

# CARDINIA

### SHIRE REPORT

Holm Park Road Reserve is a step closer, with the allocation of \$2.42 million in the 2009-10 council budget to commence the construction of the reserve. The 12.6 hectare site at the corner of Holm Park Road and Beaconsfield-Emerald Road will be transformed into a major sports and recreation reserve over next few years. the Council is also grateful for the recently announced support from the State and Federal Governments who have assisted with grants of \$500,000 and \$264,000 respectively towards the \$5.8 million project. Construction is expected to commence shortly.

The 2009/2010 council budget also includes \$120,000 for the construction of a footpath along Holm Park Road between Fieldstone Boulevard and Beaconsfield Emerald Road. A lack of a footpath along Holm Park Road has been a concern of local residents and I am pleased that this upcoming budget will deliver this footpath.

Council has written to the State Minister for planning to request that the State Government introduce an interim heritage control over the Bunya Bunya tree on the railway land adjoining 20 Beaconsfield Beaconsfield. Avenue. This tree is identified as being of regional heritage significance and must be protected as it is associated with the former Beaconsfield station master's house.

Council has been attempting to acquire a 226 square metre section of land at the rear of the Beaconsfield Hotel. This

land is required to create an access way from the soon to be opened Woolworths Supermarket to Beaconsfield-Emerald Road.

The preferred and most efficient means of securing the carriageway easement was to negotiate an agreement. However, the amount sought by the land owner (not licensee) is substantially in excess of valuation advice.

Council has commenced the statutory process to compulsorily acquire the carriageway easement over the hotel land under the Land Acquisition and Compensation Act. The access way is a high priority for council. It is essential to improve safety and traffic flow within the Beaconsfield commercial area.

#### Cardinia Shire Council's new Mobile Youth Bus hits the road

Cardinia Shire Council's new Mobile Youth Bus was officially launched in Emerald.

Cardinia Shire Council Central Ward Councillor Brett Owen and Victorian Minister for Community Development Peter Bachelor officially opened the bus, which is called MYBus, at a ceremony held at Emerald Secondary College.

"The bus has a fantastic range of fun resources young people can use," Cr Owen said.

A special thanks goes to Mr. Tony Rafferty for his attendance and to Tony Lukas and Murray Johnson for organizing a magnificent evening.





It is with great sadness that I inform the St Francis Xavier College community of the death of former principal, Mrs Maree Johnson, early on Sunday 31 May. Mrs Johnson has been battling leukemia for a long time and in recent weeks her illness took a serious turn for the worse. Mrs Johnson passed away peacefully.

In terms of her Jegacy at St Francis Xavier College Maree Johnson will be long remembered and with a deep sense of gratitude. As principal of this College from 2000 until 2004 she oversaw the rapid expansion in population at each Year Level, conducted significant refurbishments and improvements at the Beaconsfield Campus and planned and built the Berwick Campus. Johnson's commitment to excellence in Catholic education is well known. Whether with students. parents or colleagues. she encouraged a love of learning and a desire to bring about the best for others. She gave of her time, skills and energies; our young people are the beneficiaries of this.

## MY VIEW FROM OVER THE FENCE

In the Banner two issues ago was a photo of the Old Scout Hall awaiting demolition because of claimed excessive asbestos contamination. My photo shows the Scout Hall with the asbestos removed and awaiting final demolition. It is here that the lie is exposed.

No protective barriers, no plastic sheeting, etc so one can assume that the threat has been removed or the final demolition works to be illegal.

With me living next door OVER THE FENCE and having the asbestos removal independently monitored this senario was highly unlikely.

Nowhere in the Asbestos Report on both buildings did it say they required demolition.

Both buildings lost to the community because of the false claim the council ordered their demolition when the council could not even enforce its own directive to have the Scout Hall fully fenced.

Draw your own conculsions as to where the monster lies.



