

President's Report



Welcome to this spring edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA Website

A demolition order applied for by the owner of the Old Post Office building located at 19/21 Woods St, Beaconsfield, damaged by a recent fire, was initially considered at the Town Planning Meeting held on 7 June. As this building has a heritage overlay, BPA lodged a submission/objection to this Application for Demolition. The original building is one of the oldest in Beaconsfield and one of the oldest in Cardinia Shire with heritage values, hence the need to keep the building. An alternate motion was agreed at that council meeting that a suitable expert be appointed to review the heritage assessment of the building. This new review advised general agreement to the original heritage assessment, but it did however specify other original parts of the building that should be retained and incorporated into any future rebuild. This was a review only of the original heritage assessment. We received advice from the National Trust of Australia (Vic) concerning the proposed demolition order. The National Trust advice outlined the relevant heritage principles applicable in the demolition application and stressed the relevance of the heritage overlay. The demolition application was then included in the Council meeting agenda for 19 July 2021. The Council officers recommended approval of the demolition with some conditions including retention of some original heritage features to be incorporated into any replacement building. The Heritage Overlay remains with the property even if the Post Office land is sold or the building is demolished. Our Association emailed all councillors with additional matters since our original

submission as well as including and commenting on details contained in the National Trust of Australia (Vic) letter. Sadly all councillors present at the meeting voted in favour of the demolition order. Very disappointing for the preservation of local heritage!

The future of the Beaconsfield Reservoir and Nature Conservation Reserve is of interest to many in the community. Nothing further appears to have occurred since the General Council Meeting held on 17 May the details of which were included in my President's Report in the Winter Edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. At that Council Meeting, an Alternate Motion was passed specifying 12 requests for further information from the responsible State Government authorities and, in particular, from Melbourne Water. Cardinia Shire Council wants a long term strategic plan developed to achieve best outcomes for the environment and for the community and requested Melbourne Water not to proceed with any works on the dam until the strategic document is developed. There is nothing further to report. Unfortunately the delays and uncertainty of the future of the Beaconsfield Reservoir and BNCR continues.

Works have been finalised on the O'Neil Road intersections with Old Princes Hwy and Pink Hill Boulevard roundabout. Works have also been finalised on the intersection of Old Princes Hwy and Glismann Road. Both these intersections on Old Princes Hwy are now signalled and in operation. The work on the these intersections should improve traffic flow and safety.

An onsite meeting was held to discuss the traffic issues for the intersection of the Old Princes Hwy and Desmond Court, the extension of the path along Old Princes Hwy to the entry of Desmond Court roadway, no slip lane to safely enter Desmond Court from Old Princes Hwy, speed of traffic on Old Princes Hwy making turns into Desmond Court dangerous, difficult visibility due to trucks and school busses parking on the side of the road, and also the placement of the new light pole. The meeting was attended by Mayor Cr. Brett Owen, Council Engineers, Desmond Court residents, Senior Pastor at Beaconsfield Baptist Church and myself. As a result of the meeting, 'No Parking' signs have since been erected on Old Princes Hwy up to the front of the Beaconsfield Baptist Church. Cardinia Shire Council have prepared plans for some or all of the works discussed. Mayor Cr. Brett Owen forwarded a

letter to the Department of Transport that included letters of support from Desmond Court residents and the BPA.

The works for the upgrade of the Kath Roberts Reserve and playground equipment have been completed. Our association has assisted with the design of an interpretation sign for the park and advised of drainage problems. An official opening is planned for 1 October subject to Covid regulations.

The Council's annual Volunteers Reception and Stan Henwood Award presentation was held. Congratulations to Helen Smith of Upper Beaconsfield for winning the Stan Henwood Award and to long time Beaconsfield resident Gwen Neve, a finalist for the Award. Congratulations also to Beaconsfield resident Margaret Turner on being awarded an AOM in the Queen's Birthday Honours list.

Old Princes Highway Intersection Upgrades **Completed**

The works to upgrade Princes Highway intersections at Glismann Road/ Beaconsfield Avenue and O'Neil

Road in Beaconsfield have been completed with both intersections now fully signalised and operational.

These Princes Highway intersections are the first of several Princes Highway intersections in Cardinia Shire to be upgraded over the next three years as part of Council's Better Local Roads program. These works are being funded by Council (\$18.3M) and the Australian Government's Urban Congestion Fund (\$17.8M).

