### **President's Report**



Welcome to this Summer Edition of the Beaconsfield Banner. The Banner is available on our BPA website <u>www.beaconsfield.org.au</u> and printed copies are available from a number of local businesses including the Beaconsfield Post Office.

An important local issue is the Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) and, in particular, the level crossing at Station Street, Beaconsfield. On behalf of members and the community, BPA organised a Zoom meeting with LXRP on Tuesday 25 October. The meeting was hosted by LXRP and went for half an hour mostly with their staff speaking. Questions were submitted online, however any questions with any reference to the Old Railway House were not discussed. The LXRP have stated a preferred option for a route diagonally south from the Goff St, Beaconsfield Ave and Station St intersection through the Old Railway House property (proposed to be compulsorily acquired and demolished) then an overpass bridge across the railway line and Kenilworth Ave and then joining a new roundabout at Kenilworth Ave. The only way to make representations to LXRP was to complete a survey which has now closed. A petition has been organised by some closely affected residents and hopefully the community will demonstrate their concerns to save this heritage listed house and sign the petition. The final plans for this LXRP project need to be approved by the Minister of Planning. There is considerable community support for the campaign to save the Old Railway House and Bunya Bunya tree.

The proposed capital works at Beaconsfield War Memorial and Bonette Reserve was discussed at the October BPA Meeting. Draft concept plans were presented at that meeting. Subsequently pop-up sessions at Bonette Reserve were held on Sunday 13th November and Wednesday 16th November. An online consultation format was available between 28th October and 25th November at www.cardinia.vic/gov.au/haveyoursay. BPA members and the community have provided Council with thoughts and comments for the design to best meet our community expectations.

Discussions are being held to consider the community interest in power saving initiatives, renewable energy and planning for a more environmentally friendly future. The Upper Beaconsfield Green Initiative Group have held meetings to discuss various issues including completion of a survey to establish community interest, green initiatives, partnerships with power companies, educating the community, etc. Two BPA members have attended these meetings. If you are interested in solar, home energy efficiency microgrids, and being part of a local Green Initiatives Group then please email secretary@beaconsfield.com.au so initial interest

can be assessed.

At the Cardinia Shire Annual Statutory Council Meeting held on 7th November, Cr Tammy Radford was elected as Mayor and Cr Jack Kowarzik was elected as Deputy Mayor. We offer them our congratulations and best wishes for the year ahead in these important roles.

Unfortunately it has been determined that, due to excessive recent rain, Carols by the Creek will not be able to be held at Bob Burgess Reserve this year, and several other venues are either unavailable or unsuitable. The organisers had explored all the options but sadly have to cancel the event this year.

The Beaconsfield Banner is produced by volunteers with costs of printing and overhead expenses covered by advertising revenue and grants from Cardinia Shire Council and from Australian Government for Regional and Local Newspaper Publishers.

Bonette Reserve landscape improvements

Cardinia Shire Council invites community feedback on a draft concept plan for Bonette Reserve, Beaconsfield.

Council has developed a draft concept plan to

guide landscape improvements to the reserve.

Bonette Reserve is located at the corner of Woods Street and Old Princes Highway in Beaconsfield and includes the Beaconsfield War Memorial.

Council is keen to incorporate the community's ideas into the final concept plans.

The reserve holds a special place in the heart of the community and the Beaconsfield township.

We want to ensure the reserve plans sensitively consider the heritage context of the site.

We also want to look to create a distinctive public space that offers a place of reflection and ceremony, develop a strong connection to Bob Burgess Reserve and Cardinia Creek, and provide access for all abilities and members of our community.


This is your chance to share your ideas about the future of the reserve through the development of the concept design. We look forward to seeing lots of members of the local Beaconsfield community at a drop-in session – or pop online to provide your comments or fill out a survey.

The draft concept plan outlines improvements to the reserve including provision of accessible parking bay, seating, paths, paving, planting, lighting as well as maintaining existing significant trees and improving accessibility and safety.

#### LXRP upgrades at Brunt Road and Station Street Beaconsfield

The Victorian Government is making the Pakenham line level crossing free by 2025, including the level

crossings at Brunt Road and Station Street in Beaconsfield.

