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
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President's Report

Open Air Fires Local Law 20

Cardinia Shire Council's Open Air Fires Local Law 20 changes were adopted at the Council Meeting held on 20 June, 2022. There were some changes to the existing policy. In particular, a new Urban and Township Zone was included which only allows burn-offs at the discretion of Council after permits are applied for each burn-off. At that meeting, it was adopted that properties north of Holm Park Road (nos. 41-123) be zoned as Bushland and Peri-Urban, and would be able to burn-off without a permit on four specific days of the week and with a permit on the other three days. This policy is subject to future reviews.

Community Power Hubs

As reported in the previous Beaconsfield Banner, work is being undertaken to consider the community interest in power saving initiatives, renewable energy and planning for a more environmentally friendly future. Community Power Hubs are being established across Victoria to assist communities to facilitate and implement renewable energy projects.

Cardinia Creek Regional Parklands

The Cardinia Creek Regional Parklands will encompass more than 600ha of parkland from Beaconsfield to Clyde on both sides of Cardinia Creek.

The Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP), have been undertaking the Cardinia Creek Regional Parklands Future Directions Plan refresh project in conjunction with the project partners. The project partners include Parks Victoria, Cardinia Shire Council, City of Casey, Melbourne Water, and DELWP. Other invited project partners include the Committees of Management for Akoonah Park and Beaconsfield Recreation Reserve, and Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation.

At its heart, the plan recognises and embeds the rights and values of the Traditional Owners, the Bunurong people, in the planning and management of the Parklands, and responds to the continued urban expansion in the region. It responds to the pressing need to mitigate climate change, protect, and enhance biodiversity, and contribute to improved community health and wellbeing. The Plan aims to create a shared vision and commitment for the co-management of the expanded parklands to collaboratively expand Cardinia Creek Regional Parklands by working towards a continuous chain of parks and reserves. It will form the basis for design and implementation planning of the Parklands over the next 10-15 years and will help shape future funding and partnership opportunities.

The draft Cardinia Creek Future Directions Plan sets out principles and direction for (Continued on page 6)

progressive parklands expansion, establishment, and management to be achieved by 2040.

The draft Plan was open for community consultation and all feedback regarding the Draft Cardinia Creek Regional Parklands Future Directions Plan is being reviewed, due for completion in October 2022.

LXRP upgrades of Brunt Road and Station Street Beaconsfield



The Victorian Government is removing 85 dangerous and congested level crossings by 2025, including the level crossings at Brunt Road and Station Street in Beaconsfield.

The level crossings will be removed by building new road bridges over the Pakenham Line. Removing these level crossings will help to create a level crossing-free Pakenham Line, which will change how locals live, work and travel. Early site investigations are underway, with the project expected to be complete by 2025. Early works are due to commence on Brunt Road towards the end of the year with major construction underway next year. For more information, visit

Council's free Green Waste drop-off program



Cardinia Shire Council's free green waste drop-off program is continuing through to December 2022. Council's green waste drop-off events are a free service accepting residential amounts of green waste including flowers, garden prunings, grass clippings, leaves, tree branches, weeds and trunks (up to 30 centimetres wide and 1 metre long). Residents must present photo ID as proof of residence within Cardinia Shire to access the free service.

Waste will only be accepted from residential vehicles and trailers; commercial business operators cannot use this service.



Smarter Station Parking for Beaconsfield



New trial technology rolled out by the Victorian State Government at train stations in

Melbourne's south-east is making it easier for commuters to plan their journey.

Since February this year, new parking technology has been telling passengers at Beaconsfield and Berwick stations what car parking spaces are available before they even leave home.

The trial is part of the Government's Car Parks for Commuters program, which is delivering upgrades at Victorian railway stations to make it easier for everyone to catch the train.

Live car parking information is shared through the dedicated Smart Car Parking Trial app, providing real time information about where spaces are available.

> A number of technologies have been trialled, including computer analysis of live camera feeds, and in-bay sensors to detect car park occupancy and usage.

The trial has been running for several months, with an online survey. Feedback from the survey will help inform a potential future rollout of the technology.

The Beaconsfield Flora and Fauna Reserve, Cardinia Creek Sanctuary is a lovely place for a walk through native local bush with local birds and wildlife. It is the area alongside Beaconsfield Emerald Road between Holm Park Road and Payne Road. The Friends group have been helping with maintenance and care.

At present it looks like they may need to close FOCCS. The issue is not the number of people needed to plant trees, but people who are interested in committee roles and/or just leading a working bee.

