

Central Ward councillors are concerned about the lack of dedicated active recreational reserves in the growth townships. We are all closely looking at possible locations for additional reserves. We are also in the process of arranging organised town walk throughs of townships within central ward. These walkthroughs will be published and residents will be able to highlight issues

of concern to attending councillors and council staff.

Council meeting times have now changed from 4.00pm to 7.00pm. This change to an evening starting time ensures that council is more accessible, particularly for those who have family or work commitments during the afternoon. I invite all residents to attend council meetings to see council at work.

Cardinia Shire Commonwealth Games Getting Involved events are coming up. Mini Commonwealth Games will be held on Tuesday the 7th March (primary schools) and Wednesday the 8th March (secondary schools). The primary

school events will take place at the Toomuc Recreational Reserve in Pakenham and secondary school events will take place at a range of venues includina Toomuc Recreational Reserve, Bunyip State Park and the Koo Wee Rup Pool. 

After facing what may be the biggest test of their lives in battling cancer. survivors will be recognised for their strength and courage during the opening lap of The Cancer Council Victoria's Relay For Life for Casey Cardinia.

All cancer survivors are welcome to take part, whether they are a member of a Relay For Life team or not. They will wear a red sash during the lap of honour as Relay participants cheer them on.

Casey Cardinia committee chair Deborah Ditchburn says the Survivors' Walk is a great way to unite the many people in our community that have survived а cancer diagnosis.

"The Survivors' Walk is open to people who have battled cancer and are now cancer-free, as well as those currently undergoing treatment," Mrs Ditchburn says.

"You do not need to have raised any money or be a member of a Relay team to take part, and we would encourage all cancer survivors to take part in what will be a special celebration of life to start this very important event."

Mrs Ditchburn says carers are also welcome to take part in the opening lap in recognition of the important role they play in supporting survivors.

A moving Candlelight Ceremony will also be held at 9pm. Hundreds of candle tributes bearing personal messages will line the inside of the track, lit in memory and support of someone fighting cancer or in memory of loved ones lost. People can buy candles at the track on the night.

Cancer survivors wishing to take part in the Survivors' Walk can register at the registration tent from 4pm. The walk is part of the free Opening Ceremony which begins at 5.45pm.

News from the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade

The Beaconsfield Fire Brigade will be holding a giant bazaar sale on Sunday 9 April 2006. Brigade Kept Busy

Firefighters from the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade have been kept busy since Christmas with a number of call outs. Significant fires and incidents have included:

* A truck fire on the Princes Freeway in late December. The truck was carrying hay bails and smoke from the fire resulted in the closure of the freeway for a couple of hours. Fire trucks from Beaconsfield, Berwick, Narre Warren and Hallam were responded to the fire.

* A tanker and crews being sent to the Morwell open cut coal mine to assist in controlling a large fire in the mine.

* A tanker and crews being sent to a large bushfire in the Moondarra State Park north of Moe. This fire was one of a number of major fires across Victoria during January which stretched the state's firefighting resources and had a significant cost in terms of lives and property lost. These fires highlight the importance of people living in high risk fire areas to have a plan and be prepared to protect themselves against a bushfire.

* A power pole fire on the corner of the Princes Highway and O'Neil Road in early January. The pole snapped in half as a result of the fire causing high voltage pole lines to fall through the middle of the intersection. The brigade was unable to extinguish the fire for two hours until electricity crews could ensure that the power has been completely shut off.

They have quickly settled into their new school lives and are having so much fun getting to know everyone and find their way around.







Community **Achievement Award** - Contribution to the **Local Environment**

I have been a member of the Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary since the group started in 1998. I was 20 years old at the time and had just started studying Environmental Science and Teaching. When we first began, I didn't know the names of any of the plants, let alone which ones were the weeds that we had to remove! I loved the local bush, to walk my dog through the reserve and just wanted to help look after it.

