CARDINIA SHIRE REPORT

RAILWAY STATION CAR PARKING

In May, Council wrote to the Victorian Transport Minister about the urgent need to improve and increase car parking at Beaconsfield Railway Station. response, Murray Cullinan, Deputy Director of Public Transport advised that planning is underway for initial improvements to, 'Park and Ride' facilities at Beaconsfield for construction in 2007.

The car parking upgrade involves the construction and sealing of 130 car parks. This is great news

for Beaconsfield and will reduce the current pressure on residents and commuters. I look forward to the upgrade.

SHOP IMPROVEMENTS

Earlier this year, I was approached by shop keepers in the strip of shops on the south side of the highway adjacent to the Wood Street Kindergarten, regarding concerns of graffiti and vandalism. Victoria Police conducted a crime prevention assessment on the area and made numerous recommendations.

At the July Council meeting, Council moved to improve lighting at the front of these shops, repair Council owned fencing, review vegetation and also encourage the owners of these shops to improve fencing, reinstall a lockable gate and improve lighting at the rear and side. I am hopeful that these proposed changes will improve public safety and reduce incidence of crime in the area.

INCREASED HOURS FOR MOBILE LIBRARY

Beaconsfield's mobile library service has changed its times. The service will be on Wednesdays between 12 noon and 7.00pm. These new increased times allow Beaconsfield residents an increased opportunity to access the library's services.

The Mobile Library can be accessed outside the Beaconsfield Neighbourhood Complex on O'Neill Rd.

NATIONAL TREE DAY

As part of Planet Ark's National Tree Day, on Sunday 30th July, the shire organised a community tree planting day at Hilltop Reserve in Beaconsfield. It was the first community activity at the reserve and the Council hopes it will lead to the formation of a local friends group.

The event was an opportunity to introduce local residents to the reserve, raise awareness of the unique flora and fauna, and to encourage the community to get involved in caring for the reserve. FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

TRAVEL CLAIMS WITHIN AUSTRALIA

Many taxpayers are required by their employers to travel to country and interstate locations in connection with their employment.

The employer may pay directly for expenses or accommodation, meals and incidentals but this is often impractical particularly for smaller amounts, where it is difficult to obtain receipts.

As an alternative employers pay travel allowances to employees

which are subject to special treatment for periods of an overnight stay up to 21 days. Provided that the amounts of the travel allowances do not exceed Australian Taxation Office prescribed amounts depending on location, type of costs incurred and salary level of the employee then receipts or other written documentation is generally not required and these travel allowances would not included in an employees PAYG Payment Summary. If however the travel allowances paid to the employee and all claims for deductions are subject to substitution requirements or having receipts, other documentary evidence and diary records of minor cash expenses. Some examples of maximum travel allowances that would not need to be substantiated in respect of the year ending 30th June 2007 are as follows:

If you do not want to be subject to the substantiation requirements including obtaining receipts for travel etc., then you should ensure that the travel allowance does not exceed the rates for accommodation, meals, and or incidentals for the location(s) visited. Any travel allowances paid in excess of prescribed amounts of reasonable travel allowances need to be substantiated in full with receipts, written

documentations and diary records.

The substantiations of the trip for income tax purposes should be discussed with your Accountant in advance of the travel and not left till after the end of the financial year at tax return preparation time.

Overseas travel is subject to additional substantiation including diary records and receipts for accommodation expenses.





NEW PEDESTRIAN CROSSING FOR BEACONSFIELD TRAIN STATION

I am delighted to inform Beaconsfield residents that a \$230,000 upgrade of the pedestrian crossing at Beaconsfield train station is now underway, an upgrade for which I have been lobbying for strongly on behalf of residents. It is one of the larger pedestrian upgrade projects within the state and when completed, will be accessible to those in wheelchairs as well as parents with prams and the elderly.

There will be additional safety features at the upgraded crossing which will include full height, active pedestrian gates which will be triggered by the approach of a train plus audible warnings. This will greatly improve safety for all users of this crossing.

However, work to improve this station is not finished. I am still working to address the concerns with the state of the car park. As it is, the car park is inadequate to service the local community. It needs to be sealed as well as provision made for additional car parking spaces. I will keep working on the station until these much-needed additional improvements are made.

On 24 July, the Premier of Victoria The Hon. Steve Bracks MP officially opened the new pool in Pakenham, Cardinia Life. The Minister for Sport and Recreation, Justin Madden, was also in attendance. The facility was funded by both state and local governments and

again showed how important it is for us to work in partnership to achieve adequate infrastructure and services for the community.

