SNIPPETS FROM THE ACCOUNTANT'S DESK

All taxpayers should be aware of the constant changes to tax laws and the publication of Determinations and Rulings. Some recent items noted include:

- * The Tax Office is reviewing reducing the number of taxpayers who need to lodge a tax return, which would abolish claims for work related deductions.
- First Home Saver Accounts have been available from 1st October 2008 attracting tax free bonuses of 17% (maximum \$850 per annum) and interest taxed at a flat rate of 15%. Monies can only be withdrawn after four years of Contributions for the purchase of the first home or rolled-over into Superannuation.
- * The Government Budget proposals to increase Luxury Car Tax from 25% to 33% and Family Trust Loss definition of 'Family' have been defeated or substantially modified by the Senate.
- *Arecent court case upheld the Tax Office issuing an amended assessment to a wage earner for additional cash wages assessable income in excess of the amount shown on

the PAYG Summary. In addition, incorrect return penalties were applied and a reduction in the Spouse Tax Offset for undisclosed cash wages of his Spouse.

- * Both the Labor Government and the Liberal Opposition have initiated reviews of the Australian Tax System so expect future changes some of which may have major consequences.
- * The Tax Office has issued a Draft Ruling on the requirements to be satisfied before payments are treated as Genuine Redundancy **Payments** and mostly tax-free. The Ruling aims to prohibit project and contract workers from claiming concessional tax treatment as well as for employees who act as both Director and employee.

Make sure that you discuss your accountancy and taxation affairs with your Accountant to ensure that you are aware of changes effecting you.

St Francis Xavier **College And Outward Bound Australia** Celebrate 25 Years Of Adventure

St Francis Xavier College returned in Year 9's from their September Outward Bound Australia adventure in the Snowy National Park, celebrating a partnership of 25 years providing self discovery, personal challenge and growth for local youth.

Beginning in 1984, 100 Year 10 students bravely forged a path that would be followed by over 4500 students in the following 25 vears, an experience that continues to be relevant in today's fast paced world.

St Francis Xavier College said the rationale for introducing outdoor education, as a compulsory part of the curriculum in 1984, was to challenge students in order to strengthen their ability to cope with change and uncertainty and to build their self-confidence and levels of motivation.

Through the 25 years activities have included hiking, rock climbing, abseiling, rafting, highropes courses and perhaps the most demanding, cooking for a group of 18 fellow students each night. Each student has experienced a unique journey and holds special memories of the experience.

Peter Robinson of St Francis Xavier said he had found that Outward Bound inspires responsibility, selfreliance, perseverance. confidence, teamwork. compassion and a greater sense of community in the students, well beyond the expectations of those who pioneered the program.


Mr Robinson has been personally involved as a group teacher and coordinator of the program for most of those 25 years and has a unique perspective on its success.

"The college has grown and evolved enormously since 1984. Society has also changed. An article publishedin 2004 described young people today as belonging to "the bubblewrap generation". As a society we have become far more protective of our children. There is evidence that children today are less resilient because we shield them from risk. The need for programs such as Outward Bound has not decreased.

In fact, they have become even more important at a youngerage," Mr Robinson said.

CARDINIA CREEK PLATYPUS KILLED - SEVERE BLOW TO REINTRODUCTION PROJECT

highly successful conservation project in Melbourne's eastern outskirts has been put at risk by illegal yabbying. Work to reintroduce platypus to Cardinia Creek has received a severe setback in recent weeks with at least two animals reportedly drowning in yabby traps on the outskirts of Beaconsfield.

The platypus population in Cardinia Creek disappeared as a result of the Ash Wednesday bushfires in 1983. Since 2004, a number of platypuses have been released into the creek and carefully monitored

by the Australian Platypus Conservancy in hopes of re-establishing the population.

Dr Melody Serena, Conservation Biologist with the APC, said that successful breeding has occurred for the last three summers with at least eleven juveniles hatched.

"The fact that the Cardinia Creek population appears to be reproducing on a regular basis is a very positive sign that the platypus reintroduction project – the first of its kind in Australia – is well on the way to long-term success," said Melody. "However,

the totally pointless deaths of at least two members of this small population (which currently numbers around 20 animals) is a tremendous blow. There is also a major concern that other platypuses will be killed along Cardinia Creek if the use of illegal nets continues."

The platypus is listed under the Victorian Wildlife Act 1975 as a notable wildlife species. The Department of Sustainability and Environment investigating the recent deaths and warns that anyone killing platypuses will be prosecuted. DSE's Senior Wildlife Investigator Mike Sverns said, "This matter is very serious. jeopardising the local recovery of a species that is under pressure across Victoria because of habitat loss and climate change." The penalty for killing platypuses is a fine of up to \$12,000 and/or a year's imprisonment. with further \$1000 fine for any additional wildlife taken.

