aim of the talks was to explain the uses of computers and some of the confusing terminology that always seems to accompany new technology.

I certainly enjoyed meeting some of the local residents and business people and everybody seemed to enjoy the sessions. If you missed out for any reason, I have left some information leaflets at the Centre which cover some of the topics we talked about.

One of the questions that I was asked by several people was "what sort of computer do I need for use at home and small business that will be useful for the next 4-5 years?" We discussed several different types of computers but mainly IBM compatibles (of which there are hundreds of brands).

If your buying second-hand, the most common is the 286 or 286AT. This computer is suitable for wordprocessing, accounts and most other tasks. Some of the more modern software, particularly those programs which are "Windows" based will have difficulty on a 286.

A 286 is suitable for you if you don't have needs to use lots of software and don't need anything very fast. You should be able to buy a complete system from about \$1000.

For those considering purchase of a new machine, I strongly recommend a 386SX as a minimum. The speed of the computer is quoted in megahertz (MHz). A computer with a 40MHz speed is twice as fast as one at 20MHz (assuming same processor, for example 386DX).

You also have to decide what options to fit to your computer. Again, I suggest the following as a practical minimum for serious use. A hard disk size of 40-80 megabytes, 4 megabytes of RAM and a VGA colour screen. The choice of floppy disk size is personal preference. If you have any friends who have recently made a purchase then they can be of great help.

David Norman McBRIDE was



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

SOMETHING FOR THOSE COLD WINTER EVENINGS.

CORN & CHICKEN CHOWDER

Ingredients

1 tablespoon butter

2 rashers chopped bacon

1 large chopped onion

4 medium peeled diced potatoes

2 diced carrots

440g tin of corn kernels

Liquid from can

440g tin cream of chicken soup

1 soup can of milk Salt & pepper

1 cup water


