

As it stands at the moment, it is proposed to be installed outside Aldi's/Video Ezy and the Foodwise/Fish & Chips on the southside of the highway. It is now dependant on the business owners affected to consent to give up two car parking spaces on the southside. I would like to take this opportunity to thank our former Councillor & Mayor Runge. **BPA** Garry Executive Committee, David Moreland, Maurice Potter, Tony Rushton, Margaret & Willem Boon and our current ward councillor. Brett Owen for continuing the issue with the current council. Without the support of these people and many more behind the scenes, this issue would have not been able to come to reality.

In closing, I would like to wish all of the members of our community good health and would like to extend an open invitation to the Anzac Day memorial services that will be held on the corner of Wood Street and Princes Hwy at 2.00pm on Sunday 23rd of April.

"CAVEAT EMPTOR" Buyer Beware

It is my considered opinion that all growth area Council's should develop a policy of including in a 173 agreement a requirement for developers to inform purchasers of the range of non residential development that may occur within their residential estate development.

I recommend that any such policy which is developed should be placed on the respective council websites with advise also to consult the DSE Planning website.

After a great deal of thought and consideration I believe MAV or LGVA plus all people who consider purchasing in the Growth corridors in Victoria should lobby the State Government to amend the Sale of Land Act to make it mandatory to include such information in Vendors Statements required to be given by Vendors to Purchases.

Council's in growth corridors with new estates have a duty of care if not a legal responsibility to our citizens to have the developer identify early in the initial stages of any residential development what the planning scheme intention is re the appropriate or inappropriate location of business's that are licensed and or gaming premises, hotel/ motels, sports or related clubs and also high volume retail outlets, plus road widening which are possible occurrences, in a neighbourhood that to the purchasers expectations is primarily residential.

People purchase in "good faith" into a new residential development they think suitable to their family or retired lifestyle and then are rudely disappointed and/or disillusioned with "their Council" for not alerting them to the fact that any developer can make an application for such a premises on their doorstep.

It is not any Council's legal responsibility to do that. For Cardinia the information concerning permitted uses in residential areas is available on the (DSE) Department of Sustainability and Environment website. The problem is making people aware before they purchase of development may be allowed to occur within a residential 1 zone.

LISA SPRINTS FOR GOLD

Lisa McIntosh sprinted her way to a commonwealth gold medal in the womens 100m EAD (Elite Athletes with a Disability) T37 final, a truly awesome moment. On Monday 20th March in front of a packed crowd at the MCG, Lisa ran a time of 14.38 seconds with fellow Australian Katrina Webb winning silver. Lisa attributed an enthusiastic home crowd with propelling her to a gold medal.

Lisa, a Beaconsfield resident and swimming instructor at Casey Arc, won gold in 100m, 200m and 400m at the 2000 Paralympics in Sydney and a silver and bronze at Athens. She holds the world record in the 100m, 200m, 400m and 800m T37 Cerebral Palsy classification. In 2001, Lisa was awarded an Order of Australia for Services to Sport, after her fantastic effort in the Sydney Paralympics.

She underwent surgery to repair stress fractures in her feet in December 2004 and was unable to run for three months.



After the operation Lisa began an intensive training program which began with walking and finally building up to running. During this time Lisa stayed

focused on coming back to challenge the world record of 13.8 secs that she set in Sydney and winning in front of her home crowd.

Lisa was photographed proudly showing her gold medal to the huge crowd that lined the streets of Melbourne to celebrate and congratulate the athletes and volunteers of the 2006 Commonwealth Games.

With the focus of the Commonwealth Games over, Lisa still has a busy schedule planned for 2006 beginning with events at Stawell Gift on Easter Monday. She will be the only female running in the disabilities race.

Her racing events will then take her to Manchester in May. This will also give Lisa the opportunity to catch up with family from Scotland. Returning to Europe again in September Lisa will have the opportunity to race in the 2nd biggest event in the world racing calendar. This will be held in the Netherlands.

