Ranges Ward Councillors' Report

Old Princes Highway - Signalisation and Intersection upgrades

Council has been advocating for other government financial assistance to bring forward the major improvements at the intersections along Old Princes Highway at O'Neil Road and Beaconsfield Avenue/Glismann Road. It was pleasing to get a committed financial allocation from the federal government of \$17.8m for 8 intersection upgrades along the Princes Highway between Beaconsfield and Pakenham. The above mentioned intersections are included in the roads package.

Council is waiting to receive the funding agreement from the federal government which will set out timelines of commencement and ending dates. Once Council has this agreement, the Tender documents will commence. Council has design details for all intersections and is in a place to commence the process as soon as details have been received from the Federal Minister.

In the meantime, council met with Vic Roads in February to get a commitment from them to make safety improvements to the O'Neil intersection in the interim until the intersection is fully upgraded.

I would like to thank the Beaconsfield Progress Association on their advocacy over many years for these much needed upgrades.

Interpreting Bowman's Track

Council has worked with the Beaconsfield Progress Association to redesign and install a new and improved Bowman's Track interpretation sign which has been installed at the start of Janet Bowman Boulevard, Beaconsfield and also at the end of Bowman's Track which is located at the junction of

Beenak East and Beenak Road on the border of Cardinia Shire and Yarra Ranges.

The next stage of the project is near completion which is the design and installation of 23 new wayfinding signs to be located on key road sides along the 60km route.

Cardinia Creek weed reduction works

Council has been working with the community on a long-term project for weed reduction along Cardinia Creek and various parcels of land in the Beaconsfield, Guys Hill and Upper Beaconsfield areas, and as far north as the Cardinia Reservoir Park.

Funded by the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning the works involve a highly collaborative effort to tackle high threat weeds across land owned and managed by a variety of different agencies including Cardinia Shire Council, Melbourne Water, Parks Victoria, the Cardinia Environment Coalition and VicRoads.

Thank you to all of the community members involved in keeping our beautiful area weed-free! If you'd like to learn more about the project, please give council a call.

Council has received a proposed method of rectification from the contractor, which council is reviewing. Works are expected to commence mid-March and at the contractor's cost.



Coaching



The brigade sent two strike teams to Grantville. Strike teams are a rapid deployment group of fire trucks who rendezvous near the fire ready to be deployed on arrival at major bush and grass fires.

On the local front the brigade continues to attend car accidents at Beaconsfield Avenue and O'Neil Road. Please take care here and take care at other high accident areas.

So, as the community is aware of how busy the brigade is here are some interesting statistics.

Last year we had a total of 260 calls, this year we have attended 173 calls, up from 151 from last year at this time. The brigade is expected to attend over 300 calls this year to June 2019.

Recruitment will again be activated in mid year and any interested persons should fill out the application form via the the CFA website. Further details will soon be released on our junior recruit programme which has been running for many years.

Now, as the traffic continues to be an issue in our area this of course impacts on our ability to arrive promptly at our fire call.

How can you help us to potentially help you.

Firstly, if you hear or see an emergency vehicle approaching check your mirrors and move to the LEFT LANE to allow the vehicle to pass.

At an intersection come to a complete stop and allow the emergency vehicle free passage.

Remember it may be you who the brigade is coming to assist and your support and care is vital to our successfully delivering a fire service that meets the needs of a modern society.

Jeanette Maree Smyth 1941-2018



Jeanette was born to Frank and Gladys in Berwick District Bush Nursing Hospital on February 10 1941.

Her father Frank was born in Beaconsfield and was part of the large 'Barnes clan' in the local area. Frank and Gladys had married in 1934 and lived all of their married lives in Beaconsfield, most of it at 18 Railway Avenue. Jeanette had an older brother Reg and a younger sister, Pauline.

Jeanette lived in Beaconsfield all her life. First at 18 Railway Avenue, then 13 Souter Street and later in Wallace Street and Sanctuary Way. She attended Beaconsfield Primary School, Dandenong High School then Zrko's Business College. She joined H.J. Heinz as a secretary when she was 16 and spent all of her working life at Heinz as a secretary and PA, mainly to Heinz's senior managers. She married Jim Smyth at the Beaconsfield Congregational Church in Railway Avenue in 1962. They later divorced in 1973.

When she was younger, she liked going to many of the local balls/dances. She won many Belle of the Ball and Belle of Belles. Apparently, in those days, there was also a 'Miss Beaconsfield' pageant, in which many of the young ladies of the district entered. She won the title, 'Miss Beaconsfield', at least once. Jeanette and Gladys made most of the dresses that she wore to the dances, often working into the wee-hours of the morning before the dance to complete them. This love of sewing grew into a broader interest in craft that she pursued at Make and Mingle.

These are many things she loved doing that defined who she was. She enjoyed going shopping with her mum (Gladys). For many years, Friday night shopping in Dandenong was the norm before the existence of Fountain Gate Shopping Centre.

