A public meeting convened by the Casey-Cardinia branch of the National Trust held at the Beaconsfield Community Complex on Monday 12th February was well attended.

The topic of discussion was the Kenilworth Coachhouse. A building which is now part of a new development on Kenilworth Avenue. A building which has been noted as one of Beaconsfields historical sites.

National trust members and local residents condemned the situation where a developer was allowed to sign a Section 173 agreement with the council and then not retain the building or take any action to prevent further damage.

The developer has withdrawn an application to the Cardinia Shire to have the building demolished.

On the 19th February Cardinia Council passed the following:

"The condition of the "old Coach House" is in need of urgent repairs to reasonably ensure its retention. The council resolves that:

1. The matter be referred to VCAT to obtain an order for the restoration of the building."

Council are seeking that this restoration is undertaken by the developer/ owner.

### SHIRE REPORT

Council has recently appointed councillor Kate Lempriere as the shire's new Mayor. Council has also gone through an extensive process to select the new Chief Executive Officer. Almost 50 candidates were considered for the position and at the end of the selection process, Garry Mc Quillan, the shires General Manager of Corporate Services and the acting CEO was appointed. Garry is well regarded in the community and I am confident he will do a fine job.

Council is reviewing the township boundaries between Beaconsfield and Officer. Over time, there has been confusion and debate about the town boundaries. At the pres-

ent time the Beaconsfield Community Complex, in O'Neil Road, is technically in Officer. Council has surveyed residents in the area of question and the majority of respondents were in favour of being called Beaconsfield. Council is supporting a change to the boundary to include the area west of Whiteside and Brunt Road's, including the Panorama estate to be called Beaconsfield. Council will now advertise its intention to change the boundaries and council seeks public comment.

I have been contacted by many concerned residents about the Old Coach House situated amongst a new residential development in Kenilworth Avenue. I am disappointed that the condition of this heritage building has deteriorated so badly. The subdivision has a Section 173 agreement (signed in June 2005) between the developer and council, whereby one of the conditions is that the "existing coach house must be retained." Council is currently getting legal advice of what the term, "retain" actually means and what action can be taken.

The council of time, in my view made an error and should have worded the agreement much better to contain the requirement to actively conserve, protect and maintain the Old Coach House.

At the February General Council meeting. I tabled a petition of Beaconsfield residents who objected to the replacement of hard waste collection with tip vouchers and who wanted the road side collection service re-instated. When council soon re-considers hard waste services in preparation for the 2007/2008 council budget, I will be voting for the reintroduction of a roadside collection service.

The council funded signalised crossing between the north and south side of the Old Princes Highway in Beaconsfield was switched on in January. This crossing will provide safe access between the two shopping precincts.



### Glismann Road - Proposed Rezoning

The Happy Hills Estate was subdivided in the early 1960's into mainly 2.5 acre lots. All are now built on and while the road was originally Salisbury Road, the name was changed to Glismann Road to avoid confusion with the Upper Beaconsfield road of that name.

On Friday 2nd February 2007 all of the present owners met with three representatives of Cardinia Shire to discuss the proposed change in zoning from Rural to Residential. Ms Marcelle Bell, Strategic Planner, Mr. Philip Walton, G.M. of Planning and Councillor Brett Owen gathered with 32 residents at the home of Elaine and Phil Collins to hear the pros and cons of the change.

Much of the discussion centred on the road itself as any closer settlement which may result from rezoning, would severely strain the unsealed surface and create a terrible dust menace.

The practicality of subdivision into smaller residential lots was placed in question due to the hilly nature of the land, most blocks have steep sections and a good deal of filling would be necessary.

The residents must now record their support or opposition in writing to Council and it was felt that the meeting served to inform residents of some of the factors in the decision process.

Any plan to allow free access to the Berwick Views Estate via Glismann Road would meet strong opposition from residents.

### NEWS FROM THE BEACONSFIELD FIRE BRIGADE

Major bushfires in Victoria and New South Wales have kept the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade busy in the period from the end of November to mid January.

A tanker and crews from Beaconsfield were sent to Mudgee to the west of Sydney in New South Wales at the end of November as part of a CFA taskforce to assist in controlling one of numerous bushfires burning in New South Wales at the time. Crews came back from Mudgee as major fires flared in Victoria in the north east of the state and Gippsland.

Crews were actively in-

volved in fighting the Gippsland fires around Heyfield, Dargo and Swifts Creek up until mid January with a tanker from Beaconsfield also being deployed to Swifts Creek during January.

Twenty three firefighters from Beaconsfield were involved in the fires in Mudgee and Gippsland and collectively completed over 120 twelve hour shifts. Despite such a significant commitment, the brigade ensured that a tanker and crew were retained locally in Beaconsfield to respond to any fires or emergencies in the local area.