A truly inspirational comeback and we look forward to hearing more of Lisa's successes.

Wendy and husband Eric's son Ryan was a sufferer of MPS.

Vanessa Boon from Beaconsfield (pictured below left) escorted 2 runners in Frankston early on Friday 3rd March. Vanessa was sponsored by Qantas Frequent Flyers. Vanessa described the experience of running with the Baton as "exciting but I was amazed at how heavy the baton was. The run went really fast".

News from the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade

FIRE SAFETY IN THE HOME

There are about 11,000 house fires in Australia each year. House fires are more common in the winter months when people are using fires, heaters and other electrical equipment. Unfortunately more than 50 people die each year as a result of house fires. The majority of deaths occur between 9pm and 6am, and often tragically involve children and elderly people.

Working smoke alarms provide a vital early warning in the event of a fire. When people are asleep they cannot smell smoke. Smoke alarms are essential to ensure that people sleeping in a house wake up and evacuate if a fire breaks out.

Smoke alarms should be regularly checked and the batteries in your smoke alarm should have been replaced with the end of daylight savings on 2 April. If you have not changed your smoke alarm batteries within the last 12 months, don't put off changing the batteries any longer – just do it!

While a smoke alarm helps to save lives in the event of fire, there are many simple things that you can do to prevent a fire occurring in the first place. These include:

- * Never leave cooking on a stove unattended.
- * Never place electric cords, curtains, tea towels and oven cloths to close to the stove
- * Never leave oil burners and candles left on at night or left burning while you are away from home.
- * Never leave the house without switching an electric blanket off, and never leave heavy objects on the bed when the electric blanket is on.
- * Never overload power points and power boards.
- * Always ensure that cigarette butts are extinguished before placing the butts in a bin.
- * Always clean lint filters in clothes dryers after each load.
- * Ensure that chimneys for fireplaces and wood heaters are cleaned to avoid a build up of material in the chimney.

CHILD CARE TAX REBATE

The new 30% child care tax rebate can be claimed in 2005-2006 income tax returns for approved child care expenses incurred during the period 1st July 2004 to 30th June 2005. The rebate is not means tested and covers 30% of out of pocket expenses for approved child care limited to \$4,000 for each child. The rebate is a tax offset, which reduces income tax payable in the year of claim.

You can claim for child care expenses incurred whilst you:

- used approved child care
- received Child Care
Benefit (CCB) from Family
Assistance Office.
Alternatively, you should
lodge a CCB Claim Form
with Family Assistance
Office to obtain a lump sum.
All eligible families can
receive CCB regardless of

 passed the CCB work, training or study test

income

To claim the tax offset in your 2006 income tax return you need to have:

- a letter from Family Assistance Office of CCB paid: and

- evidence of child care expenses paid including detailed statement from child care provider or receipts, credit card statements, bank statement debits etc

Make sure you have the proper documentation including CCB letter to maximise the tax offset claim in your tax return. Discuss the matter with your Accountant if you are unsure of this long awaited rebate and lodge your 2006 income tax return early.

The event officially opened at 5.45 pm on Friday night, with cancer survivor Stan Miskin speaking at the Opening Ceremony. Casey Deputy Mayor Rob Wilson and Edrington Ward Councillors Brian Hetherton and Mick Morland then cut the ribbon to declare the start of the Relay.

A group of local cancer survivors and carers were applauded and supported as they completed the first two laps of the event.

Over the 24 hours, 413 participants took to the track, with teams camping out overnight, participating in challenges and keeping the spirit alive. Walkers and runners were rewarded with massages, food and entertainment – all donated by local businesses. The awards were presented by

Cardinia Launches Improved Green Waste Service

CARDINIA Shire Council adopted the new Waste Management Strategy that will introduce a fortnightly green waste service in the Shire's township areas.

The service will not be compulsory, with residents being able to choose not to be included in the kerbside green waste service. The service will be supplied at a fixed annual charge to users.