The Glismann Road/Beaconsfield Avenue intersection is now a fully signalised intersection with:

- · upgraded street lighting
- pavement widening on Old Princes Highway
- a new left turn slip lane into Beaconsfield Avenue
- an extended right turn lane into Beaconsfield Ave
- dual right turn lanes out of Beaconsfield Avenue
- pavement resurfacing; underground drainage upgrades; signalised bicycle crossings and landscaping works

The O'Neil Road intersection is now a full, signalised intersection with:

- a fully signalised t-intersection with dual rightturn lanes
- the addition of bus lanes on the Princes Highway
- dedicated signals for cyclists
- improvements to drainage and connected shared paths from Desmond Court to the Princes Highway
- a new roundabout at Pink Hill Boulevard.

These upgrades will reduce congestion, improve travel time reliability and increase access through the greater road network. Most importantly, they'll also improve safety for our community.

Where was the Beaconsfield Racecourse?

The Beaconsfield Racecourse was established in the late 1870's, it was adjacent to what is now the Central Hotel. The racecourse name varied between Beaconsfield or Berwick Racecourse and the racecourse paddock.



By the December of 1881, Beaconsfield Racecourse had an annual Horse Racing picnic which included flat racing, hurdles

and the ladies race. Prominent locals filled the administration positions to ensure that everything passed off as smoothly as possible and acting in accordance with the Victoria Racing Club rules. In 1892 the program was further extended; it was well organised with the official positions of a judge, stewards, starter, treasurer and clerk of course. The program would include time, description and prize money for each race. The Maiden Plate was one and a half mile for horses that had never won public money before; The Handicap Hurdle Race was twice around the course and over eight jumps; The Shire Handicap, twice around the course; Novelty Race twice around the course for grass feed horses only; Galloway Race, racing heats; Pony Race, once around the course and the Consolation Race, once around the course with the prize being "surplus money".

It was reported that several hundred people would attend each race meet. By 1895 the crowds had increased to almost 500 at the most popular annual race event held on Easter Monday. The course was considered to be "one of the best in the district, a good size, and very level, affording the spectators an excellent view of the races from start to finish". The Melbourne bookmakers and many punters travelled by train to attend the meet.

In the early 1880's a Beaconsfield Cricket Club was formed, they played on the ground in the centre of the track. The preliminary meeting of members was held at Key's Gippsland Hotel, where the Central Hotel now stands.

A few years later the ground hosted the first Athletic Sports Meeting and picnic, this included children and pony races. Wood chopping competitions became popular and were always well attended.

In 1890 a meeting at the now Gissing's Gippsland Hotel was held to form a football club. There was great enthusiasm for a district competition team to be played in the centre of the track.

Unfortunately the wet weather in March 1897 spoiled the annual race meeting, the crowd was significantly reduced from prior years. The horse racing did continue but the impact of the weather was to change the future use of the racecourse.

Jack Holt, the youngest son of local resident Michael Holt began his career training horses at sixteen. Jacks solid reputation of maximising a horse's performance, gave him the opportunity to train horses of local wealthy residents such as Richard Grice and the Brunt family. Jack trained and raced his horses on the Beaconsfield Racecourse. He had early success at both the Gippsland and Melbourne racecourses. Due to the very wet winter of 1908, Jack decided the mountain soil in Beaconsfield was not conducive to obtain the best performance from

the prized horses in training. This meant moving to Mordialloc and from then there was a decline of horse races at the Beaconsfield Racecourse.

Sporting clubs and the events held at the racecourse paddock ensured the local activities continued to give entertainment and provide outdoor enjoyment.



A picnic in April of 1910 would be reported as one of the most successful events, with an attendance of two thousand people. This event became an annual event which included school children with pony events, children's races, prizes and a brass band. The wood chopping competition continued to be most popular. In 1916 golf was now included in the use of the land, good links were laid out on the racecourse paddock and "a good season is anticipated". All the sport and picnics continued after the First World War, although the rain and drainage continued to be a problem.

After the end of the Second World War the use of the racecourse declined and concluded with sporting events moving to the Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve, now the Perc Allison Oval.

Council Proposes Changes to 'Open Air Fires' Laws

Following extensive community and agency consultation, Council has proposed new open air fires regulations which will be open for public exhibition for community feedback from Friday 20 August, 2021.

The proposed Open Air Fires Local Law aims to provide adequate provision for fuel reduction and fire prevention while discouraging unnecessary smoke health hazards.

The proposed local law details the regulations for open-air fires - commonly

known as 'burning off' – outside of the declared fire danger period.



This new law will provide the community with more opportunities to reduce bushfire risk through burning-off while ensuring public safety remains a key priority.

The proposed changes to local open-air burning regulations will make it easier and safer for residents to reduce fire fuel hazards on their properties.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Brett Owen said the proposed changes aimed to ensure that open air burning was used to minimise the risk of bushfire across the shire in a safe manner.

