O'Neil Road Reserve Recreational Reserve Master Plan

At the November council meeting, council adopted the O'Neil Road Recreation Reserve Master Plan.

The draft master plan was placed on public exhibition in July and council received 79 submissions. This feedback was considered and the draft Master Plan revised.

The endorsed O'Neil Recreation Reserve Master Plan will be used as strategic justification to seek council and other government funding to support the delivery of capital works recommendations highlighted in the plan.

Beaconsfield Railway Station Car Park

The lack of car parking at the Beaconsfield Railway Station continues to be an issue which affects local residents and commuters. The preferred solution is for the state government to provide additional car parking spaces on the Vic Track owned land between Station Street and the existing Beaconsfield railway station car park. This land would be able to accommodate 200 - 300 spaces. During the 2018 Victorian election, the State Government committed to providing 150 parking spaces at the station carpark during the current term of government. Council will advocate for the State Government to uphold its commitment and provide further upgrades. If the full area of land available is not proposed to be formally constructed, Council will advocate that the remaining land be opened up as a temporary gravel car park until funds are available to formally construct the car park.

Beaconsfield Community Complex goes solar

Council has installed a 37kW solar electricity system at Beaconsfield Community complex.

The system will save approximately \$7,000 per year in energy costs and reduce emissions by approximately 52 tonnes of carbon dioxide per year – equal to the emissions of 13 average cars. These savings will benefit the community centre, Beaconsfield Kindergarten and Council.

Footpaths in Beaconsfield

Council's 2018–19 footpath program extends the footpath network in and around townships. The following new footpaths were included in the council program.

- Princes Highway, Beaconsfield provides an important pedestrian link along the highway between Brunt Road and Panorama Avenue
- Kenilworth Avenue, Beaconsfield provides a path between the train station and the bus stop
- O'Neil Road, Beaconsfield completes the path to Timberside Drive.

Richmond Football Club Open Training Session at Holm Park Reserve

On Tuesday 18 December, the Richmond Football Club will visit Holm Park Recreation Reserve in Beaconsfield for a training day.

The players will train between 4pm – 5pm, following that they will lead a clinic for children.



This month the brigade celebrates the second anniversary of the opening of our new fire station.

It is a good time to reflect where the brigade came from to our new station today.

The building across the road started out as an ex-Army hut and was the functional fire station for 22 years before brigade members began to expand the station to include the building you see today. So from 1972 until 2017 that was our operational centre for responding to fire calls.

Trucks varied from Austins to International trucks to our current fleet which has a state of the art Scania pumper.

This station is still 100% volunteer staffed 24/7 and still has a healthy list of members who devote countless hours to training let alone attending call outs.

The brigade is currently averaging one call out a day which is greater than some inner city stations.

The heart of any organisation is its members and this brigade has a mixture of talented people dedicated to serving our community.

We have recently celebrated 3 members who have achieved 50 years of service and others with 35 plus years. These are amazing milestones and adds to the strength of our brigade.

1/Check your environment to minimise or eliminate combustibles from near your home

2/Ensure you heed the warnings given by the CFA or Vic Emergency the night before an extreme or code red fire danger day and act accordingly to the advice given.

3/Update all family and guests on your fire plan.

4/Please remember there may be days that ALL resources are committed to a going fire in the area and we may not be able to respond to you in a time sensitive manner should there be another fire.

5/ This summer may be hotter than usual and with that in mind on days of extreme fire weather the station will usually be staffed by brigade members so that a quicker response time is achieved.

Finally, all brigade members would like to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a safe and prosperous 2019.

Remembrance Day at Beaconsfield



100 Knitted poppies were installed in the gardens of Beaconsfield Baptist Church to remember the one hundredth anniversary of the end of World War One.



Both the Australian and New Zealand flags were flown at the Cenotaph at Woods Street and wreaths and knitted poppies were laid. Around 30 people met and paused for one minute's silence to remember the servicemen and women who served in all conflicts.

Centenary of Armistice at Officer

Thank you everyone for joining us today to commemorate the Centenary of Armistice.

I would like to begin by reading the Call to Remembrance:

"At the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month 1918 the guns fell silent on the Western Front, to bring to an end the First World War. Our nation and commonwealth has recalled that moment through our Armistice and Remembrance events down the decades, decades during which the men and women of our armed services have continued to pay the ultimate sacrifice. And so 100 years later, we stand here today to remember lives sacrificed in the service of our Country, and those traumatised and injured in conflict. May we have such a devotion to justice and freedom that the heroism of all who fought, and still fight, may continue to be remembered in a nation of service and in a world of peace."