Council is also looking at ways to improve and streamline the hard waste and bundled green waste collection system shire-wide in coming months in an effort to clean up streets and reduce the amount of recyclable material going to landfill.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Bill Ronald said the new system would save ratepayers money in the long term. "The cost of landfill space is increasing rapidly, and it costs significantly more to send green waste to landfill than to recycle it. On top of that there is the environmental cost of wasting such a valuable resource. Recycling and reusing our green waste is the only responsible option," he said.

Council will soon begin the tender process for green waste collection and reprocessing contractors.



COMMUNITY CONCERNS

I was one of the attendees at the public meeting in March held at the Beaconsfield Community about Complex the planning application for the 'Beaconsfield Sports Club'. This club would comprise three storey development including 75 gaming machines, a bistro, lounge, bar, 26 motel rooms and over 200 car par parking spaces. Numerous representations have been made to me by residents of both Beaconsfield and Officer about the unsuitability of the proposal and after attending that meeting, I was certainly convinced of the merits of the community's concerns.

On behalf of my constituents, I submitted

an objection to the planning application on the grounds that this large-scale development would have a detrimental impact on the surrounding area. I do not think that such a development is appropriate in what is essentially a community precinct district with preschool, childcare and neighbourhood house services nearby.

Cardinia Shire Council is the responsible authority for determination of the application, although it would be expected that an appeal to VCAT, whatever the outcome at council, is definitely on the cards.

It is vital that residents stay engaged with this issue as it works its way through the planning channels. I am, of course, happy to provide any assistance to local residents that may be required.

I also recently submitted an objection to the ACCC regarding the proposed takeover by ABC Learning Centres of another major childcare provider, Kids Campus. A decision will be made in May whether to allow this takeover. My concern is that choice and being quality are compromised by concentrating too many child care centres in the hands of too few operators. I strongly believe we need community-based centres, as well as smaller private operators, to continue. ABC already runs close to 1000 centres and I do not think it is in the interests of our community or the marketplace to see this number increase even further.

I recently visited the Berwick Rotary Club's farmers' market. Like the farmers' market Pakenham, it is a great way to purchase fresh and healthy produce, but there is also a serious side. Major supermarket chains are using only their preferred suppliers, which means many local farmers are shut out. Shopping at farmers' markets ensure that our local industries, and local people, can survive.

I encourage residents to attend the Beaconsfield ANZAC Service, conducted, in line with




tradition, on the Sunday prior to ANZAC Day, which is 23 April. Being held at the family-friendly time of 2pm, it is a fantastic opportunity to introduce children to the meaning of the occasion as well as mix with other local residents. I look forward to seeing you there.

CARDINIA CREEK **PLATYPUS** REINTRODUCTION (PHASE III) UPDATE

Three more platypus have recently been released into Cardinia Creek in order to boost the long-term viability of the local population.

Dr Melody Serena of the Australian **Platypus** Conservancy said that three juvenile females were introduced into the stream's upper reaches in early April as part of a joint Melbourne Water-APC conservation initiative.

It is believed that platypus disappeared from Cardinia Creek about 20 years ago following the "Ash Wednesday" bushfires. Platypus were returned to the creek in 2004 in hopes of re-establishing the population. Following the success of the initial release, a second group of platypus was transferred to Cardinia Creek in 2005.

The recent third phase of the project brings the total of platypus translocated to Cardinia Creek to nine. Dr Serena said that the group was now close to the size where it could be expected to become a self-sustaining breeding population.

The recently released



platypus have been fitted with specially designed radio-tags so their progress can be tracked over the next few weeks. Regular live-trapping surveys will also continue to be conducted to monitor how the new population as a whole is doing.

However, the reported recent use of illegal fishing equipment along Cardinia Creek, especially "Opera House" yabby and cray traps, remains of concern as such traps can easily drown platypus. Accordingly, anyone finding such a trap or observing illegal fishing/yabbying activities is encouraged to telephone government's 24-hour fishing hotline 13 3474 (i.e. 13 FISH).

