Foreword

Officer was originally referred to as the "Officer's Wood Siding". With an abundantly wooded landscape, James Lecky, LL Smith and Robert Officer were instrumental in having the train stop to collect the fire-wood logged on the property of Robert Officer, known as "Greenbanks". A flag would be displayed, and the Gippsland train would stop at the railway siding to collect the logged timber for transportation to Melbourne.

In 1888 the township became known as Officer.

During the 1880's land boom in Melbourne, Officer prospered with the abundance of timber available and clay suitable for bricks; there was at least five brick yards at the peek of the building boom. After the housing bust in the late 1880's, the cleared land was found suitable for orchards to be grown. The orchard industry flourished with the capability of transportation to Melbourne both by railway and road.

Originally there was no store or post office, the mail would be collected from the railway station. The first store was opened in the late 1890's by Fred Harris. Then the new public hall was approved and built, a "great convenience" for public meetings. In the following years it would be well utilised with regular dances and celebratory events. The local state school began in 1886 and the new wooden school was built on a new site in 1913. Rix and Hicks built new kilns in their brick yards, supplying drainpipes and the like and offering local employment. Several Eucalyptus distilleries produced large quantities of oil which were successful for a few years. There were numerous farms; dairy, poultry, sheep, crop growing, and flower growers, which have been prosperous in Officer for many years. The Progress Association was formed in 1911, as were other community groups, supporting the township.

War intervened; On the 4 August 1914 Great Britain declared war with France against Germany. Two days later the Australian Government offered an Australian expeditionary force and the Commonwealth Government called for volunteers for the Australian Imperial Force. Officer, one of many small towns, was swept up in the conversations and excitement of war, the young men full of enthusiasm and the opportunity of an adventure, began to enlist. In 1918 the Great war came to an end and those that survived returned. Officer was a small town, so the loss of numerous local men had devastating consequences. The fabric of the close community was changed forever. Grief and sadness made the following years a challenge in rebuilding the lives of the families and the town itself. Stoic and hardworking the people of Officer strived forward. As reported some years ago, "*The Officer people have a happy knack of pulling together.*"

The Officer Union Church built in 1929 by the community, gave the opportunity for all denominations to have a place of worship. The Officer Country Women's Association began, which was enthusiastically welcomed by the women of Officer. Having played sports on a local property, finally with the acquisition of a 13 acre site, the Officer sports club was officially opened on 17th January 1930. Sport has always been an important activity for the locals to participate and enjoy the break from working life. The Officer Fire Brigade was formed in 1942 another example of the community spirit.

In 1918 a boulevard of trees on the north side of the highway was planted to honour the men who had enlisted from the district. In later years (1970's) with the widening of the highway the trees have all gone. Clair Whiteside instigated the idea that a committee be formed to erect The War Memorial Gates at the entrance to the Officer Recreation Reserve. The unveiling ceremony took place on Sunday 11 November 1951. Due to the rapid development of Officer and the need for road upgrades, the Officer Memorial Gates were moved to their current location in 2014.

Anzac and Remembrance Day services are now held at the Memorial Gates each year to honour and commemorate all who have served their country including those that made the Supreme Sacrifice.

The soldiers that joined the Australian Infantry forces for "King and Country" could never have imagined the extensive transformation of Officer in this past 100 years.

In a list of casualties published on Monday by the Defence authorities, the name of Corporal P. T. Beadel of Officer appears amongst those reported to be wounded and seriously ill.

Percival died 17th January 1917 from a gunshot wound. He is innterred at St Sever Cemetery Extension, Haute-Normandie, France.

News has been received of the death of Corporal Percival Beadel, of Officer, who died in the 6th General Hospital from a gunshot wound. He was one of the first to leave Australia, and was in the trenches on Gallipoli for some time. He was 20 years of age.

On the 3rd May 1917, Thomas was wounded in action with a shrapnel wound to the chest, he returned to Australia on 18 October 1917.

He was discharged from the AIF on 21 January 1918 and received the British War Medal and the Victory Medal on 13th April 1923.

In 1922 Thomas married Mabel May Wilmott in Footscray and they had two sons, Maxwell Thomas and Maurice John.

They lived in Berwick, occupation Farmer. Thomas retired in the 1950's and moved to Dandenong before Glen Waverley.

