The BPA is a group of volunteers who work hard on many throughout projects Beaconsfield including the publication of the Banner, organising of the Anzac service each year and other history related projects. All residents of Beaconsfield are welcome to join the association. Thank you to the current committee members for all the great work you do.

Well done to Penny Harris Jennings who was awarded Cardinia Shire's Australia Day Community Service Award. Penny has worked tirelessly to research the history of Beaconsfield and has contributed to a number of successful historical project grants.

Congratulations also to Beaconsfield's Vivienne Williams who was awarded a medal of the order of Australia (OAM) for service to the welfare and protection of animals and her community.

Beaconsfield The Structure Plan's planning amendment C198 went to an independent planning panel hearing on Thursday 29th January. The panel heard submissions raised concerns regarding the site layout, safety and economic viability of the commercial area, south of the highway. The proposed amendment will give greater certainty confidence about and development future in Beaconsfield and provide the framework, conditions requirements and consideration of the future planning permits.

has received Council submissions for Road the Glismann Beaconsfield draft development plan. The plan is on council's website. Information sessions and one on one meetings with affected landowners have been held. Council will now consider submissions received.



up a few years ago, it has been harder for councillors and council to engage with business. We welcome the re-creation of a Business Group. Council's economic development team and councillors are happy to workwithinterested persons to reform the Beaconsfield Business Group.

Thank you very much to Ann Taylor for the historical walk of Beaconsfield that she trialled recently with some interested community members. Councillors wish her much success with her ongoing research and future opportunities in this project.

Council is continuing to progress the Holm Park Reserve Master plan. The works to be undertaken at the reserve this year include the construction of two additional netball courts, two cricket practice nets, improvements to the third oval surface, including fencing and drainage, a new playground and various other minor works to improve car parking and landscaping.

The entrance from Beaconsfield-Emerald Road to the Beaconsfield Business Park has been widened by council and the landowner. These works will improve safety and vehicle manoeuvrability. As per council's adopted Beaconsfield Structure Plan, council intends to work with the owners to make further improvements to traffic circulation. pedestrian movements and car park layout in the Woolworths and Aldi car park area.

am honoured and delighted to the be recipient of the Community Services Award. There are many people I would like to thank. Thank you to Cardinia Shire and the Australia Day Committee.

Thank you also to the Ranges Ward Councillors Letitia Wilmot, Brett Owen and Tania Baxter who support the importance of local history.

A special thank you to Graeme and Ann Taylor and the Beaconsfield Progress Association. Thank you to my proofreader John Grbic and also a special thank you to Gary Elliott President of the Pakenham RSL.

A huge thank you to my husband John Jennings for your encouragement, support and photography skills and thank you to my own family and wonderful friends.

My passion in genealogy and family studies began for me as a very young person. I was drawn in particular to the friendship of my grandfather Claud Harris who lived at Beaconsfield Upper and his friend Cuthbert Urwin whom he worked with at William Angliss. They enlisted together for WW1, which took them to the battlefield in France and resulted



in the death of Cuthbert. While this is the 100 year commemoration of WW1 my interest began long ago.

Beaconsfield **Progress** Association Victorian received "Restoring Government War Memorials Grant" for the Beaconsfield Avenue of Honour. New bronze plaques were made listing the individual soldiers. My task was to research the 65 soldiers for a booklet to accompany the unveiling of the new plaques located on the corner of Prince's Hwy and Beaconsfield Emerald Road. It is easy to copy someone's service record however in my opinion the true value of this project was to recognize that these 65 individuals were real men, with a real connection to the Beaconsfield Community as well as being soldiers.

I was subsequently contacted by Gary Elliott from the Pakenham RSL. This led to my researching many families for the return of lost medals. It is an honour and a privilege to have met so many local families who have shared their life stories with me.

My research has involved traveling in Australia and overseas, but regardless of where I am, I am always proud to be an Australian. Thank You.

