In the last two months the Association has continued to address significant matters that have an effect on our Beaconsfield Community.

The draft Beaconsfield Structure Plan has been The plan released. prepared by Cardinia Shire Council has been supported by an Issues and Opportunities Paper and public meetings. Council staff have been available to obtain feedback from the community on any relevant matters including commercial and housing development, roads, traffic, parking, infrastructure, environment, heritage, etc. Our Committee has prepared a submission and we await a revised draft of the Structure Plan.

I note that work has commenced on the extra car park spaces at the Beaconsfield Railway Station. The extra car spaces are desperately needed and will double the existing spaces and should be ready in July.

At our May meeting our guest speaker was Cr. Ed Chatwin, Mayor of Cardinia Shire Council. He informed us on the Council's draft budget for 2012/2013 year. The total revenue is \$110 million with an underlying result of \$4million loss. Capital Works are over \$35 million. If the budget is accepted the average rate increase is 6.4% which includes 0.5% for the effect of Carbon Tax. Cr. Ed Chatwin gave an interesting insight into the Budget compilation and he answered questions from those present.

Memorial Anzac The Service at Beaconsfield Cenotaph organized by the Association was held on Sunday 22nd April. Thanks to all involved in making the day successful and for those who attended. An enjoyable afternoon tea at the Woods Street Kindergarten gave people opportunity to talk with current and former residents who served in the forces or have historical links with Beaconsfield.

The Beaconsfield Structure Plan Issues and Opportunities paper was recently placed on public exhibition. Broad community consultation was undertaken by council. including two community information sessions held at the Beaconsfield Community Complex. The information sessions gave community members the opportunity to ask questions about the process of developing the Structure Plan and contribute their ideas for the future of Beaconsfield. Together with written responses received during the exhibition period, all the information gathered during this time will contribute to the further development of the draft Beaconsfield Structure Council will then Plan again seek views of the Beaconsfield community in order to finalise the plan.

The improvement works

at the Village Green Park in Stirling Circuit within Panorama are now complete. The improvements new footpaths in exposed aggregate, 70 new trees planted including species of Ornamental Red Maples, Pin Oaks, Liquidambars and Norfolk Island Pines. Re-mulching of garden beds, installation of three new benches, a rubbish bin and new lighting under the palm tree has also been included. The \$110,000 improvement package has rejuvenated this park.

Holm Park Recreation Reserve continues to take shape. Works on the netball courts and floodlighting for Oval 2 has commenced and are expected to be completed by July.

slab is nearing completion. Structural steelwork and the concrete wall panels ordered. Completion of the pavilion remains scheduled for the end of November 2012. Council continues to work with the developer of the future subdivision at O'Neil

Road and Old Princes progress Highway, to the construction of the footpath along the Old Princes Highway between O'Neil Road and the Traffic Intersection Controlled at Princes Highway/ Old Princes Highway. works have been tendered and the anticipated start date is the end of June, subject to Vic Roads approval of the plans.

It is pleasing to see the commencement of the construction works for the car park extension at the Beaconsfield Railway Station car park. The additional 157 spaces are being funded by the state government. Council had advocated strongly to the state government for these much needed works. The improvement works also include the installation of **CCTV** within the entire car park.

The Chief later met with the broader membership who were invited to meet and talk directly with the Chief. This was well received by the Chief who was able to respond to an informal open forum type session that discussed many topics.

The Chief thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to see first hand the issues associated with growth in the Beaconsfield community. The Chief appreciated the efforts of all the Beaconsfield members in putting together

the day's activities and congratulates the members of the Beaconsfield brigade for the professional service provided to the Beaconsfield and Victorian communities.

Regularly check risk areas, download a home fire saftey checklist from the CFA website.

- •Make sure you have a working smoke alarm.
- •Keep a fire blanket and extinguisher in the kitchen.
- •Teach children to be careful around fire.
- •Prepare and practise a home fire escape plan.
- •Know how to get out of your house if there is a fire.
- •Only working smoke alarms save lives.
- •You're 60% less likely to survive a house fire without a working smoke alarm.
- •You can't smell smoke when you're asleep (we lose our sense of smell when we go to sleep). A smoke alarm is the only thing that will alert you if there is smoke from a fire.

157 New Car Parking Spaces

The number of car parks at Beaconsfield Railway Station will soon be doubled, with construction beginning on 157 new car parking spaces.

The new car parks will bring the total number of parking spaces at Beaconsfield Railway Station to 285.