Thomas died on 17th January 1982 in The Manchester Unity Nursing Home, Coleman Parade, Glen Waverley. He was cremated on the 19th January at Springvale Cemetery.

Arthur enlisted and served 66 days before becoming ill with bronchitis, he was given a medical discharge on 6th October 1915.

Arthur later re-enlisted on the 24th July 1916, but he became ill once again after serving 106 days. He was discharged on the 7th November 1916. Arthur enlisted for a third time on the 10th November 1916 and served another 7 months before returning to Australia on 27th September 1917 with a fractured left ankle.

He was discharged from the AIF on 1st February 1918 and would go on to receive the British War Medal on 2nd July 1923.

In 1918 Arthur married Linda Renfern in Footscray, Victoria and they had five children, Clarence Leslie, Lila Mary Doreen, Raymond John, Elvie Linda and Kevin George.

Arthur died on 6th January 1946 at Royal Melbourne Hospital, Parkville. He was buried at Springvale Cemetery 7th January 1946.


John died on 18th February 1919 in hospital in South Melbourne and was buried at Melbourne Cemetery on 19th February 1919.

Word has been received that Private A Brunt second son of Mrs Brunt of Jolimont and grandson of Mrs R Brunt "Gin Gin Bean" Officer, has been awarded a military Medal for bravery under shell fire.

On 6th October 1918, Archibald was accidently injured and admitted to hospital. He was later transferred to hospital in the UK.

He returned to Australia on 18th December 1918 and discharged on 30th March 1919. On 26th September 1921 he received the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. He was later awarded the 1914/1915 Star Medal on 10th May 1923.

In 1922 Archibald married Adelaide Letitia Gilbert and continued farming after the war.

Archibald died on 28th January 1968 in Baxter, Victoria and was cremated on 1st February 1968 at the Springvale Cemetery.

Mr Clements will be greatly missed in the district, having been connected with the Progress Association since its beginning. He was also Hon. Treasurer for the hall for the last 12 months.

John returned to Australia on the 25th September 1919 and was discharged from the AIF on 27th March 1920.

On 12th April 1922 he received the British War Medal and, later, on 16th March 1923 received the Victory Medal.

In 1927 John married Myrtle May Scale in West Melbourne, they had one daughter Mavis Enid.

John died at the Repatriation General Hospital Caulfield on the 5 July 1944. He was cremated on 6 July 1944 at the Fawkner Crematorium.

On 7th September 1923, Alan received the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. They were issued to his brother.

Awarded the Military medal. His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to approve the award of the Military Medal for bravery in the field to the undermentioned-No 804 Sergeant Basil Raynor Davies, 39th Battalion. For gallant conduct and devotion to duty during the period 16 September 1918. To November 11, 1918.

Sergeant Davies did excellent work on the 18th September, 1918, at Bony. He was sent in charge of a patrol to go forward to the canal. His control came under heavy Machine gun fire, but in spite of this he pushed on and gained very valuable information regarding the location of enemy machine gun. He was also successful in keeping his patrol together, having no casualties.

The above has been promulgated in "Commonwealth of Australia Gazette" No 135, dated 11 December 1919.

Basil returned to Australia on 5th April 1919 and was discharged from the AIF 12th July 1919. Basil would go on to receive the British War Medal on 9th September 1921 and would later receive the Victory Medal on 28th February 1923.

At the ceremony, which was attended only by close relatives she wore a teal blue ensemble and a hat of matching flowers, from which hung a shoulder length veil. Her accessories were navy blue, and she had a spray of orchids pinned at the shoulder of her coat. Dr V Davies was best man.

Basil and Frances Margot lived in Longwarry Victoria farming Ayrshire cattle for many years, they eventually retired to live in Ivanhoe.

Basil died on the 3rd August 1979 in Thornbury. His body was received at Department of Anatomy, University of Melbourne on 6th August 1979.

As next of kin of the late No 6612 gunner W M Lecky, the Military Medal which his majesty the King has been graciously pleased to award to that gallant soldier for conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty while serving with the Australian Imperial Expeditionary Force. The specific deed for which this distinction was bestowed is as follows:-

"At Herleville during the operations on the morning of the 23rd instant thie telephonist, together with three others, formed part of the F.C.Party."

During the day these men worked under great difficulty from the forward O.P.

station to the relay post under heavy shell fire and due to an utter disregard for personal safety, succeeded in maintaining the line escept for short periods.