Pretty close to the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve, all hell broke loose at the south end of Woods Street - a series of explosions that sounded like a small cannon being fired at point blank range.

It's no secret that fireworks displays, especially when conducted by unlicensed amateurs, can result in nasty, even fatal, injuries. In this instance there was also the risk of fire from the barrage of sparks falling on nearby houses and gardens, and the hazard of someone being hit by the fallout. I don't know what was in those 'bombs', but at my place it sounded like it was hailing nails.

The other risk is to domestic pets. Mine, although safe in the house, all went crazy.

Bright Sparks Cause Havoc On New Year's Eve

As I went outside to check that no fires had started in the eaves or on the dry overdue-for-a-mow lawn, yet another missile was launched. I saw where it came from - the Beaconsfield Railway car park, barely fifty metres away.

I left my panic-stricken pets locked inside and went out into the street – just in time to see a large brown dog blundering down the road. I tried to intercept him, but he was too traumatised to see me, let alone respond to my calls.

The station car park was empty apart from a Council Bylaws vehicle, although smoke and the stench of gunpowder still lingered (and it's worth noting here that fireworks pollute air and water with toxic gases and heavy metals). One of the Rangers was having a word with some lads on the opposite side of the road. The other was sitting in the

car. He, too, had spotted the terrified brown dog, but the car was already packed with canine refugees.

of the None people gathered in the street claimed to have who had caused all this pandemonium. I returned to my home, stopping en route to talk to a nice voung couple parked on the side of the road. Their dog, they said, had jumped out of their car when the fireworks began. They had retrieved him - along with another frightened four-legged escapologist.

I have nothing against New Year's celebrations. But the bright spark/s (not nearly as bright as their fireworks, apparently) who chose to have their illicit fun in a suburban station car park were in clear breach of the law. As far as I know, their actions fortunately did not injure people or start any fires. But they did cause misery to countless

numbers of local pets even those who remained safe in their homes must have been highly stressed -not to mention anxiety and perhaps even heartbreak for people whose animals went missing that night.

We pet owners need to take some responsibility here, too. Ideally, all our pets should be inside on NYE (and during thunders torms). preferably under human supervision. Animal experts recommend that we calmly comfort them without making a fuss; making too big a deal of it will only reinforce anxiety. Punishing or reprimanding animals for responding to their survival instincts is illogical counter-productive. and is likely to exacerbate stress-related behaviours such as whining, damaging furniture and urinating.




Thunderjackets (available for both dogs and cats) can be very effective in these situations. Even just wrapping or covering the animal in a blanket calming can have a effect, as does a dose or two of herbal Rescue Remedy. For extremely anxious or hypersensitive animals, a vet-prescribed sedative be may the humane option.

SNIPPETS FROM THE ACCOUNTANT'S DESK

Self Managed Superannuation Funds

The Australian Taxation Office recently released the latest statistics for Self - Managed Superannuation Funds (SMSF's). As of 30 June 2014, 1,011,686 Australians were using SMSF'S as their retirement vehicle through 534,176 separate funds. Total Assets held were \$557B accounting for 30% of all Superannuation assets. Assets held under borrowing arrangements were \$8.3B.

From 1 January 2015, Centrelink deeming rates have been extended to include account-based superannuation pensions. will apply to all new pensions from that date and existing pensions where the owner is not in receipt of a qualifying income support supplement. Account based pensions on or after 1 January 2015 may also affect people entering aged care with a new deemed earnings rate on total pension balance. From 1 July 2016, Accountants and others wishing to provide advice on setup or closure of SMSF'S will need

to be licenced to do so. The new limited Australian Financial Services Licence will enable Accountants to advise on SMSF'S and" class of product" strategic advice. An Accountant's exemption applies to that date.

There are greater regulations on SMSF'S and you should ensure your Advisors are appropriately qualified and that your fund complies.

