

Shire-wide Fire Inspection Program To Begin

Cardinia Shire Council's property inspection program for the fire season starts Wednesday 3 November and land owners are reminded to keep their properties tidy.

Vacant lots and unimproved land from last fire season will be checked.

These properties and bushfire-prone areas are high on the inspection list for Council's Fire Prevention Officers.

Council's Fire Prevention Officer Glynn Owen said if a property was seen to be a fire risk, a fire prevention notice would be issued to the owner. "Property owners will be given up to 21 days to undertake works specified in the fire prevention notice.

"Those who do not comply will be fined and Council will arrange for contractors to complete the necessary works and invoice the owner," Mr Owen said.

Justices of the Peace in Cardinia

Justices of the Peace are said to have their origin in an edict of King Richard 1 (Richard the Lionheart) in 1195. This edict provided for the appointment by the King of Custodes Pacis (custodians of the peace). Among their functions, they were to apprehend offenders and bring them before traditional courts presided over by the sheriff. This was apparently necessary because of widespread violence at the time.

By a series of statutes in the 14th century, they had their power extended, and the name "Justice of the Peace" bestowed upon them. They could attend at sessions, which came to be held four times a year, called "quarter sessions" and hear and determine all offences, except treason, without a jury. Thus they had power to apprehend offenders, determine whether they were guilty or innocent, and inflict penalty.

The commission of Justice of the Peace had, indeed, wholly exceptional powers at this time. The ordinance of 1380 (Richard II) gave Justices of the Peace the jurisdiction of the Statutes of Winchester, Northampton and Westminster for conservation of the peace, power to bind any person to keep the peace, power to search out by inquest, hear and determine a list of offences typical of the


day; robbery, maiming, homicide, the bearing of livery for the purpose of maintenance of conspiracy, breaches of the statue of labourers, in short to exercise in their quarterly sessions far greater power than the sheriffs held within the last century and a half, and virtually to replace the criminal jurisdiction of the trial and gaol delivery. After the peasants' revolt, the Commons asked and obtained that the justices might hold sessions upon emergency when where they thought fit, and in 1392 they were given the extraordinary power of raising the counties against those who invaded their neighbours with bands of men-at-arms and



archers, and the sheriffs were to place themselves under their orders.

Thus, justices controlled the Common Law in two ways by exercising constabulary duties and by hearing and determining cases. They were also responsible for keeping the peace, and putting down insurrections. They had considerable administrative power, which increased over the course of the next few centuries.

Justices of the Peace in Cardinia

In 1788 the system was imported to Australia and Governors were given powers to appoint Justices of the Peace and Police Magistrates. As in England, justices exercised considerable local power and, in a rapidly expanding made community. the the task of central government much easier. In the nineteenth century in Australia, Justices of the Peace, even when acting as Magistrates, were not expected to be legally qualified. But the growth of more detailed and technical legislation in the twentieth century made it ultimately essential for Stipendiary Magistrates to be so.

Justices of the Peace have been operating in Victoria since 1836, when there were 3 appointees who originally appointed. With were the growth of population accelerating after discovery of gold, by 1851/2 there were over 10,000 Victorians inhabitants. As a consequence, there was an increase in the number of Justices of the Peace.

as it became necessary to man the courts, as Justices of the Peace were the Magistrates under the legal situation in force in those times.

The Victorian Association of Justices was formed on 27 April 1910. For most of the first half of the Victorian association, the Lord Mayor of Melbourne held the office of President. Heads of all municipalities became Justices of the Peace upon their election. Most continued to hold the office after their term of office. In1961, Royal ascent was given and the association became known as the "Royal Victorian Association of Honorary Justices". The Victorian Governor has for many years been the Chief Patron. This year marks the centenary celebration of the RVAHJ and civic receptions across the state have been held honouring the service of Justices of the Peace and Bail Justices to the Victorian Community.

The Shire of Cardinia has a number of Justices of the Peace who provide a voluntary service to the community by witnessing declarations. statutory affidavits and other documents. These JPs are all community minded people who are considered by their peers as honorable men and woman society. A signing centre is provided by JPs at the Pakenham Police Station where members of the community can attend to have documents signed.

GLENN RECEIVES THE YMCA COMMUNITY FATHER OF THE YEAR AWARD


The YMCA Community Father of the Year Award recognises community dad who is doing his best to be a great dad.

Who is for real?