Early works are underway on Brunt Road with major construction underway next year. Works will get underway on Station Street as designs develop in 2023. For more information, visit www.cardinia.vic.gov.au/lxrp

Council does have serious concerns regarding the LXRP in Station St Beaconsfield given that the plans include acquiring the historically significant building namely Railway House at 20 Beaconsfield Avenue in order to construct a bridge over rail.

Council recognises the value of Station Master's House and the adjacent tree to the community as heritage significance. We are aware of the community's concerns and recognise how crucial it is to protect this heritage property.

Council is considered a stakeholder in the design process and will seek to influence outcomes, although council will not be final decision maker, this will be the Minister for Planning who will determine the outcome of the project. In the formal engagement for the project Council has provided a submission alongside the community's submissions emphasising the importance of protection of this heritage site.





Beaconsfield residents have long enjoyed the festive season.

In the lead up to Christmas day in 1969 many families were celebrating achievements accomplished throughout the year.

The 1st Beaconsfield Scouting group were celebrating the presentation of the Queens Scout badge to Beaconsfield Rover Squire, Alan Johnston. Alan received the first ever such award for the 1st Beaconsfield Group, the BBQ celebration was well attended by dignitaries and guests.

Linda Tudden, a student at the Beaconsfield State School received the "Citizen Award" for her work in

assisting the senior citizens walkathon and the Egg Appeal.

Marjorie Watson of Station Street, Officer passed her exams to become a registered nursing aide at the Eye and Ear Hospital in Melbourne.

The Beaconsfield Fire Brigade received from the Country Fire Authority a new 4 x 4 truck, which was much appreciated for the potential firefighting season.

Businesses published their gratitude in the local

newspapers to those residents that frequented their establishment.

Messages included "Greetings for Christmas 1969, with best wishes for your health, happiness and prosperity throughout the coming year." Advertisements for gifts and Christmas fare, were prominent in the newspapers encouraging

readers to prepare and purchase for the festive season celebration. Many gifts were promoted as "the perfect gift for the whole family", such as the Sparklets Soda Syphon being one such gift. A

traditional gift for men was often a practical item, and in particular in 1969 the favourites were

> binoculars or a multitool, which incorporated a wire cutter, ice breaker, nut-cracker, cork opener, tin opener, screw driver, and piercer. The local Pharmacy's recommendation for women was a classic French perfume, other popular items for this year were Psychedelic diaries, notebooks, address books and telephone books. There were also street stalls or the school fair for the purchase of gifts, generally "homemade" or "home grown" items. Beautiful personal presents for mothers and

grandmothers were always well received, including hand decorated nightwear or a knitted cardigan.

Gift giving for the young was highly promoted to encourage popularity, and in 1969 the most coveted by children were the Nerfball, Sindy Doll, Model Apollo Moon Rocket, Risk Board Game and the Malvern Star Bike.

It was a particularly busy time for Santa, visiting the State School with his sack of gifts. Santa would give a present, most often a book. Children would often have a fancy dress day and perform dances to

entertain their parents or perform the Nativity Play. Young people from various groups presented concerts for their end of school year at the



Young people from various groups presented concerts for their end of school year at the Beaconsfield Hall, since demolished. There were Christmas Parties and the Carols by Candlelight evenings to attend, carols sung by the crowd attending accompanied by the local Brass Bands.

The festive season may have

changed since 1969 but without doubt all those who enjoy the celebration will create a special gathering which will continue to include delicious food and gift giving.



### Historic Beaconsfield Railway House Eyed For Demolition By Fran Healy

I begin this article with a question

"What will Beaconsfield look like without the Railway House (Station Master's Residence) standing proudly near the Beaconsfield Station since its completion over 150 years ago?"

What will Beaconsfield feel like when our daily walk, or drive, or commute means we no longer glimpse a scene from long ago when life was simple?

Imagine our town when we no longer see the red letterbox with number 20 on it and smile. This is about to become a reality for all of us in the very near future.

The proposed Level Crossing Replacement Project in Station St Beaconsfield means that the Victorian Government will acquire Railway House and demolish it in order to build a very big bridge over a very small railway line with no real advantage.

The Railway House was built in 1888 by local builder James Adamson for Charles Nott. Over the years it has been a family home, a Ladies College and a holiday home as well as the Station Master's Residence. The original property number can still be found above the door! It has witnessed the growth of Beaconsfield from a quiet country town to the bustling community it is today.