SIGN TO HELP PLATYPUS AWARENESS



The sign, pictured above, is one of two poster boards that was installed Cardinia Creek Landcare using federal and state funding. The signs have a dual purpose including to raise awareness that the platypus are found in the Cardinia Creek. The water quality and surrounding environment are of a high quality which has been conducive to successful breeding for the species.

The other driving force for the installation of the sign was that the local community have been traumatised to find dead Platypus in Cardinia creek as a result of rubbish which has been discarded around theneighbourhoodandthen washes into the stream. As the sign correctly states, certain types of rubbish can be particularly deadly to the Platypus. 'opera house' type vabby nets are also lethal to Platypus which get caught and drown in these traps. Due to the nets ability to kill unintended by-catch such as turtles, native water rats and Platypus they have been made illegal to use in inland public waterways in Victoria. Dead Platypus have been found in these nets within Cardinia Creek.

The Platypus is a unique animal that is part of our natural heritage. If the public want to view a Platypus they can be most easily seen along calm sections of the creek in the morning or late They normally evening. remain underwater less than a minute, so with a little patience they can be relatively easily found. Several websites including the 'Australian **Platypus** Conservancy' and 'My Platypus' offer detailed information about this unique and ancient animal. These sites also have Facebook pages.

Build A New Station For The Beaconsfield CFA

As the Member for Gembrook and Shadow Minister for Emergency Services, I will lobby the Andrews Government to deliver a muchneeded new CFA station for Beaconsfield.

I encourage the Andrews Government to continue the work of the Coalition and help secure a new station for Beaconsfield.

Prior to the last election, the Coalition promised \$2.2 million for a new CFA station in Beaconsfield.

Now the Andrews Government needs to take up this important local project and ensure the local community is better protected from the threat of firesandotheremergencies.

A petition has been created urge the Andrews Government to build a new station for the Beaconsfield CFA, and I call on the community to show their support for the brigade by signing the petition that is available at my office. The Beaconsfield CFA station was built in 1944. and has constantly limited operated with space, requiring firefighters to obtain agreements with neighbouring properties to gain additional space.

With the growth that has occurred in the area, the brigade is desperate for a new home.

Beaconsfield CFA covers a known extreme bushfire risk area, so it's vital that local brigade members have a station that provides them access to the latest specialist equipment.

But it's just as important that a new station is built to boost the personal safety of the local firefighters who protect local property and lives.

The Coalition had worked with the brigade in efforts to secure land for the site of a new station and with the support of local volunteers a new site was located.

We also significantly bolstered frontline emergency services for our local area over the past four years. This included new fire trucks for Cockatoo, Yellingbo, Hoddle's Creek, Belgrave,

Officer, Warburton and Upper Beaconsfield, and station upgrades at Berwick, Hillcrest, Pakenham, Pakenham Upper and Yellingbo.

A new CFA station at Beaconsfield would be an important local service in the growing area and necessary to ensure the protection of the local community.

As Beaconsfield continues to grow, we need to ensure local residents have access to a range of vital services to allow this community to continue to thrive.





An Environmental Focus for La Trobe

Welcome back to 2015 – I hope everyone had a great break over the holiday period and got to spend some time with their friends and family. While some are making a slow return to work and others have been hard at it for a while already, there has been some great news developing in La Trobe – particularly on the environmental front.

Up to \$5 million has been approved for 291 projects across Australia from the 25th Anniversary Landcare Grants 2014-2015, million which \$2.5 directed towards projects environmental with an focus and \$2.5 million to projects with an agricultural focus. Locally what this

translates to is the Cardinia Creek Neighbourhood Restoration Project being funded through Cardinia Catchment Landcare Inc. with \$20,000.00. This will individually project assist 20 landowners along Cardinia Creek to restore and rehabilitate their natural environment. Individual management property plans will be developed Cardinia Catchment Landcare Inc. to guide weed removal and followrevegetation works.

