### CAPITAL WORKS - COMMUNITY ORGANISATIONS.

Community Organisations managing public facilities on behalf of Council on Crown or Council owned land are soon to receive application forms for Capital Works Grants. Sporting Clubs and other organisations who use facilities run by Committees of Management should consult with the Committee of Management to obtain endorsement of the project.

As Capital funding is constrained, only works of a priority nature will receive consideration. This is the only opportunity to apply for Capital Works Grants for 1995/96. Maintenance Grants will be dealt with separately through Council's budget process.

The policy formulas for funding are:- Recreation projects may receive assistance on a dollar for dollar basis. Kindergartens, Maternal and Child Health Centre, Neighbourhood Houses, Community Centres and Halls may receive assistance on a \$2.00 Council : \$1.00 Committee basis.

The closing date for applications is FRIDAY 28th APRIL.

This earlier timeline relates to the requirement of Council to now implement budgets effective from July 1st instead of October. Assistance is available from the Shire's Community Liaison Officer, John White (059) 411 011.

#### SENIOR CITIZENS' WEEK

#### RAINFALL IN BEACONSFIELD

Since the February 1995 Banner (Vol 7 No 1), there has not been a lot to report.

Despite some good falls of rain early in the month, the total rainfall for February was only 18.9mm with seven days on which rain was recorded.

February is usually a low rainfall month but higher falls are sometimes encountered (eg 1990 & 1994)

1985 12.8mm 1986 32.1mm 1987 58.6mm

1988 1989 13.2mm 92.3mm 1991 2.0mm 1992 25.4mm 1993 63.8mm 1994 119.6mm

1995 18.9mm

The total Summer rainfall ( Dec 94, Jan & Feb 95) was only 131.5mm. This is the lowest Summer Rainfall since 1984/85 (87.4mm) The Summer rainfall for 93/94 was 296.2mm for 1992/ 93 259.3mm

Up to the time of writing (28th March) the March rainfall had been 49.0mm. There was a good fall of rain recorded on the 8th March (26.8mm) Apart from this, small falls of rain have been recorded on 13 days.

Albie, known to many in Beaconsfield was the cheery man you would see walking daily to the shops. Night times often he would be chairing meetings of the Progress Association.

Born in Moreland near Glenroy, he first went to school in North Fitzroy. He left school at 14 and went to work in a hat factory. He quickly decided that he would rather be self-employed and became a fruit vendor. From there he became a general carrier and had his own trucks. For the last 8 years of working he was with the Waverley

Council in Parks and Gardens. He retired in 1982.

Albie served in the 2nd World War from 1942 in Bougainville. New Guinea. After the war he and his family lived in Hurstbridge before moving to Dandenong in 1949.

Woodworking and painting became Albie's two retirement hobbies. As well as this he was very active in community affairs. He has served with the Anti Cancer Council and the Dandenong Citizens Advice Bureau. He was a strong believer in preparing for retirement and was very active with the Dandenong Early Planning for Retirement Group.

After a very active life Albie was unfortunately afflicted with Motor Neurone Disorder and passed away quietly on 2nd March. He leaves his wife Grace and sons.

He will be sadly missed by many in Beaconsfield especially the Progress Association with whom he was President for 2 years.

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### PERSONALITY FILE - KATHLEEN CLARKE

Many people still living in Beaconsfield will remember our friendly Railway Station Mistress Kath Clarke. Wife of the late Kevin Clarke she now lives happily in retirement in Adamson Road, Beaconsfield.

Born in Berwick Bush Nursing Hospital, she has lived in the area ever since. Kath is very much a local girl and wouldn't live anywhere else. Her father was Mr. Whiteside the orchardist and the family lived on the farm in Whiteside Road. Her two grandfathers were both Presbyterian Ministers.

Kath attended Officer State Primary School and then Dandenong High School. In those days she enjoyed choral singing in Gilbert & Sullivan productions and the like. Kath also enjoyed the local dances at the old Beaconsfield Public Hall and that is where she first met her husband Kevin. They married in 1950 at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church in Berwick. Kevin had moved into the area in 1947 with his family and they lived in the first Soldier Settlement home and farm on the corner of Adamson and Soldiers Road. It was all part of Lord Casey's Edrington Estate. Kevin and Kath also lived in this same house until Kevin's mother died in 1968. They then moved into the brick family home in Adamson Road in which Kath lives to this day.