The bunya bunya pine planted at the front of the Railway house although a remnant of the Kenilworth Gardens of the 1880's was planted when Railway House foundations were laid in 1888 so is in fact as old as the house. It is a very healthy, rare example of its type and is now on the significant trees listing.

It has become a landmark known by all when describing Beaconsfield and surrounds. It is featured in books about the history of Beaconsfield.

When purchased by Ian and Yvonne Cole in 2002 it leaked, was rundown and neglected. Ian and Yvonne spent years and much money ensuring that this special house was restored as faithfully as possible. Inside and out, it is testament to their attention to detail, and the carpentry, restoration skills and patience of Ian.

Yvonne created a wonderful garden and painted metres and metres of wall, cornices and skirting boards!! They jumped through all the hoops Heritage Victoria presented to them despite being initially told it was external control colour only.

As a neighbour, and friend, I know how much they loved living there and being a part of the Beaconsfield *Photo: Peake Real Estate* 



community. Ian epitomised this by being a great spokesman and champion of all that is great about Beaconsfield, especially its history. He wrote many articles in the Beaconsfield Banner detailing their renovation ups and downs.

When Ian and Yvonne reluctantly sold in 2018 to move to a smaller property the current owners moved in with the same determination to preserve

this beautiful home for future generations. They see themselves only as custodians of this property for Beaconsfield in the many years to come. They love living there and take great pride in ensuring they continue to add to the story of the Railway House but it is first and foremost their home.

The news that this beautiful home, and heritage

property, is to be acquired and demolished was sad and shocking news to hear indeed. The official notices from the LXRP made no mention that the property being acquired was the Railway House and there is no understanding or appreciation that it has such significance for the community. It would be devastating for anyone to hear that what was your home was going to be taken and you had absolutely no say in the process. We feel for the owners and this is now a

call to arms for our very tight knit Beaconsfield community. It is like this home belongs to all of us, we see it on our travels around the town and have almost taken it for granted over the years.

We do not want this to happen, we need to object in the strongest possible way to those responsible that the Railway House must stay. In order for this to happen we need people power and the power of (Continued on page 14)

your voices. Our democracy demands that we be heard because this affects us, our community and the future generations to show that we value our past. Too many of our heritage buildings have been lost to us over the past few years. The Old Post Office in Woods St was torn down and a lonely space now stands as a reminder every day.

Instead of the Railway House there will be a bridge over the road and two roundabouts, one of which will be constructed in the Cardinia Creek Parkland. The justification for removing the level crossing was that it was congested and dangerous but it fulfills neither of those criteria, in fact we would argue that roundabouts create their own congestion, especially at peak time when traffic is approaching the roundabout from all directions as is the case at Soldiers Rd and Kangan Dr. The wetlands flora and fauna will be adversely affected during construction and the engineering feat of ensuring the stability of the bridge is challenging indeed with the whole area being recently under significant flooding. The speed with which these level crossings are being removed is truly worrying without due diligence being undertaken. The floods in Lilydale are being blamed on the hasty build of the new Lilydale Station and the business owners are now paying the price and say that they expressed their concerns at the time but were not listened to. We do not want to be in that position in the future when we are able now to

ensure that where we live is protected and our concerns are heard. This is our chance to speak about these very serious issues before it is too late.

Despite these concerns our priority is saving the Railway House. These houses don't stand the test of time on their own. It takes those who care for them to preserve them, it takes the community to call out efforts to remove them. Our love of all things historical can be seen whenever the steam train puffs and whistles its way up the Pakenham line to Gippsland and spectators line the tracks and level crossings all the way to wave and remember a bygone era that isn't really gone when we can experience it in what we see and hear and love.

### **Beaconsfield CFA**



I would like to share with the community some history of the brigade.

The Beaconsfield CFA was founded in 1944 and only recently lost one of its first members,

Bruce Adamson, a name synonymous with Beaconsfield.

The original station which housed our first vehicle and a small meeting room sits at the rear of the old fire station and the front which now houses a mower business was completed in 1972. We are now comfortably housed in our new station nearly opposite the old building.


look forward to working with the community again.