"We believe the draft local law reflects the community's feedback and balances the need for fuel reduction and fire prevention with community amenity, environmental benefits and broader public health interests.

"We encourage everyone to jump online later this week, review the proposed new regulations and provide feedback."

The proposed local law renews focus on:

- Smoke impacts on community
- · Bushfire fuel reduction and property preparation
- Burning off timeframes
- Burning off in townships
- · Alternative methods of green waste disposal
- Environmental impacts



Council is inviting feedback until Friday 17 September, and will review all feedback before deciding whether to make the local law.

Farewell Mr Methven



Last term, we farewelled Gary Methven as he retired from teaching after 43 years of working for the Department of Education and Training. Gary came to Beaconsfield Primary School in 1997 – 24 years ago. He was the Assistant Principal and then become the principal in 2001.

Over the 24 years at Beaconsfield Primary School, Gary has seen the school grow from a small school of a couple of hundred students to a school of 700 students and over 60 staff. Regardless of the size of the school, he has ensured that it continued with a community feel and building relationships was always his number one priority.

The site of the school has changed over Gary's time with additional buildings being built and playgrounds. One of Gary's favourite projects to work on was the installation of the playground at the back of the school. Gary sat with the students to ask them what they wanted in a playground. Their response was something to climb and a slide. Gary and the students then met with playground designers and many companies drew up designs for our new playground. These designs were displayed in our library and students, staff and parents could

vote on their favourite design. The winning design is now a very impressive playground that is loved by all students.

Gary was asked by our students what was his greatest achievement and this was his response:

"Some schools are built from brick and wood, but our school is built from kindness! I have enjoyed the privilege of working with so many wonderful teachers over the years; extraordinary teachers who embody our Beacy Culture. These teachers believe that every child can learn and then they shower our children with their love, care and respect; engaging and connecting them to school and each other.

"Our teachers model care and compassion to our students and take every opportunity to elevate them, praise them and build their self-esteem. Our teachers fuel a love of learning and academic pursuit, imagination, curiosity and wonder, so that our children can create their own bright futures. This is what Beacy culture is all about. During the darkest, most difficult of times of the COVID-19 pandemic, my teachers supported this community, projecting hope in every home, supporting resilience and optimism for the future in every child! I am so proud of my staff. Our teachers are my greatest achievement and my legacy to the community. The school doesn't stop when I walk out the door; Beacy's culture is much bigger than any principal because our Beacy culture runs deep in our veins and kindness flows through every heart.



"Our Beacy children are a celebration and exaltation of the human spirit and I will be a bit cheeky and claim this as my other greatest achievement shared



with their parents and teachers! Every time a child shows kindness to another, respect for their peers or teacher or compassion for others, that is a Beacy vision. Every child who strived to learn and do their best or shows

ambition or surprises us with their questions should be celebrated. When we see a child's curiosity at work or witness their sense of wonder, we know that learning will follow. I am grateful for the child with a big sense of humour or who can see the fun in their everyday life and we love to see those children with a sense of justice and integrity as they take on the work! "My life and your lives are linked forever because of the experiences and special moments we have shared here at school. Beaconsfield Primary School has been an important part of my life story and I would like to thank the parents, teachers and children who have enabled me to share their lives. As Dr Seuss wrote: 'Sometimes you will never know the value of a moment until it becomes a memory'."

We will miss seeing Mr Methven at school every day but wish him all the best for his retirement – he certainly deserves it.

A Beacon at Beaconsfield Primary School

This year we celebrate the amazing work and commitment of Ellie Dodd, who has achieved 30 years of service as a School Crossing Supervisor. Ellie has ensured the safety of children and families for the past three decades.

Ellie began her career relieving at a number of schools across the Shire of Cardinia before she settled at Beaconsfield Primary School. She has worked at this school's crossing for 29 years. Over this period, she has seen a lot of change to the

Beaconsfield community. When she commenced in 1992, it was a flagged crossing. Ellie recalls it being a very quiet crossing and only seeing students walking to and from school – never their parents.

As the growth corridor through the south-east grew, so did her job. More students, siblings and parents were using the crossing and the highway became a

busier road. The crossing was upgraded to lights and lower speed zones were introduced to ensure the

safety of all pedestrians.

Ellie is the first and last person that many of the Beaconsfield Primary School families see. They are always greeted personally with a smile and a 'hello'. Ellie does an amazing job at remembering students' and parents' names and she has seen many generations using her crossing. She loves reconnecting with families over the last 30 years.