Playing the piano was a big part of her life and she was a very accomplished pianist. She taught the piano while living at Souter Street and held annual concerts at Christmas in which all the students played. She played piano for the Congregational Church in Beaconsfield. The congregation in those days was small. Apart from the Minister and Jeanette, there were often only a few parishioners. She also attended the Uniting Church and Church of Christ in Berwick and the Beaconsfield Baptist Church, being involved in playing the piano for services, choirs and sing alongs at all these churches. She also played for weddings and loved listening to the music of Andre Rieu and Richard Clayderman. Her garden was also important for her and she had a big garden and spent many hours gardening and knew all the scientific names of the plants.

Frank Barnes was a life member of the Beaconsfield Football Club and Jeanette's son Russell played junior football for a while with Beaconsfield. In typical fashion, Jeanette and Gladys started helping out with the junior canteen and soon they were running it.

When she retired, she was active in local activities and was a mainstay of many local groups. She was involved with the Berwick Hospital Auxillary and a member of Probus Pakenham receiving a 20 year member certificate. She served in many committee roles with Probus, including being Club Service Director for five years. She was particularly active in organisation of the Cancer Council Biggest Morning Tea.

She loved going to Make and Mingle every Wednesday and with Jan welcomed people when they arrived and they served in the kitchen for the craft fair. She participated in line dancing in the Beaconsfield Community Hall and continued doing this until reduced mobility made this too difficult. She loved going to the Akoonah Park Market and enjoyed having coffee or lunch with the 'girls', be they the 'Heinz girls, the 'Make and Mingle girls' or other circles of friends.

One of her best friends was Margaret, whom she worked with at Heinz and later they joined Probus. Jeanette and Margaret liked to go walking (the streets of Beaconsfield) with their dogs. Her other best friend was Jan. They enjoyed Make and Mingle, craft, the knitting club and generally each other's company. Jeanette enjoyed watching all types of sport;

especially swimming, football and tennis. She particularly enjoyed watching North Melbourne football club and going to the games. In more recent years she watched the match on television. Her passion was her pets. In her earlier years there was the white Samoyeds – Sam and Shell. Later, there was a corgi ('fella' – short for 'little fella') and then King Charles – Churchill, Dixon and Watson. There were also cats – Scruff, Walter and Fullager.

Jeanette was farewelled at Beaconsfield Baptist Church by family and friends who will miss her but were so thankful for her love and friendship to them.

Taylor, A. Service No. VX55734 Beaconsfield War Memorial WW2

Who was Taylor, A on the Beaconsfield War Memorial?

In 2006 Tony Rushton, a well-known Beaconsfield resident discovered that the name on the Beaconsfield War Memorial was in recognition of the World War 2 soldier Allan Taylor, Service No VX55734.

Allan was the fourth child of the farmer George Anthony and Jessie Catherine (McDonald) Taylor, born in September 1921 at Lancefield Victoria. Sadly, Allan was never to know his mother as she died 3 weeks after his birth in the Kyneton Hospital near Lancefield.

He lived his formative years at Yatpool, Victoria and attended Yatpool State School.

On completion of school Allan worked as a shearer and drover, this is when he met and became firm friends with the Dennis family.

He worked with Ernest Dennis in the Mallee and later stayed with the family in Beaconsfield.

Allan went on to work at his brother's dairy property in Thorpdale, apparently he did not enjoy dairy farming.

Enlisting at Royal Park, Parkville, Melbourne for the Second World War on 13 May 1941, Allan gave his date of birth as 7 October 1919 increasing his age to be eligible without having to obtain parental consent for enlistment. He gave his brother, Anthony George Taylor living in Childers via Thorpdale, as his next of kin.

His niece, Ellen (Taylor) Purvis, recounts the last the family saw of Allan was him riding his bike from the farm on his way to enlist.

Allan joined the 2/29 Battalion on 3 July 1941 in Bathurst, New South Wales. After brief training for combat, he left Australia on 30 July 1941 and arrived in Singapore on 23 August 1941. Early 1942 the 2/29 Battalion had established position in Malaya where the allies were trying to thwart the advances of the Japanese. By 16 January the strategic town and harbour of Muar had fallen to the Japanese. The 2/29 Battalion were trying to hold their position, but with the constant attack by the Japanese troops on the ground and the assault from aircraft, it meant the 2/29 must draw back to the edge position of the 2/19 Battalion. All day the fighting continued, as night fell the severe loss was palpable. During this battle would be the most likely demise of Allan, documented as wounded on 18 January, Pte Allan Taylor, C Company was reported as "Killed in Action" on 20 January 1942 and is buried at Kranji War Cemetery, Singapore.

In 1943 Allan's father, George Taylor, passed away, the family notice and death certificate recorded Allan as "AIF missing".

Allan was awarded four medals, 1939/45 Star, Pacific Star, War Medal and the Australian Service Medal, they were despatched on 4 October 1951. The family never received the medals, apparently, they were posted to Childers, Queensland instead of Childers, Victoria. The location of the medals issued is unknown.

It is understood that at Ernest Dennis's request Allan Taylor's name was included on the Beaconsfield War Memorial.