The risk of fires in the local area is still likely to be high through until the end of April, and residents in the fire prone areas of Beaconsfield are urged to ensure they continue to be prepared for a bushfire during this period.

Local fire brigades were recently asked to assist in collecting food and other household items to deliver to a foodbank in Victoria's western district for local families significantly affected by the drought.

It is extremely pleasing that with the generous support of the Berwick Op Shop

and brigade members, almost \$6000 worth of food and household items were able to be delivered to Horsham on 3 February 2007. This is in addition to food and household items provided by other fire brigades in the region.



## FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

### BUDGET SUPERANNUATION CHANGES

The Government introduced Tax Laws Amendment (Simplified Superannuation) Bill 2006 into Parliament on 7th December 2006. This Bill was then referred to the Senate Economics Committee, which is due to report by 6th February 2007. The Labour Party has indicated they will support the Governments' changes. These much awaited changes to Superannuation are now close to becoming law and are aimed at making administration of superannuation simpler for retirees whilst providing better benefits and flexibility when taking superannuation benefits in retirement.

The majority of the new measures that will apply from 1st July 2007, include the following:

- 1. The Reasonable Benefits Limit (RBL) will be abolished hence there will be no restriction on the amounts that can be accumulated in superannuation and paid as benefits.
- 2. The requirement to compulsorily be paid benefits on reaching a particular age or on ceasing employment is to be abolished except that benefits must be paid on death of the member.
- 3. Superannuation benefits paid from a taxed fund would be tax-free for persons aged 60 and over. This applies to Lump Sums and also Pensions.

A lower rate of tax applies for benefits from untaxed funds (eg some Government schemes).

- 4. The current age based limit of tax deductible contributions will be replaced by a limit of \$50,000 per person per annum (transitional rule for persons over 50 is a limit of \$100,000 p.a. until 30/06/2012).
- 5. Self employed persons will be entitled to full tax deduction that currently applies to employers contributions for employees as well as being eligible for their Government Co-Contribution for personal after-tax contributions.
- 6. Tax deductible superannuation contributions can be made for persons up to 75 years.

In addition, other changes include:

- 1. Undeducted contributions will be limited to \$150,000 p.a. from 10th August 2006.
- 2. The Centrelink/DVA 50% assets test exemption for complying income stream pensions will be removed for pensions purchased after 20th September 2007.

The Pension in place before that date will still receive the asset test exemptions of:

- 100% if purchased before 20th September 2004

### Heritage in our Community by Tammy Lobato, MP, Member for Gembrook

I was most distressed to learn prior to Christmas that the heritage-listed Kenilworth Coach House is now under threat of demolition. Beaconsfield residents alerted me to the application for demolition which places this unique piece of local history under threat. This is despite the fact that an agreement (called a Section 173 agreement) already existed which required the property to be protected.

Those who were involved with the Cardinian Embroidery Project would know that the Coach House was one of the buildings depicted on the Beaconsfield panel of the embroidery. This building, dating back to the late 1800s, was part of a property known as Kenilworth Villa, which also included a mansion and stables. It was used as a laundry when the Berry Street Foundling Home acquired the property in 1913, so that the nappies

of the children being cared for could be washed.

Since the demolition of the mansion in the 1960s, this coach house is all that remains of this important time of Beaconsfield's history. I have lodged an objection with the Cardinia Shire Council to the demolition application, and I know many other local residents have done the same.

The heritage and history of an area plays an important part in the identity of a community and in building the ties across the neighbourhood. I know many locals treasures such as the Old Coach House and the war memorial, mean so much to Beaconsfield people. They are like having a community photo album which speaks of where we have been and where we have come from. They are part of our shared culture and, as cultural icons, form part of the spirit of the com-

History is for everyone and heritage, which has been identified as of importance to a community, needs to be protected. It is easy to identify national icons that deserve protection and preservation from inappropriate development. Yet it is just as important for local communities that their own local icons and heritage-listed buildings and sites get the same level of recognition and protection. It is not sufficient to argue that anyone can do anything just because of title ownership, with total disregard for heritage values. This is particularly so when owners have agreed to maintain and protect a site as a condition of council allowing them to proceed with a development.

