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What's Happening at Council

Pakenham Council's mobile caravan office was launched in Main Street, Emerald, recently, and is being used to distribute information to outlying townships, including Beaconsfield.

If the Shire is to survive this round of the State Governments reform program, we need the support of local people.

Pakenham is now seeking most of the Emerald Riding of the Shire Of Sherbrook, and most of the Kooweerup swamp area from the Cardinia Creek east around Westernport Bay to just before the Gurdies (currently part of the City of Cranbourne).

This new Municipal district will be more economical, unite rural interests, assist economic development and job creation, enhance tourism and deliver more effective services.

The people of both Emerald and Kooweerup districts have been very supportive towards this proposal.

Pakenham is about people and communities and Council believes it can provide important local government service to the people of Emerald, Macclesfield, Avonsleigh, Clematis and Menzies Creek, particularly road maintenance, more efficiently. The previously divided communities of Emerald and Cockatoo would be joined. Approximatlely 6000 people reside in this area.

PRESS RELEASE FROM PAKENHAM COUNCIL RE-COUNCIL AMALGAMATIONS

The Shire of Pakenham has recommended to the Local Government Board that Beaconsfield should remain within the boundaries of a future "Shire of Pakenham". The City of Berwick has agreed that the two neighbouring municipalities should retain the dividing boundary of the Cardinia Creek.

The Council of the current Shire of Pakenham has resolved that the future Municipality take the name "The Rural City of Pakenham". It is the belief of Council that Pakenham is the logical and most easily recognised name for the municipality.

CONCERN ABOUT DANGEROUS ROAD INTERSECTION

The Beaconsfield Progress Association has been writing to Vic. Roads about the dangers of entering and exiting the township of Beaconsfield at the Officer end, where the old Princes Highway joins the Princes Freeway.

From Beaconsfield heading East many motorists are disturbed about the short distance they are given to merge with fast moving traffic. The reason for this is because May Road also enters square on the highway shortly after the merging lane.

Coming from Officer and preparing to turn right into Beaconsfield many motorists are concerned about the dangers of being hit from behind. Fast moving traffic unknowingly think that you are turning into May road. They get impatient when you continue on over the crest of a hill in the road to turn later into the right hand Beaconsfield turning lane.

Vic Roads have acknowledged in writing that this road junction is indeed quite dangerous. They state that when funds become available certain improvements will be made.

Many readers will be well aware of this problem junction. There have been accidents in this vicinity. To help things along readers are encouraged to write to Vic. Roads themselves.

The Beaconsfield Progress Association will not be holding a Public Meeting in the month of August.


Unless another meeting is called before, then next public meeting of the Progress Association will be the Annual General Meeting to be held on Tuesday 25th October

GLENN RODE TO RECOVERY!

As reported in The Banner some 10 months ago, I had a very unfortunate and untimely motor vehicle accident. This left me in a poor state mentally and physically. But I can report that with the help of my wife, family, friends, Doctors, Bruno and Glenda at the "Beacy Gym", a return to normal life will now be a lot easier. Also the Traffic Accident Corporation have shown me what the word "rehabilitate" really means. This organisation is world class. It's run by caring people who have helped me with income support and have paid nearly all the costs, which helps me a lot to reduce the stress that comes from a major trauma. It helps to ensure a speedy recovery.

Another aspect of my rehabilitation is the constant support received from friends involved in Bike Vic and Audax. Before the accident Ted, Joan, Ralph, Jason, Neil and the others have ridden with me on many enjoyable rides with Bike Vic and Audax and we have participated in other charity rides. During the past 3 years we have raised over \$9000 for local organisations. This has been a great joy to me and I would like to thank all the generous sponsors and helpers for their support, especially Ralph Smith. It is Ralph who provides me with the strength, support and friendship needed to cope with what I face.

After months of hard work and support from friends, on the 27th June, I decided to test this old body out on the bike as it was the mid term

break at the Casey College where I'm studying English and trying to use the word processor. After a quick round up of camping gear and purchasing a return ticket on the Spirit of Tasmania, I was off on a bike tour of the East coast of Tassie, the West Coast was ridden a couple years ago. I knew that some of the roads had a few "hills" and sometimes the weather is cold and wet. But when you had thoroughly prepared for two weeks. then "no worries" the saying goes.

About two years ago I paid \$15. for a list of organic farms in Australia- 450 in all: this made me a'WWOOFER'. This wonderful little book is the passport to work on host farms who accept people to work at all types of farm help in exchange for food and accommodation. So, I rang my first farm in Beaconsfield in Tassie which seemed like a good place to start. Bruce answered the phone and said "OK MATE".