Building more car parking spaces at Beaconsfield Railway Station was a key election commitment and I am pleased the Coalition Government has been able to deliver well beyond the 100 car parking spaces that were promised.

Beaconsfield Railway Station will also get improved lighting, increased CCTV coverage and landscaping works as part of the upgrade.

former Labor The Government failed provide the basic infrastructure required for the south-eastern growth corridor. The Coalition is rectifying this with the addition of 157 car parks at Beaconsfield as well as 106 new spaces at Pakenham Railway Station, 138 new spaces at Narre Warren Railway Station, and 450 new spaces at the recently completed Cardinia Road Railway Station - a total of 851 new car parking spaces between Narre Warren and Pakenham.

The car park extension at Beaconsfield Railway Station is due to be completed before the end of the year.

Beaconsfield residents may also be interested



in the progress of two other State Government commitments near them.

The 2012-13 State Budget saw \$6.27 million delivered for the construction of a new 24-hour police station in Emerald – a station that the community has campaigned for since 2003. This will ensure full police coverage of the hills and relieve pressure off existing stations.

The budget also included \$2 million to plan the new Officer Secondary College, which will be co-located with the Officer Specialist School.





Readers Dear I hope you're all managing well and keeping warm as we head into winter. Since the last edition the Federal Government has made some important announcements will help which Beaconsfield residents.

Support For Pensioners And **Families**

Pensioners living in Beaconsfield are set to get extra support to help them make ends meet. The Government \$250 providing a cash payment for single pensioners and a \$380 cash payment for couples.

This means that from the end of May almost 17,000 pensioners across the La Trobe electorate are eligible to receive these payments and will be paid over the following weeks.

Local pensioners will get another boost next year, with an ongoing increase to their fortnightly payments from March. In total, local pensioners will get about \$338 extra a year for singles and \$510 extra a year for couples combined.

The Federal Government is also tripling the tax free threshold to \$18,000. This will make an important difference for many local residents and families. It will mean that some residents, such as part time workers and those on lower incomes, will be taken out of the tax system altogether. around 47,000 residents, it will mean a tax cut of up to at least \$300.

We are also providing extra support to families who are eligible for family tax benefit payments. This will assist over 12,000 families in our area.

These changes are part of a package of measures that the Federal Government has put in place to help Australians with the costs of living.

Schoolkids Bonus

I know that for many local families with children at school, it can be difficult to keep up with costs. With uniforms, text books and school excursions to pay for, the costs can pile up pretty quickly.





VACCINATIONS AND YOUR PET

by Beaconsfield Veterinary Centre

Vaccinations are essential step towards a healthy immune system for your pet. Puppies and kittens have immunity from natural their mother's milk but this immunity wears off over time. They need vaccinations to support the immune system and prevent illness. disease and

coughing, fever, muscle tremors, seizures and eventually paralysis.

Hepatitis: Like distemper, hepatitis is highly contagious. The virus affects the liver and kidneys. Symptoms can include fever, a painful abdomen and signs of liver disease such as jaundice and vomiting

Canine cough (Kennel cough): Is one of the more common diseases and is highlyinfectious. Dogsdon't necessarily need to be in kennels to contract canine cough. Canine cough is spread through the air by infected dogs sneezing or coughing. Symptoms include a dry hacking cough, and in the worst case if left untreated, can develop into pneumonia.

What can I protect my pet against?

DOGS

Distemper: A highly contagious viral disease that can affect dogs at any age. Symptoms can but can include

CATS

Feline Enteritis: A highly contagious viral disease. Onset of this disease is very rapid and can often be fatal. Symptoms include high temperature, loss of appetite, depression, vomiting and diarrhoea

Cat Flu: Cat flu is caused by feline herpes virus or feline calicivirus and is commonly termed 'cat flu'. It can cause longterm problems, including chronic sneezing, nasal discharge, inflamed eyes and severe gum problems

Feline Chlamydia: This is a bacteria thatpredominantly causes conjunctivitis. Mild upper respiratory symptoms such as a low grade fever; nasal discharge and sneezing may also develop.

RABBITS

Calici virus: A common but untreatable disease. Calici virus causes a disease that damages the rabbit's internal organs such as the liver and gut. It can also cause hemorrhaging or bleeding

When should my pet be vaccinated?

We recommend following vaccination schedule for your puppy or kitten

- 1st vaccination at 6-8 weeks
- 2nd vaccination at 12-14 weeks
- 3rd vaccination at 16-18 weeks

Adult dogs and cats require an annual booster.

