In accordance with our previous commitment, we will continue to produce the Banner, hence this Spring Edition has been produced but with less content. Hopefully the Covid-19 situation will continue to improve and the Summer Edition of the Banner may be back to normal. The Banner is available on our BPA Website www.beaconsfield.org.au and printed copies are available from a number of local businesses including the Beaconsfield Post Office.

The Banner is prepared by Beaconsfield Progress Assoc. volunteers with the only cost being printing done externally plus a share of the administrative costs of operating the Association. We received a Grant of \$900 from Cardinia Shire Council to offset costs and the balance is paid from advertising in the Banner. It is pleasing to see work continuing on the burnt- out shops on Old Princes Highway. Hopefully the reinstatement works continue to be done quickly so the area which is the entrance to Beaconsfield is reinvigorated. It is also pleasing to see that the works on creating 150 new car spaces at the Beaconsfield Railway Station have commenced.

Elections for Cardinia Shire Councillors will be held on 24 October by postal vote. Parts of Beaconsfield are in 3 different Council Wards, however Beaconsfield is predominately in the new Beacon Hills Ward. Each Ward is represented by 1 Councillor. Candidates can nominate to be a Councillor from Thursday 17 September. Voting is compulsory for residents aged 18 or over who must be registered on the State Electoral Roll. Due to Covid-19 our Association is unlikely to hold a Meet the Candidates Forum for this election.

Cardinia Shire Council Planning Scheme Amendment C238 concerning the Glismann Road Development Plan has been exhibited with explanatory Letter and Commonly Asked Questions/Answers. This information can be accessed from the Cardinia Shire Website. Interested parties can lodge written submissions by the nominated due date of 14 September. If you require more information check the Cardinia Shire Website or contact the Shire's Planning Department.

An upgrade to the Kath Roberts Reserve and Playground Equipment is included in the Council's Capital 2020/21 Budget. If you have any suggestions, then you should complete an online survey on the Cardinia Shire Council Website.

At present, we are unable to have monthly public meetings however the Committee is holding monthly meetings on Zoom to attend to necessary business matters. When Covid-19 restrictions are lifted and we are able to have meetings, we will publicise this on our Website and Facebook.

### Council elections – October 2020

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) has advised that local council elections will be held in Victoria by post in October 2020. Voters will receive a ballot pack in early October.


If you want to stand as a candidate, you can nominate from Thursday 17 September 2020.


Following the introduction of the *Local Government Act 2020, the* electoral structure of Cardinia Shire Council changed. Voters will be voting according to the new structure, which will come into effect at the election.

The new structure has Cardinia Shire Council divided into nine single councillor wards. Voters will elect one councillor per ward.

Beaconsfield is divided into two wards – Beacon Hills and Officer wards. (please see the ward maps to determine which ward you live in).

#### Beaconsfield Railway Station Car Park Upgrade

Construction of the additional 150 car parking spaces at the Beaconsfield Railway Station has commenced. Works will also include improved lighting and CCTV as well as new amenities to make cycling to the station easier, with a secure bike parkiteer and 16 additional bike hoops. This project is jointly funded by both the state and federal governments.

At the beginning of March, before this terrible pandemic set in, I met with Prime Minister Scott Morrison and Minister Alan Tudge to announce the upgrade of the Beaconsfield interchange and the extension of O'Shea Rd.

La Trobe is one of the fastest growing electorates in the country and we need the infrastructure to match it.

That's why we have committed \$1.4 billion to the Monash Freeway Stage 2 works and for upgrading the Beaconsfield interchange. This will create local jobs when they are needed most. This improvement will directly impact the development of Minta City, opening up 10,000 new jobs in the IT and advanced manufacturing sector.

Many residents over the years have voiced their concerns about the lack of parking at Beaconsfield train station. That's why I have committed to upgrading the train station carpark, which I'm proud to say Stage 1 is now under construction, this will deliver an additional 150 much needed spaces.

Sporting facilities are also being attended to. We have already completed many sports facilities upgrades in Beaconsfield. Be it the protective nets for Beaconsfield Football Club members, the electronic scoreboard for the Beaconsfield Netball Club and the new grass at the Beaconhills Golf Links.