I've done a whole range of things in my involvement with the Friends Group, although none of it has ever been 'work'. I'm really interested in sharing what I've learned with other produce people. newsletters, information posters, brochures, and

the 'Care for Cardinia Creek' website (http:// home.vicnet.net.au/ ~cardinia/Cardinia/). Over the years I've done presentations and guided walks for school and community groups, represented the group at public meetings and government panels and organised events such as Clean Up Australia Day each year.

As a group we've done a huge amount of work over the years, removing weeds in our monthly working bees. Once I learned to recognise the weeds in the reserve, the task to remove them seemed impossible.



As a group we've managed to tackle the worst areas. Walking through the reserve now, its amazing to see the regeneration of the native plants. We see animals that were rarely or never seen previously because we've improved their habitat. Its incredibly rewarding.

One of the best part of the Friends Group meetings are the suppers and the morning teas, not just because of the great food, but because it's a chance to sit back and talk with people who have become very close friends. We're all different ages, some retired, some working and some studying. Some people come for a short time and some people come month after month. year after year. Its been a great way to meet new people. I've gained so much from being a Friend.





SALLY'S GARDEN



What a difficult summer season we are having! Summer began with tropical weather giving us plentiful rain, cool dewy nights and warm sun during the day. This type of season gave us flourishing growth in the garden, where it was difficult to keep up with the weeds as well as all the pruning of the bushes.

I found the roses were large and very colourful in their first blooming and the stems on some of the bush and tree roses grew at such a rate that they needed to be staked as they were so long and heavy they merely fell over. After their summer pruning, the fresh shoots were very tender and prolific. But then along came the heat and many of these fresh young shoots were burnt and this interferes with the growth cycle as the buds do not form the same and hence the flowers can be rather stunted.

I have a hibiscus that faces the north and it can become slightly wilted in the heat of the afternoon sun but always revives after a watering. But after the first 40 degree day, all the leaves were burnt off. It will revive and survive like most of the other flowers and bushes, but needs a good feeding and watering.

It is impossible to stop the effects of the strong burning sun that we have experienced this summer, but we can mulch with mushroom or pea straw, and water deeply once or twice a week. Feed well with animal manure and water

the manure in well. Be careful not to allow the manure near the stems of the plant as this may burn the stems.

Pots of plants that are drought resistant plants have also suffered this summer. I have moved mine to the shelter of the shade house and this is the first summer I have needed to do this, so severe is the heat of the sun.

Let's look after our wild birds and leave seed and water out for them. Unfortunately, I do not have the variety of birds that I had last year. There is so much machinery noise through cutting down the trees to make way for more buildings and housing that the birds do not always come back, even though feed is left out for them. If you are a bird lover and bird watcher this is very disappointing. Once again, when some say, "that we are in a growth corridor and that means we are in the throws of progress" I strongly disagree. We need the birds not just for their beauty and song, but to rid our gardens of the harmful insects and grubs etc.

Please be very vocal to our council when developers want to build more units and turn existing housing into private businesses. This is our town, we should have the say in what we want our town to look like and be. Developers only come in to the town to make money and then move away.

Good luck in keeping your gardens as fresh as possible in this heat.



This year will see the progression of one of La Trobe's most significant road improvement, the Bryn Mawr Bridge. Last year the Minister for Local Government, Territories and Roads Jim Lloyd has announced an allocation of \$10 million for the project.

FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

ACCOUNTANT'S UPDATE

Changes to legislation and an abundance of Practice Statements, Public Rulings, Regulations and Determinations by the Australian Taxation Office continue to be made and affect many taxpayers. Some items of interest include the following:

1.INTERDEPENDENCY RELATIONSHIP

The definition of a dependant pursuant to income tax legislation prior to July 2004 included a spouse, former spouse, de facto spouse, child of the person under 18 years of age and any other person who is financially dependant. This definition was amended effective

from 1st July 2004 to include any person who has an "interdependency relationship" ie. they live together, have a close personal relationship and one or each provides financial support and/or domestic support and personal care. This largely expands the number of persons who may qualify for concessional taxation benefits for superannuation benefits paid in a interdependency relationships. The principal tax benefits relate to death benefits ETP's.