We also have the great news of the 20 Million Trees Programme. Round one of the 20 Million Trees Programme small grants component were open towards the end of



2014, under which grants of between \$20,000 and \$100.000 were made available to individuals organisations and community groups such schools, landholders and conservation groups to establish native tree plantings in environments across Australia. These projects can occur on both publicandprivatelandwhere there will be a community and environmental benefit. Locally from round one, we have had the Habitat Restoration for Helmeted Honeyeater & Leadbeaters Possum Project approved, which has resulted in \$99,057 of funding to plant 30.387 trees over three years which has the dual effect of benefitting our local environment, conserving our local fauna.

If you or a community organisation you know of would like to get involved in local environmental conservation and preservation efforts there is still an opportunity to do so besides further rounds of both the 25th Anniversary Landcare Grants and the 20 Million Trees Programme. The soonest opportunity is the Dandenong Ranges

Environmental and Bushfire Reduction Community Grants Programme which was an election commitment of mine. I'm proud to say that applications will be opening soon. The aim of these grants is to improve the environmental health and reduce bushfire risk in our local region, and the program is specifically seeking to support projects that can show that these two aims are complementary. Thismeansthatapplications should demonstrate the improving of native vegetation and habitat for native species (through weed management) while reducing (or at least not increasing) bushfire risk. Please contact my office to learn more about the application process strongly encourage everyone to get involved if they can.

The Ramsden Family

The Ramsden family are synonymous with the introduction of paper manufacturing in Melbourne. Samuel Ramsden was very much a self-made man.

He was born in Yorkshire. England and moved to Manchester to learn the trade of stonemason. In 1843 with his wife Eliza, Samuel arrived in Melbourne, Australia. His first employment was to kerb footpaths, he later travelled to Portland for work. Samuel went into partnership with his friends, Charles and Henty Brown, as builders. Their first contract was St Peters Church. They worked in partnership for over 10 years.

Samuel next took up a partnership with David Aitken, they built flour mills in Carlton and Castlemaine. Eventually the partnership split and Samuel retained the Carlton Flour Mill. He had now profited well, both from his building business and the flour mill. Thomas Kenny had the intention of building a paper mill in Melbourne, unfortunately he died before his business could commence. This Samuel knew was an opportunity too great to miss. He was able to secure a 7 year lease from the government to build his paper manufacturing business on 2 acres on the south side of the Yarra near Princes Bridge opposite the Flinders Street Railway Station. This position on the Yarra River was to

take advantage of the water supply for power. He purchased the equipment meant for Thomas Kenny and employed the experienced men who had travelled to Melbourne for paper manufacturing.

1875 Samuel's mill products were exhibited, "Mr Ramsden's papers are all of excellent quality, and he is awarded first prize. The paper shown by him as made from native grass or sedge is of special interest. The quality is good, and the supply of raw material for the manufacture is said to be "inexhaustible". Samuel had not only purchased land in and around Melbourne but also in the Western district.

Samuel and his first wife Eliza had several children. their eldest was George. After the death of Samuel in 1877, it was George who inherited both the Carlton Flour Mill and Melbourne the Paper Mill. George and his wife Elizabeth had a growing family, sons Samuel Henry, George Jnr, Edward Maxwell and daughter Eliza Mary. It was in 1877 that George purchased Lots 55A and 55B, Beaconsfield from Andrew Keating. His father Samuel had built and recently died at "Verona", 7 Fitzroy Terrace, Cnr. Gipps Street and Clarendon Street, East Melbourne.

The home Samuel had built in 1864 was a magnificent mansion with a tower constructed of brick and stone with 20 rooms. With the grandeur of his father's home in mind, George commissioned an architect and built his own country house, Home / Holm Park.

The structure is made from locally produced bricks and slate, it is a 'large stuccoed hipped roof Italianate style house with a central parapeted tower and return cast iron verandah'. The house is situated on the hill to take advantage of the amazing view.

