It is with great pleasure and relief that we advise the VicTrack application to build factories in Beaconsfield Avenue has been withdrawn.

A number of factors brought about this decision. Of huge importance was the strength of community opposition with 102 people at the Community Meeting held in March and over 150 letters of objection lodged with Cardinia Shire Council.

St Francis Xavier College was integral to the community lobby as hosts of the Community Meeting, through administrative support. circulation of information to families via their website and by defining the position the Beaconsfield Community in a meeting with VicTrack staff.

Beaconsfield The **Progress** Association were supportive of local residents and sent a letter to Minister Lynne Kosky lobbying for the withdrawal of the application.

Cardinia Shire Council were also strongly opposed to the development, with Cr Brett Owen supportive

of local efforts to prevent the development.

The end result would not have been possible however. without efforts of Tammy Lobato MP and her staff who lobbied Government tirelessly for the withdrawal of the application. This was confirmed on Monday 5 May.

It is important to note that while this application has been withdrawn, VicTrack are likely to investigate alternative uses for the site. It is vital that we are prepared to continue to working for appropriate use of this land in the future.

Council will soon make decisions on the three planning applications for electronic gaming facilities in Beaconsfield and Officer. This includes the DSL proposal in May Road, Beaconsfield. I am aware that there are many Beaconsfield residents who are opposed to such facilities. Therefore I have asked Council to conduct a survey of Beaconsfield and Officer residents to gauge people's opinions electronic gaming machines. Results of this survey will assist Council with the planning and decision making process as well as for any future VCAT hearings.

Vic Track (State Government Body) has withdrawn its planning application to construct 12

factories on the land which includes and surrounds the Old Beaconsfield Community Centre and the Scout Hall in Beaconsfield proposal Avenue. This was totally inappropriate. The buildings are being used by community groups and for educational courses for young people. proposed factories would have been totally out of character with the area. The proposal would have severely restricted the further expansion of the Beaconsfield Railway Station car park. Already the new extended car park is at capacity and the need for additional car parking Dedicated evident. train station car parking is essential to reduce the

need for public transport users to park on residential streets.

Council is supportive of the proposal for a Bendigo Community Bank Beaconsfield. Community banks employ local people and empower local communities by providing an income stream to fund community based projects, community and sporting groups. Council has agreed to provide funding assistance for a future feasibility study. I encourage residents to support the proposed community bank by completing a pledge form. Hard and green waste kerbside collection

Council's waste management contractor will conduct a kerbside hard and green waste collection in May/June. Residents have been allocated a collection week during the period, according to their own garbage day. Kerbside hard and green waste collections occur twice a year, in May/June and November/ December. Residents will not need to book as all streets will be included.

The contractor is WM Waste Management Services Pty Ltd, who can be contacted on 9721 1915.

Council has worked with WM Waste Management to make it easier for residents to plan for their hard and green waste pickup, by grouping collection areas by garbage collection days rather than by ward.

your Match garbage collection day with the relevant hard and green waste collection week (see the table below).

For example, if your weekly garbage collection day is Friday, your hard and green waste collection week commences Monday 26 May.

Monday

Tuesday 10 to Friday 13 June Tuesday

Monday 2 to Friday 6 June Wednesday

Monday 16 to Friday 20 June Thursday

Monday 23 to Friday 27 June Friday

Monday 26 to Friday 30 May Waste is to be put out in the week preceeding the collection and anything put out after the collection date will not be picked up.

If your waste is not collected by the end of your collection week, please contact WM Waste Management on 9721 1915.

Important tips

Collection is limited to 2 cubic metres (or two trailer loads) per household, per collection.

Place green waste, mattresses, scrap metal and remaining hard waste in separate piles. Each pile will be collected separately and not necessarily on the same day of your collection week.

Provide clear access to your nature strip during the collection week. Please do not park your car or visitors cars in front of your waste.

Hard waste placed out for collection becomes the property of the Council contractor. No other persons are permitted to collect this hard waste.