Examples of persons who may be interdependent include elderly sisters or brothers living together and

an adult child living with and caring for an elderly parent.

2. TRANSITION TO RETIREMENT PENSIONS

New changes have been made to superannuation cashing rules to include a person who has reached their preservation age whilst still in the workforce. The preservation age is currently 55 years. Superannuation can only be accessed from a noncommutable income stream eg.annuity or allocated pension. The Tax Office has advised that Part IVA anti avoidance rules will not apply where taxpayers commence receiving a transition to retirement

pension but at the same time salary sacrifice contributions to a superannuation fund which would have significant income tax benefits.

3. NON-PROFIT SECTOR

Commencing on 1st July 2005 charities must be endorsed by the Taxation Office in order to access income tax, fringe benefits tax and GST charity tax concessions. This would include exemptions from income tax and fringe benefits tax. The Charities endorsement can be viewed on the Australian Business Register. The endorsement also allows taxpayers to access a public record register of gift recipients that can receive tax deductible donations.

All taxpayers should keep abreast of changes made to ensure compliance with regulations but also take advantage of any tax benefits available which you should discuss with your Accountant.

Summer Has Definitely Arrived

Well Christmas and New Year have somehow been and gone. I hope everyone had a wonderful Christmas and that the New Year is going well. I don't know where January went (apparently we had the full 31 days) and we are now somehow in the middle of February. No doubt most of us are enjoying summer, daylight savings, warm (sometimes too warm) days and mild nights. Unfortunately, warmer weather can also bring some undesirables. Bushfires, snakes, fleas and heatstroke to name a few.

Of these, I would like to give you some help in determining what to do if you think your pet may have been bitten by a snake. I have had several clients in recently who own land, and they have made mention that they have seen more snakes than other years. I do not want to explain what signs to

look for when your pet may have been bitten by a snake, mainly because I don't want you to sit and watch your pet. Time is so very important when dealing with a snakebite. Please, if you think your pet has been bitten by a snake, head straight into the clinic. If you have time to call us to let us know you are coming in, please do so. but if you don't, just head straight in. It is far better that we observe your pet in at the clinic, so that if signs develop, we can treat them immediately. In my 10 years of experience, I have seen some dogs only start to show signs 2 hours after the bite, and others unfortunately not make it after only 10 minutes. Several factors determine how quickly the bite may affect your pet. Snakes can sometimes have what are called "dry bites" which means that no venom is injected when they strike. Do not feel that you have to bring the snake in to be

identified, there is antivenom that covers a range of snakes.

I have treated pet snakes in the past, but you may have guessed I am not the bravest when it comes to snakes. This of course leads me to an experience I had years ago, funny now, but at the time, lets say uncomfortable.

It was only 3 months after I had graduated and a client at the time brought their dog in that had been bitten by a snake. As sheer luck would have it, on this particular day, they had managed to kill the snake and delivered it to me in a hessian bag minus its head. Now, I was a new graduate, trying to become known in the area and no hurdle was too large. I took a deep breath, reached into the bag and grabbed the snake where it's head should have been. At the time I thought I was managing well, but as I

looked at it's under belly to identifiy it, the headless snake began to wrap itself up my arm! I managed not only to remain upright, but also turn a new whiter shade of white. Reading all of the James Herriot books and my Veterinary degree did not prepare me for that first one on one encounter with a snake. Happily, 3 days later the dog bounded out of the clinic as though nothing had happened to it. Sadly, 10 years later I am still coming to terms with the day I grappled with what appeared at the time to be a 20 metre headless snake.

Please do not hesitate to bring your pet straight to the clinic if you think it may have been bitten by a snake. Much better that we observe it and find that it has not been bitten than the other consequences.



