





During this difficult Covid-19 pandemic period, it is pleasing to hear about the resilience and community spirit of Beaconsfield residents that makes our town a great place to live.


At present, we are unable to have monthly meetings however when these restrictions are lifted in the future, we will publicise on our Website, Facebook and Notices in business premises.

# Council supports community and business during COVID-19

Council has been working hard and in partnership with local community groups in supporting our community throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

Council's \$1.6 million Community and Business Support Package includes a range of initiatives to support our community during this time. Initiatives include, but are not limited to, fast-tracking of approvals and compliance matters, rebates for some business fees and charges, extended due dates, interest-free periods and payment plans for rates if you need support, and more time to pay animal registration renewals. Council has also announced Community Relief Provider Grants for eligible service providers, agencies or groups that provide relief services, and Community Connection Grants for eligible community groups for support initiatives.

Our online support and resource centre has been designed to help you during the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. We hope you'll find it useful, in what is a stressful and challenging time for everyone. Here you can access a range of useful resources including links, fact sheets and videos, as well as a 'call back' option if you would like Council to assist in finding or understanding relevant support or information.

# **Princes Highway intersection upgrades**

The major intersection and signalisation upgrades along the Old Princes Highway at O'Neil Road and Glismann/Beaconsfield Avenue are progressing with the project currently out to tender. Construction of these two intersections are expected to commence within the coming months, weather permitting and with the approval of Vic Roads.

# Change room upgrade at Beaconsfield Recreational Reserve (Perc Allison)

The change room upgrade project is currently out to tender. The project is an upgrade of the existing change rooms pavilion to provide unisex change room facilities, umpires change rooms, first aid and strapping room, gym, time-keepers room and a spectator viewing area. Works are expected to

commence onsite in the coming months and be completed in November 2020.

# Changes to hard waste pick up

Following the recent shire-wide hard waste collection held throughout April/May 2020, Cardinia Shire Council is moving to a bookable hard waste service.

Moving to a bookable hard waste service will enable council to provide a more convenient and efficient service, increase diversion of waste from landfill, and reduce the impact of large amounts of hard waste out at one time. It also reflects the actions in our Council Plan and Waste and Resource Recovery Strategy (2017-26).

Each household in Cardinia Shire that has their bins collected by Council will be able to book 2 free hard waste collections per year, including properties which are rented. Bookings will be available online and over the phone. The service is expected to commence from July. More information including how to book, what items are accepted and limits on sizes will soon be available at: www.cardinia.vic.gov.au

# Alex Robson – Beaconsfield Football Club & ANZAC Day

Alex Robson who passed away in 2017 (appropriately on Anzac Day) held an iconic status with the Beaconsfield Football club. Alex was our strongest link to those early days when our town was a quiet village and life was a lot different. Alex has seen so much of our club history but he has also been a part of the wider history of Australia through his contribution to the community, and through his time serving in the Second World War.



Alex Robson has seen every Beaconsfield premiership, and just about every game Beacy has played. He was born in 1924, first came to the town in 1928, and boundary umpired his first local game in 1932. Just under 10 years later in 1942, he and his good mate Jim (Skinny) Parkes, lined up at Caulfield racecourse to sign up to serve in the Army.

Alex was spotted by his uncle, who alerted authorities to the fact that Alec was underage (only 17) so he and Jim then tried their luck at Dandenong and he managed to join up there. Alex served with the First Australian Pack Transport Company, 7th Division and was shipped out to New Guinea where the army was trying to hold back the Japanese advance. Being a country lad, he was given a role with the horses, taking valuable supplies by packhorses along the Kokoda Track to Innaminka Ridge. Alec was involved with this work up until the end of the war in 1945. Those who now take the popular track walk can only imagine what conditions would have been like in

those long years for a young bloke in his first trip away from home. No leave at home during these tough times.

For many of the young people at our club Alex is the old fellow who was always there on training nights and kept the fire lit in the Perc Allison club rooms. They would not be aware that at the same age as many of our current U/19's and U/18's team he willingly went overseas to serve his country like thousands of other Australians did at that time. Thankfully he came back safely, and went on serving his country and his community through his involvement with the Beaconsfield Football Club.



Alec 's contributions as a past president, (his father had also served as president of the club), and his ongoing involvement has been recognized through club life membership, along with an AFL Certificate of Acknowledgement for his 50 years involvement, which was presented to Alex by Allan Jeans back in 2003.

The Alex Robson award was struck in 2011 and is voted on by the players for the player or person who most upholds those values that Alex represented, such as Selflessness; Loyalty, Dedication & Perserverance. Great values & attributes to have within a football club, and also in our community.

Alec's story would be repeated in football clubs, and other sporting clubs, across Australia, and on Anzac Day, it is especially timely to reflect on this contribution. It is pleasing that the young people that pass through the Beaconsfield Football Club have an opportunity to develop a bond with someone such as Alec and experience the example of service he provides in his own modest way. So to all the Alex Robsons at every football club we thank you and salute you.

The third category was the best group entry which was won by 'It's Morphin time'.




This prize was donated by Daniel from Beaconsfield Mower and Chainsaw service who presented the winner with a Sanil leaf blower.

# Grogan, Joseph Stanislaus



Approximately 90 years ago the Grogan family came to Beaconsfield to farm.

Michael and Gertrude Grogan had six children, most born in Benalla, Victoria. On moving to Beaconsfield, the children were grown and only the eldest two children Mary and Joseph came with them to farm the property known as "San Antonio", Clyde Road, Beaconsfield.