If your adult pet is not up to date with vaccinations they will require one vaccination followed by a booster in four weeks. Rabbits under 12 weeks require a course 2 injections a month apart. Adult rabbits require annual booster.

When your pet comes in for a vaccination, they will receive a full physical check up. This is also a good time to speak to your vet about any general health or behavioural concerns you may have.

It is important to remember that no vaccine is 100% effective in preventing disease. If your pet does unfortunately contract one of these diseases. side effects severity of the disease are likely to be reduced.



SNIPPETS FROM THE ACCOUNTANT'S DESK

PRIVATE HEALTH INSURANCE

The income tax benefits of having private health insurance will be reducing from 1 July 2012 for higher income earners. In addition the amount charged for Medicare Levy Surcharge will be income tested against three new income tier levels at rates varying from the current rate of 1% to 1.5%.

Up to 30 June 2012 all taxpayers could claim a tax offset of 30% of premiums paid for hospital and ancillary cover irrespective of their income. This was paid as a reduction of premiums or as a refundable tax credit. The new rules reduce the private health insurance rebate as follows:

The entitlement to the premium rebate will now be shared by the adults covered by the policy e.g. a policy covering a husband and wife will be deemed to be equally owned by each. However one person of a relationship can choose to claim the private health insurance rebate for their spouse provided they have an agreement.

For those without appropriate level of private hospital cover, the Medicare levy surcharge continues to apply to incomes tested to include fringe benefits and investment losses for level 1 income over \$168,000 for families (\$84,000 for individuals) at 1%. The rate increases to 1.25% for level 2 income and 1.5% for level 3 income.

These new measures are directed at higher income earners and rebates and premiums paid by some tax payers and will increase the Medicare Levy surcharge payable for some taxpayers.

You should discuss these changes with your Accountant. If you pay private Health insurance premiums in advance no later than 30 June 2012 then the current premium rebates of 30%, 35% and 40% should apply irrespective of your income but check with your Health Fund.

Innovation and Invention Seminar

by Heather Arnold, Local History Librarian, Casey Cardinia Library Corporation

April 30, 2012.

As part of the National Trust Heritage Festival, some of the heritage groups of the City of Casey and Cardinia Shire presented short talks on the subject of Innovation and invention, the Festival's theme. It was held at the National Trust Rooms at Pioneers Park in Berwick.

Rob Pritchard, the Vice President of the Casey Cardinia Branch of the National Trust, welcomed us all. The theme was introduced by Heather Arnold, the Casey Cardinia Local History Librarian, whose great grandfather, Horatio Weatherhead, had applied for two patents in 1890 and 1891 for his inventions. Horatio passed on his love of machines and innovating to many of his descendents who were typical of many farmers, tradesmen etc in the early days who would make or adapt or invent a machine or implement to help them in their work.

The next speaker was Graeme Legge of the Cardinia Shire who demonstrated, in a very manner, amusing child's toy made by his grandfather, over 60 years It consisted of a ago. tapered piece of wood, with notches cut along one side and a propeller on the end. The propeller turned when a pencil or a finger was rubbed along the notches and it could be made to turn either way. No doubt there is some scientific explanation but if you were a child (or even a young at

heart adult) you could well think it was magic and it was a very impressive demonstration. This is a great example of an innovative home-made toy.

Judith Dwyer spoke next on behalf of the Edrington History Research Group on Lord Casey's invention of a navigation aide. Both Lord and Lady Casey flew their own planes and Casey was trained as an engineer. Judith also showed some of the aeronautical books from the Berwick Mechanics' Institute Casey Collection.

Taylor of the Ann Beaconsfield **Progress** Committee spoke innovative about two women. Beaconsfield Janet Bowman and Ada Armytage. Janet Bowman (1811-1904) took over the running of the Gippsland Hotel after her husband died and was responsible for financing Bowman's track, which went from her hotel to the Upper Yarra gold fields. In 1988, as a bi-centenary project the Shire of Pakenham put up signs along the track to mark its location*. Ada Armytage (1858-1939) of the Como Arymtages, lived at Holm Park and started her own Scout Group, was responsible for planting the Beaconsfield Avenue of Honour (along the Princes Highway) and was a generous philanthropist.

Polly Freeman and Helen Lowery of the Cranbourne Shire Historical Society had a great display of 'homemade' tools and utensils with such items as a toasting fork made out of wire and a soap 'sudser' made out of an old tin. These items reminded us that in the days before there was a Bunnings on every corner and a car in every garage that people frequently needed to innovate or invent a tool or utensil to do a job, often using recycled material.