'Family Law Concerns'

supplied by Peninsula Community Legal Centre

Changes to be introduced into Federal Parliament on 7 February may represent a misguided attempt by the Federal Government to address findings that many children do not live with their fathers or relate to their fathers on a regular basis, says Brendan Stackpole, Solicitor-in-Charge of Family Law Program, Peninsula Community Legal Centre.

Mr Stackpole says:

"There is an assumption in

the community that the law is somehow conspiring against fathers to deny them their rightful contact with their children. This seems to be the view put by a number of so-called "father's rights" groups, who seem to have had considerable influence regarding the proposed legislation.

In relation to the concerns of father's rights groups, it is our view that the Family Law Act does not have a gender-

bias. The fact is that, if a mother has been the primary carer for children during the relationship and if the children have resided with her since separation, it makes good sense for that role to continue to ensure stability for the children. Of course, if the father has fulfilled that role, then he is likely to be the resident parent. The law tries to be practical."

Peninsula Community Legal Centre's Principal Solicitor, Victoria Mullings, agrees with Mr Stackpole and says: "Peninsula Community Legal Centre has been providing free legal services for over 28 years. We have considerable experience in how the Family Law Act works in practice and have serious concerns about the effect of the proposals.




January also had 7 days where the temperature went over 35°. Interestingly for the 31days of January 2006, the 24hr average temperature was 24.5°.

From that meeting, the Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary was formed. They have worked tirelessly over the years to help care for the Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna Reserve and Creek Cardinia environment.

Rain, hail or shine, every month of the year, the Friends group gets together to work in the bush along the creek, removing weeds and rubbish to create perfect conditions for the bush to regenerate. Where the bush needs a bit of help to re-establish, tree planting takes place (with no help from the grazing wallabies!)

During these years we have celebrated birthdays (from 21^{st's} to 60^{th's}), watched each others families grow, supported each other through difficult times and enjoyed many morning teas, drinks and barbeques.

The lessons we have learned about our amazing local environment and the enormous sense of satisfaction that comes from seeing the results of our hard work are a big bonus!

Following are some interesting facts and small stories on this subject. Prostitutes: Brothels and prostitution in general have

often served as a taxable source of revenue. Pope Clement the second even found a way of taxing prostitutes after they had died. He issued a Bill requiring that anyone who had engaged in prostitution must leave half of her property to the Church if she had not made the contribution earlier, whilst alive. In Nuremberg in the 15th century money spent visiting prostitutes was taxdeductible. Some form of taxation was levied on prostitutes in Spain. Portugal. Germany. France, Switzerland and others, in the middle ages.

The 15th century Prostitutes of Venice were ordered by the Municipal Authorities to sit at their windows with completely bare-breasts. This was required so that the young

men would be diverted from the "unnatural aberration" of homosexuality.

Brothels have existed throughout all civilizations since history began.

In 1810 a well known London Brothel specialised in girls under 14 years of age and others offered adolescents to their patrons. A French Newspaper reporter noted that in one stretch of London Streets, about 300 vards long, could be seen 500 girls most of them between 13 and 15 years of age. The same was true of Paris and other European cities. Paris had a well known child Brothel until the 1930's.

Court Brothels were established by many Royal Houses for the use of the Innermost circles of the Courts. George 111 established one in St. James Palace in a lane called "Kings Place". The girls were not allowed to ply their trade outside the Palace.

An 18th century Love Club known as the "The Aphrodites" arranged wife swapping and other sexual diversions for its members. Membership cost \$20,000 for a gentleman and \$10,000 for a lady, plus a compatible economic status. The records of one lady member have been preserved and over a period of 20 years she provided a list of 4959 amorous rendezvous. Among her lovers were 272 Princes and Prelates, 93 Rabbis, 439 monks, 288 commoners, 2 uncles, 119 musicians, 929 officers, 342 financiers, 420 society men, 117 valets, 12 cousins, 47 negroes, and 1614 foreigners.

A Homosexual Brothel was opened in London in 1884, and did very good business for a time, and catered to many Aristocratic and well to do homosexuals. Royal figures were reputed to have visited the premises.

Well if you can't be good, be very careful!