The trip on the boat was great except for my apprehension about "WHO" would want to ride in the winter in Tassie? Well, over the next 30 days I can say the weather was kind. the people were "MAGIC" and I worked on four farms and stayed on three. I rode about 50 to 60 kms each day that I was moving from each farm and this was not so easy with five packs on the bike and one on the back. "WHEW" 25 kilos plus a few HILLS and the enemy LOG TRUCKS. but I suppose someone has to cut all the bloody tress and cart them to Japan!!

The total of 600 kms covered from Devonport to "Hoonville" then back to Hobart and bus back to the Spirit and home to Beacy. If anybody is interested in more information about bike touring or WWOOOFERS you can call me on 707 4509 or if you like you might want to join me in a easy paddle downstream in a kayak for about 30 days on the Murray from Albury to the sea!! please contact me.


MIDWAY NEWS



BEACONSFIELD'S CHILDRENS SERVICES

CHILDRENS AFTER SCHOOL CARE.

Beaconsfield Community can pride itself on having a first class childcare centre at the new Childrens Service Centre in the grounds of Beaconsfield Primary School, Lyal Ave..

Currently they are able to take more children into their service which operates daily 3.30 pm to 6.30pm during school terms, Monday to Friday. Parents will be pleased to hear that they also operate when schools have a half day to cover from school out time. Similarly on curriculum days they operate from 8am till 6pm.

Run by the Shire of Pakenham, the After School Care is supervised by Jenni Mathieson and she may be contacted there on 796 2985. This Beaconsfield centre is open to any child of Primary School age regardless of what school they normally attend. It is not just a centre for children of "working mothers"! Children go seeking fun

activities and Parents wanting a quiet time on their own, are welcome to bring their young offspring along. Charges per session are reasonable and depending on parental income, per session rates vary from 50 cents to \$6.00. This is good when you consider that the children get a drink and healthy snack and are well occupied and entertained with cooking. crafts, indoor and outdoor games and sports and childrens videos. On curriculum days they plan special lunches and on some afternoon session they have special theme times.

Children do not have to enrol for any set number of sessions. Attendance is welcome on a casual basis. Furthermore, parents will be pleased to know that the Government do allow, through Medicare, for the cost of sessions to be subsidised at a percentage rate. Parents may claim this.

HOME HINTS "SECURITY LIGHTING"

Lighting, properly designed can throw a protective barrier around your home or business at night. Remember, most burglars will think twice before crossing a well lit area or tackling a well lit door or window - they are really very modest chaps with an intense dislike for publicity, mainly as they know it can lead to a visit from your friends and mine, the "Boys in Blue."

Your objective is to give the impression that the house is occupied and also to make clear that anyone approaching points of possible entry will be made clearly visible by strong clear lighting. Don't just think of lights, but think of the various developments that are readily available. Highly efficiently lamps for continuous lighting over extended periods; automatic time to switch lights on and off, and light sensors that turn lights on and off in the daylight. Particularly disconcerting to intruders are lights that are triggered on by movement or infrared sensor. By the time someone has triggered a light on they are within the area of illumination and, unless they have a legitimate purpose, have to beat a hasty retreat - they have to be particularly bold to return with the prospect that they may already have been observed.

CRIME ANALYSIS AND PREVENTION STRATEGY.

The City of Berwick and the Shire of Pakenham are developing a Crime Analysis and Prevention Strategy which will help forge a partnership between the community, government and non-government agencies to promote an environment less conductive to crime and violence.

The Crime Analysis and Prevention Strategy will: - provide a clear analysis of current levels and potential trends within the two municipalities;

- Identify community perceptions in relation to crime.
- Identify existing agencies involved in crime prevention.
- Identify strategies for reducing crime in the area.

Well known identity Frank'the shearer' Buck passed away on July 23rd at Dandenong Hospital. Gone with him are many pages of history and the many skills of an old time shearer. One of the old school' and a true gentleman he will be missed by many of his friends in and around Beaconsfield.

Born in Collingwood he was orphaned as a teenager and things were very tough for he and his older brother. To support himself he worked hard cutting wood, milking cows and shearing from the early age of 15. During the depression times he worked in Mines at Woods Points. During World War 2 he was sent to Wonthaggi to help mine coal and cut wood. But the shearing shed was second home to Frank and over the years he was well respected as one who could shear very cleanly. He was a generous man who shared his knowledge and gave his time over many years to demonstrate shearing especially at the Berwick Show.