Kaths first position of employment was as a typist with the S.E.C. in Dandenong. Her

other job for which she is best known was that of part time caretaker of the Beaconsfield Railway Station for Victorian Railways. She went on to be the full time Station Mistress and held this position for 29 years and 9 months till 1989. She had to leave to care for Kevin who become sick at that time. "There never was a dull moment working on the station," said Kath.

Despite having a busy working life, Kath had and still has other pursuits and hobbies especially now that she is retired. She is an active member of the Pakenham and District Historical Society and has proudly arranged a Bicentennial display and transport exhibition for them.

She has a special interest in local affairs and is on the committee of the Beaconsfield Progress Association. The other hobby that occupies her time in retirement is craftwork and she practices this with the Country Womens Association. Kath started her craft with spinning and progressed to being an expert in fine needle and lace work. She also does velvet patchwork.

Although being a strong home base lady, Kath has enjoyed overseas travel to Canada, America and New Zealand. She intends to travel some more soon. Kath also enjoys going to concerts.

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### LITTER BUGGED

It bugs me that 'Clean Up Australia Day', Sunday March 5th came and went with little action in the township of Beaconsfield.

I phoned the Berwick tip that day for a free pass as I intended to do my own share of cleaning under the railway bridge on Soldiers Road, along the creek and down either side of the road between. I was coldly informed that I must pay \$10. unless collecting for the Berwick Rotary Club or Narre Warren North Progress Association. Why make it so exclusive to pick up litter I ask? Why cannot every household have a free pass to dump rubbish on this special day? It was disappointing to learn that there were only two community organisations collecting locally on March 5th.

Prevention is better than cure but frankly I cannot see either happening. Surely, Scouts, Guides, Schools, Church Youth Groups and sporting organisations could all have been out there side by side on Clean Up Australia Day to be made jointly aware of the extent of the problem. It might cure some of the adults from throwing litter out of the family car and prevent some of their children copy-

ing the bad habit when they grow up. Adults are clearly the worst offenders.

My wife and I did in fact do a clean up as planned and half filled my utility in very quick time. The most commonly dropped roadside litter was empty cigarette packets, cans of UDL Bourbon and Coke and McDonalds take away food packaging.

I feel that fines should be more rigorously imposed ie. \$100 for minor offenders and \$200. or more for intentionally wilful dumpers of rubbish. Consider that you can get 96 days in jail for not paying parking fines. Tobacco companies. drink firms and fast food chains should all display the fines on their packaging with a warning. And there should be ongoing public awareness campaigns with slogans like: "Join the Drive Against Litter" or "If you Litter and Drive You're a Bloody Nuisance!'

It bugs me that 'Clean Up Australia Day' fails to teach people not to litter. Furthermore Councils seem to be cutting back on their cleaning services. So wake up Australia, and lets all make an effort to "STOP THE DROP AND LITTER LESS".

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### OUR NATURAL WORLD

Every day we use words common in speech and which we rarely think about in any deep sense. They are part of speech tradition handed down, learnt from others during our lifetime. It's surprising but true that most common words and phrases we use daily come from religious backgrounds, long forgotten. Here are a few examples:-

To Lounge about :- The word lounging applied to a state of inactivity and relaxation and came from the name of a soldier, the Roman Centurion, Longinus. He is referred to in the Gospel of St. John ( 19.34) who allegedly pierced with a spear the side of the crucified Christ. This soldier is said to have unconcernedly and lazily leaned on his spear at the time, also stretched out idly on Christ's coat. Thus his name Longinus, became over time lounging or to lounge about.

On the water wagon: Those who abstain from alcoholic drink are said to be "on the wagon". This phrase goes back to the early days of the Salvation Army in New York, when picking up drunks off the street to drive them to a safe shelter. For this purpose they used a water wagon which they found ideal for the task. This simple historical fact resulted in the well known phrase.

Bloody Mary: No, not swearing at a female but the alcoholic drink of tomato juice and vodka, well known to pub patrons and party goers. This blood red mixture was named after Queen Mary the 1st of

Great Britain. King Henry VIII's daughter. She was nick-named "Bloody Mary" because of her ruthless attempts to reestablish Roman Catholicism in 1555. She pitilessly persecuted Protestants of whom at least 300 died as Martyrs. An ugly beginning for a popular drink.