Finally, Heather Arnold spoke about the Lubecker Dredge, the first machine used on the long running project to drain the Koo-Wee-Rup Swamp. It was imported in 1912 by the Public Works Department Engineer, Carlo Catani. It began work in 1913 to turn the Lang Lang River from a 'wandering creek' to a functional (in historical eyes) drain. It later worked on the Main Drain and other Swamp drains. At the time the German made, articulated ladder type steam dredge considered to be was the finest in the world.

We had a small and enthusiastic attendance of twenty people including three Councillors - Cr Legge and Cr Judy Owen and Cr Bev Hastie, both from the City of Casey. They are very enthusiastic about the history of the area and it is great to have their support. I would also like to thank Rob and Chris Pritchard of the Casey Cardinia Branch of the National Trust, who stepped in to help at the last minute as the President, Ruth Crofts, was unable to make it. And a big thank you to our great presenters presentations made the morning not only interesting but educational.

* Incidentally the Bowman track project was opened by Cr Jeune Matthews who was innovative in her own way as in 1979 she was the first female Shire President of the Shire of Pakenham, and its predecessor, the Shire of Berwick. The City of Berwick's first female Shire President/Mayor was Cr Jan Bateman in 1980 and for the Shire Cranbourne it was Cr Judy Elso in 1988.

Beaconsfield Has Two Very Innovative Women, Janet Bowman And Ada Armytage

BoulevardisinBeaconsfield and close to the original Bowmans track.

Janet Bowman left her home in Scotland to come to Victoria in 1840 with her husband David and then to Beaconsfield in the early 1850's. In 1855 David took up the lease for the title to 200 acres on the Panty Gurn Gurn lease, covering what is now the township of Beaconsfield. Later in the year he was granted a licence for the "Gippsland Hotel" which was known as 'Bowman's Inn". David and Janet had 6 children and built a homestead believed to be where Villa Mar now is on O'Neil road.

Life was not easy for this lady and sadly her son drowned in Cardinia Creek whilst shepherding sheep and later her husband died in 1860. This enterprising became the woman licensee for the Hotel, a remarkable achievement for a woman of her time. Even more remarkable and innovative was her achievement of having a track cut through rugged terrain from Beaconsfield into the Yarra Valley linking to the Jordan goldfields. Her 4 sons and some other men worked on the track. It started behind the Hotel and then travelled east ward to where O'Neil Road is today and then north, the track now has the present day names of Hughenden Road. Telegraph, Split Rock Road. Downey, Bourke's Creek Road. Paternoster Road and Mt Burnett to Boyd Road, East Beenak to Basan's corner

The government wanted to encourage miners and said they would compensate the expenses of those people who had opened up the country to the goldfields. The track cost 1500pounds and Janet applied to the government for payment for the work and after 20 years, compensation was paid of 300pounds.

In the April of Victoria's bicentenary year, 1988, Pakenham Shire honoured this visionary lady with the marking of the site of Bowman's track with a plaque and 14 signs along the track. The

Shire President Cr Jeune Matthews unveiled the plaque at the corner of O'Neil Road and Old Princes Highway along with other local dignitaries and more than 150 descendants of the Bowman family who had come to a family reunion that day. Unfortunately the O'Neil Road Sign has vanished with the development and many of the other signs are in disrepair, but the track can still be followed today.

An article and photos describing this historic day appeared in the Pakenham Gazette 20th April 1988

If you read Heather Arnold's blog at http://cas eycardinialinkstoourpast. blogspot.com she tells us of the Royal Connection with Beaconsfield and the Gippsland Hotel in 1869 when the Souter family were then the licensees and Princes Albert stayed at the Hotel for 3 days.

ADA ARMYTAGE OF HOLM PARK BEACONSFIELD

Ada Armytage was the daughter of Charles and Caroline Armytage and her family owned Como House in Melbourne. After Charles died Caroline and the family continued to live at Como and she purchased Holm Park in Beaconsfield as their country residence.

After Ada's mother died in 1909, Ada moved to Holm Park and lived there until her death in 1939.

Ada was extremely community minded. She was very involved with the scout movement and held many scout camps at Holm Park. She is noted for being responsible for Dandenong Scout Hall and it is still standing today. It can be seen on the Princes Highway and is very distinctive as it looks like a castle and has the words "Armytage Own" on the front.

She invited people to hold their wedding receptions at Holm Park and was involved in many other community events such as the Berwick Show, local schools and charitable committees.