He worked at many farms around Beaconsfield including the property of Lord Casey in Berwick.

Despite a heart attack around 70 years of age he continued to shear local pet lambs for hobby farmers on a regular basis.

Times were tough again for Frank when his wife Sylvia passed away but he retained his dignity and self respect till the very end. Little known to many was Franks love for poetry and his ability to recite which he shared with a privileged few - sacly its all gone with him.

Pictured below is Frank Buck as many friends will remember him. He was in his seventies when this photo was taken.

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
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BEACONSFIELD CUB NEWS

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

A recent wine tasting saw a group of four of the best 1992 Cabernet based reds tasted masked. The experienced panel unanimously selected the same wine as the preferred wine on the night.

The Wines were:-

1. BOWEN ESTATE COONAWARRA CABERNET MERLOT - CABERNET FRANCE 1992. \$18.50 R.R.P. about \$14.50 discount. A huge wine, big flavours, lovely soft cabernet matching tannin and acid. A hot month feel, from the extrmely high 15% alcohol. A wine for heroes.

2. YARRA BURN YARRA VALLEY CABERNETS 1992 - \$18.50 R.R.P. - about \$14.50 discount. A different wine altogether to number 1. Elegant lighter cabernet. Tannin a bit too assertive (at this stage). Although a trophy winning wine, was the least favoured.

3 DALWHINNIE MOONAMBEL CABERNET 1992 - \$25.00 R.R.P. A big rich full flavoured red. Big nose, flavours and tannin. High alcohol. Not clearly a Cabernet as it had some basket press. Shiraz style about it - this was not seen as a fault, just a comment.



4. PETER LEHMANN
BAROSSA VALLEY
CABERNET. - 1992. \$10 \$11. discount. An outstanding
wine. Medium weight. A
floral nose, violets almost
sweet. Soft and supple in the
mouth where the warmth released further perfumes so
that you are left breathing
the wine long after it is swallowed. Almost perfect balance of flavour acid and tannin.

When the labels were exposed most of us were surprised to see the \$10. wine Peter Lehmann, easily rise to the top. It has happened before and I guess it will happen again'the dearest is not always the best'.

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OUR NATURAL WORLD

Much is written about diets these days. We are bombarded with information about the relative merits or de-merits of different foods, often accompanied with boring charts and statistics that are as interesting as watching grass grow.

Busy people are turned off quickly by all this semi scientific analysis, using words that sometimes require research to properly comprehend and who has the time?

On the other hand a true story, full of drama and human interest will often achieve more than all the clever waffle designed to impressive the readers.

In August 1914, the "Kronprinz Wilhelm" a converted german cruiser, left port and roamed the seas for 255 days, its orders to function as raider on allied shipping, to sink as many as possible and at the same time too provision itself for food and fuel from the holds of its victims. It was never to touch any port or make any landfall for the wars duration.

She sank 14 steamers and seized vast supplies of fine white flour, fresh beef, port, hams, bacons, smoked meats, potatoes, canned vegetable, dried peas, and beans, sugar, cakes, coffee, condensed milk, refined cheese, beer and champagne.

To most people this would seem like a dream diet and would have been the envy of an average family in wartime countries of any side. A point to note here, there was a total absence of fresh fruit and vegetables in this plunder of foodstuffs.

After six months at sea mysterious sickness started striking the crew down. They became very pale, their pupils dilated, and shortness of breath troubled them. Swollen ankles developed with pains in arms and leigs.

After 8 months alarming symptoms developed - paralysis, dilated hearts, atrophy of muscles, neuralosias, an emia and constipation. Fifty of the men could not stand, and the crew were dropping at the rate of two a day.

On April 11, 1915, the ship made a dash into James River, and anchored off Newportt News, Virginia, U.S.A., a floating hopspital with 500 sick and dying men on board, and a dropping rate of 4 every day.

The American medical men called aboard, were unable to diagnose the malady, until a journalist, Alfred McCann, appeared. He was a nature student and knew straight away that their diet was the cause of their illness.

They had lived on cooked, denatured "dead" foods without raw fruits and vegetables and this "High Living" diet was almost the cause of their death. The ships surgeon, Dr. Perrenon, agreed to a simple natural diet of fruit, vegetables, seeds, nuts (all fresh) as a desperate measure and awaited the results.