The family settled into their new life. While Michael and Joseph both farmed the property, Joe, as he was called by family and friends, was also regularly employed as a Bridge Construction worker. He was also a keen cricket player and joined the local team.

This new life was short lived, with the announcement of World War 2 Joseph enlisted with the Australian Army on 21 October 1939 and was "taken on strength". In November his solder training commenced at Puckapunyal and in December he was transferred to Ingleburn Army Camp, New South Wales.

In mid 1940 Joseph embarked from Sydney and disembarked in readiness for war, in Gourock, Scotland. Deployment to the Middle East came in late December and he was stationed there for several

years until the November of 1942, when he was severely wounded;

"a penetrating shell wound to the abdomen".

L/CPL. J. S. GROGAN (Eng.), from Beaconsfield, has been removed from the dangerously ill list.

Joseph survived and on 9 January 1943 was assessed as "unfit". He boarded the hospital ship "MS Oranje" for the long journey home to Melbourne and was admitted to Heidelberg Military Hospital.

Joseph endured a protracted recovery, convalescing at numerous locations, "Stonnington" in Malvern, the "Cottage by the Sea" in Queenscliff and a hospice at Portsea.

Michael, Joseph's father realised that it would not be possible for Joseph to return and work the farm in Beaconsfield, so with the dream of a prosperous life on the land over, the family returned to the inner suburbs of Melbourne.

# Grogan-Doyle St. Mary's Star of the Sea Church. West Melbourne, was the setting for the marriage yesterday of Veronica Teresa, eldest daughter of Mr. P. J. Doyle and the late Mrs. Doyle, with Sapper Joseph Stanislaus Grogan, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. M. Grogan, Coburg. The bridegroom's prother, Rev. Father G. Grogan, officiated at the marriage with nuptial mass.

Joseph was eventually able to work as a French polisher in Caulfield. He married Veronica Doyle and they had three sons, Michael, John and Gerard.


On 5 November 1987, Joseph Stanislaus Grogan, born 18 December 1911, Service No VX1220, passed away at the Huntly Close Nursing Home, Glenhuntly, Victoria.



His younger brother, Father Kevin Grogan, Service No NX205421, once quoted John Henry Newman;

"May he support us all day long, till the shades lengthen, and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed, and the fever of life is over, and our work is done! Then in his Mercy may He give us a safe lodging, and a holy rest, and peace at last."

NON MEMBERS – Hire of courts is not yet available. MEMBERS - Synthetic courts are available under these restrictions:

- Social games only, both singles and doubles allowed.
- Before leaving home, email our Secretary
   (mauricepotter@bigpond.com) detailing
   names in your group and date and
   time of use. This will enable us to contact you
   should an infection occur at the club, for your
   own protection and to meet Government
   guidelines. These emails will be retained for
   our records.
- Please bring your own sanitiser/antiseptic wipes to clean gate latches and locks before entry (to protect you) and after use to protect others.
- Club house is to remain locked at all times, toilets are not available to meet local Cardinia Council guidelines.
- Bring your own full drink bottles as club drinking fountains must not be used.
- No social gathering before or after play (get in-play-get out).
- Shared equipment is not to be used, eg scoreboards, personal tennis racquets, drink bottles.
- No handshakes and wash your hands before and after play.
- Maintain social distancing at all times 1.5 metres apart.

- Be considerate of other members by limiting court time to one hour maximum if others are waiting.
- Members' use of the courts is at their own risk and are responsible for their own actions under the current Government restrictions.


# Dogs of Beaconsfield's Past

Dogs have long been referred to as "Man's Best Friend"; this year more than ever dog owners have appreciated the companionship of their pets.

The Victorian "Dog Act" requiring the registration of dogs began in 1864. Licensing required the description of the dog, the premises where the dog is kept, the sex, age, and colour; the fee was five shillings payable every year. Each dog was required to wear a collar with registration number and place of its registration, failure to register or comply incurred a penalty.



In 1865 resident Janet Bowman, Licensee of the "Gippsland Hotel", a widow with children, chose to own a Mastiff dog, as recorded in the Dog Register, Road District of Berwick.



The Mastiff dog given his size would have been an excellent guard dog in such a remote location. He would confidently fend off intruders and the possibility of robbery at the Gippsland Hotel. Given there would have been frequent travellers passing through the district, Janet would have relied on her mastiff for protection for herself, family and business.



In 1867 Janet owned a terrier and two kangaroo dogs. The terrier was known for their tenacity, a smart little dog, willing to work and protect his territory. During

the day he would guard livestock and give early warning of danger. In the evening he would be an affectionate and quiet companion.

Kanagroo dogs were very popular in early days, they were primarily a greyhound/ scottish deerhound cross which evolved into a very large, strong and extremely tough running dog, essential for hunting. They were the perfect multi functional dog, their slender frame allowed them the ability to run swiftly through fields or cover rough territory at high speed in pursuit of prey. Kangaroo dogs had loyal attachment to their owners, very obedient and were always willing to please.





In 1871 resident Patrick O'Neil owned a dog we are more familiar with, the Cattle dog. This dog is a combination of other breeds such as the Smithfield and Collies, which finally resulted in the Australian cattle dog breed. In the settlement of properties, farmers needed to control stock over vast tracts of land. Cattle dogs were chosen by farmers for their tremendous powers of endurance and courage. The local climate and landscape required a versatile well-balanced dog which the Cattle dog's ability and character typifies. Though the choice of dog breed to own may have changed in Beaconsfield, residents today continue to enjoy the loyalty and companionship of dogs.