Collectable items include Hard waste - white goods, hot water systems, scrap household items, iron. furniture, computers and electronic equipment, mattresses, car parts (less than 1.8 metres long and less than 50 kilograms) and timber (less than 1.5 metres

Refrigerators should have their doors removed, lids should be removed from empty paint tins, and mirrors or glass should be securely wrapped with cardboard and marked "Glass."

in length).

Green waste - must be tied in bundles, less than 150 millimetres in diameter, less than 1.5 metres in length, and be able to be lifted by one person. Weeds will be collected if placed in boxes which will be emptied and left behind.

EMERGENCY RELIEF CENTRES

Cardinia Shire Council is part of a network which assists the emergency service agencies when required during major emergencies.

The arrangement for this support is detailed in the Municipal Emergency Management Plan which has been developed by the Municipal Emergency Planning Committee, chaired by Cr Graeme Legge.

In the plan a number of Relief Centres have been identified throughout the Shire. Beaconsfield Community Complex has been listed as one of these centres.

The relief centres are different to fire refuges which were part of previous emergency plans. All the Shire's fire refuges have been de-commissioned.

What is a relief centre?

A relief centre is defined as a building or place established to provide life support and essential needs to persons affected by or involved in the management of an emergency, including evacuees.

It is anticipated any of these centres will only be activated during high magnitude emergencies requiring emergency short term accommodation and support.

A relief centre would be activated with advice from the responsible agency, for example CFA or SES to the Municipal Emergency Response/Control agency (the Police), who will request the Municipal Emergency Resource Officer to arrange for the opening of a centre. Currently the centres would be managed by Council

staff with support from other agencies.

Advice to community members to attend a relief centre will be provided at the time, through a number of communication mediums, including radio and door to door visits.

Why were the fire refuges decommissioned?

A fire refuge was a place or building designated for public use where people may seek short term shelter from the fire front during a bushfire.

CFA now advocate developing a household fire response plan, which would enable people to plan in advance what actions they would take should a "wildfire" threaten the area, in short "stay and defend or go early".

A state government report found designated fire refuges were unsafe in the case of extreme bushfire because: they encourage residents to evacuate at the last minute; many are located so far from their population catchments that people would need to drive to them and many refuges could not cope with the number of people wishing to use them.





SNIPPETS FROM THE ACCOUNTANTS' DESK

All taxpayers should be aware of the constant tax changes to laws and the Publication of Determinations and Rulings. Anyone unsure of the income tax treatment of specific transactions can apply for their own Ruling from the Australian Taxation Office. A key factor in the administration of tax laws is to comply with specific dates of lodgement of returns as penalties for non-compliance can be severe. Recent items of interest include the following:

1. e-Record. The Australian Taxation Office provides free of charge, an electronic record-keeping package for taxpayers to record their business transactions including cash income and expenses. A revised Version 6.1 is due for release and will allow taxpayers to also monitor Cash Flow and has a Tutorial tool. Reports from e-Record are welcomed by Accountants to prepare appropriate Financial Statements and Tax Returns.

2. There will be a new Child Support Scheme from 1st July 2008 effecting separated parents and their children. The new scheme is aimed to assist parenting arrangements and shared responsibilities ensuring that Child Support is paid when due. Prior to the introduction of the new

scheme. assessments will be issued to existing customers which should be verified.

3. Companies effected by Division 7A Loans have an opportunity to self correct any past mistakes made from 2001/02 onwards thereby avoiding deemed unfranked dividends. The corrective action must be taken by 30th June 2008 by ensuring that complying Loan Agreements are in place and make up any payments of Principal and/ or Interest due.

Unless there are prior years tax returns outstanding or an individual or trust is deemed to be a high level tax-payer, then Tax Agents normally have an extension to lodge 2007 income tax returns to 15th May 2008 without penalty or general interest charges. A further extension is usually available to 5th June 2008 however in that situation. the income tax must also be paid by 5th June 2008. If you have not already lodged your 2007 income tax returns through your Tax Agent, this should be attended to promptly.

Discuss with your Accountant all your accountancy and taxation needs and ensure that you are aware of current developments and that you meet all the deadlines.