Ellie's own children used her crossing as they attended Beaconsfield Primary School. Her three children attended the school

in the 1990s and now the second generation of the Dodd family are attending Beaconsfield Primary School, with currently three of Ellie's grandchildren at the school.

We have already received some extremely generous



private donations plus support from Beaconsfield Woolworths, and hope this initiative will continue to grow and benefit our community. Any time the Centre is open, the shelves can be accessed with no confrontation or judgement. During lockdowns, the Centre will be open during the same time as when our Children's Programs are running.



Beaconsfield CFA Update



As we enter spring, it is important to get prepared for the summer of 2021/22, and is time to revisit your fire plan if you live in the urban rural interface.

Why is this important? People don't plan to fail, they just fail to plan. So, ask yourself the following:

In the event of an emergency evacuation, are the following important issues on your radar?

- 1. Important documents like passports, photos and other irreplaceable items.
- 2. Pets; what arrangements are in place and do you have a carry cage for transport.
- 3. Ensure all family members are fully accounted for on an extreme fire danger day.
- 4. Home and contents insurance up to date and with current values reflected in the cover insured.
- 5. In the case of extreme weather event ensure you have plans in place to leave the night before or early on the day before temperatures and wind become extreme.

If you wait for the advice, it may be too late to leave your property. Remember, on extreme days a fire truck may not be available to attend your property. The brigade has had the normal number of calls with two calls of note to St Fancies Xavier. The first was for smoke issuing from the roof of the school. This was a serious situation that required a full-scale evacuation of the school. The fire was brought under control quickly and the staff and children could then return to class. The second was a major gas leak at the school with another evacuation. The brigade would like to thank the school staff for successfully implementing their fire plan which was highly successful in its implementation.

The brigade has held its biannual elections with the position of Captain being filled by Phil Walton who has moved up from first lieutenant. The brigade would like to thank the outgoing Captain Marc Graham for his strong leadership and unwavering commitment to the role of Captain. He was instrumental in leading the brigade to our new fire station and the permanent allocation of a new fire truck to meet the needs of the township. It is a difficult and challenging role that only those that have had the honour of leading a brigade would understand. Thank you Marc.




one of several used to support the building when it was raised up from its foundations for the move.

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Margaret Turner Receives Australia Day Honours

Margaret Turner, a long-term Beaconsfield resident, was awarded an Order of Australia Medal in the Queen's Birthday Honour List, for "Service to Youth through Scouts".



Since she is an avid walker many residents would have seen Margaret around the district especially with her beloved corgi "Ruby".

Margaret moved to Beaconsfield as a vibrant young woman, worked in Dandenong, and with the encouragement of friends established the first scouting group in Beaconsfield - First Beaconsfield Cub Scouts which is now combined with Officer. It consisted of a small group of boys aged 8 to 11 years, with numbers fluctuating over the years. At that time Margaret knew little of scouting procedures – compass, knots, maps – but was a fast learner and a very effective "Akela" {Mother Wolf}. She went on to train many prospective leaders with weekend training sessions held in Traralgon where she was known as "Raksha" (trainer). Margaret well remembers the long hikes with the boys and the exchange pack visits with city cubs who were amazed by country life in "Sleepy Beacy".

Meetings were held each Thursday in the Lodge Hall in Railway Avenue and later in the Community Hall

which was near the current location of ALDI. She remained involved in the Scouting Movement for the next 60 years. She held many positions during those years including District Treasurer of Cardinia Scouts and as a Warranted Leader was awarded the Silver Emu and the National President's Award. Margaret became Assistant Regional Commissioner in 1979 and retained that position until 1997. There are many Beaconsfield families whose children Margaret assisted to become responsible citizens.

Now officially retired from Scouting except for social meetings with past leaders, Margaret is still involved in her community particularly with PROBUS. When asked what changes she has seen in Beaconsfield since she moved here, her answer is "Lots!"

Despite a reluctance to accept any accolades, Margaret certainly deserves her well earned honour which will be formally presented at Government house in October.


While we're learning new repertoire for our community trivia afternoon and showcase concert on 18 September (watch our website




Beaconsfield Rainfall Data

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Local MP Calls For Station Upgrades

A few weeks ago, some representatives of the Beaconsfield Progress Association, along with a reporter from the Pakenham Gazette, met with our local Victorian Member for Gembrook, Brad Battin MP to discuss the state of the Beaconsfield Train Station.

With the Victorian Government 'Big Build' Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) coming closer to Beaconsfield, it was a good time to discuss the poor condition of the Beaconsfield Station and why it has, for the most part, been overlooked when so many other stations on the Pakenham line have been upgraded or completely replaced with first class facilities.

