SHIRE REPORT

Car parking around the Beaconsfield shopping precinct is a big issue. In the past, council approved commercial some developments with reduced car parking, well below council's acceptable minimal car parking requirements. problems associated are obvious when you look at the cars parked along the Old Princes Highway adjacent to Wallace Street.

I have a very strong stance on car parking in the Beaconsfield shopping precinct. Looking to the future and as Beaconsfield commercial precinct grows, as your representative I will not accept any commercial development which provides anything less than the minimum car parking requirements. New commercial developments must not be of the detriment of existing

businesses and nearby residents.

Cardinia shire has adopted a new Neighbourhood House funding policy. The previous policy did not allow for any annual increase in council funding and did not reward Neighbourhood Houses that were increasing its service hours. The new policy is great news for the Beaconsfield Neighbourhood Centre. It includes an immediate 12 per cent increase, ongoing annual CPI increases and it also provides additional funding to reward those neighbourhood centres. like Beaconsfield which that are providing increased program hours and increased number of participants.

Council has approved the re-opening of the pedestrian access walkway between the Beaconsfield Post Office and Sylvia Avenue. Conditions of the re-opening are footpath improvements along Sylvia to the walkway and increased lighting. This is great news for

Beaconsfield traders and residents. This will give residents to the north of the shopping precinct improved and direct access to the shopping precinct. It will also encourage residents to access the shops by foot instead of a car.

Works have commenced on the signalised pedestrian crossing between the shopping precincts on the north and south side of the Old Princes Highway. These works are expected to be completed by the end of December.

Finally as the year comes to a close, on behalf of Cardinia Shire Council, I wish you and your family a safe and enjoyable Christmas and New Year.

NEWS FROM THE BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE

PREPARE FOR FIRE THE FIRE SEASON

Have you and your family prepared your Bushfire Survival Plan?

it is important that you obtain information about what needs to be done before making your decision. Will you leave early or stay and defend?

CFA recommends that people make their decision well before the summer fire season to either stay and actively defend their property or leave the area before fire threatens.

Research shows that many people make unsafe

choices that can have serious consequences. CFA advises people not to stay with an unprepared property and not to leave their property too late such as when the fire is very close, or return to your home during a bushfire.

If you would like a CFA "Living in the Bush" workbook to assist you with your plan call the Victorian Bushfire Information Line on 1800 240 667 to obtain a copy today.

Victorian Bushfire Information Line

The Victorian Bushfire

Information Line is a 24 hour, seven days a week service which provides recorded information regarding fire restrictions, Total Fire Bans and information to assist you to prepare for the fire season. During the summer fire period you can obtain personal advice from trained operators from 8am to 8pm weekdays.

In the event of a major incident the centre can be staffed 24 hours a day in order to provide incident updates and advice on actions to take during

bushfires. For example if you work out of the area but during the day a bushfire develops you could call this number to ascertain whether it is safe to return to your home. The number to call is 1800 240 667. It would be a great idea to program this number into your phone.

CLOSE-KNIT COMMUNITY SCARF PROJECT

During the rescue operation of trapped miners in the Tasmanian township of Beaconsfield many residents of our town sent messages and prayers of hope to community groups and schools. Many of us have made connections with the township.

Recently the Tasmanian township embarked on a 925 metre reminder of the experience. Knitters from around Australia and the world were invited to knit up to a metre to be joined as one scarf, the length that the miners were trapped underground, to be known as the 'close-knit community' scarf project.

The scarf will then reside as property of the Grubb Shaft and Heritage Museum and it has been suggested that it will tour Australia later in the year.

Cardinian Embroidery Project

"Isn't it fantastic!" "That's amazing, it's much bigger than I expected." "The colours are beautiful." "What a heritage for our Shire".

These were just some of the comments that were heard from the public after the launch of the Cardinian Embroidery at the Cardinia Cultural Centre on Saturday 18th November 2006.