There has been more good news for Beaconsfield Primary School with a grant of \$9,673 for the purchase of additional computers and ICT equipment. It is vital that our children have these critical tools to equip them with the skills they need. This additional funding, along with the commitment to link all



government schools to broadband, will assist our children with their learning.

Communities in Cardinia have just received over \$292,000 in grants for developing a shire wide volunteer network (\$175,000) plus the purchase of two community buses. One of the buses, funded with a grant of over \$58,000, will be run by the Cardinia Shire Council, while the second bus (\$59,210) will be run by **Emerald Community House** in partnership with Fernlea House and U3A. These community buses will help link people across the townships in the Shire and ensure that vulnerable groups, like the elderly, have transport to access essential services.

The recent Our Environment, Our Future Sustainability Action Statement 2006 has been very well received across the community. This statement outlines 150 priority sustainability initiatives to secure a sustainable state for future generations of Victorians. ORGANIC GARDENING

"The single most important step to a self sufficient lifestyle is to grow your own food."

Vegetables grown organically have many more anti-oxidants in them, are better for our health and have a greater flavour. The grower has a great sense of achievement and satisfaction when serving organic home grown vegetables at the table.

It is recommended that you begin with home grown vegetables that have not been sprayed with any insecticides. If not, a commercially grown vegetable can be used.

Tomatoes: Choose a very ripe mature tomato (not over ripe or rotten) for example, and scoop out the seeds. These seeds are enclosed in a jelly-like sac, which require a few days of fermentation to break down. Fermentation also has the advantage of developing conditions that will kill some of the bacteria and fungi that are responsible for some diseases. When completely dry, these seeds need to be placed in a bottle as they are too fine and small to be placed in a paper bag.

Pumpkins: Collect a few seeds from your favourite type of pumpkin and lay out on a paper hand towel to dry out. When completely dry, place in a jar or paper bag (which I prefer) until the correct time for planting. This same principle can be carried out with cucumbers, peppers and squash.

Peas and Beans: These should be left on the vine until the pod starts to crack open, the seeds then put into a paper bag and allowed to dry out.

The legume family produce nitrogen nodules on their roots from atmospheric nitrogen dragged down into the soil. They can also be dug into the soil as a green manure. By planting peas and broad beans in winter and French beans in summer, we can harvest a crop of delicious food as well as adding nitrogen to the soil.

If you have the space in your garden patch, dig a large hole and bury your vegetable peelings, as this is once again nourishing the soil and breaking down the soil and encouraging the worms to be active. Of course, don't be surprised if your peelings germinate and you find vegetables starting to grow in odd places in the vegetable patch. Potatoes are especially prone to do this.

I grow garlic and chives amongst the plants and allow marigolds to grow in their rampant way as these plants tend to keep the insects and grubs at bay. Also some of the stronger smelling herbs, such as thyme also tend to keep unwanted plant eating insects and grubs away.

Now is the time to mulch both the vegetable garden as well as the flower gardens. A thick heavy mulch will keep the weeds at bay and the few that work their way through are easily pulled out. Spread dry animal manure near but not on your plants for stronger growth.

Good luck with your vegetables and healthy living to you all.



STEP YOUR WAY TO A HEALTHIER LIFESTYLE

Seniors over the age of 65 years throughout Cardinia are being encouraged to put on their walking shoes and step on down to their local libraries where they can present their Seniors Card and loan a pedometer kit, as part of the SEALS/10,000 Steps Program.

The program, recently launched in Cardinia Shire, aims to increase the level of physical activity among older adults and has been running successfully throughout libraries in the City of Casey over the past 12 months.

National Physical Activity Guidelines recommend that Australians – young and old – engage in at least 30 minutes of moderated physical activity on all, if not most days of the week.

Cardinia Shire Councillor Ed Chatwin, a supporter of the program, encouraged others to get active by collecting a pedometer from the Pakenham and Emerald libraries, or a mobile library, and walking 10,000 steps a day.

"It is relatively easy to get involved and to keep active at any age and don't make excuses." he said.

"You can do your 10,000 steps in stages – you may want to take a walk somewhere, take a break and then walk back. You might be surprised at just how easy it is to achieve the 10,000 steps. I encourage everyone to take a step and help prolong their life.

"Just trot along to your local library and grab your pedometer kit and keep on going," Cr Chatwin said.

The kits contain a pedometer, a step log book and local walking maps. The pedometer is a small device that is designed to clip onto clothing near the hip and registers each step you take.