Niki Savva has spent the last 30 years as both a political journalist and a press secretary. She has just written a book describing her life as a political reporter (So Greek, Confessions Of A Conservative Leftie).

In February 1980 she was working for the Sun and with a bunch of other reporters was travelling with Andrew Peacock on a VIP aircraft as he made a visit to Pakistan. The press were granted an interview with the president of Pakistan, General Zia-ul-Haq. The general was seeking to paint the darkest picture of the danger to Pakistan if countries like Australia did not help support Pakistan in their endeavours to deal with the Soviet menace in Afghanistan. Such was his description of the threat that one of the Australian iournalists said: 'in the face of such a dreadful situation perhaps Australia should reconsider forthcoming cricket tour'.

The General hesitated a moment and said; 'I think I have been exaggerating the situation'. Everybody burst out laughing (p86). The General was a politician. when he wanted one thing he painted the facts one way and when he wanted another thing he painted the facts another way.

That is what politicians do: it's their job. And our job is keep looking for the facts. We all want the best possible society both for ourselves and our children

This is not a job we can leave to the politicians alone, they have their role to play and we have ours. In an open democracy like ours we can all play a part and have a say. The bottom of the political heap may be local Progress Associations and their like but I would not want to live in a community that did not have such. Your views are significant, express them.

SNIPPETS FROM THE ACCOUNTANT'S DESK

by GRAEME J. TAYLOR, F.C.A.

Whilst the Federal Election period deferred some decision making and legislation, there have been recent changes all taxpayers should be aware of including the following:

- Legislation has been passed in Parliament for paid Parental Leave. From 1st January 2011 working parents will be eligible for 18 weeks of paid parental leave at the current gross rate of \$570 per week.
- The Tax Office has extended for 12 months to 30/06/2011 general interest-free payment arrangements and deferral of activity statement payment due dates for certain eligible small businesses.
- -The Tax Office administers a garnishee project in respect of outstanding social security, student assistance and family assistance debts of former Centrelink recipients if no repayment arrangements are in place. These debts can be recovered through the tax system.

- The Tax Office has released three new work related expense publications for claims by employees working as Engineers, Mechanics and Teachers.
- The Government proposes to extend the Education Tax Refund so that the cost of School Uniforms will be eligible provided approved by the School. This will not apply unless the expenditure is incurred after 1st July 2011 and the recipient is eligible for Family Tax Part A.
- The Government has announced that the 50% reduction in minimum draw downs for account-based, allocated and market linked pensions will apply again in 2010/11 year.

There is a lot of information available from websites eg. Australian Taxation Office and Centrelink or alternatively talk to your Accountant to ensure that you are receiving your correct entitlements.

PINK HILL UPDATE AND OTHER NEWS

The update on the Pink Hill development proposal is that only around 20 objectors have applied to appear in person at the VCAThearinginNovember, of which I am one. A recent email to me from local resident Natalie has shed light on the reason why:

"I originally objected to this development but after I received a letter with Ratio Consultants as the front page, attached to a VCAT form, I was rather alarmed and decided not to take the matter further because it had appeared to be suggesting that if I were to attend VCAT it was

going to cost me a huge amount of money. I have now found that this is not the case so I feel rather naïve and jibbed of being able to follow through with this. The letter in my opinion was intentionally misleading which I now believe is the fault of the developer. It is very upsetting and unfair that I am now no longer allowed to attend VCAT due to misunderstanding. I wonder how many other Beaconsfield residents originally objected to the proposed Pink Hill hotel development but were deceivingly scared off!!!"

I am genuinely concerned that others like her may been deterred have from appearing at VCAT thinking there may be a cost involved. Community representatives of the local action group have the council contacted to ask for the names objectors who of all were contacted by the developer, so we can assist them to appear at VCAT, but council has refused. However, there is still time for objectors to request permission to appear at VCAT. My office staff can provide assistance with the completion of forms.

People tell me that this Pink Hill proposal is not what the people of Beaconsfield want given that this site that is so close to residential homes, child care, kindergarten, junior sporting facilities and our neighbourhood centre, and that is the view I will be representing at the VCAT hearing.

In other local community news, it was terrific to see around 200 people turn up for the Sue Dengate roadshow on food additives and food intolerance. I was thrilled to welcome her to Beaconsfield on behalf the neighbourhood centre and everyone was fascinated and learnt so much from her insightful presentation. To those who were not able to attend, I recommend you visit her website at www.fedup. com.au for an overview of some of the relevant information she presented.

