At the April BPA meeting Guest Speaker Lorna LaBlache, Cardinia Shire Senior Town Planner provided an update on the Glismann Road Development Plan and Amendment to rezone the land to allow for residential development. Information was also provided on the Beaconsfield Structure Plan adopted by Council in December 2013 and Amendment C220. At the May General Council meeting Cardinia Shire Council adopted Planning Scheme Amendment C220. Details of these two planning matters can be obtained from Cardinia Shire Council.

The Interactive Touchscreen Project for the Beaconsfield Honour Board and World War I soldiers is nearly completed. There are some matters still to be completed including computer software issues and a base for the Touchscreen Unit. Special thanks to the Committee members and IT consultant Barry Hyde for the work done on the project. When the Touchscreen unit is fully operational there will be an official opening on a date to be advised. The project has been mostly funded by a Grant from the Commonwealth Government Department of Veterans Affairs.

The Beaconsfield Banner is produced by Committee members on a voluntary basis; however we need advertising revenue to cover BPA administration costs and printer's costs. Lack of Car Parking at Beaconsfield Railway Station

Increased car parking at the Beaconsfield Railway Station is needed to cater for the increase in patronage of the station. Current car parking to support the community and commuters is not sufficient.

The lack of car parking is resulting in overflow into surrounding residential streets, which is affecting the amenity and liveability of residents.

Based on current conditions, the overflow effect of commuters parking in local streets is significantly affecting the congestion, safety and local amenity of the Beaconsfield Township. Residential streets in Beaconsfield such as Woods Street, Railway Avenue, Goff Street, Railway and Beaconsfield Avenue are impacted on a daily basis by overflow parking issues. At the upcoming state election, a funding commitment from both major parties is essential for the upgrade of Beaconsfield Railway Station car park, utilising the adjacent Vic Track land.

In addition to increased car parking, additional bus services are also needed to improve bus and train connectivity. Such an investment in public transport would reduce the need to drive to the station.

Car parking at Beaconsfield Railway Station has been one of the most common concerns raised with me during the past couple of years. I too have experienced the frustration of driving around a full car park at 7 in the morning and the struggle to find any parking in neighbouring streets.

The lack of car parking at the train station is not only an issue for commuters – it is also a problem for the nearby residents who face the daily inconveniences of a street full of parked cars.

I have written to the Minister on multiple occasions raising the need to upgrade the station car park, with no success. Every time I have written to the current Minister for Public Transport, the response has been the same: there are no plans to upgrade the car park. It is simply not good enough.

Under the former Victorian Government, 157 new car parks were built at Beaconsfield Station. Since then, the current Victorian Government has ignored the growth we have seen in Cardinia over the past four years. We have five families moving to Cardinia every day. That is a lot of extra commuters - and no extra parks.

Car parking is not the only issue at Beaconsfield we have raised with the Minister; it is also the lack of toilet facilities, which a number of residents have contacted me about. The Minister's response to the lack of toilets was for commuters to catch a train to Dandenong Station, get off their train and use the toilet at Dandenong, and then wait for the next train to continue their commute. I don't know about you, but sometimes when you have to go you have to go and a 15 minute train trip to Dandenong Station just doesn't cut it.

The Minister denies Beaconsfield commuters toilets due to Beaconsfield not being a premium station, yet the current Victorian Government built toilet facilities at the non-premium Hallam Station in 2016.

Over the next couple of weeks, I will be heading out to the streets of Beaconsfield to talk to residents and commuters regarding the issues at Beaconsfield Station. Over the past months I have received many emails and calls with concerns about the live animal export industry, from people within the La Trobe electorate and across the country.

On the 17th May 2018 the Government announced changes that will allocate greater space to sheep on live export ships to the Middle East and other recommendations. I was pleased to hear this, however, I do not believe these changes are nearly enough to deal with the problem.

This is why I supported a Private Members' Bill on the issue that was introduced in Federal Parliament by Susan Ley MP on 21st May, and co-sponsored by Sarah Henderson MP and myself.