By 1878 George was now advertising his imported Clydesdale stallion 'Admiral', this fine horse had an excellent pedigree and had won many prizes in Glasgow. Scotland. Further enquiries regarding the horse were directed to George Ramsden. Carlton Flour Mills, Carlton Andrew Keating at the farm, Home Park, Beaconsfield. This beautiful idyllic country house and lifestyle for the Ramsdens as a family came to an end the following year. After the summer of 1878/79 only daughter Eliza Mary contracted Typhoid fever and died at Home Park on the 7th of April.

For George the grief would have been devastating, his mother Eliza had died when he was 15 years old, the following year his sister, Eliza aged 10 had died of croup and now his only daughter, Eliza had died. It would seem after then the family rarely came to Beaconsfield. In 1882 he sold the Melbourne Paper Mill to William Brookes and Archibald Curry. George continued to operate Home Park property as a horse stud with William Brunt as stud manager. 'Admiral' had won first prize at the Mornington Farmers Society Show, the mares were offered 'Good grass paddocks with large frontage to Cardinia Creek'.

On the 10th October 1883 'Home Park' was offered for sale, Messrs W R Looker and Sons were the agents handling the property, they described 'Home Park as is one of the most complete country residences we know of, and commands most beautiful scenery.' The Armytage and Ramsden families had been friends and had business dealings in the Western district of Victoria. After the death of Charles Armytage his wife Caroline Armytage purchased Home Park in 1883.

The Rates assessment of 1885 continued to call the property 'Home Park'.

George and Elizabeth now resided in Kew and had several more children and in 1882 they welcomed a baby girl Dora Isabel.

Numerous myths have been published regarding the Ramsden family. In 1980 when Holm Park was classified by the National Trust, the grandchildren George Ramsden attended and requested that incorrect information the family regarding should be quashed. The house was built not as a gentleman's residence but as a family country home for the children to enjoy all that country living provides, fishing shooting and horse activities. There was never a death of a son on the property, only daughter Mary. Eliza George Ramsden was a businessowning many man, properties and businesses but not a financier. While he took interest in shipping and his father Samuel had the barque "Eliza Mary" which sank in 1875 on its third voyage in Port Phillip

Bay, George himself was not a ship's Captain. Mt Eliza was named in 1836, Samuel Ramsden arrived in Melbourne in 1844 therefore Mt Eliza was not named in honour of his two wives called Eliza or his daughter. The only connection found is that Robert Grice owner of Ayrecourt, Berwick built house designed by Frances Gillett in 1863. The tower of the house 'Manyung' at Mt Eliza looks very similar to 'Verona' in East Melbourne and Home Park, Beaconsfield.

It would seem unlikely as reported that George would have offered Home Park to the Governor of Victoria as a country seat without payment. Lord and Lady Loch in 1884 were the first to spend time at 'Government Cottage', Mt Macedon, so the timing makes for a possible choice between the two properties as a country residence. It was during this time that George was liquidating properties to build his amazing home 'Byram' in Studley Park, Kew. In 1896 George died, leaving extensive collection

of property and chattels.

While there are now no family living in the Beaconsfield District the Ramsden family certainly left behind an amazing historical home, classified by the National Trust and now in private ownership.

Tales From The Potting Bench...Australian Native Garden Mishaps And Marvels

Ways To Make Your Garden More Relaxing

Is it time to make your garden work for you? Has the round of weeding, planting, pruning trapped you in a never ending spiral of garden tasks?

A garden should be what you want it to be, a place to relax, somewhere to watch wildlife or insects, enjoy flowers, a place to entertain or showcase rare or difficult plants, or propagate new ones. Whatever your preferences, sometimes we all need to step back and think about what we would like the garden to do.

Firstly have a look at the garden. What pleases you, what works, and what doesn't? Perhaps make a list, and compare it to what you would like to be doing in your garden.

1.Entertaining

Do you have a BBQ area with seating and shade? Is it convenient to the house? Is it inviting? There are lots of ideas in magazines on

how to jazz up an outdoor eating area. Maybe combine it with an area of pots for your delicate plants or the ones that flower best.