"We are seeking more information on the use of illegal cray and yabby nets along Cardinia Creek. Anyone who has witnessed this activity should contact DSE so appropriate action can be taken," said Mr Sverns. "We would also appreciate any information that might help us locate the carcasses of the two recently killed platypuses. to assist ongoing research by the Australian Platypus Conservancy."



Many different airbreathing animals including tortoises. waterbirds and the native Australian water-rat as well as platypuses - can drown in the opera house and similar enclosed nets used to capture yabbies and crayfish. Hence, it is now illegal to set such nets in public inland waters throughout Victoria. Instead, it is permitted to catch yabbies and crays using either a baited line with no hook or open basket-type hoop nets. The illegal use of opera house nets attracts a penalty of \$500 if issued with an infringement notice or a heavier penalty that can be imposed by the courts. Members of the public are encouraged to report fisheries offences by ringing either 136186 (DSE information hotline) or 133 474 (DSE fisheries hotline).

Be Safe This Summer

Terrific news for young people and their families in Beaconsfield is that the NightRider bus services have been extended with both Berwick and Beaconsfield now included on the NightRider routes.

The new Cranbourne Loop NightRider will depart from the terminus at Lonsdale Street Dandenong, running in both clockwise and anticlockwise directions, from 1.30am until 5.30am on Saturday mornings and from 1.30am until 7.00 am on Sunday mornings.

The service connects with all the City to Dandenong NightRider buses, which means parents can be assured that young people enjoying a late night in the city can get home safely. With NightRider ticketing part of the Metcard system, it is also an affordable way to arrive safely home. Timetables are available on-line at www.metlinkmelbourne. com.au or by contacting my office.

With summer holidays almost upon us, I urge all residents to prepare for the forthcoming fire season and familiarise themselves with fire regulations. It is vital that everyone takes steps to ensure their homes are safe by cleaning out gutters, pruning vegetation, storing gas bottles and other inflammables with care, and preparing a fire safety kit. I have published a Fire

Season Calendar which includes all emergency telephone numbers plus handy hints to keep people and property safe. These are available from my office on request. is also the Summer season when we need to take particular care about our water usage. The new Target 155 campaign is designed to encourage all residents to limit water consumption to 155 litres per person per day. Target 155 combined with Stage 3a water restrictions will achieve similar water savings as Stage 4 while offering greater flexibility, as people can choose how they use water. Average water use during summer is 180 litres per person while the average across the year is 165 litres per person. Simple things like installing showerheads, efficient shower reducing time and using greywater or rainwater on gardens can enable households to meet the target of 155 litres per person.

Melbourne's progress on achieving Target 155 will be measured weekly and reported every Friday on the website at www. target155.vic.gov.au. Residents have done a magnificent job of saving water so far and I'm sure there will be enthusiasm for this new voluntary program to help us all continue to save water.



Parliamentary The Environment and Natural Committee, Resources of which I am a member, is currently investigating Melbourne's water needs supply examining the merits of further water savings that can be achieved by increased conservation and efficiency efforts, the collection of stormwater, the re-use of treated waste water, the use of groundwater, and small locally based desalination plants. Our report will be finalised soon and I will ensure to communicate the findings to residents. In the meantime, please keep saving water and do not hesitate to contact my office for any further assistance or advice.

THE VOICE OF THE BAPTIST CHURCH

Cameron Watt is not a household name but let me tell you his story. In 2004 he was sentenced to four years imprisonment. He was 29 with a wife and three little kids. Until that moment he had never so much as had a speeding fine. He had a degree and he and his wife were church goers. So how did he end up in jail?

He was the Assistant General Manager of Baptist Investments and Finance Ltd. It was a position with a great deal of authority and he used his authority to set up some very lucrative but unauthorised investments. So lucrative that he was able to siphon off cash for his personal use without anyone being the wiser. That is until the planes hit the towers on 9/11. His clever investments failed and in the wash up his unofficial personal payments were exposed.

At his trial his barrister argued that Cameron thought there was nothing illegal in using some of the excess profits for his personal use. In the trial his barrister asked him, "Do you believe what you did was dishonest?" He was supposed to answer, "No, of course not." But as he stood there he had a moment of self-realisation.

He knew everyone was expecting him to give the standard answer and to go on trying to show the world that he was innocent. But in that instant he finally accepted that what he had done was wrong. In that second he decided to be true to himself regardless of the consequences. He answered "yes". The judge stepped in and asked him to reconsider his answer. But there was nothing to reconsider. The truth is he had done wrong and now for the first time he was admitting it to himself.