# SNIPPETS FROM THE ACCOUNTANT'S DESK

The Budget recently introduced into Parliament contains many changes affecting all taxpayers. Some of the major items are:

- confirmed previously announced personal income tax cuts from 1st July 2009.
- the bonus deduction for capital expenditure on new depreciable assets acquired by a "Small Business Entity" between 13th December 2008 and 31st December 2009 has been increased to 50% instead of the 30% and 10%.
- reduced the concessional (deductible) contributions for Superannuation to \$25,000 for persons less than 50 (was \$50,000) and \$50,000 for persons over 50 (was \$100,000) effective from 1st July 2009.
- reduction in the minimum payment amounts applicable to account based, allocated and market linked pensions from the current 4% to 2% for the 2009/10 year. This reduction also applied to the 2008/09 year.
- the superannuation cocontribution has been "temporarily" reduced from a maximum \$1,500 to \$1,000 effective from

1st July 2009 but will be restored progressively to the higher amount by 2015.

- foreign employment income will be taxable in Australia from 1st July 2009 and taxpayers will be able to claim credit for any foreign tax paid. Employment income of specified government employees aid or charitable workers continue to be exempt.
- from 12th May 2009 discounts on employee shares and rights will be taxed in the income year the shares or rights are acquired and cannot be deferred for ten years, as previously. The \$1,000 exemption will be limited to employees with an income of less than \$60,000.
- it is proposed to amend Private Health Insurance Rebates from 1st July 2010 reducing the rebates for higher income earners up to nil and also increasing the Medicare Levy Surcharge to 1.5%.

If you are unsure of the Budget changes then you should discuss with your Accountant. Please note that Budget proposals may not necessarily be legislated as announced so await for legislation to be passed.

Advertising is another problem area, as it is

basically a self-regulating industry. Items such as billboards can be erected without being scrutinised first and it is only complaints from the public that lead to their removal.

Parents and families have had enough. Many people in the community have contacted me wanting to take action to protect children and to help us as parents enjoy a childhood of fun, playfulness and innocence. You can support this campaign for change in the areas censorship advertising by contacting Kids Free 2B Kids, a group of Australians concerned increasing about the sexualisation of kids in the media, advertising, and clothing industries. (www. kf2bk.com) or Women's Forum Australia (www. womensforumaustralia. com). Please let me know your thoughts on this important issue.

The Royal Commission on the Victorian bushfires is now well underway and I am sure many of you have been following proceedings the with interest as well sadness. Although the hearings mean that many tragedies are re-visited, it is important for all of us to understand how we can improve safety and prevent further loss of life from occurring in the future. ### **BROADBAND IN BEACONSFIELD**

Are you having difficulty in gaining access to Broadband for your home or business in Beaconsfield or surrounding areas? If you are fortunate enough Broadband have connected, is it operating at a high speed efficiently and reliably or are you experiencing problems with the speed of the internet or even no access at certain times?

This matter has been raised by us on a number of occasions with Telstra corporation and other telecommunication Companies with the response that ADSL cannot be connected as the local telephone exchange does not have any free ports. The options appear to be

as follows:

- 1. Wait for the National Broadband Network promised in the 2007 election to be established. However, it is expected to take up to 8 years to build and may not be delivered to smaller towns with a population of less than 1000.
- 2. Accept Telstra's push for Big Pond Wireless Broadband as an alternative to ADSL but with less capacity and lower speed of operation.
- 3. Have the opinion that every resident or business should be able to have access to ADSL Broadband and that Telstra should upgrade the network and extend the reach of ADSL Broadband.

This will only happen if there is sufficient demand from consumers.

If you want to obtain access to ADSL Broadband or an improved service then you should contact your local Member of Parliament with your concern (Tammy Lobato - State and Jason Wood - Federal). addition, we are collecting names of persons who want ADSL Broadband and will make representations to the Government and/or Telstra provided there are sufficient number of people experiencing the problems that we are.


health and welfare. My son went to the last Jamboree and had a marvellous time and had experiences which will always be one of his highlights.

Local Historian Dr. Charles Wilson has sent us an extract from the VICTORIAN TOURIST BUREAU GUIDE BOOK -1912

Picturesque Victoria p. 219
Gippsland, the Lakes, and Buchan Caves.

'BEACONSFIELD, 28 miles from Melbourne by rail, 16 ½ feet above sea level – From Flinders Street station there is a convenient train service daily, with an additional train shortly after mid-day on Saturdays. The journey occupies 1 ¼ to 2 hours, according to train taken.

A Sunday train leaves Flinders-street Station at a convenient hour, reaching Beaconsfield in time for lunch, and returning to Melbourne at a reasonable time.

