

CARDINIA CREEK PARK MEETING

(reported by K. Goodman)

On Wednesday 24th November approx. 50 people attended a public information evening on the Proposed Park Discussion Paper No. 2., released in October.

Issues discussed related to Beaconsfield were:

- The paper is related to Park boundaries not its future use.
- Future use will develop following community discussion.
- The area behind Beaconsfield shops will develop following discussions between Shire of Pakenham and Beaconsfield Progress Association.
- Clarification of pathway alignment behind Wood Street homes is required.
- A small amount of flood prone private land to the north of Adamson Road to be incorporated into the Park.
- Haileybury College to purchase all of private grazing land between railway and Highway.
- Beaconsfield Retarding Basin boundaries will remain as is.

- A walking track will be constructed on the south side of the creek within the Retarding Basin.
- The Beaconsfield Pistol Club may remain until future use of the Park is developed.
- Soldiers Road is the likely access to the Park and a small amount of parking places may be provided.
- Some land may be purchased on the West side of Thomas St. (off Kenilworth Ave)
- No land will be forcibly acquired.
- Any landowners wishing to sell immediately may do so.
- Total area of proposed park is 474 hectares of which 119 is existing public land - the remaining 355 hectares is mainly north and south of Beaconsfield and involves approx. 20 owners.
- Any submissions related to Discussion Paper No. 2., should be submitted by early December 1993.

Dear Sir,

I must write to express my concern. During the last month or so, there seems to have been an upsurge of vandalism and reckless destruction of property in the town. The problem appears to be groups of young people with plenty of alcohol, on the streets.

Most, if not all, of them appear to be from out of town. The result is seen in broken shop windows, numerous smashed home windows, letterboxes, plants and trees. The streets are not safe for families to walk on Friday and Saturday nights. And next morning, empty beer cans and stubbies litter the main street.

Maybe the recent publicity and Police activity in Berwick have moved the problem on to Beaconsfield, but I say we can do without it, and hope something can be done to rid our rural town of this city pest.

Dear Sir,

I call your attention to an unsafe situation for pedestrians in Beaconsfield.

At the intersection of the Princes Hwy, and the Emerald-Beaconsfield Road, there is no footpath on the north side. Consequently walkers, horse riders, cyclists and particularly persons with prams, pushers or wheelchairs, must go out onto the carriageway.

Given the constant volume of traffic passing and making various turns, this situation is unacceptably dangerous.

An excellent footpath past the Hotel disappears abruptly at the corner. This requires construction of a short section of footway at road level. On the north corner, it is not possible to get off the road without climbing over a barrier or going some distance along it, in the path of traffic.

This path is the only reasonable access to Beach sfield Park with it's tennis courts, playground and sports ground; and also the popular market on Sundays. I suggest an inspection of the problem should bring a modification, so that people's and children's lives will no longer be put at unnecessary risk.



For White meat, chicken, pork, turkey or duck - a Pinot Noir from Yarra Valley or Mornington Peninsula, try Yarra Ridge or Dromana Estate or the Elizabeth Riesling(see recommendations) or Seppelts Sparkling Burgundy, approx. \$9. - \$10.

For Red meats try a red wine. (see recommendations)
For dessert, especially Plum Pudding try a Rutherglen Muscat - one of the great wines of the world - try Baileys, Morris, Stanton & Killen or Chambers.

Enjoy your Christmas and remember don't drink and drive.

RECOMMENDED WINES.

VALUE McWilliams Elizabeth Riesling 1987.

This is a wine I buy almost every year and must be one of our buying bargains. Usually released with 6 years bottle age and a swag of gold medals (real ones) the '87 fits the usual mould. Developed Hunt-



er semillon characters, toasted honied bouquet which carries thru onto the palate and lots of flavour. A great food wine on discount around \$7.95.

Wynns Connawarra Hermitage 1991.

Over recent years a number of high quality versions of this wine have been produced from '86 - '90. This '91 wine may be the best of recent vintages. The nose and colour indicate right away that this is a quality wine even before tasting. Peppery bouquet balanced with lovely oak, On the palate a wonderful depth of flavour that leaves behind a lovely peppery spicy bouquet. A good wine at \$15.00 but a bargain at \$7.95.

Yeringberg (red) 1991
Yarra Valley is one of the premium wine growing areas of Australia. 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RAINFALL IN BEACONSFIELD 1993 AN AVERAGE YEAR?

(Written by Dr. R.C. Webb)

So far (up to the 26th November), 1993 has been an average year. A high Summer rainfall (December 1992, January & February 1993) of 259.3mm. A very low Autumn rainfall (March, April, May) of only 94.4mm for the three months. Winter rainfall was lower than usual with 193.8mm. Spring rainfall has been above (not quite completed at the time of writing) with 300.2mm so far. Even so the reading does not compare with the record high figure of 402.3mm for the Spring of 1992.

The highest rainfall month for 1993 (so far) was September with 130.0mm The high-

est DAILY readings for 1993, to date, have been 34.0mm on the 25th January and 30.9mm on the 2nd September. As mentioned in a previous report the highest daily readings in recent years was 50.0mm on the 20th November 1992.

It may be of interest to some readers to know that the longest periods WITHOUT rain in 1993 were:

9-15 January inclusive (7 days) 12-19 March inclusive (8 days) 23-30 August inclusive (8 days)

The lowest rainfall MONTHS for 1993 have been April with 20.5mm followed by May with 36.3mm and March with 37.6mm.

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
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

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

OUR NATURAL WORLD

Herbal Medicine is certainly making a "comeback" after nearly a century of domination by the orthodox Medical School or Mainstream Medicine as it is sometimes referred. The use of plants to cure disease is older than man himself.

Animals ate plants of certain kinds when they were ill and indeed they still do. Anyone with a dog will know how it seeks out grasses when it feels off colour and the same applies to cats and any species of fauna treading the earth. Dinosaurs would have had their favourite medicinal plants, to quell their gastric upsets after eating more smaller Dinosaurs than they could comfortably accomodate!

Man has always been dependent on the plant world for his nutritional survival, and always will. Ever since records have been kept there have been Herbal Medicines. The Chinese had quite sophisticated Pharmacopoeias in 3000BC., but the contents of a grave opened in 1963 in Iran clearly showed that plants were used medicically as far back as 60,000 years ago. assifrian King Absurbanipal's library contained a clay tablet listing 250 vegetable drugs dating from 2500 B.C., and the ancient Egyptians also had a deep knowledge of the subject not only in Herbalism but as colour, using crystals and the sun's rays to bring about healing.

The great growth in herbal remedies came with the development of printing. Early Herbal books were of course handwritten, but this was painstakingly slow, thus out-

put was low and very few ever got to read them. When William Caxton invented printing, hundreds of medical textbooks were printed in the fifteenth century, so books on Herbs were more freely available, and interest grew until the printing of the greatest work on the subject, Nicholas Culpeppers, "Complete Herbal" in 1653. This book is still being used today and is almost the Bible of Herbalism. Much myth and magic became associated with Herbs over time, but these practises drew much criticism from the Church of Rome, who saw this as a direct threat to their control the populace. Many of these early healers knew so much about fertility control and abortion, that the church became incensed at this loss of children. (and potential Catholics to swell the ranks of their faith) to the point where much "witch burning" took place throughout Europe. Many of the so-called witches were in fact Herbalists, Astrologers and Physic healers whom the church tried very hard to stamp out. Consequently Herbalism lost influence and prestige in these "dark days" and even worse was to come. We will continue this saga in our next edition.