The SEALS/10,000 Steps Program is funded by the

Department for Victorian Communities, in line with the broader Seniors Go For Your Life initiative. The program committee. including members from the South East Primary Care Partnership, the Casey-Cardinia Library Corporation, Cardinia Shire Council, Cardinia-Casey Community Health Service, Dandenong Greater Community Health Service, YMCA and Eastern Ranges GP Association have worked together to set-up the program within Cardinia.

The committee strongly encourages all seniors throughout Cardinia to become involved in the nocost program, either as an individual or as a group, as the physical, social and emotional benefits associated with walking are well recognised.

Despite 80 per cent of children living within 2 kilometres of their school, less than 40 per cent walk to school regularly. Sadly, this figure is lower even than Sweden or Canada where it snows for at least six months of the vear!


Cardinian Embroidery

The final stitches were added to the Cardinian Embroidery at the end of July. Many residents, families and friends have worked on this exciting community project. In just over two years, 216 people have embroidered 350 features and well over one thousand have added their names to the name panels.

We now have 8 large panels 1.4m x 1.9m in size. They show the main features of all the towns in Cardinia. Our town Beaconsfield is represented on a panel with our neighbouring towns of Rythdale Officer and Cardinia.

Features you will recognize on the Beaconsfield panel include, The Buff Hall, Cardinia Park Hotel, Beaconsfield War Memorial, Kenilworth Coach House, Beaconsfield Baptist Church Hall, Entrance to Beaconsfield Park, Beaconsfield Central Hotel, Old Post Office, Bull's Raw(Old Parkes Butcher Shop) Old Adamson's Hardware Store, Houses in Wood Street, Beaconsfield Primary School, Viaduct, Bowman's Track, Station Master's House, Roberts corner, Mount View, Villa Mar, Beaconsfield Community Complex, Holm Park, Mt Misery and Pink Hill.



The Rythdale, Officer, Cardinia part of the panel includes, the Rythdale well – head., Officer Memorial Gates, Cardinia General Store, Cardinia School, Cardinia Rec. Reserve, Cardinia Presbyterian Church, Williamson's prefab cottage Officer, Officer Union Church, Burgess's cottage, Hicks Brick Factory, Cardinia Public Hall, Musgroves horse float, Randolph's tankstand, tiny, Officer Hall, Boon's glasshouses. Russo's apple orchard, Kadoona Park

and Cardinia Park.

These features have been worked in a variety of embroidery techniques. including machine appliqué, free machine embroidery, cross stitch, and black work.

It is anticipated that within the next couple of months the 8 panels will be hung in the Cardinian Cultural Centre, protected by Perspex and then be on show to the public.



I was recently reminded of the dangers of buying a restored or renovated house. The same applies to old cars which are 'born again".

If a house is 70 to 90 years old, it remains so, no matter how much paint is applied or plaster patched. The use of shiny brass fittings, locks, hinges, knobs etc may create the illusion of rebirth but tread carefully there are traps everywhere.

Our house is about 35 vears old and we replaced the roof (corrugated iron) a house 70 years old with an original must be suspect. My niece bought a renovated Victorian and found that the lovely fireplaces no longer had their chimneys attached that is they stopped once

through the ceiling. Lovely old houses need to be thoroughly checked by reputable surveyors before the sale is complete.

Always keep some left over paint. A small patch can then be painted without the need for colour matching or even a whole wall repaint. Keep the left overs in small tins (available from the paint shop). It last longer in a smaller tin.

With Spring on the way, it is a good time to plan your painting, check your flyscreens and the clear material (laser lite or similar) in your pergola and shed.



Who has the right to tell us what films we can and can't see? Is it the Government or any of the different bodies that review films? Or are we, as adults, intelligent and mature enough to choose what we fork over our hard-earned cash to see.

Recently I had the pleasure of sitting down and having a chat with Australian director, Ana Kokkinos. Kokkinos doesn't hold back in her films. Her first film 'Head On' explored the topic of a Greek boy, Ari, realising that he is gay.

Mostly the conversation revolved around the launch of 'Kokkinos' new film, 'The Book Of Revelations'. Once again Kokkinos tackles a full-on topic. This time it tells the story of a young dancer, Daniel, who is abducted and sexually assaulted by three women.

the film isn't Yes, everybody's cup-of-tea, but it is a topic that surely should be explored in today's culture. Tom Long, Colin Friels and Anna Torv are exceptional in their roles and as Kokkinos told me, "delights to work with". She certainly didn't mean to set out to offend and certainly doesn't deserve the articles that some 'gutter journalists' have written about the film saying that it didn't deserve government funding and should be banned in cinemas. Like I said before. who is the Howard Government to tell us what we can and cannot see? And don't get me started on the people who classify

films, one guy who used to do that job, banned as many films as he could and then left the position to form his own porn company.