The Embroidery was launched by the Project's Art Director/Co-ordinator Eleanor Taylor and Cr. Kate Lemperrie. Members of the design team were present

when Eleanor told of the journey the Embroidery has taken.

The eight panels measure 190cm in height and 140cm in width. The Embroidery took just two vears and two months from start to finish. 384 features of local significance were embroidered by 218 women and one man. Cross-stitch, appliqué, black work, canvas work, free machine embroidery, fabric painting, hand embroidery and computerized machine embroidery were the main techniques used.

The Embroidery can be seen at the Cardinia Cultural Centre on each side of the right-hand corridor, near the theatre and seminar room.

Friends of Cardinian Embroidery Inc. was formed in March 2006 to work with Cardina Shire Council as joint custodians of the Embroidery. The 'Friends' have produced a range of souvenir items for A wonderful book entitled The Cardinian Embroidery edited by Eleanor Taylor is available for \$20 per copy. This book is A4 in size and has full colour pages of each panel and details of each town panel, including the history of the town name, and a list of all the name panel stitchers. Every feature is numbered, illustrated and names the stitcher and the techniques used, together

with history notes of each feature. There is also a diary and photos of progress on the work.

Other products available are greeting cards illustrating the Embroidery and superb quality reproductions of entire panels or selected features from the panels.

None of the above items could have been produced without the generosity of Binary Master Art who has reproduced the images directly from the embroidered panels using а mastering process they have developed which enables the work to be reproduced with extraordinary accuracy. The items nearer to life-size show every stitch as it was embroidered.

This Embroidery is a lasting heritage for the people of the Shire of Cardinia.

OUR NATURAL WORLD

Once again, and seemingly quicker than the last one, Christmas is almost upon us. A mixture of dread and joy assails the adults of the world as they contemplate the reality of the "festive season". The children in their wonderful naivety think of school holidays and Santa with all the presents he brings to the lounge room on Christmas Eve. They wisely ignore the fact that chimneys no longer exist and will rationalize it some other way.

Whilst Christmas is associated with Christ, many of the traditions and

rituals we take for granted existed long before Christ was born and are of pagan origin. When Christianity started converting many of the pagans, their customs were integrated into the Christian way of life, and became the much loved traditions we hold dear today. Feasting and present giving were taken from pagan habit.

Boxing Day is well known as a holiday after Christmas Day but very few would know its origins. It derived its name from the habit of servants and tradesmen to call for their

annual tips which were put into little earthenware boxes, that had to be later broken to collect the money. Somewhat like our "piggy banks".

The famous Nativity scene was first created in life size in 1223 at the church in Greccio by St. Francis and the Franciscans when he created а life-size reproduction of the stable, manger and the Holy Family, the ox and the ass. Another Franciscan. Jacopone Da Todi was the "father" of Christmas Carols, simple, heartfelt even robust songs in praise of Christs birth sung in the common language, in contrast to the austere Latin hymns of Christmas.

The origin of the Christmas tree was attributed to the German Monk, and famous savager of the Papacy, Martin Luther, sometime in the early middle ages.

The Christmas story almost ended in Britain when the Puritans came to power under Oliver Cromwell, and Christmas and all other Festivals were banned. This so incensed the population that riots took place, and Christmas gradually returned. It was a close call but no further attempts were made to ban it.

In 1843 Charles Dickens wrote his famous book" A Christmas Carol" which became legendary in the Christian world. A factory owner in America was so touched by the story that he decided to give his workers Christmas Day off, and the habit spread throughout the world. Santa Claus, that jolly old figure in the impossible costume was based on a St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra in Germany.



FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

FUEL TAX CREDITS

The Australian Taxation Office has changed the method of claiming fuel tax credits to claims on Business Activity Statements effective from 1st July 2006. Fuel Tax Credits relate to claims for duty payable on fuel under old Tariff Acts. The new Fuel Tax Credits Scheme. which replaces the energy grants scheme is broader and has cash flow benefits compared to the previous scheme. It principally relates to road transport and agricultural businesses.