The F.C.Officer was thereby enabled to send back information of considerable tactical importance as regards the line held by our own infantry flash bearings of hostile batteries shelling our new positions, and enemy movement likely to develop into a counter attack.

Their conduct is deserving of special recognition"





The provisions of a Will have no bearing upon the distribution of medals unless they are specifically mentioned therein, such momentos being handed over in the following order of relationship unless good and sufficient reasons for varying the procedure are stated:- Widow, eldest surviving son, eldest surviving daughter, father, mother, eldest surviving brother, eldest surviving sister, eldest surviving half-brother, eldest surviving half -sister. Thanking you in anticipation of the favour of an early reply.

Told to repay 800 pound pension.

Frederick Victor Peterson, 58 years, railway watchman of Prentice Street Newport, was fined 3 pound at South Melbourne court yesterday on each of 10 charges of obtaining a service pensions by means of false written statements to the Repatriation department.

Mr Molony SM also ordered defendant to make restitution to the Repatriation department of 810 pound 17/6, *which has been paid to him in the form of pension payments during the years from 1942 to 1951*.

Peterson was told he could make restitution at the rate of 3 pound per week after he had paid off the 30 pound fines.

The prosecution had alleged Peterson in written statements to the repatriation department, had falsely stated that he had no income apart from the pension.

Defendant had actually been employed by the State railways during those years and had earned as much as 10 pound weekly.

Frederick died on the 9th October 1959 at 6 Prentice Street, Newport Victoria. He was cremated on the 12th October 1959 at Springvale Botanical Cemetery.

Suddenly the horse, which had been left standing in the road, took fright and bolted with the cart and eventually collided with a stump. The vehicle was badly damaged- both shafts were broken and the horse had its leg broken and had to be destroyed.

During World War II, Oscar lived at Hindmarsh, South Australia, working in the munitions factory.

Oscar died on the 16th October 1953 and was cremated on the 19th October at the Springvale Cemetery.

SOLDIERS' LETTER. SIGNALLER KEM. SKELLET.

Mrs Skellelt, of Clunes, has received the following interesting letter from her son, Signaller Kem Skellet : --You will know before this arrives that we have withdrawn from Anzac and Sulva portions of the Peninsula. It seemed a great shame to have to do so, after so many of our lads falling there; but we were only losing men and gaining nothing. Up in our position the 8th Light Horse were the last to leave, 17 of us being picked from the regiment to stay. I had the pleasure of being one. We had to take over the trenches of two regiments at 4 p.m. and were there till 2.15 a.m. No matter how many Turks came we had to hold our positions until that time. The men further up had to come down first, and I can tell you it was an anxious and tiring time. I had a post on my own. Our withdrawal was timed to the minute, and was carried out without a single man being hit. After we had been on board ship a short time the gun on Walker's Ridge was blown up. My word didn't the Turks start firing then. We have heard since leaving that the Turks bombarded our positions for two days after we left. We had 48 hours silence once before, so I suppose they thought we were at the same game again. We had rifles rigged up to go off at intervals after we left. We were extremely lucky to get off without a scratch. On the boat I met Milton Williamson and George Pollington. It was like old times meeting them. They were also in the last party to leave. We are On our way back to our horses. We had our Christmas dinner on board ship (roast pork and plum pudding.) I can tell you I am glad to get a spell, for we had a busy time of it on the Peninsula. I have never felt better than l did whilst On the Peninsula. From the day I left Alexandria until I got back was exactly four months, so I had a fair spell over there. Two of my mates are ill, one wounded, and one killed in the last bombardment' the Turks gave our trenches on Lone Pine

In a later letter Signaller Skellet says he had met many Clunes boys at Heliopolis. They have military sports, football and boxing matches. An officer's widow has a place where the boys can go and have meals, which is a treat, as everything is so nice. You will be pleased to hear I have been promoted to the rank of corporal. I have been acting Squadron Quarter- Master for a time. Our regiments have been re organised, and after horse drill, we will go away some- where mounted. I got a Xmas billy, the contents of which my mates and I greatly appreciated. The sender was a lady of Ballarat, whom I intend to thank. Albert was related to Henry Charles Kempson Maxwell and may have worked or visited with the family at *Luckham* in Officer, Victoria.