Planning- and heritage listing- is recognition that we live and work in a community and that the community needs to be functional as a whole. Heritage, culture



### A Growing Concern by Dr. Steve, Beaconsfield Vet Centre

So often we hear about obesity in children and adults, but research shows that around 50% of our pets are overweight. There are a number of factors that. can contribute to weight gain and these include:

Overfeeding - oversized portions or high caloric treats (the main cause of weight gain)

Limited exercise

Medical reasons - which increase the likelihood of putting on weight

Age - older pets are less active and therefore require fewer calories

Desexing - alters their metabolism so fewer calories are required

### Why the need for herbs in our daily diet?

Herbs have been in use since the Ancient Roman days and they were used in a variety of ways. They were used to purify and sweeten the unhygienic environment in the great cities, where cleanliness of body was a luxury to only a few, and food was often rank or even well and truly "off". Herbs have antiseptic properties and pleasant perfumes and powerful stores of volatile oils and minerals.

Ancient times saw people use herbs for balming purposes, incense and myrrh, and the Kings and Queens or any notable person, was always buried with a variety of herbs to keep them free from the evil spirits, and ease their way into the after life.

Many herbs were carried

as gifts from one monastery to another by monks, and from the monks' knowledge of the herbs people soon grew to acknowledge and embrace the power of the herbs. One of the earliest forms of taking herbal medicine was when the herbs were mixed with a wine to make a "cordial". Most of our liqueurs today are mixed with herbs, so we have the monks and their ingenuity to thank for that fact.

Natural remedies were prescribed for natural diseases, and "magic" remedies for many forms of mental illnesses, quite often by charlatans and tricksters who had no training or knowledge, but a smooth tongue for convincing people they knew what they were about.

Rasputin, the rascal monk, was able to keep people in a coma with herbs at his free will, and then administer other herbs and potions to bring them back to consciousness. This all so impressed the Russian royalty that all other physicians were not allowed in the palace to administer to the young prince who had a serious blood condition. The way Rasputin and others like him used herbs for their own mischievous advantage has given the use of herbal medicine a wrong reputation.


In our Grandmother's day, home remedies were readily available from the garden, and as she would say," There is no need for a Doctor when there are fresh herbs in the garden to administer"

Some people, who live in flats in parts of Europe where they have neither front nor back vards, rent from the council a small shed on a plot of land so they can grow their vegetables and herbs. Flowers were not allowed to be grown, just vegetables and herbs, bringing to the fore again, the importance of fresh vegetables and herbs.

### Cardinian **Embroidery** Project by Ann Taylor

Have you been to Cardinia Cultural Centre yet to view the Cardinian Embroidery?

This is an ideal outing for all the family and also somewhere to take visitors.

You will see eight embroidered panels, each measuring 190cm x140cm which depict the heritage and tradition of Cardinia Shire as we saw them in 2005. Even if you do not understand the intricacies of embroidery, you will all have fun identifying the well-known landmarks and recognizing neighbouring houses.

The third panel on the wall depicts features in Beaconsfield, Rythdale, Officer and Cardinia, Some old ones like historic Holm Park and includes the new Beaconsfield Community Centre.

In the lower section of the panel you will see the Old Kenilworth coachhouse. This was worked in machine appliqué by Roslyn Robinson.

Page 25 of "The Cardinian Embroidery" edited by Eleanor Taylor has information about the coachhouse.

Kenilworth Coachhouse

"In the late 1880's Charles Nott, 'gentleman' had a large turreted mansion built near the Cardinia creek. Much of the interior joinery was the work of local builder, James Adamson. Nott also developed an extensive garden with a lake and island, but he lost his fortune in the crash of the 1890's and eventually 'Kenilworth Villa' was acquired in 1913 by the Berry Street Foundling Home, when the coachhouse was converted into a laundry for all those nappies!

The Foundling Home, closed in 1946 and the mansion, though tenanted, fell into disrepair. In 1963 the Tozer family brought the property and demolished the old house, using the handmade bricks. slate and other materials to build a new four- level

house on the site. In 1971 the Sanders family bought the property and extended the coachhouse for their children's use. Some of the stained glass from the original mansion have been used in the coachhouse." The book "The Cardinian Embroidery" gives historical details of all the buildings illustrated on the embroidery.







### BEACONSFIELD'S HANDYMAN

Water storage tanks have become very popular. They say there is a 12 week delay on supplying some tanks. Every industry has its boom times - I think it is tanks and plumbers turn. One could certainly question the economics of buying a \$2,500 tank system when mains is so inexpensive. The main appeal for tank is independence. There is no-one telling you when you can wash your car or water your plants - yet. The water you collect tastes ok to me - many people grew up on tank water and creek water. Mind you they didn't have fluoride or chlorine to fight tooth decay.

What do handymen do when the weather is hot and dry? Well we avoid digging holes, working on iron roofs. We paint on the shady side, we do tiling repairs, plaster patches, put up sails (although that does involve digging holes) and building shelves. Shelves

are an all the year round job as are doors. Doors drop, rot, blister and just give up. Clotheslines need rewiring after a while, once rewired the line is tight and smooth.