The other film I really enjoyed is 'Superman Returns'. Being the geek I am, I was always going to be one of those people who went out to see this film straight away. Still 'Superman Returns' is definitely worth it's money at the box office and is a must for all sci-fi and Superman fans.



TALKING WEATHER

During the last 2 months we have seen very little rain, a total of 90ml for June and July.


With only 14ml of rain in June, it was a very dry start to winter. It was the lowest recording for June I had in my records which date back to 1985. This however is not the lowest amount of rain that has been recorded in a particular month. The lowest amount I had was 4ml which was recorded in February 1997.

According to the Bureau of Meteorology website the total for June recorded in Melbourne was 8.6ml. This was the second lowest on record, with the lowest of 8ml being recorded in June 1858.

During July, 76ml of rain fell over 14 days. This was 8ml above the July average of 68ml.

The last 2 months have also been extremely cold at night with the June average night-time temperature of 6.3°. This is well below the average of 7.2°. On several occasions temperatures dropped below 0°. Melbourne's average day time temperature for June was equal to the average of 14.3°.

The yearly rainfall total stands at 426ml, the exact average for the first 7 months of the year.





The Beaconsfield Junior Football Cub has for the first time in the club's history fielded 16 teams this year. With 380 players and over 700 parents, the club can proudly claim a membership of 1,000. We are in fact the 6th largest junior football club in Victoria.

Last year was the most successful for the club, having 6 teams in grand finals and five returning home with a premiership flag.

The greatest challenge for the club in the coming years is to find another ground for training and playing. The population explosion through the south east growth corridor has seen previous Council's fail to plan and provide sporting facilities for the influx of young families into the area.

The sporting groups within the Beaconsfield area have combined to form the "Beaconsfield Sporting Clubs Action Group" to address the current and future sporting needs with the current Council.

These talks have seen Cardinia Council allocate \$120,000 to upgrading the Eagles Upper Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve home ground. This money will allow much needed drainage and returfing to be carried out over summer.

A further \$200,000 has been allocated to the development of the O'Neil Rd oval. When reconstructed, this ground will be suitable for junior cricket and football games in

the younger age groups only.

The current Council has shown a genuine commitment to meeting the needs of the local youth that was sadly ignored by previous councils. We are hopeful that both grounds redevelopment will be completed in time for the 2007 season.

The BJFC predict that it will only be a few years until we field 20 teams. This cannot happen at the moment as the club has had to cap numbers until further arounds are made available within the district. The club is passionate about providing the opportunity for all junior footballers to participate in their chosen sport and will continue our crusade with Council until the necessary facilities are in place.

As the footy season comes to an end the planning is underway for the club presentation day. Every one of our players will receive a participation trophy together with a free drink, sausage sandwich and fairy floss.

The all day entertainment and rides is the highlight of the year for all the players and their families on this day of fun and socialising.

It is the efforts of our 30 odd committee members that make our club so successful, so I would like to acknowledge their contribution and dedication in making 2006 another fantastic year, both on and off the field.

Courts Surfaces:

Tennis is played on many and varied surfaces including grass, asphalt, cement, clay, wood and artificial compositions. Beaconsfield Tennis Club offers three playing surfaces and is purportedly the only club in Victoria to do so. This provides an excellent opportunity for junior players to experience varied surfaces during both practice and competition. Our courts comprise two asphalt based hard courts, acrylic sealed and painted and are the original courts built at the club site. Four Ent Tous Cas courts which are based on a compacted scoria under surface and finer brick dust surface are good all weather surfaces but require constant care and frequent maintenance: Bagging (leveling with a bag like drag) and watering in warmer months are maintenance requirements are each set fro these courts. Two Sand Filled Acrylic Grass courts are our newest and are effectively are a carpet laid over existing asphalt hard courts and filled with sand.

Junior season starts shortly:

Now is the time to make a move if Junior tennis is on your planned activities for the coming Summer (and Autumn) season. Competition commences early October with teams fielded on Saturday mornings in Berwick & District Tennis Association and Sunday mornings in Waverley & District Tennis association. Open to all ages up to 18 years, players need to be a registered club member. Contact our Junior coordinator if interested in joining our Summer brigade of teams.