The Bill is entitled the 'Live Sheep Long Haul Export Prohibition Bill 2018', and its intention is to restrict the long haul export of live sheep during June to September each year. The ultimate aim of the Bill is to ensure the phasing out over five years of all longhaul live sheep exports from Australia. I am also calling for:

• The immediate introduction of independent veterinary experts on the ships instead of vets who are employed by the exporters;

• The process to be managed by another department within the Government instead of the Department of Agriculture, with whom regrettably I have lost faith.

I have listened to the community, and believe the case for continuing long haul sheep exports fails on both animal welfare and economic grounds. I will continue to fight on behalf of the animals until this industry is entirely phased out.

THE 3 Rs – Roads, Rates & ROCKS....

I'm sure you have noticed the recent road resurfacing around our village lately.

This is part of Council's annual road maintenance program to prevent more extensive and expensive damage in the future by stopping water damage, which can get in under the surface and lead to potholes and damage to the subsurface which is extremely expensive to repair once it sets in.

Resurfacing works are generally required once every twenty years roughly, so we should not be inconvenienced again for a while, we hope. So even though the roads look perfectly ok from our perspective, the experts know that if we want to keep these roads in great condition and still be able to afford it, then we need to maintain them (a bit like painting your house regularly to prevent the weather from rotting the timbers or rusting the metals).

Now that I have looked further into this I see that these resurfacing works are an annoying but necessary step to maintain our local roads.

If you still have loose stones on your road, then it has received a 'spray seal' as opposed to a full 'asphalt' resurfacing. This is when stones are laid over a layer of bitumen, to provide a hard wearing, skid resistant surface and because more stones are used than stick to the surface, you may notice them tapping the underside of your car as you drive over them.

These extra stones are left on the surface for up to seven days before being swept off then they are recycled. So please be mindful of any loose stones when driving through affected roads and slow down knowing that it is only a temporary issue until they are swept from the roadway by the contractors.



On the upside, we should have great roads to drive on for the next 20 years.

Glismann Road Update



Glismann Road Development Plan

re: Glismann Road update

In December 2013 the Beaconsfield Structure Plan was adopted by Council. An action of the structure plan is to rezone land in the 'Glismann Road area' from the Rural Living Zone to a residential zone to allow for residential subdivision.

The Glismann Road Development Plan is a planning tool used to help ensure that properties are developed in a cohesive manner. The current title boundaries of the lots do not lend themselves to be developed in isolation of each other.

The amendment will also consider the development's public expenses, within the amendment area, and will allow for development to be bound to an

Infrastructure Contributions Plan (ICP) via a separate planning scheme amendment, so as to minimise the cost to the wider community due to the changes in this area, e.g. road/footpath and intersection development, etc.

Council is requested to seek authorisation from the Minister for Planning for Council to prepare Amendment C238 to the Cardinia Planning Scheme to rezone the land to allow for residential development and implement the Glismann Road Development Plan. This has been delayed at the Minister's request.

The amendment also provides direction for the provision of the road network, public open space and traffic management and that all major planning issues are resolved prior to the commencement of subdivision development.

The Plan also hopes to safeguard our natural features by carefully integrating them into the development of the land to minimise adverse impact on the amenity of the area by balancing the need for new housing against the environmental constraints and opportunities of the area.

Application seeking authorisation from the Minister to prepare an Amendment was lodged with the Minister before Easter. A copy of the Minister's letter has been uploaded onto Council's website, as is further information.

But instead now they will have a similar situation to that of the existing Lyle Ave street's residents around school drop-off/pick up times.

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Beaconsfield Kindergarten

Beaconsfield Kindergarten has some exciting plans underway for 2019, with changes to our program models and session times. As a community based, independently managed early childhood service we have the ability to be responsive to our local community and families, while continuing to provide high quality early childhood educational programs. Below is a snapshot of the different programs we will be offering in 2019. Families should enrol at Beaconsfield Kindergarten through Cardinia Shire Council's online portal. After families are enrolled at our service, they will be given the opportunity to express their interest in any of the programs below.