On the road front, exciting news is that the \$5.23 million upgrade of Beaconsfield-Emerald Rd is nearing completion and drivers will notice, not only the new guide posts, safety barriers and line-marking, but the skid resistant surface which will make the road far safer.

Signalisation works on the intersection of the Old Princes Hwy and Princes Hwy near the the community complex are also underway and expected to be completed by the end of the year, weather permitting. This \$1.7 million project will also include the installation of double right turn lanes and a pedestrian crossing.



WHITESIDE ROAD

An unsealed stretch of road that runs due north one mile from its point of entry from Princes highway, just east of Pink Hill. It terminates at the Transmission Power Lines. The northern section of the road passes through bushland and was opened up as late as 1980 following the 1979 bushfires. With the alignment of Brunt Road, south of the Princes Highway, a clearly defined boundary line is given between the townships of Beaconsfield and Officer.

The road takes its name after the family of William Sherlock Whiteside, a Presbyterian Minister who, with his wife Sarah and two children, Thomas Clair and Mary Ione came to the district in 1909. Their son Clair, was 15 years old and daughter Mary 13 years old. They had come from

Leongatha, South Gippsland where five happy years were spent getting to know and appreciate the Australian way of life and its people.

Rev. William and Sarah McCullagh were of Ulster-Scot descent. They met in County Derryvalley, Monaghan, Ireland where William had taken up his first charge as minister graduating Queen's University Belfast in 1880. William suffered indifferent health. He had a lung condition that was to plague him throughout life. After marrying the couple decided to leave their native land for the warm and drier climate of California, USA. Sarah's married brother and family had settled there. References from Ireland had secured work for William in the Presbyterian Church in the USA. They set out



in May 1893 and spent nine years in California in three different parishes and regions of the state. Firstly in lone, a central town in the Jackson Valley, then Fort Bragg on the coast and finally the agricultural and oil producing town of Santa Maria. Their son Clair had been born in lone, and two years later, Mary in Fort The two children Bragg. were to experience a good deal of stimulating travel

during their young lives.

In May 1902, the family left America, from New York, for Ireland, to stay with relatives before setting out for their final destination, Victoria Three months Australia. were spent in Stellenbosch, South Africa en route, and they arrived in Melbourne in July 1903. William's eldest sister Jane and her husband. an employee Nobelius Nursery. Emerald, were living in the Dandenong Hills, and Sarah's youngest brother Thomas and his family were in Mentone, a South Eastern Suburb of Melbourne. Cousins met for the first time and brothers and sisters were overjoyed to reunite.

In January 1904, the Rev. William accepted a call from the congregation of the Leongatha Church. He was the second ordained minister to be appointed to the charge. Continued page 22

Set in the western foothills of the Strzelecki Ranges, SouthGippsland,Leongatha in the 1890's was selected by the government as a labour colony. Between the depressionyears 1893-1904 over 6,000 unemployed men passed through this colony. They helped clear the forests of blue gum and messmate, opening up the land and the dairying industry began to flourish.

Part of the pastoral duties William took on at this time was to go out to the people in the hills. His journeys were made on horseback and he sometimes returned home wet and cold. It was after one such day that he collapsed, seriously ill. The congregation generously allowed him a six months rest period, and change of climate, but it was found to be insufficient to restore his health. So he felt forced to resign from the active ministry.

A representative gathering all denominations farewelled the family. As reported in the local paper, The Leongatha Star the Rev. A.E. Young (Church of England) said "If all clergymen were as closely associated as they had been. the union of the churches would not be a dream, but a reality!" And Rev E.J. Little (Methodist) spoke of the wide influence for good and how Mr Whiteside had helped raise the moral and spiritual tone of the whole community. of the churchmen spoke of the great deal of work that had been done, under the surface, and of how the church debt had been reduced by two thirds under Mr Whiteside's leadership.

Many friends had been

made and children Clair and Mary felt at home in their new country. A decision was made to purchase a 33 acre mixed farm in Beaconsfield (Officer). It was hoped that revenue from what could be produced on the farm would supplement the small stipendiary allowance for a retired minister. Early in 1909 they took possession of their new home and as time went by it became known as 'Claremont'.