Five years ago, members of the Officer community took the lead in ensuring that these Officer Memorial Gates were successfully relocated to this current site and restored to provide a place of remembrance and reflection for future generations. As part of that process we were grateful to receive a Grant from the Australian Government Anzac Centenary Grants Program, which culminated in the unveiling of our Anzac Centenary Plaque here at the Memorial Gates in 2015.


Our community now comes together each year for our Anzac Day Dawn Service and Remembrance Day Service, with numbers attending continually growing.

Eighteen months ago, the opportunity again arose to apply for a grant, through the Federal Government Department of Veterans' Affairs Armistice Centenary Grants Program. Our application was again successful.

We are here today to unveil a plaque to commemorate the Centenary of Armistice, which lists the names of all who served from our district in World War I, including those who made the supreme sacrifice.



We are very pleased to also launch our book "We Will Remember Them" which provides some insight into the lives of those who served, before, during and after, World War I.



We sincerely thank the Australian Government Department of Veterans' Affairs for providing the funding to make both the plaque and book possible. Allowing us to further honour and remember those from Officer and the surrounding district that proudly served their country.

A sincere thank you must also go to Penny Harris Jennings for her tireless effort in researching and sourcing the information in the book.

An immense thank you too, to Sam Aldersea who spent countless hours on layout and set up and for always being there for technical support and advice.

Without the volunteering efforts of these two people, the book would not have come to fruition.

I would also like to thank the members of the Officer & District Community Association for their dedication to the Officer community.

Thank you too, to our community and youth groups, local schools and sporting clubs for assisting and participating in our Anzac & Remembrance Day services.

Playgroup

It also familiarises the children with our Children's Room which eases the anxiety when it's time for care or 3-Year-Old Kinder.

3-Year-Old Kinder

Run by a qualified kindergarten teacher and catering specifically for the 3—4 age group. Children will enjoy interesting, creative themes across all areas of development. Positive outcomes are sought following the Early Years Learning and Development Framework. With some longer sessions and various days available, you choose the program that will work best for your child (and your schedule) with any combination of days or even just one session per week.

Occasional Care

This Early Learning Program offers quality care for children between 18 months and 5 years. Care can be permanent or casual. A wide range of activities are provided for the children by our qualified and experienced staff. Often the first time that parents leave their children, our staff are skilled with strategies for separation anxiety and helping you both with the transition. Occasional Care is also offered for After Kinder in partnership with the 4-Year-Old Beaconsfield Kindergarten which shares our Community Complex.

BNC Children's Room



We had a very cute visitor in the Children's Room in Term 4!

It has been an exciting year of growth and learning in the Children's Room. The new plants in our playground area are taking off and the children attending our various programs have thrived as well. We are enthusiastic about the many changes happening in 2019. Our proposed 2019 timetable (next page) is full of choice for parents to set up a variety of programs that best suit your child's age, readiness and schedule. Please note that sessions will run when minimum class numbers are reached.

Some places are still available and without the need to go through Central Enrolment and pay the associated fees, you can contact us directly to organise a session or two.

The State Occasional Care Funding which has subsidised our costs of providing occasional care (including our 3-year-old program) is being withdrawn at the end of December this year. However, for the first time, we are eligible to apply for the National Child Care Scheme which will enable our families to claim a subsidy for care in our Children's Room.

More details will be shared as we go through this process, but the bottom line is that even though our fees will need to be increased to cover the loss of our prior funding, families will find their out of pocket expenses to be much less. The scheme is based on a family's combined income and administered through Centrelink.

We will make the transition as painless as possible and we're thrilled that this will mean parents receive a subsidy of up to 85% on fees. We believe that most of our families will be eligible for at least a 50% subsidy and only have to pay the gap.

Look for our Term 1, 2019 program in mid-January. Bursting with activities, it will be available on our website <u>www.bncinc.org.au</u> or hard copies are free at reception if you don't receive one in your letterbox.

The Mysterious Mr Bonette

Mr Bonette was a man whose life evolved through opportunity, choices and broken relationships. He was born on 23 November 1890 and registered as George Leonard Francis Bonnett. His parents, James and Mary, lived with their extended family at the Union Hotel, Curlewis, Geelong.