I don't expect a gold watch, but 2007 is my 20th year as Handyman, first at Berwick and now Beaconsfield. My first job was at Berwick Brae Retirement Village in 1987 and today and Monday of this week I again worked at Berwick Brae Village. There are still many original residents, for such is life in that village I really think it adds years to your life.

Having installed a tank, we applied for Government Rebate of \$1000, which covers about a third of our costs. Little did we know that it would be paid as a rebate of each water bill. Of course we won't use nearly as much water now – it will be a very long time before we receive the full refund.



### TALKING WEATHER

In 2006 Beaconsfield had a yearly total of 609ml of rain.

In December there was 4 days of rain totalling 34ml. Most of this rain falling around Christmas day.

The month was also extremely hot with 10 days being over 30°c, with the highest temperature being 43°c on Sunday 10th December.

The yearly total of 609ml was the lowest recorded since 2002 where there was only 564ml in Beaconsfield.

The Highest Yearly total in my records, being 939ml in 1992.

In January 2007 there was 6 days where rain fell totalling 42ml. The month was also extremely hot with 11days reaching 30°c or above with the highest being 43°c on Tuesday 16th.

Melbourne's water storage is currently at 35.6% full.

### CARDINIA CATCHMENT LANDCARE INC.

I have spent the night listening to rain falling on our metal roof and decided it was one of the most beautiful sounds ever, especially the gurgle of water falling down the downpipe on its way to the water tank!

Like everyone else our garden survives on its own except for rinse and shower water carried to the more recently plantings. We are putting in more indigenous plants as others die and enjoying the birdlife that they attract.

We are hoping that the Landcare plants of last autumn are surviving. We cancelled all Spring plantings because of the dry conditions and have them to do this autumn together with other new projects. These range from properties on the open plains of Clyde to the hills of Upper Beaconsfield.

We have also been successful in an application for Melbourne Water funding to replant into Beaconsfield Park at the Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve after

weeding. This area was once a beautiful park with towering manna gums and dense riparian vegetation – we aim to return it to that condition.

We need public participation to succeed in this venture and would welcome assistance from clubs and individuals. The site is to be done in 3 stages concentrating initially on the riparian edge of Cardinia Creek. The weeding will be done by professional contractors and the Landcare group, with community assistance, will replant with indigenous plants. If you are interested in assisting please contact us.

This is a great community project and will make a huge difference to the condition of a badly neglected public space.

The plantings will take place after the autumn break – hopefully April/May – on Wednesdays throughout winter until stage 1 is complete.

On Clean Up Australia Day, Sunday March 5th we plan to work with the Friends of Cardinia Flora and Fauna Reserve to remove rubbish from this park as well as from the adjacent Reserve. For further details please watch out for a sign to be erected on the site.

Landcare's primary role is in supporting private land-owners in improving and protecting remnant vegetation and waterways on their properties. However in Beaconsfield and Harkaway we are also working on public land. The state of our waterways which are so often overwhelmed with weeds need as much public and private input as possible.

I have recently had reason to do some research into sweet pittosporum and pass on the following for your information. My sources are a Fire Ecologist, a CFA Officer who is also a Fire Manager with Parks Victoria and two authorities on native plants.

### Pittosporum undulatum – Sweet Pittosporum

An understorey plant whose natural range is along the east coast of Australia from eastern Victoria to southern Queensland.

It is described as 'fire sensi-

tive' meaning that it will burn in a bushfire situation and not recover. In its natural range this fact restricts it to moist gullies.

It has been planted widely outside its normal range and become a pest plant. In urban areas we do not allow bushfires so there is no mechanism to control its spread-hence it forms dense, impenetrable stands and prevents other indigenous plants from growing.

It also has a bellbird connection encouraging these birds to establish by providing dense habitat. There is another whole cycle involved here as bellbirds prevent other birds from visiting an area because of their aggressive behaviour. Small birds are prevented from controlling the lurps on gumtree leaves and so the eucalypts can eventually die.Pittosporums take a longer time to ignite than some other native species but burn vigorously once ignited. In the past this delay in ignition has meant that they have been promoted as a fire retardant species. The CFA, Department of Sustainability and Environment and Parks Victoria no longer promote pittosporum (or any other species) as fire retardant. All will burn given the right conditions.

### UPPER BEACONSFIELD INDIGENOUS NURSERY

It is not the time to be planting but mulching and weeding in preparation for autumn planting is a good thing.



They want to try and reach as many women as possible and let them know "there is hope; you don't have to be lonely". One


happy mother said that this group helped her to find herself again and brought her from being "severely depressed" to a having a great sense of empowerment.