AMBULANCE SERVICE UPGRADE

by Tammy Lobato, MP, Member for Gembrook

VicTrack's recent application to build 12 factories in Beaconsfield on land zoned for public use associated with railway purposes, led to a huge turnout at a public meeting. I was pleased to be able to attend and to lend my support to the cause. As anobjector to the application, I made my view clear to the council and to the Minister for Public Transport: the application failed the basic test of contravening the purposes of the zone. I am firmly opposed to the proposition that land zoned for public use should be used for a commercial and private purpose.

In my objection, I also made the following points:

- * It is an extremely risky proposal, given that the setting up of commercial factories bestows an entitlement to the use of public land for this purpose and would then require a future dismantling of that
- * It would be unfair to the

community to develop a reliance on businesses with a view to shutting them down in the future:

* The proposal makes the assumption that the purpose for which the land is zoned—such as providing car parking for commuters is not required for the next decade, a matter on which I disagree; * The additional movement of trucks and other heavy vehicles would have major implications for traffic flow and poses unacceptable danger to students at St Francis Xavier as well as other pedestrians;

* The proposal would adversely affect the amenity of residents in the many houses close by.



I urged the Cardinia Shire Council to reject the application and local ward councillors also demonstrated their opposition to the proposal.

However, most important in the process was the activism of the many Beaconsfield residents who took the time to write objections, to attend the public meeting and to make their voices heard.

So it was wonderful that out joint cooperative effort has now paid off with VicTrack deciding to withdraw its application. It also demonstrates what a huge difference the involvement of the community can make. I hope this encourages you all to stay vigilant and keep involved in your local groups.

In other news, a massive boost has been given to the ambulance service in Beaconsfield, with the existing peak period unit upgraded to a 24 hour service. This will ensure that ambulance services can keep pace with increasing demand.

Casey Hospital has also received a \$4.2 million boost with the special care nursery for babies being expanded from 6 beds to 20 beds. This will mean the hospital will be able to cater for up to 1000 extra births per year.

In other news, all secondary government schools are receiving money for the purchase of technical equipment. Berwick Secondary College is receiving \$100,000 as is Pakenham. Schools have also recently received extra maintenance funding, in addition to the \$41 million already allocated school maintenance this vear. Recipients include Beaconsfield Primary School (\$4701.00),BeaconsfieldUpperPrimary School (\$2376.00), Berwick Primary School (\$4439.00), Berwick Secondary College (\$11,858.00), and Officer Primary School (\$1906.00).

Irecently visited Beaconhills College, St Francis Xavier and Monash University and had the opportunity to speak to students, parents and staff. A WORD FROM WOOD

I was delighted this week to receive confirmation in a letter from the Cardinia Shire Council that the proposed development for twelve two-storey units on Beaconsfield Avenue, Beaconsfield has been withdrawn.

I have been truly amazed at how quickly and how effectively the Beaconsfield community was able to band together and mobilise itself against the proposed development. I was also surprised that VicTrack – a Victorian Government authority – would even consider an application of this kind without extensive consultation with affected local residents and schools.

Initially I was contacted by members of the community expressing a concern that the fencing erected around the site by the developer was endangering students and other residents travelling to and from Beaconsfield station. I circulated a press release and thankfully the developer saw sense and removed the fence.

Subsequently I was sent

the objections of over one-hundred concerned residents. They were not over-the-top or negative; quite the contrary – they were sensible and well-considered and many residents actually suggested productive alternative uses for the site.

For my part I wrote an objection to the Cardinia Shire Council and the two Victorian Labor Ministers concerned - Planning Minister Justin Madden, and Transport Minister Lynn Kosky - to make them aware of the backlash in the Beaconsfield community urging them withdraw the application.

This result is a credit to Beaconsfield's wonderful community spirit. I hope the unbelievable tenacity of the Beaconsfield community has taught Victorian Labor Government a lesson and that this episode will ensure that there is substantial consultation before any future developments are considered for the site.

I once again congratulate the people of Beaconsfield.