2. Special Interests

Do you propagate or grow from seeds or grow bonsai? Having a bench or shed space that has all your tools and pots to hand would make the job much easier. Setting aside a small area that you see every day so you can easily check on cuttings is also worth considering.

3. Wildlife Watching

Like to watch birds or insects? Set up a bird feeder outside a window, provide water and some large shrubs or trees for them to escape cats, and you can watch birds from the comfort of inside all year round. A long flowering grevillea against a window will also provide nectar for insects, and attract butterflies. A small wild undisturbed patch is

ideal for insects such as native bees, hoverflies and praying mantis, with plenty of mulch, shrubs, grasses and a few weeds.

4. Like To Read, Snooze, Listen To The Cricket? Set up a small corner with a chair, footrest and table for a retreat to read or snooze a few hours away.

5. Light The Way

Put in a few lights such as solar lights along pathways or near bins or woodpiles for convenience. A solar light near a pond looks good, and will attract insects for any frogs.

6. Make It Sustainable

There are many ways to reduce our impact on the environment. Some include making a compost heap, a storm water reuse pond, and not using chemicals. A worm farm is also a fine addition to a backyard. Read up on permaculture for an in depth discussion on the relationship between a house and garden.

7. Grow Some Edibles

Trial a few fruit trees, a small vegetable patch or a tub of strawberries or lettuce. Ponder what you enjoy eating, and plant that. Try a few herbs in pots. Cover a fence with a passionfruit vine, or a patch of raspberries. The front garden can also be used for edibles. Some native fruit trees include the macadamia. lily pilly and the finger lime.

8. Make It Easy

Have a look at what does grow well in the garden. Does it behave itself and not take over the place, not need too much watering or looking after? If you like it, plant some more. Many garden designers recommend the planting of only a few types of plants for dramatic effect.

9. Reduce The Work Load Have a think about where you spend time, and not the good time. To reduce time spent weeding try a few dense ground covers and thick mulch, or thicker shrub planting. Endless pruning? Assess the trees and perhaps replace them with something easier to manage. Do you plant annuals for colour? Try a few that self-seed such as daisies or bulbinella.

10. Engage The Senses Does your garden sooth your senses? Do you like the sound of wind rushing through grasses, or the tinkle of a wind chime, or a gently splashing fountain in a pond? If you come home late, try a patch of silver leafed plants near the door, with a lit statue or a night scented plant. Or a patch of your favourite cut flowers so you can bring the garden inside.

RABBIT CARE

Rabbits can make great pets and are becoming more popular. They are relatively low maintenance and bond happily with people to become part of the family!

Choosing rabbit а Baby rabbits can be brought home from 6 weeks of age. Make sure that your new rabbit has been well handled and is used to human contact. It is very hard to tell the sex of a rabbit under six weeks of age, so it is a good idea to come in to see the vet for a check if your new rabbit is very young.

Housing

Rabbits can be indoor or outdoor pets. If they are housed outside, the hutch should be warm and sheltered, waterproof. well ventilated and away from potential predators. Ideally the hutch should be made of an easy to clean material, and should be chew-proof. Timber is not a great material to use. The hutch needs to be tall enough that the rabbit can stand completely upright on the hind legs, and three

hops wide. The flooring of the hutch is very important. As rabbits do not have pads on their paws like dogs and cats, inappropriate flooring can damage their paws. Wire meshing on the floor is not good for rabbits. A suitable cover for wire mesh is a thick layer of straw over the top that is changed regularly.

Exercise

Your rabbit should not spend all of its life inside the hutch. This is not physically or mentally healthy. Rabbits need daily physical and mental stimulation. It is fine to bring the rabbit indoors to play. but if unsupervised they can chew on electric wires. eat poisonous household plants or damage furniture

and carpets. A n o t h e r option is to create a safe, predator-proof outdoor run area that is fully enclosed so that the rabbit cannot escape. It

should contain places for the rabbit to hide e.g. pipes and upturned boxes. It is also good for rabbits to receive a little sunlight daily.