Climbing Trees

Bush Kinder

We are very excited to be offering Bush Kindergarten in specific programs from 2019. Bush Kinder provides outdoor learning experiences not typically available in a traditional kindergarten setting. Children are encouraged to play, explore and learn in a bush or natural environment. Current research indicates the benefits for children participating in nature-based play experiences are many and varied. The Early Years Learning Framework for Australia states that play spaces in natural environments 'invite open-ended interactions, spontaneity, risk-taking, exploration, discovery, and connection with nature. They foster an appreciation of the natural environment, develop environmental awareness and provide a platform for ongoing environmental education.' Bush Kinder recognises the place the bush has in Australian folklore and the significance of the land in aboriginal culture. Beaconsfield Kindergarten's Bush Kinder program will run at both Wilson Botanic Park and Akoonah Park. Children will attend one Bush Kinder session each week during terms 2 and 3.

Two-day Program

Family centred practice is integral to our service delivery at Beaconsfield Kindergarten. We recognise that working families require choice and flexibility when seeking enrolment in sessional kindergarten. In 2019 families will have the opportunity to enrol their child in two 7.5-hour sessions per week. Our educators are highly qualified and experienced in providing educational programs which balance the learning needs of individual children with regular food and rest breaks.

Three-day Program

Beaconsfield Kindergarten's three-day program model will continue to be offered in 2019. Groups will attend either two longer sessions (5.5 to 6 hours) and one shorter session, or three sessions of similar length. Three-day programs provide children with consistent learning environments and experiences throughout each week.

Kinder Readiness Program

Beaconsfield Kindergarten's Kinder Readiness Program:

- caters specifically for children who turn four between 1 January and 30 April
- provides two 2.5-hour sessions per week

• is run by a Bachelor-qualified teacher and Diplomaqualified co-teacher

• meets the specific needs of children seeking stimulating learning opportunities alongside 4- yearold peers, although they may not be ready for a 15 hour per week 4yo kindergarten program

• provides opportunities to develop social skills and engage with peers of a similar age

• helps children to develop a sense of connectedness and belonging in a large group setting.

James Patrick Osborne

Jim Osborne was born in 1879, the son of Irish immigrants who had settled in the mining town of Walhalla. His was a traditional upbringing of the time, numerous siblings and attending school. Through his teenage years he enjoyed the local cricket ground, playing both cricket and football. Jim saw the introduction of electricity and the telephone in his formative years. Reaching employment age, he went to work as a battery hand at the mine in Walhalla.

Ellen Osborne, Jim's sister married William Keating from "Fairwood Park", Beaconsfield. The family had experienced sadness with the loss of a sibling but the death of Ellen's husband at Beaconsfield was life changing for Jim.

For him responsibility and duty called, he moved to Beaconsfield in support of his pregnant sister to manage the property she now owned, "Fairwood Park". Jim went on to grow crops and assist his sister, immersing himself in the Beaconsfield community.

On Friday 28 July 1915 duty called again, Jim set off to Melbourne to enlist for World War One; as described the fresh faced, blue eyed, dark hair, physically fit man was accepted, and returned to Beaconsfield that day to farewell his family and friends.

The following article describes Sunday 2 August 1915:

"The accommodation of the Beaconsfield station was taxed on Sunday evening last, when the relatives, sweethearts and friends of "our recruits" assembled to give the boys an encouraging farewell on the occasion of their going into camp. The recruits who left were Messrs Arthur Bragg, Jim Osborne, Alec May, James Rix, Leslie Paternoster and John Tucker. Other recruits are already in camp. Mr Ray Thompson delivered a short address and on behalf of Mrs Paternoster, presented each soldier with a flag. The recruits were greeted with musical honours sung with zest and feeling and this was followed by the hearty singing of the National Anthem. Touching scenes marked the fare-wells, but one could not feel but impressed by the spirit of noble, unselfish devotion that dominated all present. Hearty cheers were raised as the train moved out, and hats, flags and handkerchiefs were waved until the train was out of sight".

As we stand here today we can all imagine the heartache and overwhelming sadness the families of Beaconsfield felt waving good bye to their young men some of which were never to return.

On the 19 August 1916 "in the field", James Patrick Osborne, Service Number 2733, Rank Private, from the 24th Infantry Battalion 1 to 8 Reinforcements was killed in action close to the frontline in Northern France.

Jim was never to return to his life in Beaconsfield, he paid the ultimate price, a man of commitment and duty forever loyal to his family and to his country; Australia.