At the Eleventh Hour: Something that happens in the nick of time with hardly a moment to spare is said to occur "at the eleventh hour". This strange expression for such lateness came from the parable of the labourers in the vineyard from the Gospels. Math 20, 1 - 16). This speaks of those men arriving almost at the end of the working day, as being hired "at the eleventh hour).

A working day then extended from dawn to dusk. This period was divided into sections or "hours". The twelfth of them was obviously nearest to sunset and hence the end of the working day, with little time to do anything if workers turned up so close to sunset.

It is a strange coincidence, that at the end of World War 1, the armistice came into force at the eleventh hour, on the eleventh day of the eleventh

The weakest go to the wall:-Early churches had no seats so the congregation either stood or knelt. Later on benches were fixed to the walls and were reserved for the sick and elderly. Therefore it was quite correct to say that "the weakest go to the wall."

Saved by the bell: Anyone escaping defeat or misfortune by a narrow margin at the last moment is said to be "saved by the bell". This expression refers to an incident in England during the 17th century when a sentry night guard duty at Windsor Castle, was accused of being asleep on duty, a capital offence at the time. He was court martialled and sentenced to death.

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


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### NO LOCAL BUTCHER IN BEACONSFIELD.

A little bit of history has gone with the closing of the only retail butcher's shop in Beaconsfield.

Originally the butcher's shop was located as part of the general store in Beaconsfield Avenue, opposite the station and was run by Graham Westaway.

In 1939 Dick Cole moved into the present shop next to the Post Office. In the early 1950's it was a thriving business. Dick Cole employed Dempsey Parkes (or Demps as he was fondly known), then later his brother Jim, who went into the army when war broke out and after the war finished returned to work for Dick Cole. Jim always had a cheerful greeting for his customers and was often heard whistling while he worked in the shop.

When Mr. Cole retired, Jim bought the business employing an extra man which was needed at the time.

Later when Jim's son, Bryan was old enough he joined his father and carried on after Jim, who through failing

health had to give up work. Brian later sold the business but unfortunately it started to decline and was no longer viable.

It was closed at the end of March after 56 years of trading.

For those of us who found it convenient to drop into the butcher shop after going to the Post Office or shops and now to find it closed, it is a big blow

With the rapid expansion of Beaconsfield it seems unfortunate that we cannot support a butcher's shop which is much needed for those of us who don't drive or for other reasons don't wish to go to Berwick for meat.

Certainly there are supermarkets but the cheerful and friendly service of our local butcher has gone forever.

This is something the Citizens Advice Bureau in Pakenham warns that despite what the high pressure advertising proclaims CREDIT COSTS, after all credit is money offered for sale. It is offered for sale in the form of a loan and must be paid back in full along with the cost which is commonly known as interest.

Whether it's a home loan or the credit card, the longer you take to pay it back the more it costs, so the first thing you need to check out is can you afford it. One method of answering this question is to prepare a budget to see how and where you spend your money, examine your needs and wants and then make your plans for your financial future allowing enough back-up for emergencies.


The Citizen Advice Bureau can help here with a budget sheet. All you have to do is call in and pick one up as they are free.

Another money trap you need to watch is the advertised "No Win - No Pay". Be sure to ask what will be the cost if you should lose. Whatever you do regarding money matters be sure to shop around, discuss it with your partner or family before you commit yourself.

As of late March the vintage in Vic and SA looks like being a difficult one, yields are significantly down in SA and prices per tonne for grapes have viciously increased. News from the Yarra Valley and Mornington Peninsula indicates that while quantities will be about normal the grapes are very late in ripening; a warm April is urgently needed.





Add bacon or ham any other extras. Top with more shredded cheese.



He protested that he was not asleep and had heard St Pauls bell (in London) sounding the midnight hour, but instead of 12 rings there were 13, an oddity that was dismissed by the Court as a ruse to escape punishment.

When the sentence became known in London, the citizens confirmed that his testimony was true, and he was set free just in time to avoid execution. The term "saved by the bell" is thus very clear in it's meaning, particularly to the soldier in question.

Now a short one on our great country Australia. The original full name of Australia was Terra Australis De Espirito Sanjo" meaning the " Southenland of the Holy Spirit." Our national name derives from the least significant part of it that which indicates the continents "southern" position on the globe. With God left out, only the down under remained.