On the property was a clay pit with remnants of firing kilns on the banks where tiles and bricks had been manufactured. There were five such pits operating in Officer supplying Melbourne during the housing boom of the late 1880's. The four- roomed cottage on the property, built in 1887 by Solomon Reece, Brick and Tile Manufacturer, obviously built of was such bricks. Tiles paved the south-facing verandah and lined the garden beds. (Interesting to note- eleven year old Elizabeth Reece was one of the fifteen students to enrol at the new Officer Siding State School in 1886.) Until recent times visible evidence clearly showed that access to the clay pit from the road had been along the southern boundary of the property from a point directly opposite the present day No. 49. Adjoining the boundary line, to the south, was a small dairy farm. Its owners also lived in a brick cottagevery quaint. Unfortunately it was demolished after condemned.

On coming to the property young Clair, of necessity, immediately set to work forgoing any thoughts of further schooling. He ploughed, sewed crops, and reaped as they ripened. Farm animals were bought and reared and sent to market. Wattle bark was stripped and railed and sent to Melbourne. snippet of news from a local newspaper" The Berwick County Times" described this saying- "There are not many in the district who have not a soft spot in their hearts for Clair. His bright spirit secures him a friend in each person with whom he comes in contact. And little glimpses that are occasionally obtained of his doings in his new home, more than justify the high opinion formed of him in our midst"

The following year five acres were planted under orchard using a variety of applesmainly Jonathan, and gradually the acreage was increased until eventually orcharding became the main source of income.

Twelve months after coming to the district William's health had improved sufficiently for him to accept a request to take services at the nearby Berwick Presbyterian Church, at that point a mission station. For four years he ministered to the congregation, driving regularly by horse and jinker the three miles into Berwick and beyond to Harkaway and elsewhere.

Completed in 1885, the building of the fine gothicstyle brick church, still standing today, now Uniting Church, left the congregation with crippling burden of debt. There was a long period when the congregation was without a resident fulltime minister. That was to change in January 1915, with the induction of Rev. William Whiteside. The mission station became a full sustentation charge.

St Andrew's Centenary History. 1857-1957 (Pakenham Gazette) "Two notable things happened during Mr Whiteside's ministry which together with the leadership and guidance of the minister seemed to mark the turning of the tide in the fortunes of the Berwick Congregation.

In 1914 the Hon. James Buchanan bequeathed his residence, "Burr Hill" with a glebe of seven acres to the church for a Manse.

In April1915 elders were appointed for the first time... Ordained and Inducted by Rev W. S. Whiteside. This must have been a joyful occasion for Minister and people alike, and one is left wondering why nothing had been done in earlier years to establish sessional government the congregation."

The 1915 Annual Report by Rev. Whiteside reflects some of the grief and anxiety of the congregation of the time: - "The past year will go down in history as the year of the great war, and of the patriotic and philanthropic gifts on behalf of the sufferers in the war. It has been a year of anxiety for all and sorrow for many. Our people have given loyally and have worked



energetically for the starving Belgians and for our soldiers... Many of our young men have gone to fight for King and country."

William was not to know that the war would go on for another three years. Two months before giving this report he had said farewell to his own son, who subsequently became one of the 3146 Australians wounded at Fromelles, in France, 19 July 1916.

Communications at the time were such that it took up to three months to receive a letter. Detailed news was long in coming. Sadly William's health suffered and he went into decline. He died on 6th December 1916, aged 56 years.

Clair returned home from the war after three and a half years serving as an Infantryman with the 59th battalion 1st AIF. Twice wounded his physical wounds had healed and he was ready to get on with his life as a civilian, and to care for his mother, now widowed. His sister Mary had married and was settling down with her ex-fighter pilot, George Mitchell. There was much to be done. Sarah and Mary had coped as best they could to keep the farm functioning, but there was order to be restored productive the now year old orchard. ten

The catchment dam in the gully, begun before the war, needed to be completed. plans There were further extend the orchard. A telephone line was connected up to Claremont, from the highway, using bush poles to bring the two wires up the road. Strong winds would bring down branches causing the wires to cross circuit and it was necessary to go out with a long handled

implement to fix the problem. Beaconsfield '10' would then be online again.

On the other side of the road, opposite Claremont, a neighbour, Harold Garth was growing flowers for the Melbourne Market. Daffodils and Iceland Poppies were a colourful sight and on his western boundary on the hill, brown and yellow Boronia flourished.

Below his property to the south, were a couple of cottages, small timber rented properties owned by James Legon. He owned further blocks between these and the highway, all of which at an executor's sale (early1940) were purchased by Clair. A percentage of the land was put under orchard though most of the plantings had missed the better markets and did not survive.