These people do not need to be able to climb hills or plant trees, only do a small part of the admin work or leading a working group in just a supervisory role, that is sign people in and out, hand out equipment and plants, etc, and enjoy the weather as everyone else is busy planting.

There is a meeting on Saturday 3 September at 2pm at Akoonah Park in the 'Men's Shed' (Gate 4)

This will be the AGM and the hope is to continue the group. The key discussion point at this meeting will be whether the group continues to work at the reserve or will the group close and stop all work. This will completely depend on having people who are willing to help in admin or supervisory positions.

The hope is for new members and many past members to be willing to return. They have the love for the bush, knowledge, etc.

But those without any knowledge of the work can come too.

Some have joined for social reasons when they moved to the area and didn't know the difference between a weed or a local native plant.

The hope for the AGM is to believe that "many hands make light work" so the positions are not overwhelming.

Brookfield - A new respite care service in Beaconsfield By Diane Gow

Over a year ago we moved to Beaconsfield to set up a respite care service on a hobby farm of ten acres. It has been an exciting year full of adventures and not a few dramas, mostly related to the many animals we seem to have accumulated!

Who lives on the farm? – Luckily we have eight bedrooms, so room for four family members who saw all that space and promptly moved back home!

Two of my sons help out with maintenance, IT and supporting the people who come to stay with us. We also have a part time support worker and three casual staff who help

out when we are busy. We have a lovely mental health nurse Deb who comes in when needed and the excellent Occupational Therapists from *All Walks of Life* at Emerald. My background is in the

disability field and retired last year after fifty years of full time work. But running Brookfield is not really a retirement!

Who comes to stay? – We generally have adults to stay who have an NDIS package of funding. Our home cannot support people in wheelchairs or who

have complex needs. But we can support adults with mild/moderate intellectual disabilities and individuals with mental health needs. We also support two young people who come for day activities. We have three



guest bedrooms and are open from Tuesday to Saturday. There are usually two people staying during the week and sometimes we use the third room for emergencies. Our service mostly supports older carers who have a son or daughter who may not have been away from home. And younger



people come to us to develop independent living skills. We also have individuals with mental health issues who benefit from a rural environment and a supportive home.

What animals do we have on the farm? - We came to the farm with our two dogs and cat but now have three horses, two donkeys, two miniature goats, two alpacas, a donkey foal (Lenny), hens and assorted guinea pigs and rabbits. Animal adventures include raising five orphaned rabbits, one donkey foal and last month the rescue of Buddy the pony who fell in the creek. The Beaconsfield CFA came to the rescue and expertly extracted him along with our vet and he was fine apart from being very muddy and cold!

Who volunteers – We have a lovely young woman Elisha who comes two days a week to care for the animals, Jackson a local high school student comes on Saturdays to help, and the Beaconsfield Facebook residents and Holm Park Road neighbours provide a never ending stream of items including gardening tools, craft materials, succulents and practical help. We have been made so welcome by our local community and also Brett Owen our local councillor has been very supportive.

If you have children or just like animals and a cuppa do contact me and come to visit. Our animals always appreciate a pat and some carrots!

Pink Hill By Alex Smart

Why Pink Hill Boulevard?

Ten years ago my wife Wendy and I built in Olde Beaconsfield. Moving from the Western Suburbs we didn't know much about the history of Beaconsfield but were willing to learn.

Over the past 2 years it was interesting to watch the improvements being made to intersections on the Old Princes Highway with O'Neill and Glismann Roads. I was surprised to see the size and traffic capacity at the roundabout on O'Neill Road which allows turns into Pink Hill Boulevard. My reaction was to ask "Why Pink Hill Boulevard?" That question led me to wonderful information being provided by many BPA supporters (refer credits).

Charles Knott built Kenilworth Cottage¹ in 1888 and what is now known as Pink Hill was given the name Knotts Hill. That name did not stick and in early 1900's Pink Hill came into common use. With what I have learned over the past couple of months I think the name Pink Hill may have been in common use much earlier than 1888 because field stones exposed on the surface would have been a good pink colour.

For locals Pink Hill referred to the sharp steep hill on the old Princes Hwy approximately between O'Neill Road and May Road. Until the 1960's the Princes Highway was a single 2 lane road which snaked up Pink Hill in an S-bend as the hill was too steep to be negotiated by horse-powered carts or buggies. Pink Hill became notorious as a Black Spot for fatal accidents. Alex Burgess reports that some locals used alternative tracks around to May Rd and so avoiding the dangerous climb up the hill.