Ada is remembered most significantly for the planting of the Beaconsfield Avenue of Honour along the Princes Highway from Beaconsfield to Berwick. 123 black popular trees were planted in 1929 as a tribute to the Beaconsfield serviceman. This Beautiful Avenue of trees can still be seen today along Old

Council Committed To All Areas Of Shire In Draft Budget

Cardinia Shire Council is committed to all areas in the Shire through its 2012–13 draft budget released last month.

The draft budget provides for a total of approximately \$82.6 million to be spent on a vast range of operating services, asset upgrades, program initiatives and improvements to community facilities and infrastructure across the Shire. This is an increase of \$6.7 million or 9 per cent on the previous financial year.

With such a large and diverse municipality, Council is mindful when framing its budget to ensure the needs and expectations of all residents are taken into account, not just some. But, there are community expectations that cannot be fulfilled which are addressed in the forward strategy that forms part of the budget process.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Cr Ed Chatwin said the budget focused on an equitable distribution of Council spending across the Shire.

"Much community comment is made about a perceived disparity between the capital spending in the growth area of Pakenham, Beaconsfield and Officer, and other parts of the Shire. In fact, the majority of Council-funded capital works spending goes outside the growth area.

"Similarly, the operating budget is shirewide expenditure, such as, road and drainage maintenance, social services, buildings and facilities and many others," Cr Chatwin said.

Shirewide projects include:

 significant increase in asset renewal and upgrades around Cardinia Shire, including roads, bridges and buildings, footpaths and drainage replacement, plant and plant replacement, recreation reserves and sporting facilities (\$14.51m), highlighted by:

- bridge replacement and upgrades (\$500k) and new footpaths (\$400k)
- capital works grants of \$468k
- upgrades to buildings and facilities throughout the Shire (\$460k)
- funding of projects relating to townships strategies (\$200k).

Growth area projects include:

- funding for the last year of the flood mitigation program which totalled \$2.5m over the two years. Additional \$4m set aside for reinstatement of flood damaged assets.
- continued development of

Cardinia Road Community Centre (\$4.8m) and Heatherbrae Recreation

Reserve(\$1.52m)

- Cardinia Road
 Developer
 Contributions Plan
 (DCP) projects.
 This includes Henry
 Road and Mulcahy
 Road extension

All submissions will be heard at a special Council meeting starting at 7pm on Tuesday 12 June and considered in accordance with section 223 of the Local Government Act 1989

Group Receives Grant from Melbourne Water

The Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary have received a community grant of \$11,000 from Melbourne Water to go towards weed removal and revegetation of a small parcel of land on the western boundary of the Cardinia Creek in Berwick.

Workwillcommenceshortly removing weed species including Winter Cheery, Hawthorn, Pittosporum, Blackberries, Honeysuckle and Spear Thistle. Weeds outcompete native plants for space and resources and this in turn depletes the quality of wildlife habitat.

The Friends of Cardinia Creek Sanctuary formed in March 1998 to assist in the conservation of Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna Reserve, an area of approximately 38 hectares along the eastern boundary of Cardinia Creek just north of Beaconsfield township.

Weeds currently proliferating on the western bank of Cardinia Creek affect weed control work already completed on the eastern side by the spread of seed via water, wind and birds.

Infill planting of local indigenous plants the site is scheduled for autumn next year over several tree planting days, dates are yet to be fixed. If anyone is interested incoming along to these days or would like to be involved on a more regular basis, the Friends hold working bees on the fourth Saturday of each month and meet on the corner of Holm Park Road and Beaconsfield Emerald Road, Beaconsfield, at 9am. All most welcome.





TALKING WEATHER

by Nathan Boon

The last 2 months have seen it extremely wet. The rain has yet to ease and as we head into winter Melbourne's water storage continues to rise.

In April there was rain on 10 days; totaling 136mm. this was the highest April total since April 2001 when there was 146mm. This is also the highest total I have in my records. The April average is only 67mm. The highest daily total I had for April was recorded on Tuesday 24th when there was 48mm.

May saw very similar numbers to April. There was 133mm of rain that fell over 13 days. This was the highest monthly total since 2000 when there was 142mm. Thursday 3rd saw 42mm and this was the highest daily total for May.

The yearly total is now at 472mm. This is 126mm

less than last year. This is 180mm above the average to the same point.


With all the rain over the last 2 months the ground has now become extremely wet in our catchment areas. With all this rain Melbourne's water storage is now up to 66.5%. This is up from 55% at the same time last year. Back in June 2009 Melbourne water storage was at the 25% the lowest it ever got to.


With the rain continuing to fall at the start of June it looks like we are in for a cold wet winter.