## Beaconsfield Rainfall Report

The rainfall in our neighbourhood matters more than you think – especially if you enjoy a lot of outdoor recreational activities, hobbies, maintain a garden at home or provide enough conversational material for family, friends and neighbours.


We have had a home rain gauge on our property and have records for Beaconsfield for 35 years and they have certainly provided material for unlimited weather conversations!

In the month of July 2020 we recorded 49mm. This contributed to a 3 month (May,June, July) tally of 182mm. Looking back twelve months the total for July 2019 was 73mm and the 3 month total (May,June,July 2019) was significantly higher recording 276mm.

2020 cumulative total for the 7 months is 722mm compared to 2019 total for the same period being only 390mm.

Interestingly at the time of writing this (9th August) we have passed the total yearly rainfall of 2019 of 752mm.

In our records of 35 years, 1985 -2020, the average means for 34 years is 792mm. The highest yearly total of 1211mm was recorded in 2011, a year of several notable floods in the Beaconsfield area.

### **Beaconsfield CFA**



In these unprecedented, times the Beaconsfield Fire Brigade continues to operate following Covid-19 protocols to ensure we are able to respond to fire calls.

The brigade has attended 278 calls for the year 1/07/2019 to 30/06/2020.

This is down from 309 from the previous year and is Covid 19 related.

The brigade takes delivery of our new Forward Control Vehicle in October which is an auxiliary unit that is primarily used as a mobile support unit in major incidents such as bush fires or large structure fires.

The brigade would like to take this opportunity to thank local businesses and our generous community based supporters for their generous donations that have enabled the brigade to purchase and fit out this purpose built vehicle.

With the introduction of Fire Rescue Victoria the brigade continues to operate as a fully staffed and trained volunteer brigade providing a 24/7 service to our community and greater Victoria.

We have continued to meet and at times exceed our response time thus providing you, our community, with a first rate fire service.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind the community to stay safe and follow the instructions of the Chief Medical Officer so that we all may be able to return to a normal functioning community.

We received loads of plastic bottle caps from our members earlier in the year to upcycle into this super cool mural:




We are now taking enrolments for next year's 3YO programs. Don't worry about completing the forms at the moment, but do contact us and we'll put your name down to hold a place for your child.

## Beaconsfield Kindergarten

To say that kindergarten in 2020 has been a little different to usual would be an understatement! We are so proud of the resilience, adaptability and patience that all of our Beacy Kinder children and families have shown this year while we have navigated our way through onsite kinder, lockdowns and remote learning.

As I write this, we are in the middle of stage 4 lockdown. With kinder currently only available for children of permitted workers and vulnerable children, we have closed our Woods St service and are offering kinder for eligible children at our O'Neil Rd facility. We have a rotating roster of two staff onsite, while the remainder of our educators are at home supporting children with remote learning.

I'm so proud of the way our teachers and educators have stepped up to support the kinder children with their remote learning. Spending most of their time sitting at a computer or iPad has been a big shift from the way they usually spend their work days, but they have all done an amazing job! Some of the things Beaconsfield Kindergarten has implemented to support children while at home have included:

• a fortnightly program with activities that encompass the learning areas we usually cover at kinder, including movement, fine motor (manipulating smaller objects with the hands and fingers), sustainability, language and literacy, science, dramatic play and numeracy

• take home packs, with activities to complete and resources to use at home

• regular Zoom sessions, which have included things like the teacher reading a story, a sharing time for children and secret in a box

• activities posted on our communication app, Storypark, with families encouraged to share photos of their child's work, or of their child engaging in the activities

• individual goals for each child, based on areas that they were developing at kinder

• recorded videos of our educators singing and moving to familiar songs, with children encouraged to join in as they watch

• reflections encompassing photos that have been posted by families completing the activities

• some events throughout the lockdown period to bring a bit of extra fun to lockdown and remote learning!

Of course, a huge thank you is also needed for the families who have worked with us and supported their children in their learning and development this year. At times like these, the strength of a community really comes out, and our kinder community has shone!

## Will the Helmeted Honeyeater Ever Return to the Cardinia Creek?

The Helmeted Honeyeater was selected as the bird emblem for Victoria because it only occurs in Victoria. At the time of settlement they were found at the Bass River on Westernport, up the Cardinia Creek, across the Koo Wee Rup swamps, through Berwick, Guys Hill, Upper Beaconsfield and into the Yarra Ranges.