To be eligible for the fuel tax credits scheme a business must satisfy the following:

- be registered for GST
- undertake an eligible activity
- where relevant meet environmental and/or Greenhouse Challenge Plus program criteria.

Included in eligible activities are the following: - road transport vehicles with a gross vehicle mass of greater than 4.5 tonnes (petrol and diesel)

- emergency vehicles

(petrol and diesel)

- agricultural activities (diesel) excluding road vehicles
- commercial fishing, forestry and mining operations excluding road vehicles (diesel)

Businesses that are eligible can claim Fuel Tax Credits at the rate of 18.51 cents per litre for business vehicles used on-road and emergency vehicles (petrol and diesel) whereas a higher fuel tax credit of 38.143 cents per litre applies to off-road activities including agricultural activities.

The Fuel Tax Credits are now claimed in BAS Returns. Be sure to claim for only eligible Fuel Tax Credits, which would not normally be the total fuel purchases. In addition, different fuel tax credit rates

apply eg if it relates to a vehicle for public road use or off-road activities. To assist in cash flow, transitional arrangements are in place for two years allowing advance claims for fuel tax credits. These advance claims are then offset in the next BAS Return. A claimant must meet certain criteria and make an election.

On-road diesel vehicles must meet environmental criteria if manufactured after 1st January 1996 to be eligible for the Fuel Tax Credit. This requirement does not apply to off-road vehicles and vehicles used for primary production agricultural activities.



If you are eligible for fuel tax credits be sure that your business is registered with the Australian Taxation Office (businesses previously claiming under the energy grants credit scheme were automatically registered). Fuel tax credits can be quite significant and those

eligible should be claiming fuel tax credits in BAS Returns commencing on 1st July 2006. Talk with your Accountant if you are unsure of Fuel Tax Credits to be claimed or the records required. Amendments can be made to future BAS Returns if claims have been overlooked.

THE CHALLENGES OF SUMMER

I want to thank everyone for their support and good wishes during the recent election period. I now have the privilege of continuing to represent the people of Gembrook for the next parliamentary term and look forward to working with all communities in the electorate to deliver more important projects.

The early signs are already indicating it will be a difficult summer for Victoria, with water levels extremely low and the risk for bushfires very high. This summer, more than ever, every citizen needs to ensure that they save water whenever they can.

The state government is encouraging water savings by extending and expanding the rebates on offer for water-saving devices. \$10 million will be used to extend the scheme so people can claim rebates on a variety of products such as showerheads. Households

that install new large water tanks of 5000 or more litres that are connected to laundries and toilets will now be eligible for a \$1000 rebate, with rebates of \$500 for smaller tanks. Importantly, \$10 million has been set aside to initiate local water recycling and stormwater projects while \$20 million will be used to create a Small Towns Water Quality Fund to help small towns improve water quality and upgrade septic tanks. These are all important measures that can make a difference to our water supplies. Of course, all residents should follow the requirements of the water restrictions. which are currently at Level 2. It is anticipated that the trigger point for at least Level 3 restrictions will be reached this summer, so all residents need to be vigilant about water usage.

The drought is also coinciding with a potentially very dangerous fire season. Even urban fringe

areas like Beaconsfield face the risk of bushfire threats, especially in pockets of the area that are fringed by grass and bush land. The best way of a managing risk is to develop a Bushfire Survival Plan and sticking to it. Residents need to decide that whether they will stay and defend their properties or leave in the event of a bushfire. If you choose to leave, you must leave early as the CFA advises that leaving too late can be a potentially fatal decision.

Please support our CFA volunteers as they face the challenge of summer bushfires and read the important and valuable information on the website at www.cfa.vic.gov.au Employers can assist by allowing their staff who are CFA volunteers to leave work to assist in the efforts. bushfire Communities can assist by cooperating with volunteers, by being prepared and developing a



Bushfire Survival Plan, by supporting fundraising efforts and by considering becoming a volunteer at their local CFA.