Albert was wounded while serving in Palestine (which at the time was a part of the Ottoman Empire), he later succumbed to these wounds and died on the 20th April 1917.




DEATH FROM WOUNDS

Mrs Skellet (sister to Cr A E Kempson) received word on Monday evening that her only son Corporal Kempson Skellet, of the 8th ALH Anzac Mounted Division, had died from wounds at Palestine on the 20th inst. He enlisted over two years, ago, and fought for some months in Gallipoli and as one of the last to evacuate the Peninsula He then went to Egypt, and with the division fought right through the desert, until he was killed He was a strapping young man, of fine physique, and never had ill health since his enlistment.

Albert posthumously received the Star Medal 1914/1915 on the 1st October 1920, the British War Medal on the 5th August 1921 and the Victory Medal on the 28th December 1922. All Medals were accepted by his mother, Mary Skellett.

Albert was interred at the Deir El Belah War Cemetery in Deir El Belah, Israel.

Clive was killed in action on 25th April 1915 in Gallipoli (which at that time was a part of the Ottoman Empire).

Berwick Shire News - 23rd June 1915

Clive Were, of Officer, who has fallen at the front, was well known throughout the district, and the news of his death was received with regret by many friends. He was a member of the Pakenham cricket team and a splendid type of an athlete.

Berwick Shire News - 30th June 1915

OFFICER - An impressive memorial service for the late Private Clive Were, who was killed in action at the Dardanelles, was conducted at Officer on Sunday afternoon last by Canon Hart. There was a large attendance, bearing evidence of the high esteem in which the young soldier was held.

Berwick Shire News - 7th July 1915

At the memorial service for Clive Were, held on the 27th, collection was made for wounded Australians. A branch of the Red Cross Society has been formed here with a good membership.

Pakenham Gazette - 10th August 1915

Mr John Mason: has taken a lease of Mr Were's farm where he intends carrying on dairying.

Clive posthumously received the Star Medal 1914/1915 on the 16th April 1920, the British War Medal on the 8th April 1921 and the Victory Medal on the 28th August 1922. All Medals were accepted by Clive's father.

Clive is listed on the Lone Pine Memorial in the Gallipoli Peninsula in Canakkale Province, Turkey.

Berwick City News - 15th March 1916

A letter from Pte Clair Whiteside appears in a recent issue of the Tamb and Bruthen times. The letter received by Mr Munachen a one time resident of Berwick. Private Whiteside says that he has been inside and outside of nearly all the chief places of historic interest- pyramids, citadel slave market, tombs, mosques etc. Some of the buildings are very artistic, but size was the chief wonder.

Berwick Shire News - 30th August 1916

It was several weeks ago that Cpl Whiteside, son of Rev WS Whiteside, was wounded while fighting in France. The information was first received from Corporal Whiteside himself and afterwards from the defence department. On Monday Rev WS Whiteside received the following message from Base records Office. Now report your son Cpl TC Whiteside admitted to General Hospital, 22nd July gunshot wound to the forehead severe will promptly advise if anything further received. (This message was apparently delayed in transmission as it about 5 weeks since Cpl Whiteside was wounded) The latest information received by private cable, states that he is improving and expects to go into a convalescent home in a few days.

Thomas returned to Australia on the 15th January 1919 and was discharged on the 1st March 1919.

Thomas received the Star Medal 1914/1915, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal on the 10th October 1920.

In 1923 Thomas married Kathleen Amy Cunningham. They lived in Whiteside Road, Officer and he continued to work as an orchardist.

Thomas died in January 1959 in Officer, Victoria and was buried on the 6th January 1959 at the Berwick Cemetery.

His name is listed on the Officer Roll of Honor as Whiteside. C.

He subsequently entered a drapery establishment with which business wholesale and retail he was closely associated, both in Adelaide and Melbourne. In later years he was chiefly in Melbourne with the Civil Service Stores and the Coliseum at Prahran. He enlisted in Melbourne and left for the front 12 months ago. Prior to entering the trenches, he was engaged as quartermaster-sergeant at a base in France. Mr A E Whittney, caretaker of the Trades Hall, and Mr C Whittney, an employee of the Broken Hill Proprietary mine are brothers of the late Corporal Whittney.


Leonard posthumously received the British War Medal on the 11th November 1921 and the Victory Medal on the 20th February 1923. They were accepted by his father, Frederick.