COMMUNITY WATER GRANTS SCHEME

The saying, "waste not want not" has long been a truism, but in the context of our water supply, it is perhaps truer than ever. For decades - even centuries - we have taken for granted a plentiful supply of clean water. The recent years of drought have taught us that moderation and conservation are now a must.

In the interests of fostering water conservation at 'grass roots' community level, the Howard Government has allocated \$200 million to small community projects, under the Community Water Grants Scheme.

I am delighted to report that a number of groups in my electorate of La Trobe have got behind the scheme and applied for grants in Round 1. It is particularly gratifying that these applicants have shown themselves willing to contribute some of their own funds towards water conservation projects.

There is expected to be at least one round of Water Grants per year until 2009. I would encourage all community groups to apply for grants in Round 2 of the scheme, which is expected to open later in 2006.

Beaconsfield Banner readers will be pleased to hear that a Round 1 Community Water Grant has been awarded to St Francis Xavier College, Beaconsfield. The Howard Government has allocated \$46,441, and the college has contributed an additional \$3,050, towards its School Indoor Water Efficiency Project.

This project will improve water efficiency by implementing a range of water-saving initiatives in the college's bathrooms. These include: installing constant flow valves on taps, replacing inefficient toilets, sealing leaks, adjusting urinal flush volumes and the trialling of a waterless urinal.

It is estimated that these changes will save a staggering 11,830,000 litres of water each year!

Congratulations St Francis Xavier College! As a passionate advocate of the environment I warmly applaud your contribution.

ALL IN A DAYS WORK!

By the time you have read this, we will already be one third of the way through the year! The Commonwealth Games have been run and won, the Easter bunny has been and daylight savings has ended. Many of our summer problems start to decline, snakebites, beestings, grass seed abscesses etc.

The most unususual abscess I have ever encountered was when I was working in Mansfield. A call came in for a cow that had an abscess on its cheek. Not an uncommon occurrence with grass seeds. sticks puncturing the mouth and becoming infected. The only thing slightly unusual about the case was that the abscess appeared suddenly, and had not changed in a week. The abscess was about 6cm in diameter and it was unusual that it had not burst after a week.

When I arrived on the property the client had the cow already in the yards. We placed a halter on the cow's head and tied it to one side so that I could examine the swelling. It felt just like an abscess. I was about to place some local anaesthetic to cut down on the abscess, but instead, decided to place a needle into the swelling to see what fluid came out.

The farmer thought it was a waste of time, but we were both surprised when no pus flowed from the needle, it was more a gushing air sort of noise. Nothing they taught me at university could explain it. Both the farmer and I were confused.

Next we placed a gag (form of brace so that I didn't get bitten) in the cow's mouth so that I could feel what the swelling was like from inside. I pulled the suspicious swelling from the mouth, instantly the swelling was gone and I

was holding a tennis ball in my hand.

On talking to the farmer further, he had a paddock that was bounded by Lake Eildon and he said all kinds of rubbish washed up there, including tennis balls. I wouldn't be surprised if this story is still doing the rounds of Mansfield.







Pakenham Bypass Project Update

April 2006

The Pakenham Bypass is a 20km four-lane freeway between the Princes Freeway at Beaconsfield and Nar Nar Goon Road at Nar Nar Goon. Jointly funded by the State and Australian Governments, the \$242 million Pakenham Bypass project is on schedule for completion by the end of 2007.

Final Freeway Contract Awarded

Works are well underway on the Pakenham Bypass project, with all three construction contracts now awarded.

The \$66 million contract to construct the 6 kilometre western third of the Bypass, from the Princes Freeway at Beaconsfield to west of Cardinia Road at Officer, was awarded to Abigroup Ltd in February 2006.

It includes an interchange with westerly-oriented ramps at Princes Freeway in Beaconsfield, a freeway overpass at Officer South Road and bridge structures spanning Gum Scrub Creek.