Major changes to the Princes Highway affecting Pink Hill occurred in three stages. In the 1960's the critical safety issues were addressed and a deep road cutting was constructed to eliminate the S-bends and the single two lane road could sweep around towards Officer/Pakenham. The Pink colour developed on rocks both sides of that cutting. More changes occurred in the 1970's when the cutting was significantly widened to accommodate 4 lanes resulting in the existing rock face on the north side. That almost vertical cutting is about 8 metres high and 200m long and now provides a good site for viewing the rock face where around 70% of the

rock shows a good pink colour. Native trees planted in conjunction with the roadworks almost obscure the view of the Pink Rock face from the road. Please be careful if you park on the grass 100m past the pedestrian crossing to inspect the rock face as cars can be doing 70kmph.

Then around 1983 in conjunction with the construction of the Berwick Bypass the south side of the old cutting was removed and a huge graded bank was created to provide lanes to access the freeway. That graded bank is not showing any signs of pink rock.

Is the Rock Truly Pink?

The attractive pink colour is only on the surface. The composition of the rock is in layers which are fairly crumbly making it unsuitable for use in walls or buildings. It seems the rock would need to be exposed to the atmosphere and rainwater for some time to allow a chemical reaction with naturally occurring metals or compounds to produce the pink surface colour.



What causes the pink colour and how long the reaction takes is subject of investigation. Ian Chisholm put me in contact with Dr James Driscoll, a geologist from Monash Uni. Jim visited the cutting site and enthusiastically collected samples of Pink Rock for laboratory analysis. I was hoping his report would be available for the *Beaconsfield Banner* summer edition. It will be good to have an insight into the process which results in the pink surface on the rock and possibly some comments on the geological origins of Pink Hill.

Where Else Can Pink Rock Be Seen?

A block of land at 3 Fraser Daley Court is currently for sale. Part of the site has been cut and levelled in



preparation for a house and a good range of pink colours are evident. A few metres of gutter opposite 8 Glismann Road is showing fairly good pink colour. Almost immediately past the lights where traffic from the freeway turns left towards Beaconsfield there is an access road to a property. The end of a small retaining wall has been trimmed with some lovely pink field stones.

From what I have been told and learned it seems that pink rock at Beaconsfield is restricted to about one square kilometre. Pink Rock of this nature, while not being unique, may not be common. The only other reference I could find for Victoria was for Pink Cliffs Geological Reserve, Heathcote.

across May Road. For an appreciation of the future

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

break free of Winter and head into Spring!

More than one million households have signed up for the latest round of the Victorian Government \$250 Power Saving Bonus, which is helping people to find a better energy plan for their needs. My office have been helping lots of people across Eastern Victoria to apply, so please get in touch or head to https://compare.energy.vic.gov.au if you haven't already received your payment.

Even though this year's winter season has been and gone, it's still important to stay up to date with your vaccinations. If you haven't booked your booster shot or your flu vaccination, head to your local pharmacy, GP, or local vaccination site, and tick it off your to-do list. Getting vaccinated can be stressful,

but it means that your body will be healthier and better prepared to deal with whatever comes its way.

With October just around the corner it's also important to remember that grass pollen season is fast approaching, and with it comes increases in asthma and hay fever symptoms, as well as an increased risk of epidemic thunderstorm asthma, a unique weather event where grass pollen grains are swept up in thunderstorm winds and release particles small enough to be breathed deep into our lungs. While thunderstorm asthma events are rare, they can seriously affect people who suffer from asthma or hay fever, so it's important to be aware of the risk and take precautions. The VicEmergency website and app provide a daily risk forecast throughout grass pollen season and is an invaluable resource to help you avoid potential triggers and manage your asthma or hay fever.

I would also encourage people to wear a mask in settings where physical distancing isn't possible, to

The Charles Nott Story. Reprinted from the Beaconsfield Banner, Spring 2017



Charles James George Nott was born on 16 March 1844 in Marylebone, Middlesex, England. His parents, Robert and Martha Nott, decided to seek their fortune in Australia as some extended family had already immigrated.

On 25 August 1852 aboard the ship 'Priam' Robert, Martha and their four children arrived in Melbourne, Australia. Shortly after in 1853 eldest daughter Martha married Charles Hayes in Melbourne. After the marriage Robert Nott and his son-in-law Charles moved north and operated a carrier business in the Beechworth area. By 1859 they had moved to Chinaman's Flat near Maryborough, a gold mine district. It is recorded that Charles' interest

was in carpentry rather than mining. He built his parents a house and another house for himself to live in with his bride, cousin Matilda Catherine Nott, whom he married at St James Church, Melbourne on 14 March 1872. The following year they began their

family with the birth of a daughter, Malvina Matilda.