The district may be said to be divided into two portions named LOWER AND UPPER BEACONSFIELD respectively. Situated within half a mile from the railway station in Lower Beaconsfield is Cardinia Park, which has become a favourite picnicking resort being most admirably adapted for this form of amusement: a portion of the reserve still remains in its native state, the timber providing pleasant shelter; other parts have been cleared so that sports and games may be indulged in. The Cardinia Creek, running through the centre of the ground at once provides a plentiful supply of water and fishing

for those whose inclinations lie in this direction: blackfish and eels are plentiful: trout and perch are occasionally caught.

Upon the creek is a fairly large sheet of water on which was held the A.N.A. aquatic carnival and it is also used for public baths, a smaller pool lower down the creek, being reserved for the use of ladies.

A comfortable hotel is within 3 minutes walk of the railway station, and close to it is the local racecourse where races and sports meetings are held.

A second hotel lies a mile and a half from the station en route to Upper Beaconsfield, and there are three well-kept comfortable boarding houses in Lower Beaconsfield.

In Lower Beaconsfield is a large public hall, free library and reading room containing 400 volumes, newspapers, periodicals etc. The hall is used for all public entertainments. Telephones have been installed in the local public buildings and many private residences.

Within 3 miles of the Railway Station on the hills, a vacation or weekend camping ground has been laid out, and christened Quamby (the aboriginal name for camp) The main road to the farther heights beyond runs right past the allotments into which the reserve has been subdivided, and by means of passing coaches it is an easy matter to get quickly to and from the station.

The allotments are being rapidly disposed of to those anxious to obtain at small expense a spot in the bush among the hills, whereon to pitch a holiday tent and enjoy a restful and unconventional vacation.

Fresh water is available and facilities for preparing meals are provided in a centrally-erected building.'

#### BEACONSFIELD TODAY

**Trains** still stop Beaconsfield, but we have a timetable with specific times and the train from Melbourne is not divided into first or second class. The cost is now more like \$11 for a day ticket from Melbourne. We can catch a bus from the station to Upper Beaconsfield or to other parts of the area. We have a different timetable for Saturday and Sunday.

Upper Beaconsfield is still where Upper Beaconsfield is today and Lower Beaconsfield is now the township of Beaconsfield as we know it. The Beaconsfield station was first a railway platform in 1889 and the Station building opened in 1891. The Beaconsfield Primary School opened in 1890 and was called the Beaconsfield Railway Station School until 1951 when the name was changed to Beaconsfield Primary school

Cardinia Park is now called Akoonah Park where the Berwick show grounds are and Beaconsfield Park is on the town side of Cardinia Creek. Akoonah Park is still used for sporting events and also has bush areas and is popular for walking and lots of regular events as well as the Annual Berwick Show on the last weekend in February each year. The Berwick Show was first held on Clyde Road in the area known as Buchanan Park.

The area now known as Akoonah Park was first established by the Berwick Shire as a Pound in 1888 when the Show needed new grounds and after many working bees by dedicated locals the Old Pound Park became the Berwick Show grounds and the first show was held there in 1963. In recent times the popular Akoonah Park Market is held every Sunday with many stalls and people come for miles around each week.

The Cardinia Creek still runs through Akoonah Park and Beaconsfield Park and Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna reserve, but these days due to the drought, is very shallow and no longer suitable as a fishing ground. In fact fishing with opera nets is banned due to the damage that can occur to the local wildlife especially the platypus which are regenerating in the creek and are protected. Areas of local indigenous plants are currently being planted along the riverbank thanks to work done by Landcare and Greencorp with grants from Melbourne Water. However there is no longer baths for swimming as was in 1912 as it would be dangerous to attempt to swim in such shallow water.

There are still 2 hotels in Beaconsfield, the Central Hotel was built in 1928 in the Spanish Mission style, and before that on the same site was the Bowman's Hotel built in 1850. In 1861-61, it was known as the Gippsland and owned by Mrs. Janet Bowman who paid for the cutting of 'Bowman's Track' from the hotel to the goldfields further north. A few years later the hotel was taken over by the Souter family, who extended the building especially for a visit from Prince Alfred. Duke of Edinburgh and second son of Queen Victoria who enjoyed the hunting and fishing in the area on his second visit to Victoria in 1869.