This coming summer with our dual challenges of drought and bushfire is a time when, more than ever the community needs to work together for our common good.

Enjoy Christmas and New Year with your families, friends, and neighbours and I look forward to working with you on a number of new projects in 2007.

Give a Dog a Bone – but which type?

Feeding your pet bones is something everyone does, but the question is what bones are the right ones to feed. Ask a number of different vets or friends and I'm sure you will get a variety of answers. Our reccomendation is the bigger the bone the better, for several reasons. Bones themselves have very little nutritional value, and as such, should not be eaten so much as chewed on. They are your pets "toothbrush". Chicken necks and wings are popular and animals love them. However, these are often eaten in no time giving little, if any benefit to the teeth. A large marrow bone will see your pet chew on it for an hour or so giving their teeth a great clean. Give them a bone twice a week, ALWAYS uncooked (cooked bones are more brittle and likely to splinter) and feed them a little less that night as the marrow is pure fat.

Another reason for feeding larger bones is that some pets will swallow chicken necks/wings whole. This can cause major problems as they can become stuck. We have seen this recently. A small puppy "inhaled" a chicken wing which became lodge in it's eosophagus, causing much distress to both the puppy and it's owner. Not only can the bone become lodged, but it causes problems with breathing, due the pressure of the bone in it's chest, and the bone can perforate the oesophagus causing major complications. This bone became lodged in the part of the oesophagus that passes through the chest. This can require major chest surgery to remove the offending item, but luckily for this puppy an endoscope was successful in removing the bone with no surgery required.

This is not something we see commonly, and hence why a number of recommendations exist regarding what bones to feed. I remember when I was growing up that our dog was fed everything, cooked and raw bones, marrow bones to small chop bones. He lived to 19vrs without ever having a problem. As I say, the problem is not common, but it can be avoided all together by feeding larger bones. There is the risk that major surgery is needed if a bone does become lodged, so avoid the risk to your pet and the stress to yourselves and just feed larger raw bones. If your pet will not chew on bones, please contact us for alternatives to keep your pets teeth and gums healthy.

Well, somehow we have arrived at Christmas again. This year has seemed to go even faster than usual, I guess in part, thanks to our 15mth old son. We are expecting our second child in late May, so next year will probably be just a blur!!

A WORD FROM WOOD

MERRY CHRISTMAS BEACONSFIELD

Christmas is a wonderful opportunity to get together and break bread with our families and friends.

It also coincides with the bushfire season. Early indications from the Bureau of Meteorology are that this Christmas season will be a season of very high fire risk. In fact, this summer is shaping to be the one of the hottest and driest on record. There will be more days of high fire risk, more areas in danger and a longer bushfire season.

Unfortunately for residents of Beaconsfield, bushfires are a fact of life.

Those of us who live in the area dare not forget Ash Wednesday 1983 when fires covering over 9000 hectares raged between Belgrave Heights and Upper Beaconsfield. The fires destroyed over 200 properties and caused 21 deaths, including those of the heroes of the Narre Warren and Panton Hill CFA teams who lost their lives in a firestorm at Beaconsfield Upper. Captain John Minett who led the Narre Warren crew had been named firefighter of the year just two days earlier. The sacrifice they made will remain with us forever as an emblem of the courage and commitment of our CFAs.

Even though the states and territories have primary responsibility for firefighting, I am delighted that the

Commonwealth Government is also playing a part.

Last at Parliament House I was delighted to attend the Minister for Local Government and Roads, the Honourable Jim Lloyd MP's announcement that the Australian Government will spend an additional \$2.5 million this financial year to help the states and territories lease additional firefighting aircraft.

This is a great result for those fighting bushfires in Victoria this season. Minister Lloyd's announcement comes after local CFA officers raised their concerns about fire preparedness with me. I wrote to the Prime Minister urging him to make funding available for an additional skycrane and raised the issue again with my colleagues in the party room. This funding will be used to bring a third heavy "Elvis"-type skycrane to Australia from the USA for the current fire season.