We have been fortunate recently to have had the car parking capacity at the station increased with an additional 150 parking spaces built near Station Street just beyond the far end of the station platform, beyond the former Station Master's house, completed in 2020. There have also been upgrades to the existing parking area as well as the addition of a new secure storage cage for bicycles.

While all these works have been greatly appreciated by the public, the platform and its facilities, however, have been neglected for many years. The station is very outdated and in some areas is deteriorating badly.

The first noticeable issue is that beyond the small platform building, there is no shelter anywhere along the length of the platform. This is an issue during the morning commuter rush (pre-Covid), and particularly in the winter when there is very little shelter from the rain.



It will then be noted that the toilet block located about halfway along the platform is permanently closed, and has been for some years. In fact it has been neglected for so long the downpipes

have rusted away and the doors, while chained closed, still swing open enough to allow a view inside to the jumble of mess and filth.

If you are someone who is disabled and using a wheelchair, you will need to

make your way to the handicap signs at the far end of the platform, to await your train. On the city

bound side (Platform 1) this is not such a distance, however if you are travelling towards Pakenham on Platform 2, you will need to make your way around 200 metres to an isolated and largely fenced off area at the far end. And on either platform, if the weather is bad, you will have no shelter there either.

These were all issues Mr. Battin was concerned about. "I've had so many from the community calling for the urgent need of an upgrade for Beaconsfield Station," he said, "not only for the toilet facilities but a number of people living with a disability needing shelter on the platform where they wait to board the train." He also said the lack of toilets is "illogical".

The State Liberal Party had committed to an upgrade to the station at the last State election. Mr. Battin stated that he would like to see the main entrance to the platform relocated closer to where the parking is situated, either with an additional entrance at the opposite end or in the middle of the platform.

Work will soon be starting on the Level Crossing removal on Station Street. It is understood to be a car over track design, although no final plans have been available for public display.

Beaconsfield Cricket Club has recognised the on and off-field champions of its almost 100 year existence at a grandiose Hall of Fame function at the Cardinia Cultural Centre.

A total of 44 players, volunteers and administrators were inducted into the inaugural Hall of Fame, on an emotional night for a club that was first established in 1922.

In addition, six teams of the decade were announced to the 220 strong crowd, along with two 25 year silver jubilee teams, and numerous service awards acknowledging the unsung heroes of the Beaconsfield Cricket Club.

Club president, historian, inductee, and Hall of Fame committee member Mick McMahon, said the event would go down as one of the more special occasions in the long and proud history of the club.

"It was a very special event, and the feedback I have received from the Beaconsfield faithful is that it is probably the grandest and most glamourous event in the history of the cricket club," McMahon said.

McMahon said the club was blessed with a rich history and had a story that needed to be told.

"I took over as club historian about eight years ago now, and started calculating things like games played, runs made, wickets taken, premierships won, and it all just progressed from there," McMahon said.

"It soon became apparent that we had so much information, it was just a matter of what do we do with it all.

"I started looking at other clubs and what they had done, with hall of fames and team of the decades, that type of thing, and gained some ideas from there. We had very little in that regard, but we had the information to make something happen."

McMahon and his fellow Hall of Fame committee members Nathan Boon, Brendan Ewert, Penny McMahon, Kylie Southgate and Sean Young, set about organising an event that would encapsulate the spirit of the club.

"Some of the stats, from people who were at the club for a short time, were just incredible, and just talking to people made me realise there were so many contributors who really hadn't been recognised in the past.

"Handing out service awards and recognising those who had not quite made it to life membership status, that was one of the most important parts of the evening."

McMahon said the club had been blessed with some wonderful cricketers over the years.

"It's not just my opinion, it's pretty wide spread, that Mark Betheras is the standout cricketer in the club's history," he said.

"It's hard to single players out, but others like Ron Allan, George Cunningham and Alan Richards would be up there on a list of the best players at this club."

Highlights of the night included interviews conducted by Hall of Fame inductee Anthony Thomas, who welcomed Betheras and legendary figure Ron Garth to the stage.

Garth, a leg-spinner, took over 100 wickets in the 1964/65 season. He presented McMahon with the ball, 56 years later, at the function.

McMahon said the deeds of Ron Garth, who took 100 wickets in a season, held legendary status at the club.

McMahon paid special thanks to the commitment and dedication of the Hall of Fame committee, and



also to Pakenham Cricket Club president Phil Anning for doing a wonderful job as master of ceremonies.

Attendees received a 96-page history of the Beaconsfield Cricket Club, along with a special gift bag.