BEACONSFIELD STATION MASTER'S HOUSE

The Station Master's House or Railway House is a wellknown historical landmark in the Beaconsfield area in Beaconsfield Avenue. School children and railway commuters pass. by daily and the beautiful Bunya Bunya pine out the front is a favourite with many. The house is currently been restored by the present owners and it is one of the surviving historical precincts along with our town the old Coach House in Kennilworth Avenue which is also been restored.

Thank you to these dedicated people who are preserving some of Beaconsfield's history.

When you visit the Cardinian Embroidery at Cardinia Cultural Centre at Lakeside Pakenham on the Beaconsfield panel you can see the STATION MASTER'S HOUSE black work by Eleanor Taylor and BUNYA PINE machine embroidered by Betty Pritchard.

The book The Cardinian Embroidery edited by Eleanor Taylor provides historical information on 384 features of local significance in the Shire of Cardinia. p.24 Station master's house,

"The house was built in 1888 by local builder James Adamson for Charles Nott, owner of the near-by Kenilworth villa.

Known as Kenilworth Cottage, it was used briefly as a 'Ladies College' then let as a holiday home to a Mrs. Anderson who was formerly Miss Jackson of Young and Jackson's Hotel. who

entertained here among her six children's' friends Stanley Melbourne Bruce, (later Prime Minister of Australia.)

The house was also let to J.C. Hodgson, Shire Secretary. In 1900, "Kenilworth Cottage" was acquired by the Railways Department for a Station Master's Residence.

Beaconsfield Railway Station was extremely busy in the early part of the 20th century with mail deliveries, transport of food, produce and materials as well as many holidays' visitors to both Beaconsfield and Upper Beaconsfield.

The magnificent Bunya Pine in front of the house is a possible remnant of the planting of Kennilworth Villa gardens from the 1880's and is a rare example of its type."

The book "Gardening with Australian plants- trees" by Thistle Y Harris p.98 gives some information about Bunya Bunya pines Araucaria bidwilli (Queensland) Can grow to 20-25m x 6-8m in size, with the cones up to 30cm long x 20cm wide Street.



It's surprising how music ages, isn't it? Take a listen to the techno that came out in the early 90s and you can instantly tell that it's nothing like the music of today. In the same way music can age us.

This has been an overwhelmingly united response from the community signalling that they do not wish to have poker machines forced into their small towns.

However the reality is that while the State Government maintains a flawed Cap Policy that allows 10 electronic gaming machines per 1000 head of population into the Cardinia Shire, the threat is still very much real.

While scheduled to go before the Cardinia Council on May 19 there is still a real chance that the applications could be approved.

There is, however, hope for the poker machine opponents as a result of the recent Court of Appeal decisiontosendthe Romsey poker machine application back to the Victorian Civil Administrative Tribunal to consider the community views and poker machines' social impacts.

Whilst gaming is a legitimate and legal activity, families throughout the Cardinia Shire tell me that they understand the severe consequences of problem gambling and don't want additional poker machine venues that will simply add to the problem.

The State Government must act to ensure that the wishes of the community are considered before electronic gaming machines are introduced.

COOKING OF CHEESE

"The Original Cheese Man" at Akoonah Market - site 37.

Because cheese is a protein, careless cooking can cause it to toughen. Therefore the final dish will be less palatable and less attractive. If the cheese is heated for too long at too high a temperature it can curdle and become stringy in moist conditions and hardening it dry heat is used as is seen with the browning of a topping on a baked dish. Excess heat and excess cooking time tends to increase fat separation. It is best therefore to have short cooking times and moderate temperatures. also applies when blending different cheese varieties.

When preparing a cheese sauce, the grated cheese should be added to the made-up sauces, then away from the heat and stirred until the cheese melts.

For best results it is best not to re-heat a cheese but if necessary do not reheat over direct heat, so heat over hot water. If a cheese is to be kept hot for an extended period, processed can be used as it is less likely to curdle.

If you purchase an immature cheese, such as young cheddar, Parmesan or Romano, the cheese can become rubbery, tough and stringy. Therefore a well-matured cheese of these types is better to use. The maturation process causes the proteins of the cheese to become more soluble. Reduced fat cheeses do not blend as well as the higher fat ones, such as traditional Cheddar.