Cameron went to jail because of that answer. But he went to jail a free man for he was a man who was no longer tied up in the world of self-denial. There is nothing more freeing than living in the truth no matter how painful that truth. (You can read more of Cameron's story in Bright Lights Dark Nights. By Simon Smart P 95).







KATH ROBERTS RESERVE

There are three reserves named after local identities of this town, Kath Roberts, Bob Burgess and Jim Parkes.

This month we will tell about Kath Roberts 1901-1992. Kath was born in Yorkshire, England and came to Australia with her family

The Roberts family ran a station store on the corner of Wood Street and Beaconsfield Avenue which they ran prior to World War I. The brothers built a house next to the store in the late 1920's where there was a well fed by an underground spring on the property which supplied water for the town in times of drought.

Kath Roberts and her husband Mac ran the general store on the highway near the bridge and then took over the Post Office from the Craven sisters in 1936. The post office was very busy with two mails in a day and

two out a day. Mail was also taken to Guys Hill and Upper Beaconsfield, sorted for private bags and boxes. Bill Watts also worked there, sleeping by the switchboard at night as it was a 24 hour exchange. When WWII came, Bill Watts joined the army and then Kath's daughters helped their parents. The post office was also an agency for the Commonwealth Bank, the centre for collection of petrol ration tickets and for payment of fortnightly pensions.

The Roberts family home still stands and has recently been refurbished and named 'Robert's Corner' after the family.

Kath Roberts Reserve was opened in 1989. It is at Melway 111K11 at the end of Kathleen Court and has a pathway from Amelia Close to Harbour Street. Next time you visit the reserve, you will know why it was given this name.

The old Station Store on the corner of Wood Street and Beaconsfield Avenue has long since gone, but it became the Grosby Slipper factory after World War II. About 30 girls worked there cutting out slippers and shoes, sewing, binding and putting in eyelets.

Some came by train to work, but the factory also employed many locals during the late 1940's and 1950's. It closed and the building was demolished in the 1960's.

He pleaded not guilty and suggested that 2 similar buses must have broken the tape, one at the start and one at the end. As no registration numbers were recorded the charge was not proven.

Well I'm off now to patch some holes in a plaster wall, swing 6 or 7 doors, fit their locks and touch up the paintwork ready for the handover to new owners.

I hope we all stay healthy for Christmas, spare a thought for what started it all and please don't honk me because I drive at the speed limit.






November saw an increase in rain for the year. There was 69mm of rain, this being our wettest month for the year. The rain fell over 7 days.

The total for the year has climbed to 528mm. This is 139mm behind at the same point last year. It is the driest 11 months of the year I had recorded since 1997 when there was 513mm. The wettest for the same time came back in 1989 when there was 842mm in the 11 month period.

Melbourne water storage is currently at 34.1%. This is significantly lower than at the same time last year when they were 39.7%. An interesting website to look at all these figures is the Melbourne water website www.melbournewater.com.au. It has all the latest information about water restrictions, water quality and dam levels.

Beaconsfield is another step closer to getting a Community Bank with the completion of the Feasibility Study. The Study, based on Survey responses from 450 persons indicated that the proposed Beaconsfield District Community Bank would be financially viable and should be profitable within a relatively short period of time. The Study did note however that further pledges of support of \$34,000 were needed to reach the \$750,000 Share Capital required to proceed.

Preliminary discussions have been undertaken for a suitable location for

the Bank and also with Solicitors to incorporate a Public Company and issue of a Prospectus. The Steering Committee is proceeding with these matters in the expectation of opening a Community Bank during early 2009.

This is an exciting time for Beaconsfield and surrounding Communities of Officer, Guys Hill and Upper Beaconsfield to establish a Bank owned by the Community where 80% of profits are paid to non-profit Community Organisations including Schools, Kinders, Sporting Clubs, Fire Brigades etc etc. The remaining 20% of profits is used to pay

Dividends or retained for Working Capital.

CARDINIA CATCHMENT LANDCARE NEWS

by Ian Chisholm, President

Volunteers from our Landcare group have recentlybeenaccompanying Bridgette McCallum (Landcare Facilitator for the Western Port Landcare Network). on property assessments in the area south of Beaconsfield

During these visits we have heard some alarming stories about life on the land during recent hot summers:

- * cattle having to be destroyed after they stepped into large cracks in the ground;
- * stock dying because shelter was not available on days of extremely high temperatures;
- * a newly- planted windbreak struggling to survive because the farmer was forced to water his plants with underground

water, which was too salty for even the hardiest of indigenous plants. (It appears that the availability-and quality- of underground water varies considerably in this area; property owners should seek advice from Landcare personnel or from Southern Rural Water, at KooWeeRup).

These property assessments, which are provided at no cost to the landowner, could help identify solutions to problems such as those listed above. Please note that the assessments are carried out on smaller hobby farms, as well as the larger properties to the south.