By 1874 Charles had filed at the local court of insolvency. Charles and Matilda left Chinaman's Flat for the Melbourne suburb Prahran. Charles established himself in the building business as a contractor, employing architects and skilled tradesman to build palatial homes. While the business continued and their family grew they lived in homes owned by their extended family until the Discharge of Insolvency was completed on 17 July 1883. Charles built his new mansion 'St. Cloud' in Grandview Grove, Prahran. As the 1880's continued so did the portfolio of properties Charles purchased and developed. This would extend to the purchase of land in Beaconsfield to build his family a country residence. He had plans not only to build his own mansion but to subdivide the acreage purchased near the railway station and along the Gippsland Road (Princes Highway) for building purposes. Charles built the magnificent mansion, 'Kenilworth Villa', at Beaconsfield. The reason for the name 'Kenilworth' is unknown. Kenilworth in Warwickshire, England is some distance from Marylebone where Charles was born and lived so this reason seems unlikely. Perhaps Matilda and their daughters named the villa after the novel 'Kenilworth A Romance' written Sir Walter Scott.

Unfortunately speculation and building was about to end most abruptly best described as follows in April 1892.

Victorian Property Collapse a 'disaster'.

A leading London finance journal yesterday published a report which branded Melbourne's property collapse as a 'chain of disasters'. The Economist said the scale of the collapse in Melbourne was the worst in the history of the colonies. The litany of financial failures, it said, had highlighted the need for colonial governments to curtail their loan expenditure. Over 50 large and small banks, building societies and property companies in NSW, Victoria and Queensland have been forced to suspend payment over the past 6 months. British investors as well as individual Australian depositors, had lost millions thanks to the collapse of the property market. It was felt that the promotion of the land boom had over rated the value. An enormous amount of money, in the shape

substantially built on stone foundations, containing grand entrance hall,10ft and 8ft wide, 12 rooms (32 x 21,22 x 16, 20 x 16, 18 x 16) principal ones all handsomely decorated. French polished dados, wardrobes, mantles and over mantles, bathroom (hot and cold water), storeroom, laundry, servants room, 300ft of broad veranda all round, six tanks, brick stables (Four stalls), double coach house, man's and harness room, hay loft other tanks etc. the land comprising 38 acres laid out in orchard and flower garden, ornamental lakes, etc.

Lot 2 Close to the above, Weatherboard Villa containing seven rooms light & power and decorated, bathroom, pantry, laundry, two small stable coach house, man's room, two tanks. Land about 3 1/2 acres fruit and flower garden.



After the sale of 'Kenilworth' to Montague Cohen, Charles and Matilda selected land at Budgeree near Mirboo North which the government had opened up for settlement. They named their new property 'Kenilworth Park' where Charles' occupation was recorded as grazier until he died in 1907.

'Kenilworth Villa' became a Foundling home in 1913. After the Foundling home was closed in 1940, it was rented to many people and fell into disrepair. Kenneth

and Hilda Tozer purchased the villa in 1963 with plans to renovate but decided to demolish and build a new home which incorporated some of the materials from the villa.

Today Charles Nott's villa is a distant past, all that remains are the stables which have been converted into a home and the weatherboard house, known as the Railway House.

of capital and deposits, is locked up, and the income accruing from it ceased, partly because paralysis inevitably fell upon the market in real estate, and partly because colonial depositors taking alarm have for some time past been drawing out faster than the British depositors paid in. Among the Melbourne companies that sunk in early 1892 are the freehold Investment and Banking Co, the Victorian Mortgage and Deposit Bank and the English and Australian Mortgage Bank. The collapse was a 'domino effect' bringing an end to the boom of the 1880's.

On 21 April 1892 Charles Nott instructed the public auction of his properties which included 'Kenilworth' and described as follows;

Lot 1; Beaconsfield Almost adjoining the Railway station- Commodious family residence well and



Wearing a mask is a simple way to help reduce the spread of infectious diseases in our communities, and mask-wearing is an effective way for people with asthma or hay fever to manage their symptoms and avoid triggers. In either case, it's an effective tool to keep your community healthier.

If you're a casual or contract worker, you may be eligible for the government-funded Victorian Sick Pay Guarantee. This provides up to five days' pay so that workers don't have to choose between going to work while they're sick or losing a day's pay. It's worth your time to find out if you're eligible, so please contact my office if you'd like to find out more.