Regrettably now they are critically endangered and just one wild population remains at the Yellingbo Nature Reserve where more than 200 birds live and breed. The last recorded sighting in our area was at Upper Beaconsfield in 1980 (Woinarski and Wykes: Monash Zoology 1980). Following another visit in 1982 Wykes assumed they were extinct.

The Federal Government constituted a 'Helmeted Honeyeater Recovery Team' chaired by a scientist from DWELP and with members being an ornithologist, a botanist, a scientist from Zoos Victoria and representatives from Friends of the Helmeted Honeyeater (Yellingbo) and now one from Cardinia Shire.

For many years Zoos Victoria has run a captive breeding program at Healesville which enables birds to be released in selected places each spring.

In April 2015 a local Australian Plants Society Group called a public meeting in Beaconsfield, with help from Cardinia Council, to consider a trial reintroduction along the Cardinia Creek. More than 100 people attended and the question of a trial reintroduction was referred to the Recovery Team. Following that referral some members of the Recovery Team made two Inspection visits hosted by local enthusiasts and supported by local Parks Victoria staff. Visits were made to the following sites.

- Cardinia Crk Parklands and upstream towards Guys Hill
- Guys Hill Reserve
- Brennans Reserve along Cardinia Crk and Stony Crk,
- Beaconsfield Nature Conservation Reserve

At the time their response was quite positive and supportive of a trial reintroduction. Our expectation was that the Recovery Team would nominate actions required to improve the habitat, if required, to enhance the possible success of a trial reintroduction.

More than two years ago the Recovery Team advised that Ecology Australia had been commissioned to evaluate. That report, completed last year, nominated Guys Hill as the most suitable site in our area for a trial release.

Still after more than 5 years we have not received any instructions on what preparations we could make to prepare for a trial reintroduction. Therefore we have not been able to carry out any revegetation or apply for grants.

Meanwhile there is at least one positive. Parks Victoria, Melbourne Water and the City of Casey continue to work revegetating former farmland in the Cardinia Creek Parklands. At present a \$4 million project to improve hydrology and create wetlands on Grasmere Crk which is an important tributary of Cardinia Crk within those Parklands. Improvement of that environment is guaranteed.

The latest setback is associated with Covid-19 shutdowns. It is reported that Zoos Victoria income has been reduced to the extent they are not able to contribute to any new ventures.

At the time of the Public Meeting I was 77, now I am 82. Will there be a trial reintroduction in my lifetime? I live in hope.

## Heathcote, Harold "Horrie" Sidney

This year is the 75th Anniversary of the end of World War Two.

On 3 September 1939 Prime Minister Robert Menzies announced that Australia would be entering the war.

Beaconsfield at that time was a small rural district with a township surrounded by farming, primarily dairy, and fruit growing.

Residents would journey into the township to collect their mail, shop for supplies and to transport their children to attend school.

Locals could gather and socialise at the two hotels and on occasion there would be celebrations and gatherings at the local public hall.

Not long after the announcement of the war the local men and women began to enlist. Farewells were held at the hall, large gatherings wishing the "boys" well. They would also be given parting gifts such as a wristlet watch and a parcel of home comforts.

The Beaconsfield Patriotic Committee arranged social gatherings with dancing to raise funds in support of the local "diggers".

## Beaconsfield Farewells Six More Boys

BEACONSFIELD DISTRICT residents turned out in full force last Saturday to do honor to six more local boys who have joined the fighting forces. The guests of honor were Jim Adamson, Don Witham, Bill Qurtis, Cecil Robson, and Harold Heathcote (all AIF), and Bill Adamson (RAAF). Flying Officer Bailey and Cr. D. N. McBride eulogised the lads for coming to their country's aid in its hour of need, and Cr. McBride, on behalf of the district, made a presentation to each of the lads and wished them the best of luck. Later the old Diggers made a presentation of a fountain pen to Miss Nixon, secretary of the local Patriotic Fund in this and the last war, in appreciation of the grand work she is carrying out so enthusiastical'y and unselfishly. It was a capital night, such as only Beaconsfield can stage.