Toilet Training

Rabbits will naturally use one area for toileting so it is very easy to toilet train them. Indoor rabbits will happily use a cat litter tray that is filled with straw or shredded paper. Undesexedrabbits, particularly males are more likely to be difficult to train, as they use urine and faeces as a way of marking their territory. Rabbits do eat their own faeces, so if you notice this do not be alarmed! This is a normal part of bunny behaviour and necessary for the rabbit to gain maximum nutrition.

Feeding

One of the biggest causes of problems in pet rabbits is



feeding a bad diet. Rabbits need a large amount of fibre to keep their digestive system working properly, and in the wild their staple diet is grass. So the majority of your pet rabbit's diet should preferably be fresh grass or grass hay. Most commercial foods are not complete, and are not well balanced for ensuring health and longevity. Your rabbit should also be fed 2 packed cups per kilogram of bodyweight per day of green leafy vegetables. Some examples include cabbages. broccoli. celery, carrot tops, brussel sprouts, spinach leaves and asian greens. Herbs such as parsley, dandelion, coriander, basil, dill and mint can also be included. Rabbits can have maximum of 1 tablespoon per day of treat type foods. Treat foods include most fruits, root vegetables and capsicum. Commercial rabbit treats tend to be loaded with sugar and are not recommended. Foods that are not good for rabbits includecereals, grains, nuts, seeds, corn, beans, peas, breads, biscuits, sweets and sugar. Any sudden changes in diet can cause diarrhoea, so introduce foods gradually. Mineral blocks and salt licks are not necessary if fed an appropriate diet. Water is best supplied in a drinking bottle that attaches to the cage. Bowls are not as good because the water is easily spilt.

Common Health Problems

Heat stress: Rabbits are particularly vulnerable to heat stress as they cannot sweat or pant to cool themselves down. Therefore on any day that is over 25 degrees, you should ensure that your rabbit is in a cool, shady place, and keep an eye on it for any signs of discomfort.

Dental problems: As rabbits teeth grow fast and continuously throughout their life it is important to make sure that the front incisor teeth do not grown too long. Overgrown teeth result in problems eating, and eventually starvation. Teeth can be easily trimmed at the vet clinic.

Myxomatosis: This a fatal disease that is widespread in the wild population. spread by insects particularly mosquitos. Unfortunately there no vaccine available in Australia, so the best way to protect your rabbit from this virus is to cover their cage with fly screen.

Calici Virus: This is another quite common and untreatable disease. Fortunately it is possible to protect your rabbit from calici virus by vaccination. Baby rabbits under 12 weeks of age will need an

initial course of 2 injections. Adult rabbits need an annual booster.

Desexing

It is a good idea to get pet rabbits desexed. Although in the past this may not have been encouraged due to potential problems with anaesthetics, modern drugs have now become available that make the procedure much safer. Benefits of desexina include: can **Prevents** unwanted pregnancies. less territorial behaviour and aggressive problems and less risk of cancer in females later in life. We recommend desexing at 5 to 6 months of age. However, rabbits start to become sexually mature from 3 months of age, so males and females should be separated from this time as a caution.

TALKING WEATHER

In 2014 we recorded a slightly above average rainfall for the year. We ended up with 829mm for the year. This was however 75mm less than 2013. December saw 78mm of rain fall in the town. It fell over 11 days which is above average. The highest daily total was 21mm which fell on the 6th. This 78mm took the yearly total to 829mm which the lowest yearly was total Beaconsfield has recorded since 2008 when there was only 609mm.

The start of the year has seen little rain. We have only had 52mm for the year so far. The highest daily total was recorded on the 13th when 23mm fell in Beaconsfield. There were 6 days where rain fell. While this may not seem much it was average

for the month of January for both the totals and the number of days of rain.