Our CFAs do a magnificent job protecting us and our homes. The efforts of all levels of government pale into insignificance beside the bravery of our volunteer CFA officers and supporters. They are our real heroes. I urge residents to heed their advice this Christmas season and throughout the summer. By all accounts it's going to be a long, hot one.

POPULAR CHEESES

by Ross Doherty - The Original Cheese Man

In the last edition of the Beaconsfield Banner Oct/Nov 06, I wrote about the four cheese groups. These being 1. Hard cheese 2. Firm cheese 3. Soft ripened cheese and 4. Soft unripened cheese. This time I am going to concentrate on the third group, soft ripened cheeses.

Because it is coming up to the hotter weather and Christmas, some cheeses in this group are the most popular. The two main varieties are Blue Vein and Camembert/Brie. These come in many variations. With the 'Blue Types' there are many different bodies (firm and soft) textures. (smooth and crumbly) and flavours (light and strong). Another variation is 'ashed'. With the 'White Mould' types, Camembert and Brei have similar differences such smoothness and flavour types. This can be attributed to normal, double or triple cream, with the

'ashed' type as well. Age also makes a difference. The longer the 'Blue Types' are matured for, the stronger the flavours and with the 'White Types' the softer and smoother bodies become.

In Australia both cheese types are made generally from cows milk but more is being manufactured from sheep and goats milk. Blue Vein types are well known world wide. In Italy it is called gorgonzola; in England - Stilton; France -Roquefort and blue; and Denmark - Danablu. These two types have been known for centuries, eg. the 'Blues' by Romans and the 'Whites' were first made in 1791 in France. Both use different Penicillium moulds. The 'Blues' has the mould right through the curd, while the 'Whites' have it on the outside surface. Both types are very popular on cheese platters. Another way people enjoy Camembert and Brei is to deep fry them. Try it.

The other cheese types in this group are Greek style Fetta (salty and sweet) and Italian style Mozzarella (mild flavoured and stringy). Fetta is often used in salads, while mozzarella is mostly used for pizzas. Most of us have tried this, the kids love to stretch it right out, often making a mess ...!

As mentioned earlier. cheese platters are popular. The main cheese type is of course cheddar The most cheese. frequently used is Tasty (matured) or Vintage. Here again, generally the older the cheese, the stronger the flavour level. Vintage is strongest. Others to consider are Swiss (or St. Claire), which is reasonably soft, smooth and sweet, nutty flavour. Gouda and Edam have a mild, clean flavour. Another variation for Edam and Gouda are the spiced ones where

most have very well balanced flavours. Try, you will be surprised. Now for colour, the last mentioned is terrific, but how about Red Lester? This cheese is bright orange in colour. It is a 'Cheddar' type with a very distinctive flavour, as with Cheshire, which is pale and salty. These are traditional English style cheeses.

Imagine if you can how much harder it will be to spend time with your family when you have to work on public holidays weekends with no extra pay. As it is many parents already spend more time commuting to and from work than they do with their kids. Think about how hard it will be to balance the budget if you lose your job for no reason.

Even though it might be hard to imagine - these scenarios are already a reality for some families in our area.

The IR laws mean that workers can be put on to new AWA individual contracts that can cut peoples take-home pay and remove important conditions like overtime pay, redundancy pay, shift penalties public holiday pay, paid maternity leave and penalty rates.

The La Trobe 'Your Rights at Work' Community Coalition has been set up to fight the Government's industrial relations agenda.



Well over the past 2 months we have only seen 66ml of rain. With it raining on a total of 8 days.


In October there was 26ml of rain from 5 days. This total was the lowest since October 1996 when there was only 14ml. The month was also extremely warm with 4 days over 30°, with top temperature of 36° on the 12th of October.

In November we recorded 40ml of rain from 3 days. This was the lowest since November 2002 when there was a total of 23ml. The highest monthly total for November was 161ml recorded in November 2004.

Melbournes water storage is currently as 41.3%. With summer now here it is a constant reminder to save every drop.