By late 1942 the impact of the war had began to take its toll on the small community. Thomas Perkin who operated the only grocery store closed his business due to a shortage of supplies. This did not discourage the young men from enlisting because that same month six more "local boys" were farewelled.

In 1938 Harold "Horrie" Heathcote, age 16, was a prefect in his final year at Dandenong High School and living with his parents Frederick and Annie Heathcote at "Eyrl Park" Clyde Road, Beaconsfield.

School completed, Horrie was employed with the State Electricity Commission and then the State Savings Bank of Victoria. He enlisted with the Citizen Military Forces in December 1938, walking out of school and down the Princes Highway to the Dandenong Drill Hall to sign up.

Horrie then joined the Australian Imperial Force in July 1942, serving in Queensland, protecting the Air Force Base on the Cape York Peninsula and on Thursday Island. During leave in June 1945, Horrie came back to Beaconsfield and married Rena Florence Emma Dawson in Christ Church, Berwick. Their reception was held in the Beaconsfield Hotel which was run by Horrie's parents (Annie & Fred Heathcote).

After a brief honeymoon, Horrie returned to military duty, joining the 1<sup>st</sup> Australian POW Contact and Inquiry work in Manila and the Division on Okinawa Island, he then flew with them to the 27<sup>th</sup> American Infantry Division on Okinawa Island. He then flew with them to mainland Japan on 7 September 1945, as a part of the occupation force.



### BEACONSFIELD BRIDE IN CLASSICAL WHITE

WHEN Miss Reno F. E. Dawson, younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. Dawson, Raifway Station, of Beaconsfield was married to Sgt. Harold S. Heathcote, A.I.F., at Christ Church, Berwick, on June 30th, friends had the church tastefully decorated for the pretty afternoon ceremony, the bride being a popular member of the church choir. Rev. W. P. Daunt was the celebrant and while the register was being signed his daughter, Miss G. Daunt, delightfully rendered "Where'ere You Walk." Mr. J. Warne officiated at the organ. The dainty bride, who was given away

The dainty bride, who was given away by her father, wore a classical frock of white crepe, the front being embossed with lace, with buttons down to the waist at the back. The yoke was of georgerte and the high neckline was finished off sweetly with a small collar. An exguisite well of limetick lace was worn and from the white ivory prayer book which the bride carried, depended a trail of gardenias. Attending her as bridesmails one had

Attending her as bridesmaids she had her sister, Beryl, and Miss Dawn Heathcoto, sister of the 'groom. Both looked lovely in pink crepe frocks made on similar lines to the brides, but with matching lace yokes. Their hats of pink crepe were trimmed with blue flowers and they carried pastel toned bouquets.

The uniformed bridegroom, who is the

only son of Mt. and Mrs. F. S. Hesthcote, of the Central Hotel, Beaconsfield was supported by Sgt.-Pilot Sydney W. Kane as best man and L.A.C. R. Sallows, as groomsman.

After the certinony 70 guests gathered at the Central Hotel. Beaconsfield for the reception. Centre of many admiring games was the attractively decorated bridal table with its 3-tier wedding cake, made by the 'groom's mother. The guests were received by the parents of the bride and 'groom.

The 'groom's gift to the bride was an eternity ring set with diamonds, and from the bride the 'groom received a leather travelling case. The bride's aister received ear-rings and an artificial orchid and the 'groom's sister a pearl necklace. When the happy couple departed for their honeymoon the bride was wearing a smart suit of powder blue, with black coat and accessories.

Arriving back in Sydney on 28 November of 1945, Horrie was discharged on 2 January 1946.

After the war Horrie returned to his position at the State Bank of Victoria and became a State Bank Manager, initially living in Dandenong and later Berwick.

Horrie was involved in Legacy and Secretary of the 52nd Battalion Reunion Group for over 50 years. In 1999, General Peter Cosgrove and Bruce Ruxton presented him with a certificate of appreciation for his service to the RSL.

On Remembrance Day 2018, Horrie represented his regiment as a dignitary at the unveiling of the Gippsland Regiment Bridge at Prospect Drive, Narre Warren. Sadly, the following year in June, Horrie died; he was described as a respected, loving and treasured husband, father and pop.