Within 10 days, 47 of the sick men were discharged from sick bay healthy, the rest followed over the next few weeks. The "Disease" was cured.

Let us not therefore blame nature or unkind fate for all our health problems. We are what we eat and if we eat right, then good health will follow.

Adelle Davis said, "Thousands upon thousands have studied disease; almost no one has studied health."

RECIPE CORNER

SALSA DE MARISCOS SEAFOOD SAUCE

INGREDIENTS

1/2 KG Fresh Prawns
1/2 KG Fresh scallops
2 small onions (finely diced)
100 gm butter
2/3 cup flour
800 ml milk

1 teaspn salt 425 ml Salsa Cruda

1 tablespoon Jalapenos (finely chopped)

METHDOD

Melt butter in a saucepan over low heat Add onions and saute until soft.

Remove from heat and stir in the flour to make roux. Continue to stir until smooth.

Add the milk, which has been slightly warmed, salsa cruda, salt and Jalapenos.

Return to the heat and stir until smooth. Bring sauce just to the boil, stirring constantly, and add prawns and scallops.


Mix seafood through and turn down heat. Continue to cook for a first principle to heat praying and scallops through

a further five minutes to heat prawns and scallops through. Remove from heat.

Can be used as a filling for either enchiladas or burritos, or over a boaked avocado.

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
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
5 Mark the position of the cross members on each side of the frame and then glue and rail them into place. Finally attach the 1500 x 750mm (5 x 2ft 6in) piece on to F6 and to the ends of the upright frame.



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
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BLAST FROM THE PAST

We publish EXTRACTS FROM THE PAKENHAM GAZETTE AND BERWICK SHIRE NEWS dated 30th January 1974.

With Municipal Restructuring happening now in August 1994, this article raises many questions that are just as relevant toady as they were 20 years ago.

30-1-74 "PROTEST OVER NAME OF SHIRE"

The decision of Berwick Shire Council not to change the name of the municipality to Pakenham was very strongly criticised at a meeting of Pakenham Show Committee last week.

"It was claimed that ratepayers had given a clear indication of their desire for this change and that no substantial argument for opposing it had been advanced. It was further pointed out that of all the letters forwarded to Council and to the Press on this subject not one had doubted that the name should remain the same. More than 80 percent had stated their preference for Pakenham.

Ex Crs P.B. Ronald and R.R. Wakenshaw and Messrs D.J. Bourke and H.B. Thomas were appointed to put the views of the Society to the Council and to the Minister."

"ITS STILL BERWICK SHIRE" January 1974

The Shire Secretary (Mr. Wallis) submitted a report in which he set out details of the replies which had been sent in since council decided last October to delay the decision for 60 days to give ratepayers the opportunity to express their views on the subject of changing the name.

He listed the following bodies favouring a change to Pakenham Shire

Bunyip Progress Association however favoured West Gippsland. Of three private letters received one favoured Bunurong, one Toomuc, one Beaconsfield.

Cr. Hosking said that it worried him to think that they were considering altering the name of Shire of Berwick, by which name it had been known for so long. Because the township of Berwick was no longer part of this Shire was no reason for a name change. He wanted to know what money would be involved in the change over. It would mean altering every sign, every truck, every plan would be out of order.





"GOING FISHING" (Written by Ralph Neve)

How many times have you heard these words? I have said this so many times that I have lost count.

But what does really happen when you arrive at the waters edge? You cast out a line and often spend the day sitting there in hope. But there is more to fishing you know.

I have found that preparing before you go ensures success. You have to ask yourself what fish you are going out to catch then decide on which bait to use. Depending on exactly where you are going to fish. you then decide on what tackle you will use.

The technology in fishing tackle nowadays is incredible. In World Championships we are using rods 12' to 20' in length and poles up to 18 metres. These are needed to get the bait to the fish on

what we call presents tion fine lines of 2 to 3 pounds with hooks of 20 - 18 - 16 size. All these things make good presentation.

When fishing for recfin in a lake I use a 13 foct rod, a Mitchell 300 reel and load with a 3 lb line. The float I use is known as a V'aggle of (2AAA) and hook size 18 that I tie to 1.7 line. I plumb the depth of the water so that if the depth is 7 ft, my ine from float to hook is 8 t which gives me 1 ft on the bottom. To bait, I chop a dozen worms into small pieces and drop them into the spot that I intend to fish. I ther bait the hook with small red worms and fish over the same spot. This method has yielded me good catches over the years.

If we should meet on the river bank then stop for a chat. Happy fishing