Over the years many hundreds of packed cases of fruit were sent from 'Claremont' by horse-drawn lorry down the road to the Beaconsfield and Officer railheads destined for both local and overseas markets. In latter years motorized vehicles carted directly to Melbourne. Electricity was brought up the road in 1950 when a cool store was built, and a new era began at Claremont and for the neighbours alike.



Clair married in 1923four years after returning The wedding from war. date, 19th July was the seventh anniversary of the Battle of Fromelles, a date never forgotten. His bride, Kathleen, was the fourth child and second daughter of Rev, W. R. Cunningham who was then the resident minister at the Berwick Church. Presbyterian Clair and Kath had six children- Bill, Betty, Ken, Kathleen, David and Mary.

Clair took an active and leading role in community life. He was Chairman and President of the Officer State School Committee for twenty years, a lifelong supporter and Trustee of the Officer Union Church and a Member of the Berwick Presbyterian Church. He played tennis, cricket and Football over the years and

later took a leading role in the development of their clubs. He was a President of the Sportsground Committee and of the Officer Scouts Group. He was a President and founding member of the Officer fire brigade, a senior Vice-President of the Berwick Bush Nursing Hospital, a President and Founding Member of the Berwick RSL. A Chairman and Vice President and Executive of the Gippsland Fruit Marketing Association Victorian State and Apple and Pear Board.

In 1940 he was elected a Beaconsfield Riding member of the former Berwick Shire Council. He served eleven years, being President in 1945-6 and he was appointed a Justice of the Peace. In 1959 after a long illness, Thomas Clair Whiteside died at the age of 66 years.

Hard Act to Swallow



Recently we had a cat 'Arthur' brought into us after he had been lethargic for the past 24 hours, off food and vomiting overnight. When the owner's brought Arthur in they mentioned that he had a history of eating unusual items and even chews on the kids' toys. This can become a serious and potentially life-threatening problem if the objects are swallowed.

After doing an initial exam it was suggested to the owner that we would need to take x-rays, so Arthur was taken into the hospital where x-rays were performed. The x-rays were examined and revealed an unusual pattern to the stomach and gas build up. It was suggested that there could be a foreign body lodged in the stomach.

When objects are too large to pass, they usually obstruct at the stomach outflow or within the small intestine itself as these are the narrowest sections of the bowel. The best course of action for Arthur was to perform an exploratory laparotomy (surgically opening the abdomen).

Once in surgery the veterinarian removed several large pieces of rubber from the stomach and one from the small intestine causing the blockage. Arthur was given a course of antibiotics and anti inflammatory's and was kept in hospital for 2 days for observation.



It can be amazing what animals can swallow. In this case some of the pieces of rubber that were removed Arthur's stomach were up to 4cm long. There have been many cases of animals swallowing socks, toys, rocks, shoe laces, and even a whole tea towel. So next time you see your beloved animal chewing on something they shouldn't, take it away, otherwise you may end up in the same situation as Arthur and his family.

It's now been a month since Arthur's surgery and he is going well. The owner keeping a close eye on him to make sure this doesn't happen again.










BEACONSFIELD SPEED LIMIT

A number of constituents have recently raised with me the current speed limit along the Princes Highway at Beaconsfield.

As the commercial district has grown so too have the number of pedestrians. cars and

I note the frustration of many local residents. the BPA and others that Vic Roads and the State Government have refused to act on this issue; this despite the 50 km/h speed limit that applies in the retail hearts of Berwick and Pakenham.

Recently in Parliament I had the opportunity to ask the Minister for Roads to act on this issue and that: together with VicRoads. he examine the current speed limit arrangements with a view to considering reducing the speed limit reflect the to traffic increased and pedestrian movements.

Together with those who have contacted me. I urge the Government to move quickly on this issue.



TALKING WEATHER

The last 2 months has continued the current trend for the year with another 208mm of rain falling. This now takes the total to 673mm for the year. This is 128mm more than last year. And is the highest total to the end of September since 1996 when we had 676mm. That vear we ended up 771mm for the year.

August was very wet with rain falling on 21 days. The monthly total was 139mm. This was the highset August total I have on my records which date back to 1985.


September was a little bit drier with only 69mm of rain. The rain fell over 17 days. This is below the September average which is 75mm.

With all this rainfall has made the grounds extremely wet at the moment. This is also a very good thing as most of the runoff is going into our catchments. Melbourne's water storage is currently at 47.7% capacity which is the highest it has been since June 2006.