Changes to Project Scope

Originally it was proposed that Officer South Road would be constructed as an overpass of the Pakenham Bypass. As a result of the Section One award of contract, the Pakenham bypass will now cross over Officer South Road. A freeway bridge will be constructed and Officer South Road will remain at its existing level.

Construction Update Section Two (Middle Third)

West of Cardinia Road to East of Healesville-Koo Wee Rup Road

FRH Group is completing the 6.7 kilometre middle section of the Pakenham Bypass, Earthworks are well advanced on Section Two and construction on the Toomuc Creek bridge structure is almost complete. Construction works of bridge overpasses Cardinia McGregor Road and Healesville-Koo Wee Rup Road are underway.

BRIGHT IDEA!

With Easter just around the corner it is important to remember that if you give chocolate to loved ones, and you could end up poisoning them. That is, if the loved one is your pet dog.

Dogs and puppies do not have the ability as we humans do to digest a simple chemical found in chocolate called "Theobromine". When theobromine is ingested by an animal it affects are horrific on the central nervous system and the cardiovascular system. This effect of the chemical has a very harsh effect on the animal's body which may result in death.

While a very small amount of chocolate may not harm some dogs, it's safest to avoid giving it to them at all. If an accident occurs, a veterinarian should be consulted. Treatment may

require inducing vomiting, stabilizing the animal's heartbeat and respiration, controlling seizures and slowing the absorption of Theo bromine. If the animal already is comatose, its stomach may need to be pumped.

If you witness your dog eating chocolate or if it shows any signs of chocolate toxicity (anxiety, pacing, hyperexcitability, excessive thirst and urination, vomiting, or seizures): call your vet immediately and tell him or her what type of chocolate your dog ate, how much you think it ate, how long ago it indulged itself.

Cats have much different eating habits and seldom are poisoned by chocolate. Dr. Stewart and all the staff at the Vet Centre would like to wish you all and your pets a safe and enjoyable Easter.





The last two months have been reasonably dry with only 58ml in February and 37ml recorded in March. This is still within the average for these months with the average for February being 50ml and March 46ml.

The combined totals of January, February and March was 156ml which is 6ml above average. This is 84ml less than last year where we had 240ml. My highest total before that was in 1999 when 200ml was recorded in Beaconsfield.

During the 2 weeks the Commonwealth Games were held in Melbourne we had near perfect weather. We had 7 days above 30°c in March and recorded rain before and after the games.

TENNIS NEWS

A History Lesson - 15, 30, 40, Deuce, Advantage??

Ever wondered where the quaint scoring system and terms of tennis originated? According to Hanah Mandlikova's "Total Tennis" the origins of tennis can be traced back to the ancient Roman game "trigon". Later in the eleventh century the Italians played "gioco del pallone" played against walls.

The French version, "jeu de paume" was played in the 14th century with the palm and by 15th century improved with leather or gut strings. In Old French, "une journee" meant a 'sports match' as well as 'a day'. It is from this game the current scoring system is derived.

The scoring system was based on the 24 hours of the day and 60 minutes in the hour. Each match consisted of 24 games, each game consisting of 4 rallies worth 15 points, totaling 60. Hence 15, 30, and originally 45. It was soon realised that at 45 points each, two rallies would be required to win otherwise the game was decided on luck. But this would make the score exceed 60 (minutes in the day - how pedantic). So the score was changed to 40-all with 10 points being given for winning each following rally and if tied at 50, returned to 40-all.

It was necessary to win two rallies to win from which Deuce or "Deus" meaning 'two' in Old French is derived. Similarly, at 23 games all it was necessary to win two games in a row to win overall and over time this arduous set was reduced to 12 games and later to today's six games.

The zero "love" score is also derived from the French word for egg "l'oeuf", pronounced much like "love". There is some debate on the naming of the game of "tennis", however it is believed to be based on the French word "tenir" to hold or to catch.

Despite the history lesson, Tennis is a great game for both young and not so young, providing not only the exercise, but social skills of good sportsmanship, team building and consideration of others, socialisation with peers of both sexes, leadership and leader respect. 