The racecourse referred to was along the highway and bordering Lyle Ave, but has long gone with the establishment of the racecourse at Pakenham.

The Beaconsfield Public Hall was built in 1906 by Mr. James Adamson and was used for town gatherings as well as a free library. Sadly the building was demolished in the early 1970's for the widening of the Princes Highway. The Beaconsfield Community Complex in O'Neil Road opened 2004. When you read the sad news of rising unemployment you are cheered by the list of job vacancies in particular in the trades and professions in which demand exceeds supply. Prominent among vacancies are bricklayers. plumbers, carpenters, motor mechanics, engineers and electricians so if tomorrow you went to Centrelink and requested 6 tradesmen to

build your house or factory they would probably fall over laughing. Do they laugh at Centrelink?

Parents steer their children through VCE into tertiary education thinking that they will obtain a secure future in a profession. Reality is that many jobs in science, education and commerce remuneration

below tradesmen. The reason is of course that trade training has slipped The loss of the behind. technical schools and the apprenticeship mediocre system has created a shortfall - quite the opposite situation in the number of university graduates.

The worse side effect however is that a youth who spends his time chasing a degree spends hours in front of a computer screen and cramming a precious hour or two at the gym - restarting his blood circulation. Once establishes himself in employment he finds somewhere to live with room for a double bed and a desk for his computer. If the bed collapses, his mortgaged car breaks down he uses his cell phone to call a tradesman.

On the graduate's meagre income, less his uni fees, car payments, rent, computer updates, cell phone bill, oh and ves food, he must call a tradesman.

The problem may be quickly remedied but the tradesman has a tool kit and knowledge of its use. He charges a call out fee plus, plus.

Tradesmen themselves have this ancient system of bartering. He is a plumber; his friends are electricians and carpenters - the overalls wearing members of the community. When there is a job to do - you call your mate - he then is entitled to your services when he needs help. Money need not change hands.

My mother guided me into learning a trade - the wrong one as it happened but nevertheless a trade reason, "You can always fall back on your trade."

"Don't let your babies grow up to be cowboys" - sings Willie Nelson -teach them a trade.

It is a pity that the launch of 'Two Lovers' has been overshadowed by the 'breakdown' of Joaquin Phoenix because as far as 'alternative romances' go this is the first one that has worked in quite a while. This fine film shows that romance films don't have to be cheesy fodder full of Hollywood starlets and hunks who don't have an 'acting' bone in their body.

'Two Lovers' tells the story of Leonard Kraditor. thirty-something man who battles mental illness and suicidal tendencies every day of his life. He also has to endure living with his parents, Reuben (Moni Moshonov) and Ruth (Isabella Rossellini) who don't let him even as much as breathe without checking up on him. They set him up with Sandra Cohen (Vinessa Shaw)

and while he likes her he is actually in love with his neighbour, the troubled, Michelle (Gwyneth Paltrow). Torn between the two women Leonard finds himself more comfortable with Sandra but still has an unnatural obsession with helping Michelle.

Director/writer **James** Gray continues to impress with his unique filmmaking style, this time he manages to produce a Woody Allenesque film that truly draws its audience in and forces you on the emotional rollercoaster that Leonard is on. Gray also manages to write such natural dialogue that you do occasionally feel that you are watching something real, rather than something scripted.

'Two Lovers' also shows why it is so important for

Joaquin Phoenix to turn his back on his rap career (or whatever it is he is supposed to be doing) and return to acting. His performance here is his best since 'Walk The Line' and shows that he is up there among some of the best actors in the world... to see his talent being wasted at the moment is a true crime.

This is a film that will take you on an emotional rollercoaster ride but it's certainly a ride that you will enjoy every second of. The sensational characters and wonderful acting make this a sheer joy to watch and reminds you that there are the occasional good romance-dramas out there. This is one for fans of serious films.

It isn't only humans who have feelings that lead to love but so do our furry, fluffy and feathered friends. Animals are sensitive creatures. They comfort us, miss us, grieve for us so it seems feasible that they can also feel deep love for both humans and other animals.

In the wild animals show many emotions in order to survive: mothers will protect and defend their young, weaker animals will run in fear of stronger animals. Would it be ignorant to suggest that human beings are the only species of all the millions on this planet that are capable of feeling emotions such as love?