From a young age George was known as Leonard David Bonnett and was residing in Curlewis until he was 18, he then went to Melbourne to study chemistry and work as a storeman.

On 21 June 1915 David enlisted for the First World War, he alleged his age was only 19 years old, his next of kin was documented as Mrs Mary Wilson-Grey from Leopold, Geelong. Mary gives her permission as his step-mother to enlist and states that David has lived with her "always" until a few months ago, this would seem untrue given that David's mother was alive and died in August 1916.


In July 1915 David married Elsie Marie Fairthorne at St James Cathedral in Melbourne. His marriage certificate documents he married as Francis Leonard George David Bonette and was now a 24 year old soldier with the AIF and gave his address as the Coffee Palace in Melbourne. It was reported in the newspaper as a society wedding with David having the title Lance-Corporal Bonette. This marriage was to be brief, ending in a very public manner.

After training at Seymour camp, David embarked from Australia on 26 August 1915. He would serve with the 21 Battalion and the postal corps. He was wounded in action on the field in France on 8 August 1918. David returned to Australia in January 1919 but in February he had to return to England to answer a charge for two offences, stealing six British Postal Orders and the receiving of the goods, knowing they had been stolen.

He pleaded not guilty to both charges. He was found guilty of the first offence and not guilty of the second. The punishment was 30 days detention and he "made good" with the payment for the British Postal Orders. David arrived back in Australia on 1 August 1919 and was discharged on 30 December 1919. Having served in both Egypt and France David was awarded three medals, the Star, Victory and British War Medal. In October 1919 David and his wife Elsie went to court due to the breakdown of their marriage. Shortly after David had left Australia to serve, Elsie had begun a relationship with another man with whom she had a baby. The detail of the case was quite ugly, Elsie described David as a "cold" man, which was in contrast to the wedding article that had featured in the newspaper. It was later found that Elsie had drawn a military pay allotment from two men when they were at war and she lived with a third man. She had made several excuses for her behaviour and was described as a "Naughty Wife". A divorce was granted on 21 July 1923.

David moved on with his life and had attached himself with Beaconsfield, purchasing Lot 1 Beaconsfield, the land on the corner of the Princes Highway and Woods Street. He collaborated with Ada Armytage of "Holm Park" and through her contacts they embarked on multiple projects to raise funds for various charities, groups and causes within the district. In 1921 David Bonette was being described as Ada's honourable secretary and stage manager. He embraced all the fundraising functions at "Holm Park" which was of great benefit to the scouts and returned soldiers in particular. David enjoyed the local community groups such as the Cardinia Creek Swimming Club. From 1922 until the death of Ada in 1939, David gave his address as "Holm Park" and his occupation on the electoral roll as a "student".

After the death of Ada, her two sisters Laura and Leila resided at "Holm Park", David's sister Eileen Jones was employed as a nurse for the elderly ladies.

Australia entered World War Two in 1939, David Bonette enlisted on 1 June 1941 giving his age as 45 when he was actually 50 years old. His next of kin was his sister and he gave himself the occupation of Manager's Confidential Secretary. The question of educational qualification was given as merit leaving, so it is unknown why he would be listed as a student between the wars. David served as a dental clerk with the dental division, serving only in Australia. He was discharged medically unfit with hypertension on 7 January 1944.

In 1945 an offer from the then Shire of Berwick was made to David to purchase his block of land to extend the area of land for the Beaconsfield War Memorial.

In 1949 David went north to Boulia, Queensland and was employed at the Chatsworth Station as the bookkeeper. This was a short stay as he soon returned to Victoria.

On 19 December 1951, Berwick Shire councillors unanimously agreed the park surrounding the memorial should be known as "Bonette Park" in recognition of the outstanding contribution to the Beaconsfield community from David Bonette. On 24 March 1954 the Beaconsfield Progress Association and the shire engineer met to discuss improvements to this area. It was agreed to move the memorial to the centre of the park and complete beautification works. It was only a matter of weeks when a newspaper article expressed the sadness of the passing of Mr L D Bonette with whom the little park around the memorial was named. In his last months, David was to reside at the Mount Royal Hospital Parkville, a hospital for veterans and the aged. He had suffered ill health for a number of years and finally died of heart failure on 5 April 1954.

It is difficult to know why David changed his name and age on occasion but what is definite is he lived an interesting and colourful life, he believed in loyalty and duty, whether serving his employer or his country.