APPLE AND ZUCCHINI QUICHE

1 sheet ready-rolled frozen pastry 2 tablespoons butter

80g bacon

2 onions sliced

½ cup finely sliced zucchini

1 apple, peeled and diced

3 eggs

11/4 cup milk

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup tasty and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup vintage cheese grated

Freshly ground black pepper

Line the base and sides of a 23cm quiche pan.

In a frying pan melt butter and add bacon and onions. Cook until onions are transparent. Stir in the apple and zucchini. Spoon into the bottom of the pastry case. Beat together the eggs, milk, cheese and pepper, pour over the vegetables. Bake in the oven at 200C for 10 minutes and then reduce to 180 C for another 45 minutes, until firm in the centre. Let stand for 5 minutes.

TALKING WEATHER


2008 has seen very little rain. So far this year we have recorded 132ml of rain in Beaconsfield. This is exactly the same as last year at the same time. The lowest total till the end of April was 64mm. This was recorded in 1997. The highest four monthly total was 287mm which fell in 1995.

Looking at the monthly totals there was 37mm of rain recorded in February. This fell over 6 days. This was higher than February last year when only 20mm fell.

During March only 23mm fell during 4 days. This was the lowest total since 2005 when there was only 18m of rain recorded.

In April 56mm fell over 6 days. This was considerably higher than last year when there was only 15mm. The highest April total I have in my records is 146mm which was recorded in April 2001.

Melbourne's water storage is currently at 30.8% full which is slightly higher than last year at the same time.

In another great season for Beaconsfield Cricket Club, two Under 15 sides won premierships, and three other Beaconsfield sides made it to the grand final weekend.



WHY DO WE

VACCINATE OUR PETS?

Most people who own a pet will have them vaccinated. There are several reasons why we vaccinate our animals.

Unlike diseases caused by bacteria, which can usually be treated with antibiotics when an animal gets sick, diseases that are caused by viruses can not be. Unfortunately when animal contracts a viral disease, it is usually up to the animals' immune system to deal with it and all we can do is support an animal through it by insuring they are receiving adequate nutrition, hydration, warmth and antibiotics to prevent a secondary infection.

However in many cases, the disease can be prevented! Using vaccines, we are

able to teach an animal's immune system how to deal with virus/bacteria if it is ever to encounter one. Thus preventing disease completely or at least reducing the signs associated with the disease. So what can we vaccinate for?

DOGS

dogs we vaccinate In against a few diseases. Out of these, Parvovirus is probably the most notorious of them. Parvovirus causes devastating damage the intestinal lining of dogs (particularly young pups), resulting in diarrhoea which rapidly leads to fatality in Thankfully, some cases. the incidence of Parvo has been greatly reduced with the introduction of vaccines! However, recently there have been a few cases of this life threatening disease in this area.

Within a standard Canine vaccine, there is also protection against Distemper virus. Distemper used to be very common prior to its introduction into the vaccine protocol.

The final protection offered by the canine vaccine is against 'Kennel Cough'. Kennel Cough is broad term which covers respiratory diseases caused various organisms including Parainfluenza virus and Bordetella Bronchiseptica (try saying that three times quick!). This is another disease which we have seen a major increase in incidence of in the past few months. A case of full blown Kennel Cough can be disastrous to an animal, as it affects the respiratory tract, and may progress to pneumonia and other complications. Animals that are vaccinated against

Kennel Cough usually show only a milder form,

CATS

We must not forget about our feline friends! For cats, there are four main causes of disease we vaccinate against. First of all there is Feline Enteritis, which is very similar to Parvovirus in the effects it has on your cat. The other three are all causes and different variations of Cat Flu. Cat flu, like kennel cough, is a disease of the respiratory tract. A cat that develops the flu can have runny eyes, can be sneezing, may go off their food and can have trouble breathing.

By vaccinating your dog or cat, you can greatly reduce the risk of these diseases. Vaccines are a very important part of protecting your animal from potentially nasty disease. Talk to us today about vaccine protocols and remember prevention is the key to a healthy life!