If one were to describe the main characteristics of a dog, they would have to be:

- 1. strong affection
- 2. warm attachment
- 3. unselfish loyalty and concern for others

Here at the clinic we see amazing bonds between family pets. It is very common for a dog to come in to the consult room with his or her sick mate purely for moral support and to alleviate anxiety.

# **TALKING**WEATHER

With winter approaching it was time for the rain to start falling and in April it did just that. We had 89mm of rain fall in Beaconsfield for the month. This rain fell over 8 days with the largest totals falling on the 26th and 27th with 20mm and 27th with 20mm and 27th

The total of 89mm was the highest for the month of April since 2006 when we had 115mm. The total was also the highest monthly total we have had since December 2007.

The rainfall in May was only a fraction of what we had in April with only 27mm. It also fell over 8 days but it was not the rainfall we require to break the drought we are currently in.

The total of S7mm increased the yearly total to 189mm. This is above the same time last when there had only been 178mm. This still unfortunately is still well below the 5 monthly mean of 282mm.



# The Cardinian Flora And Fauna Embroidery

will be a sequel and companion to The Cardinian Embroidery.

It will consist of four embroidered landscape panels containing separately embroidered examples of plants, animals, birds, insects etc as seen in the Shire in 2009-2010, with an emphasis on endangered species.

On a fifth canvas work panel will be a label explaining the project and acknowledging stitchers and sponsors. This panel will be taken to various groups for people to 'add their stitch' and have their names recorded as participants.

The five panels will be small enough to be framed individually or hung on a free-standing framework, covered by Perspex panels for protection. These panels will be portable and can travel around the Shire first, then around the rest of the State to promote the attractions of Cardinia. Eventually it will return to a base such as the CCC or the Pakenham library but it will always be available outside the Shire on request.

As with The Cardinian Embroidery, FOTCE (Friends of the Cardinian Embroidery) aims to produce an accompanying booklet which will list all species included on the panels, together with the names of the stitchers and sponsors of each.

Funding for this work will be achieved through seeking sponsors-businesses, families and individuals will be asked to donate a set amount, for purchase of materials to complete one embroidery. The sponsor's name will be recorded in the booklet next to the name of the stitcher of each creature. This will allow greater community involvement from those unable to wield needle and thread.

#### Aims of the Project:

To unite diverse elements of the community, bringing people together

in a spirit of sharing a common goal. To generate a sense of community pride in producing a unique textile artwork of heritage value.

To provide the opportunity for large numbers of people of all ages and abilities to take part in a free, noncompetitive long-term Arts event.

To promote the sharing of textile skills which are in danger of dying out.

To create awareness of the native flora and fauna of Cardinia Shire, particularly the endangered species. To produce a second tourist feature which will attract visitors to Cardinia Shire.

Membership, we are funding these panels ourselves, so we will be asking everyone who participates to join FOTCE and pay the annual subscription of \$10 to start us off.

Most towns have something unique. It is what makes a town its own, it distinguishes it from another. Beaconsfield has something that is completely unique to any other town in the Cardinia Shire.

We have an Exeloo. An electronic toilet. Yes that's right a toilet that thinks for itself. Well it is not called a toilet it is actually called a Comfort Station.

At a recent Beaconsfield Progress Association meeting it was mentioned that the public toilet in Beaconsfield appeared not to be clean. At the following Progress Meeting Councillor Brett Owen tabled a document that revealed some interesting yet unusual information.

The public toilet which is located in the centre of Beaconsfield has been there for around 6 years now and is used by many people. Well in fact it is used about 40 times every day. This is a total of 1146

times for the month. The information also tells us that the average user is in there for less than 2 minutes.

For the month that I had the figures for the toilet was occupied for a total of 37 hours for the month. This means that it was occupied for just over 1 hour every day.

The data also indicated that the door opened a total of 88 times every day. This means it was opened a total of 2652 times for the month.

The toilet is self cleaning and it has its own detergent sprayer. During that particlar month there were 74 recorded sprays for the month. This means that on average it cleans twice per day.

So to conclude, it is comforting to know that when our public toilet comes under scutiny the numbers really tell the story.




